## District 67 ok's new sex ed curriculum

A sex education curriculum was approved for kindergarten thru grades 4 at last Thursday night's District 67 school board meeting. Following School Superintendent William Stout's recommendation, the material will be introduced into the grammar school in a 2 year phase program. The kindergarten through 2nd grade students will begin the study this semester, as the lessons are basically the same as are currently being taught at this level. To enable 3rd and 4th grade teachers to deal with questions that may arise with the new material, the Board voted to begin with those grades in September. ## 20-40 store shopping mall planned for Ballard/Greenwood

# Study plans for shopping complex

The Niles Village Board of Trustees Tuesday evening heard a petition for a 4 acre shopping complex on the property at 8854 Greenwood at Ballard. Attorney Bernard Davis representing the petitioner told the board a 33,400 sq. ft. shopping mall had been approved by the Niles Plan Commission on Jan. 7. Gerald Estes, architect for Economics Research Association described the proposed shopping mall as 5 small specialty buildings clustered around a pedestrian mall. The buildings will be grouped around small malls or plazas to allow for a maximum of specialty shops. The amount of stores will vary depending upon the square footage of space needed by each lessee. They could vary from 400 sq. ft. to 1,400 sq. ft. if desired. Estes also told the board they felt the cumulative attraction of specialty stores such as **Continued on Page 31**

The Village of Niles and the Illinois Institute of Natural Resources are co-sponsors of Project Conserve, part of the Illinois Energy Conservation Program.  
Residents are asked to answer 26 questions about their homes and mail the survey to the Project Conserve office in Springfield. Data supplied by the homeowner is processed by a computer to produce a report containing the costs and savings of do-it-yourself or contractor-installed energy conservation actions such as storm windows, storm doors, ceiling insulation, **Continued on Page 31**

### Address inside parcel is delivery 'insurance'

The experienced parcel mailer knows that including full to and from addresses inside as well as outside the package is good insurance for delivery, Postmaster Louis G. Principali said.

"An address label sometimes drops off or becomes illegible, and when there is no return address or similar identification inside, there is little chance of delivery. However, postal employees try to identify the ad-

dresser or mailer, sometimes from tiny clues," he said.

Such an effort resulted in the recent delivery of a package mailed from an Illinois community. Postmaster Principali said the address label had come off, and since there was no external return address, the parcel went to a dead letter office.

There, the package was opened and a gift card was found reading only, "To Linda, from Mother and Daddy Grimes." The dead letter office returned the package to the town from where it was mailed. A post office clerk began telephoning people named Grimes in the local phone directory. He soon made contact with the senders, and the gift was again on its way to its Texas destination.

"A happy ending," Postmaster Principali said, but had the full addresses been included inside the package in the first place, a lot of time and anxiety could have been saved.

## Career/College Fair Tuesday at Oakton

Oakton Community College will present its fourth annual Career and College Fair this Tuesday, Feb. 19 from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. in Building 8 on the OCC Interim campus, Oakton and Nagle, Morton Grove.

"Pathways to Your Future" is the theme of this year's fair which will feature exhibits of Oakton's vocational-technical and college-transfer programs.

Representatives from 37 Illinois colleges and universities will also be on hand to discuss career programs at their institutions and to detail procedures for effectively transferring Oakton credits.

Among the many exhibits by Oakton faculty and program coordinators will be special demonstrations by the Automotive Technology (Apprentice) program. An internal combustion engine will be on display in Room 609 along with transmission, differential unit and brake system components.

An in-the-car explanation of the 1979 Chrysler transverse-mounted engine and drive system will also be available in Room 613.

The Law Enforcement program will have demonstrations of self defense and the use of a radar gun, and the Hotel-Motel Management program will continue its tradition of an elaborate and exciting exhibit.

Oakton's Career Placement Center will sponsor a discussion on the changes that could take place in the world and the future role of the worker in the next decade as part of the Fair's program.

Led by Shirley Aberg, vocational counselor for Maine Township, participants will ex-

plore the changing work place and see how their needs and values can impact the world of work in the present and future.

In addition to her role with the local high schools, Ms. Aberg has worked in the elementary school system and the community college setting. She has coordinated career educational programs with many North Shore school districts as well.

Writing Careers, a program offered by creative writing faculty members Liz LeBlanc and Steve Dolgin, will feature two guests at the Fair.

Gerold Kellman, editor-in-chief of Consumer Guide Magazine, will advise free-lance writers on marketing books and articles, especially in the Chicago area. Walter Sublette, former fiction editor of Playboy Magazine, will discuss fiction and poetry publication.

The Oakton Community College Jazz Percussion Ensemble, directed by Jake Jerger, will also perform at the fair.

The purpose of the Career and College Fair is to give Oakton students, high school juniors and seniors, recent graduates and other interested individuals an opportunity to evaluate career and college options.

By talking with professionals and college representatives, students will have an unusual opportunity to gather a substantial amount of information on which to base their career decisions.

Adults interested in investigating mid-career changes also will find the Career and College Fair helpful in selecting and evaluating the choices available to them.

## IBHE recommends funds to complete Oakton campus

The Illinois Board of Higher Education at its meeting on Feb. 5 included a recommendation for \$9.8 million to complete the Oakton Community College campus in Des Plaines in its proposed listing for higher education construction for fiscal year 1981.

"We are very encouraged that Oakton is high on the IBHE list," Christine Anderson, chairman of the OCC Board of Trustees, said.

"Oakton's funding request is urgent this year because it provides space for essential programs of the College. Without Phase II the campus contains only 60% of the basic educational facilities needed."

Facilities which the new funds would provide include 18 classrooms, nine vocational labs, faculty offices and related areas.

Ms. Anderson pointed out that the state legislature in the past has approved between \$20 and \$40 million for higher education construction.

"Only \$1.8 million in other projects are ahead of Oakton for capital construction and Oakton is the first community college on the list," she noted.

The IBHE recommendations have been forwarded to Governor Thompson for inclusion in his budget proposals to the state legislature.

The first phase of the construction of the Oakton campus is near completion and college officials have announced that it will open for classes on June 16. Moving furniture and equipment into the new building will begin April 7.

"It is vital to the interests of students and the community that we complete the Oakton campus as soon as possible," Ms. Anderson said.

### Loving, Sharing in Sex

I SAW an advertisement on the highway that read, "SEX! Now, since we have your attention..." The word "Sex" was used as an attention-getting device, then the sign company told the real story it wanted to convey.

Too often in marriage the sexual relationship suffers because there isn't enough genuine gut level, really involved type of communication. There is the "come on" to initially turn one another on, but then further necessary communication stops or is very scant.

I believe that many people have not learned to go beyond the sensational kind of communication. Certainly, much of today's advertisement capitalizes on this sensationalism of sex even to sell items that are in no way related to this very intimate relationship.

I believe people need to go beyond the sensational type of communication which perpetuates and sells sex as a commodity. Sexual intimacy needs to be the result of a loving and sharing kind of relationship.

During the preparation for and within the actual sexual act, the type and/or degree of communication can make the difference in the couple's sexual relationship. If there is a team effort and both are really trying to convey their feelings of mutual love, appreciation, and sexual satisfaction, then both can enjoy this intimate experience all the more.

The key to sexual fulfillment is "teamwork." Anyone can be inexperienced and possess little knowledge about the sexual relationship and still develop into an excellent sex partner if there is teamwork. Both the husband and wife need to be patient, loving, and understanding with each other.

Above all, they need to communicate what makes each other satisfied. Don't assume that your partner knows what will make you pleased and happy.

Each should share what is pleasing or not pleasing and thereby reinforce and support the positives in this relationship, then also give a step further by indicating in a loving way what else you would like for your spouse to do.

Remember, it takes time to develop a mutually rewarding and satisfying sexual relationship. Give each other time. Don't make it life or death if you have some difficulties in the sexual act or in becoming more sexually intimate.

By all means if you appear not to be able to work out the problems within several months or a year, then seek some professional help. Don't wait for years to pass and then become passive and uninterested in this vital means of communications and intimacy in your relationship.

You may have some block to involving yourself in such an intimate relationship or you may have some misinformation about sex or some attitude that is interfering with your finding sexual fulfillment.

Beware of your insensitivity to each other. A couple in counseling were having difficulty in their sexual relationship because they were not sensitive enough of one another's needs in their marital relationship as a whole.

He thinks he can say the word and she should be ready to jump in to bed with him, whereas, he does very little to give her any praise and recognition or to show his sense of love and appreciation before the sexual act. This latter kind of communication is very important to the wife.

Also, I know a couple where the wife is constantly belittling her husband and making him feel less than a man. Then she wonders why he isn't a good sex partner.

How can he be? How each makes the other feel before intercourse greatly affects each other positively or negatively. It is very much felt and communicated during the sex act because most couples are quite sensitive and emotionally vulnerable at this time.

Because of this sensitivity it is important to be careful not to be too harsh or severe with each other; rather be open, receptive, understanding, and above all, loving.

Note that I have stressed relationship. Don't use sex as a tool to get back or hurt one another. Sex is not a weapon, tool or a commodity.

Rather, sexual intimacy/fulfillment comes out of a meaningful relationship. It takes real team effort on the part of both of you. Working together, loving each other and being able to communicate your feelings openly to each other makes a big difference in how meaningful and satisfying your physical communication can become in your marital relationship.

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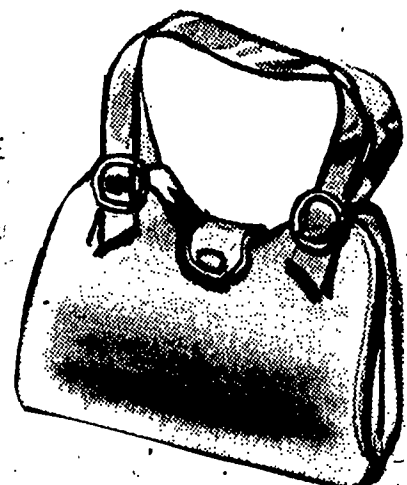

### Support bill to control handguns

Dear Editor:  
I am writing in order to urge my neighbors to support S 1936, a bill designed to stop the proliferation of handguns and to substantially improve handgun control without expensive Federal enforcement and regulatory machinery. S 1936 was introduced by Senator Edward Kennedy and Representative Peter Rodino, the Chairmen of the Senate and House Committees on the Judiciary which oversee handgun control legislation.

Among other things the Kennedy-Rodino bill would prohibit the manufacture, sale and transfer of the so-called Saturday Night Specials; would require swift and sure punishment for those who misuse handguns; would screen-out illegal purchasers of handguns; and would require product accountability. Moreover, those who suffer from handgun crime would be financially helped in paying hospital costs.

Passage of a strong handgun control bill is long overdue. In 1978, for example, there were nearly 10,000 handgun murders and over 250,000 other handgun crimes—shootings, assaults, robberies, and rapes.

I hope anyone who supports this legislation will write their elected members of Congress and let them know.

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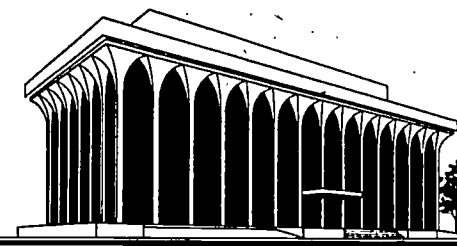

## A new adventure in gourmet meats

If you haven't had the success that you would like in cooking frozen meat, the following may be helpful: The basic principle for cooking frozen meat is a longer cooking period — usually double the time needed for thawed meat — at a lower temperature.

To broil steaks and chops with gas, turn the flame to medium.

To broil with electricity, use medium heat if the element is adjustable. If not, lower the broiler pan in the oven in order to lower the cooking temperature.

FOR MEDIUM RARE STEAKS			
Thickness	Top of steak from heat	Frozen Thawed	Minutes for each side
3/4 inch	5-1/2"	2"	10-12 5-6
1 inch	7-1/4"	3-1/2"	16-18 8-9
1-1/4 inch	7"	5-1/4"	18-20 9-10

Add approximately 1 minute for each side done "medium" and 2-3 minutes each side for "well done".

When specified time has elapsed, make an incision in the steak or chop to see if the meat is done the way you like.

Frozen roast allow 1/2 more time per pound.

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## District 207 projects added decrease in enrollment

At its Feb. 4 meeting, the Maine Board of Education heard Robert Jacobson, Director of Special Projects, District 207, report that new enrollment projections for the school district forecast even fewer students over the next five years than was predicted last year.

The new projection for the 1984-85 school year shows 6,750 students, 180 students less than the 6,930 predicted for the 1984-85 school year a year ago.

The 1980-81 enrollment projection is 9,100, down from the current enrollment of 9,912. As a result the District plans to reduce its teaching staff by 43 positions next school year.

During the meeting the Board approved a proposed 1980-81 school calendar for District 207 showing students in the Maine High Schools starting school on Aug. 27 and school ending on June 11.

The Christmas break will extend from Dec. 22 thru Jan. 4, 1981, and Spring break will be from March 27 thru April 5.

The Board also approved an emergency closing plan should an energy shortage be declared in this area. Under the plan, all four high schools will close on Mondays for the duration of the emergency. The five hours of the required school time on Monday will be made up by extending each of the school days, Tuesday thru Friday, by one hour and 15 minutes.

The Board also voted to establish its own computer operation by purchasing its own on-line computer service from Midwest System Group Burroughs at a cost of \$361,820. The Board also voted to notify the Institute for Educational Research (IER-TIES), which has supplied computer service to the school district since 1973, that the school district will no longer be part of the consortium of school districts working together for data services.

With several school districts dropping out of TIES, the consortium is no longer cost effective. The cooperative, which is presently housed in the Ralph Frost Administration Center in District 207, will be dissolved as of July 31.

The new computer system is to be operational by June 30. The district will pay for the new computer system over a period of five years. The district estimates the annual cost of the operation will range between from \$220,000 to \$251,000 until 1984-85, after which the district will own the equipment.

These amounts were close to the cost paid TIES. Actually, the school district should save \$17,000 the first year of operation. Once the district owns the equipment costs should drop about \$80,000 per year, according to Donald Kenney, Assistant Superintendent/Business.

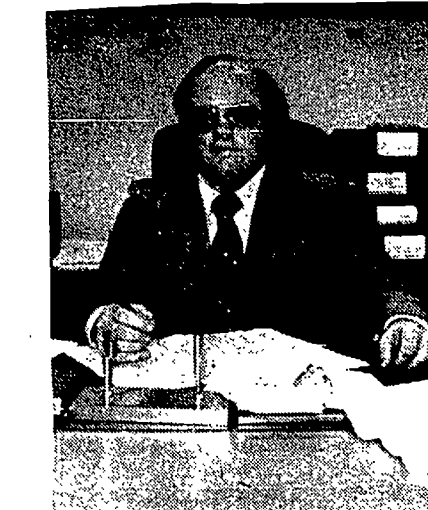

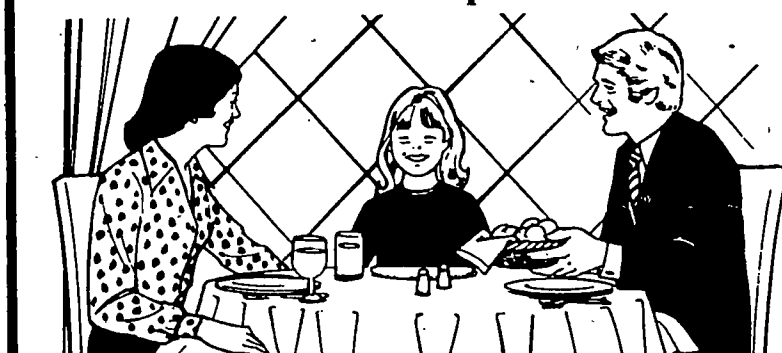

sanitary sewers. This was accomplished by placing meters in sewers in 14 locations to see if levels were rising during rainstorms. Another technique, which may have caught the eye of village residents, was setting off smoke bombs and tracking the smoke escape which would simulate rainwater seepage. This smoke testing was done in over 126,000 feet of sewers.

The next step is for sewer cleaning and internal inspection of sewers by TV cameras, which will be done over the summer. Eventually corrective measures will be employed if they are felt to be cost effective. Various options would be building interceptors or retention ponds.

## BRAVOS FOR BRUNCH!

### BASIC BELGIAN WAFFLES

Bake these extra-thick and crisp waffles on a special Belgian waffle iron.

2 cups all-purpose flour

1 tsp. salt

5 eggs, separated

1/2 cup butter or margarine, melted

1 tsp. vanilla extract

2 cups milk

In a small bowl, mix flour and salt; set aside. In a large bowl, beat egg whites with electric mixer on high speed until stiff peaks form. In another bowl, beat yolks until thickened and lemon-colored, about 5 minutes. Stir in melted butter or margarine and vanilla. Alternately add flour mixture and milk to yolk mixture, beating well after each addition. Fold egg whites into yolk mixture. Prepare Belgian waffle iron according to manufacturer's directions. Using 1-1/4 cups batter for each waffle, bake on preheated waffle iron 30 to 60 seconds. Turn waffle iron; continue baking 2 to 3 minutes or until steaming stops and waffle is golden brown. Makes 6 waffles.

### ORANGE SUNSHINE WAFFLES

1/2 cup sugar

1/4 cup cornstarch

1-3/4 cups orange juice

1/4 cup maple-flavored syrup

4 oranges, peeled, sectioned

1 (4-oz.) carton frozen whipped topping, thawed

1 (8-oz.) carton plain yogurt

1/4 cup maple-flavored syrup

Basic Belgian Waffles

Toasted slivered almonds

In a medium saucepan, mix sugar and cornstarch. Stir in orange juice and 1/4 cup maple syrup. Stir constantly over medium-high heat until mixture thickens and bubbles. Stir in orange sections. Cool only until warm. In a small bowl, beat whipped topping, yogurt and 1/4 cup maple syrup until fluffy. Chill until serving time. Prepare Basic Belgian Waffles. Serve waffles topped with whipped topping mixture and warm orange sauce. Garnish with toasted, slivered almonds. Makes 10 servings.

boutiques, gift shops and special service shops will offer the area something that is not now available and will attract customers.

Estes noted that meetings had been held with representatives of School District 63 and all suggestions from the district had been taken into consideration. Sidewalks will be installed on both Greenwood and Ballard to facilitate both customers and school children in the area.

Laurence Slutzky, representing School District 63, told the board the district was satisfied with the changes in the plans and therefore had no objection to the proposed shopping center.

One further comment by Mr. Estes regarding the diverting of sewer and drainage tile on the property and the establishment of a retention basin on the adjoining Krilich property invoked many comments and questions by board members wherein Mayor Blase suggested a personal inspection of the property Saturday morning. The decision on approval of the mall was then continued to the Feb. 26 village board meeting.

In other business Trustee Peter Pesole presented the board members with a map of the Nordica ave. area and stated Trustee Ang Marcheschi and he felt the islands on the street which had originally been installed by the developer for beautification purposes were not but an eyesore and detriment to the area. Manual labor by public works employees was used for cleanup of the area and the street sweeper could not be used because of the projecting islands which were a catchall for trash and garbage.

Pesole told the board that 4 power poles on the islands could be moved by Commonwealth Edison for \$1,199 and concrete work involved with the removal of the islands and fixing of the curbs would run \$3,900. Pesole recommended the board consider the expenditure of \$5,000 to beautify this area and thereby eliminate the need for the manual labor by Public Works employees. His request was passed by the board.

Trustee Carol Panek reported Merchants Discounts for Senior Citizens was now available in booklet form at the Administration building or the Trident Center.

Panek also reported the results of the questionnaire on Cable Television which had been sent out to all Niles residents. Regarding the returns, 59% thought Cable TV was a good idea, 20% said it may be a good idea and 20% did not think it was a good idea. Panek also said 11 Cable TV companies have submitted requests for the franchise from our area.

Ted Henderson, builder and associate with Alfred LaCerra, received approval for construction of a 3-flat building at 7457 Waukegan rd. The building will consist of 2-3 bedroom units and 12 bedroom units.

After a lengthy presentation, Robert Loomis representing American Sign Indicator was denied permission by the board by a 4-2 vote to construct a third sign on the property of Dave Cory Ford, 6200 Touhy ave. Loomis was appealing the village board for approval after denial by the Sign Board of Appeals. Marv Lotz of the Leaning Tower YMCA, 6300 Touhy, told the board they were opposed to the proposed flashing sign and said it could not conform with the appearance of the

## Homestead Exemption forms

Homeowners, aged 65 or older as of January 1, who have not yet applied for a Homestead Exemption tax break may do so by contacting Rep. Penny Pullen's office at 22 Main St., Park Ridge. Her office is open Monday through Thursday, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., and her telephone number is 823-2023.

There is no income restriction on who may apply. The senior citizen must have owned and lived in his or her current home on or before January 1, 1980, and must have reached his or her 65th birthday by that date.

Rep. Pullen recommended those interested in obtaining an application call her office about an appointment.

Rep. Pullen said applicants will need to furnish a photocopy of a recent real estate tax bill of the deed or title policy or torrens certificate, and of age proof such as birth or baptismal certificate (together with marriage certificate in the case of a married woman). A copy of the drivers license and medicare card together (but not separately) will suffice.

Copies may be made at her office at no charge for purposes of the Homestead Exemption, Miss Pullen added.

These five candidates were winnowed out from the ten "most suitable" of 60 applicants said Lloyd Gillet, board chairman.

A former administrator, Edith Jackson, left under controversial circumstances. Acting administrator is Ruth Machowski.

Robert McClarren, system director, and Robert Bullen, administrative assistant, both of the North Suburban Library System (NSLS) independently ranked applicants for the position. According to numerical scoring both qualified the same ten candidates as top ranking.

NSLS suggestions were received by members of the Niles Library board who are working as a committee of the whole to interview candidates.

Contacted at home, Lloyd Gillet, board chairman, said the top five persons confirmed they will be available for interviews. He said if for any reason an applicant cannot be chosen from these candidates, board members will interview applicants from the remainder of the list.

Applications were due by Nov. 30. An administrator will probably not be installed before Spring.

## Porter backs Olympics boycott

John Edward Porter cast his first vote as the 10th District's new Congressman in favor of the House resolution backing President Carter's call for an American boycott of the Olympics in Moscow unless Soviet troops withdraw from Afghanistan.

Porter cast his vote with an overwhelming majority of the House just a few hours after House Speaker Thomas (Tip) O'Neill of Massachusetts administered the oath of office to Porter on Thursday, Jan. 24.

The question of the Olympics boycott continues to dominate the news as other nations weigh whether to join the boycott move.

Porter said he was gratified that his first day on the House floor gave him the chance to affirm his view that the Soviets should not be allowed to exploit their huge financial and propagandistic investment in the Moscow games, in light of their invasion of Afghanistan.

The Congressman said that when the Olympics issue first arose, he was not inclined to favor the boycott because of the deep disappointment it would cause American athletes who have trained strenuously the past four years without financial support from the government or any commercial remuneration.

In addition to his sympathy for the 10,000 athletes who are competing for the 550 places on the American team, Porter said, he was concerned that a boycott initiated by Washington would be seen as an attempt to politicize the Olympics.

"After weighing all the considerations," Porter said, "I believed it was clear that our taking part in the Moscow games would tend to grant legitimacy to a country guilty of brutal and unprovoked military aggression."

The resolution backed Mr. Carter's threat not to support American participation in the Olympics if the Soviet Union did not withdraw its troops from Afghanistan by Feb. 20.

## Computerized blood pressure tests at Cook County Federal

Now, as a community service, residents of the Morton Grove area can test their own blood pressure by consulting the Vita-Stat Computerized Blood Pressure Teller at the Morton Grove branch office of Cook County Federal Savings, 9147 Waukegan rd., Morton Grove. This service is provided free during normal business hours.

More than one out of every four Americans have a potentially dangerous blood pressure problem, and 46% of them don't know they have it, or are untreated. Yet high blood pressure can be treated and controlled.

These statistics prompted Frank A. Newman, Director of Marketing, at Cook County Federal Savings, to install the Blood Pressure Teller originally at their main office, 2720 W. Devon ave., in Chicago, last May. Since that time, over 22,000 people have used the Blood Pressure Teller at the main office.

"These Blood Pressure Tellers are intended for use as a screening device for detecting high blood pressure, and for monitoring the progress of therapy between physician visits," said Mr. Newman. "They are provided as a free service to



area residents and visitors as part of the responsibility we feel as a contributing member of our community.

"The Blood Pressure Tellers are not meant to take the place of a physician," cautioned Mr. Newman. "The final diagnosis of high blood pressure should be made by a doctor. Our Blood Pressure Tellers are only intended as an aid in the detection and control of high blood pressure."

The Blood Pressure Tellers at both locations are inspected regularly.

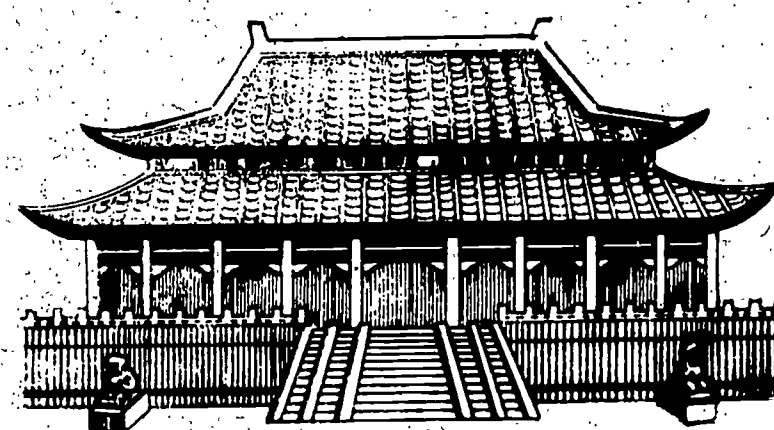

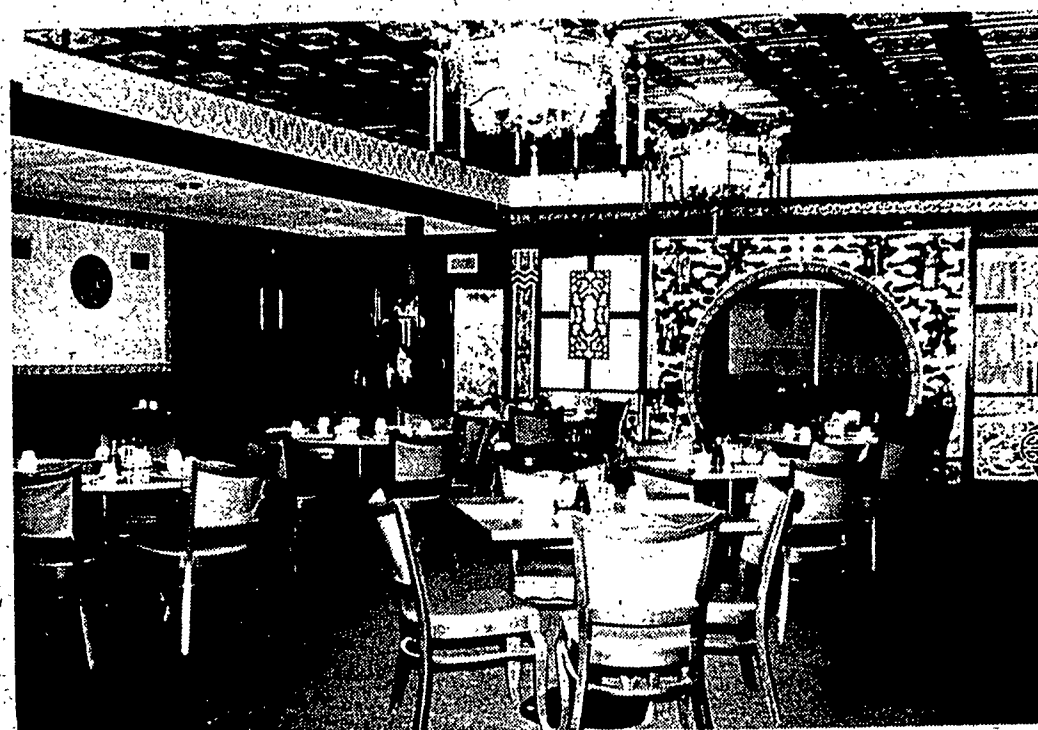
