"Physical exercise promotes good circulation in the heart and extremities and tends to create an overall sense of well-being," states Rubin. "When the weather is bad outside, you can still walk back and forth in the house and end up walking the same distance as you would outside."

While he cautions that seniors should consult their own physician before beginning any exercise program, Rubin believes that walking is usually the most practical form of exercise for seniors. But even the most exercise-eager senior can be discouraged from walking if

he or she has painful feet. Some seniors think that painful foot problems are an unavoidable consequence of the aging process. "Not so," says Rubin. He points out that with modern treatment methods, most of the common foot problems that hold seniors back from getting proper exercise can be eliminated or relieved. "The trouble is, many seniors just don't know this, and their foot problems can end up influencing a general deterioration

talked with you often. You are a very special person to me." The lady who wrote this poem was probably motivated by a very special reason. For once upon a time, a long time ago, she took care of a very young beautiful child, when she wasn't much more than a baby.

Does that ring a bell?

No? Let me refresh your memory. Carla Aliotta was stabbed to death about midnight, along a bridle path in the Skokie Lagoon Forest Preserve, just west of

Glencoe, on Tuesday, Feb. 14, 1978. Miss Aliotta's body was found in the cold snow; she had been stabbed twice, once in the chest and once in the stomach. Police surmised that the girl was brought there by car. They further speculated the girl walked from the car with her killer whom she probably knew.

Shortly, prior to this, four other young girls were slain in the northern and northwestern suburbs.

Victims of these unsolved murders were Laura Anne Williams, 16, found in May, 1977 near the Glenview Naval Air Station; Lisa Slusser, 12, found in August in a woods along the Des Plaines River; Susan Clarke, 16, found in August in a weeded area near the Edens Expressway in Skokie; and, Debbie Rosencrans, 16, found in September in a Forest Preserve near Schiller Park


