Their parking lot was emptying out by the time we left in mid-afternoon. It took us 20 minutes before we exited onto the street.

Since Levitz attracts working stiffs, and semi-working stiffs such as newspaper people, we had to conclude today's economy is still perking along. The people-mix were all ages. Lots of younger people, many with young children. But there were many of the post-50 crowd also buying.

Since we are giving you a lesson on today's economy, we've bad news for the Chrysler Corporation. A brother-in-law has been a loyal Chrysler products purchaser for the past 20 years. His last General Motors car was a 1951 Pontiac.

Last week we were together at a brunch in Chicago. Afterwards he asked me to drive him home. Then he changed his mind and asked me to drop him off at Carol Buick in Evanston. An hour later he had broken his 20-year Chrysler streak by purchasing a small Buick. He said he still preferred Chrysler. He thought the little Cordoba was a better buy than the small Regal, and he said it was probably a better car. But he spoke the words all Chrysler executives dread hearing. He asked what happens if Chrysler goes under? He feared if the company should close its doors, parts would be hard to find.

This is the fear which Chrysler must allay. Instead of their President going on television to soothe the natives with sweet taik, the company should guarantee a support system would be available to all Chrysler buyers for the next 5 years.

Chrysler lost a very important sale when the bro-in-law made the switch. He's the kind of guy who would have rather fought than switched. But his loyalty waned when his pocketbook was threatened.

We're writing this article and intend sending it on to Detroit. While Chrysler's public relations people won't be too happy reading it, we're hoping we will be doing them a favor.

The domestic automobile business needs at least 3 major competitors. The loss of one drastically reduces the competition between companies. All Americans would suffer by such a loss.

In Tuesday's Sun-Times a black man, Roland Wormley, wrote an article in the Views column of the paper. It was a touching article and we call it to your attention. We identify Wormley as black only because he identifies

himself that way. It is important because he is interested in saving Sacred Heart Roman Catholic Church, 11652 South Church st., on the far south side. And it's germane to the article since Wormley is not Catholic. And it is likely Sacred Heart is predominantly white.

Wormley and many other south siders, primarily parishioners, are trying to keep the church going. Cardinal Cody said it could cost too much money to correct buildingcode violations and meet other construction needs. He also said there was a shortage of priests which makes it difficult to replace the retired Father Borchardt.

A Sheila Murphy went from courtroom to courtroom trying to stave off the closing of the church. She showed the community had raised large sums of money to make the necessary repairs.

In February Mayor Byrne attended a special service at the church to celebrate the news the church would be considered for landmark status. If this were granted by the Commission on Chicago Historical and Architectural Landmarks, the church would not be demolished.

A few days ago the hearing was postponed. There was no explanation given.

Wormley urges all Chicagoans who care to call Chicago's City Hall and urge the commission hold a hearing. He then asks all to come and join the fight on behalf of the church.

A couple of years ago we wrote a similar article concerning the closing of Providence-St. Mel high school. Today, the school is still alive. This very fine school has been sending a very high number of its graduates on to advanced learning.

We think this fight is worth the battle.

The subcommittee invited staff members to make presentations on six areas of curriculum in District 207, including English, language, math, social science, science, and the Learning Resource Center (library). These presentations have been completed. At its May 15 meeting the subcommittee intends to review information it has assembled over the past two months and begin drafting the report it will submit to the Board of Education in June regarding recommended curriculum design for the 1980's.

Two particular concerns have developed during the two month study: (1) the difficulty in recommending future curriculum programs in the Maine schools without knowing district plans regarding building usage; (2) the number of periods in the school day, and in particular the potentiality of conflicts arising from courses requiring more than one period of class time.





tained at the finance department in Village Hall, 5127 Oakton. The fee is \$4 for all neutered animals, and \$8 for non-neutered others. To obtain a license, owners must show a rabies vaccination certificate.

According to the environmental control spokesman identifying animals in bite cases is vitally important, and complete licensing of pets helps this process. "When we have a bite case," he said, "all our efforts go into finding the animal. Bite cases are top priority in our department and we can find licensed animals much easier."
