Delivery personnel are being reminded that if an unrestrained animal threatens their safety at a particular residence, they are not. required to risk injury by attemtisement for bids on the 1980 pting to make delivery. In such instances, mail service will be curtailed to that residence and not resumed until such time as the owner of the dog provides the post office with written assurance that the animal will be controlled in the future during delivery hours.

The Postmaster also noted that delivery service personnel bitten by customer animals are encouraged by the Office of Worker's CompensationProgram (OWCP) under "e Federal Employee's Compensation Act (FECA, 5 USC 8101 et seq.), to pursue a claim against the person or party responsible, or his/her insurance company. Often such settlements result in damage payments amounting to thousands of dollars.

Effective control of personal pets, however, is the most effective safety precaution a customer can take to ensure his delivery carrier is properly safeguarded against dog bites, the Postmaster
