Morton Grove leads tax rate hikes with 60.5%

Morton Grove led local municipalities with a tax rate increase of 60.5% according to real estate tax figures released Tuesday by Cook County Clerk Stanley T. Kusper. Lincolnwood followed closely with a 50.1% increase over the 1978 rates.

Thomas Downes, treasurer for the Village of Morton Grove blamed his suburb's 60.5% rate hike on a decline in vehicle licenses fees and large increases in garbage collection fees, employee wages and energy costs. Tax rates for other local

municipalities included Park Ridge up 28.2% and Niles up 14.1%. Skokie residents will enjoy a 5% decrease in their tax rate as will residents of Des Plaines who will receive a 2.5% decrease.

District 67 approves \$3 million budget

District 67 school board members gave tentative approval to the 1980-81 school year budget at their August 14 meeting. The disbursements total over \$3,000,000.

This amount includes \$2,293,235 in the educational fund, \$461,400

for operations, buildings, and maintenance, and \$204,900 in bond and interest payments. According to law, final approval must be 30 days from the publication of the detailed budget figures. Next month's regular

Parking problems and flooding cited as main objections

Park hears health club objectors

The Niles Park Board Tuesday evening heard objections from 9 Nilesites against the health club proposed for the Grennan Heights Recreation Center.

While most of the objections stemmed from concern about parking problems and additional flooding in the area, Nilesite Tom Flynn, 8223 Oconto told the board he objected vigorously "to closing a public building and using it for a private club." Flynn also cited the proposed deletion of the pre-school program at the Grennan Heights center, but was told by Park Director Bill Hughes that the decision to delete the pre-school program there was made long before the health club plans came into being due to a decline in

enrollment over the past 8 years. Hughes noted all pre-school programs would continue and they intended to consolidate them in other park locations.

Flynn also cited the board for proceeding with the architectural plans for the health club without holding a public meeting where the residents could voice their opinions as taxpayers. He also suggested that since we have a reciprocal agreement with the Village of Morton Grove for the use of their Prairie View Center and they are apparently having problems there and their membership is down, why couldn't those interested in the health club concept use their facilities? Park president Dan Kosiba told Flynn,

Students apply now for social security number

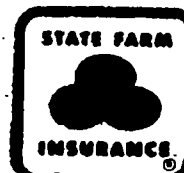

certified documents, not photocopies. Your social security card is mailed to you about six weeks after you apply. To replace a lost or stolen card, you need to complete a form and show proof of identification. Pat Feichter returns from Democratic Convention

Patton Feichter, Niles Carter Delegate, was greeted at the Democratic Convention with open arms. Three days later two of those arms reached into his pockets and mugged him for a \$40 loss. Feichter said this was the only opportunity he had to discuss economic problems with a typical New Yorker.

The Illinois Delegation was greeted on Sunday by aides to Byrne, Kennedy and Carter. Feichter was warmly received by Ed Quigley, Sewer Commissioner from Chicago, who wanted his vote for an open (Kennedy) convention. Feichter supported the President.

Senator Kennedy spoke to the Illinois Delegation on Monday. Feichter said the best part of the meeting was the free breakfast. Coffee and orange juice cost \$4.75 and breakfast was \$10 at his hotel. Lunch was around \$15 and dinners began at \$25. Our Niles delegate ate out a lot in economic self defense. His total costs for the 4 day convention exceeded \$1,000.

Feichter said the real convention ended on Monday evening when Kennedy lost his bid for an open convention. However, he was offered a lifetime subscription to Playboy Magazine on Tuesday by Christie Heffner if he would support Federal funding of Abortion. He voted against the Rule.

The feminists were successful in passing a Rule that forbids Democratic Party contributions to candidates who oppose ERA. Kennedy won an important battle calling for a \$12 billion job program for the unemployed. Carter was allowed to keep his \$30 billion MX missile program for the Western States.

Bob Weinberger, Democratic Congressional Candidate, was on the floor in more ways than one on Tuesday. First Marge Benton and Dore Williams, Carter Delegates, argued with him over his statement of possible endorsement of John Anderson for President. Then, Weinberger and Feichter crossed long distance verbal swords before Weinberger gave his full support for President Carter.

Feichter said that Senator Kennedy was colder to President Carter than the Madison Square Garden air conditioning. It was obvious to the Delegates that Kennedy is a sore loser. However, he added that the Kennedy workers would support Carter in the Fall out of fear of Ronald Reagan.

He was chosen a "key" Illinois Delegate by the Los Angeles Times and was interviewed by channel two and NBC network news. The press and media did everything possible to point up the conflict between Kennedy and Carter.

Feichter said he was grateful for his day in the Sun but looked forward to sharing his experiences with his students at Maine Township HS South. He plans on working for Carter this Fall and remaining active in local Democratic politics. He also might run for the Legislature in 1982 after all Illinois Districts are redrawn.

I asked him what his most memorable experience was and he told me. "I know how Senator Kennedy feels. He couldn't find enough votes in the primaries and lost the nomination. I couldn't find a policeman after I was mugged and lost \$40. We both lost something in the Big Apple."

"Tele-Care Program" for persons living alone

Physical Exams and Immunizations for Students Required by State

School District No. 71 Superintendent Clarence E. Culver today urged parents of the community to have their children fully immunized against certain diseases before school begins on September 3.

Mr. Culver explained that state law requires all children entering school to be immunized against polio, diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis (whooping cough), measles, and rubella.

Also, children are required to have physical examinations before entering school for the first time and at the fifth and ninth grade levels.

Students attending both public and nonpublic schools have to meet the immunization and physical examination requirements. Children who fail to meet the state health requirements can be excluded from attending school.

To prevent the occurrence of an epidemic, 90 per cent of the children in Illinois need to be immunized in each disease category, according to state health officials.

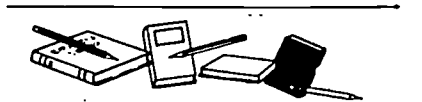

New leader of Beth Emet Synagogue

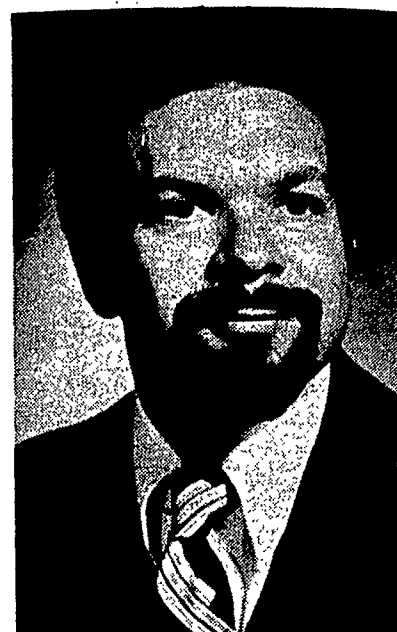
Rabbi Peter S. Knobel is the new spiritual leader of Beth Emet the Free Synagogue, 1224 W. Dempster st., Evanston.

District 71 Free and Reduced Meals program

Niles Elementary School District 71 today announced its policy for free meals and reduced price meals served on the National School Lunch Program.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size and income criteria for determining eligibility:

Children from families whose income is at or below levels shown are eligible for free meals or reduced price meals.

In addition, families that do not meet these criteria but have expenses such as unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms are being given to all parents on day of registration, August 28. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space for signature certifying that all information furnished in the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of Federal funds, that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable State and criminal statutes.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for free or reduced price meals for them, the family should contact the school. If a family member becomes unemployed or if family size changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for reduced price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals if the family income falls at or below the levels shown above.

All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child nutrition programs, no child will be discriminated against because of his/her race, sex, color, or national origin.

Under the provisions of the policy, a Local School Official will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he/she may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If he/she wishes to make a formal appeal, he/she may make a request either orally or in writing to a Local School Hearing Official for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

Amidst the brown boxes, the 2 teens and the little Mother and Father, an endless stream of Betty Coeds began squeezing into the room, laughing, gripping about the food, shaking hands, squealing and just being friendly. They were from Edwardsville and Bensenville and "she worked at Lyttons" and "I remember you from orientation" and "boy, was the food bad ... I was sick for 3 days with the flu ... and I'm sure it was from the food." It was an endless stream of people, all young and full of talk.

It was supertime and the number 1 daughter had very little for lunch so Little Mother said we'd take her out for a bite ... but naturally, she wasn't hungry, and I gave Little Mother the "Let's get out of here and leave her alone" look.

She kissed us goodbye and Mother remembered she needed a few dollars cash. She kissed us again and I even counted a 3rd time, which was some sort of a record. It must have been that good clean corn-bearing DeKalb air.

We left I borrowed an old standard bromide from a friend by telling the girls, "Have a good time and be good girls ... but not necessarily in that order." They all laughed and then they all told me what their old Dads said and I realized all old Dads are much the same ... pretty corny.

As we started the drive home we mulled over whether the school was too large. "Maybe we should've considered a smaller school." Little Mother worried because She missed supper and She wouldn't have anything to eat. "The least I could have done was left her some fruit," she worried and soon Mother was dozing as we headed for the tollway.

Exiting at Dempster st. I told Little Mother, "Look at it this way ... you didn't lose a daughter, you gained a car." I thought it was kind of funny but she ignored the little morale booster.

When we arrived home the younger brigade peremptorily asked us 2 or 3 questions about "her school" and then reviewed the sprinkling fight they'd had, and lapsed into a finger-pointing battle over who did what to whom.

There's now one less finger-pointer at home ... and we're going to miss her. But I realized as we sat down to dinner, it's only a matter of minutes before someone spills something. And I was right ... and suddenly had a lump in my throat.

business meeting has therefore been moved to Thursday, September 18.

It was explained by Mrs. Madge Bilanko, school business manager, that after this year the district will have retired all bonds. Residents can therefore expect a slight tax decrease because there will be no future levy for this purpose.

There has been much attention given lately to the possibility of

eliminating the office of township school treasurer, but Mrs. Bilanko pointed out the benefits of that office for Dist. 67. Earnings on investments this past year have been \$149,471. The pooling of resources among the smaller district schools as well as the "great interest rates" are responsible for this income to schools.

Despite the closing of one of the district schools, the upcoming

"Morton Grove has a totally different concept. We will have more of a health development program with a health instructor available for health hints. Our club will be useful for all ages over 18 with proper instructions from the health instructor."

Flynn told The Bugle's spokesman for Morton Grove's Prairie View Center stated their facility has exercise rooms, whirlpool, sauna and a weight room for exercise which is everything Niles is offering in their health club. In addition Morton Grove offers racquetball court time at an additional \$5 per hour.

Flynn also noted that Morton Grove charges a \$50 yearly membership fee for a family and \$25 for an individual which is far less than the proposed \$75 yearly individual fee for Niles. Kosiba stated that SOS funds (Save Open Space) are being used for the Health Club improvement at Grennan Heights and no real estate tax monies are going to be used for this improvement.

Grennan Heights resident John Healy told the board that the 'people are up in arms over Grennan Heights and we want a public meeting to give us, as taxpayers, a vote on the health club.' Healy also cited poor parking conditions when functions such as square dancing and teen groups take place. In addition 3 precincts use Grennan Heights on voting days and the problems on those days alone with 40 precinct workers not to mention the voters themselves are horrendous.

Kosiba cited Flynn's remarks as being "full of misinformation." In order to clarify exactly what the health club will encompass and the plans for park programs, Park Director read the following

year's budget is very similar to last year's. According to school board president Ted Lucas, "in figuring the budget for the immediate future, the closing of one school does not have much effect."

Although it was decided to close Goll Elementary, the oldest school in the district, it has become apparent that Hynes school is now in need of major roofing and boiler room repairs. Star roofers have been awarded the contract for reroofing at \$44,150.

Board member Judy Kochman was upset over these expenditures. "I don't understand how this didn't come up when we were talking about closing a school. Now \$50,000 for a new roof and the boiler needs repair. I am upset that all this information was not on hand last year when we voted to close the school that I really wanted to remain open."

School superintendent William Stout responded, "I don't think it's relevant in this context. We decided to maintain the schools regardless and not to sell them."

completion of the project is \$175,000.

He requested the group to assign a spokesman so the meeting will be organized. At that time Kosiba said, "We will clarify your grievances and possibly take a second look at the health club."

Commonwealth Edison Company hereby gives notice to the Public that it has filed with the Illinois Commerce Commission on August 8, 1980, proposed changes in its rates and charges for electric public utility service in all of the areas in which it provides retail service.

Such changes involve and would effect a general rate increase, providing for estimated increases in charges for the following classes of customers: Residential - 20.1%; Residential Space Heating Customers - 16.4%; Water Heating - 19.7%; Commercial, Industrial and Governmental - 19.9%; Governmental Pumping - 19.7%; Non-Residential Space Heating Customers - 14.9%; Transit Services - 19.7%; Street and Area Lighting - 9.8%.

The proposed charges would increase the bills of a residential customer using 300 kilowatt-hours in any month by \$3.99 per month (19.7%) averaged over the year. If the customer used 600 kilowatt-hours a month, the corresponding increase would be \$7.98 (20.0%) and if 1,000 kilowatt-hours, \$13.22 (20.4%). The increase shown include light bulb service and average July, 1980 fuel adjustment and revenue taxes. The proposed increases may, therefore, vary slightly from the above amounts depending on place of residence and whether the customer has chosen bulb service.

Special Education Program

The Maine Township Special Education Program (M.T.S.E.P.) is a Joint Agreement organized to provide cooperative planning and services which will assure equal education opportunity for all children, ages 3 through 21 or graduation, residing within the boundaries of school Districts #62, #63, #64 and #67.

In order to provide equal educational opportunities for all, M.T.S.E.P. provides special education programs and services for all exceptional children. Adaptations are made for individual differences.

M.T.S.E.P. is funded by local district taxes and by State and Federal reimbursement programs. State and Federal funds pay a portion of the following: certain types of programs and services; salaries of special education personnel; vocational student salaries (Department of Rehabilitation Services); student tuition to private facilities; pupil transportation; and equipment and materials. Local member districts share the majority of costs based on the number of students enrolled in special classes.

DETERMINING THE NEED FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION

1. Annual district registration is conducted for all exceptional children between the ages of 3 and 21 who have not previously registered in the public schools. The date for registration is announced in the local newspapers. Parents who miss scheduled registration dates may contact the M.T.S.E.P. office, 1131 South Dee Road, Park Ridge, at any time for enrollment assistance.

2. Screening and identification procedures have been developed and are continuously improved.

3. A specified method of referral has been developed and is accessible to all concerned persons. Referrals may be made by school district personnel, parents, persons having primary care and custody of the child, other persons having knowledge of the child's problems, the child or the Illinois State Office of Education. Referrals may be initiated by contacting the local school district Special Education Coordinator or the M.T.S.E.P. office. (See names and phone numbers listed below.)

4. All children who may require special education services are referred to a designated resource for evaluation and appropriate educational planning.

5. All components of a complete case study evaluation are available to students who may be experiencing problems which interfere with school performance.

6. Eligibility for and the provision of a special education instructional program or service, shall be determined at one or more multi-disciplinary staff conferences.

Multi-disciplinary staff conferences may include: parents, regular classroom teachers, Principal, District Special Education Coordinator, special education teacher, learning disabilities specialist, speech and language specialist, social worker, psychologist, consulting psychiatrist, physical therapist, vision consultant, hearing consultant, or any other person directly involved with the student.

7. Each student's placement is reviewed annually and/or upon request of parents or staff.

CHILDREN WHO MAY NEED SPECIAL SERVICES

The Visually Impaired - Visual impairment of sufficient severity to require adaptation of educational materials.

The Hearing Handicapped - Hearing impairment which interferes with learning and development of communication skills.

The Physically Handicapped - Physical impairment affecting learning and requiring the use of special equipment.

The Learning Disabled - Significant impairment of one or more of the essential learning processes: perception, conceptualization, language, memory, attention, impulse control, or motor function.

The Emotionally/Socially Maladjusted - Social affective behavior which significantly interferes with learning and/or social functioning.

The Mentally Retarded - Mental impairment causing markedly delayed intellectual development, adaptive behavior, and academic achievement. Such mental impairment varies from mild to profound.

The Multiply Handicapped - Children who exhibit two or more impairments which significantly interfere with their ability to learn are considered multiply handicapped.

The Home or Hospital Bound - The students with a temporary physical or health impairment, estimated to last six months or less. This service is recommended upon completion of a case study evaluation.

The Student with Speech Communication Disorders - Speech and/or language deviations which prevent full social and educational development as determined by a case study evaluation.

Pre-school classes are available for three year olds with developmental problems.

LEVEL OF SERVICES

A student may be placed:

1. In the regular classroom with assistance from special education personnel.
2. In a special class or program in his/her home school.
3. In a special class or program in the district or township.
4. In a special class or program in the cooperating region.
5. In an appropriate private school or program as determined by M.T.S.E.P. and student's family. This option is only available if the student's needs are so unique that they cannot be met within existing M.T.S.E.P. programs.

PARENTS' RIGHTS

Two agents act on behalf of the child and his educational life - the local school board and the parents. Awareness of programs and how to use them must be available to every parent.

As an agent of the child, the parent has the right:

- to be informed . . . e.g., the need and purpose of evaluation.
- to object or question . . . e.g. a placement decision including a recommendation for graduation.
- to participate . . . e.g., all formal discussions about the child's educational future.
- to know and control . . . e.g., the content and access to student records.

Under Illinois law, parents are permitted access to the student's school records. In compliance with this law, the following policies and procedures have been established:

1. A school record may be examined by parents' upon request.
2. Official student records may not be released to other persons or institutions without written permission of the parent.
3. Parents have the right to challenge the accuracy, relevance or propriety of any entry in the school's student records.
4. A request to examine the student's records must be granted within a reasonable time, and in no case later than fifteen (15) school days after the date of receipt of such request.

*All rights of the parent are exclusively those of the student upon his eighteenth (18th) birthday, graduation from high school, marriage or entry into military service, whichever occurs first.

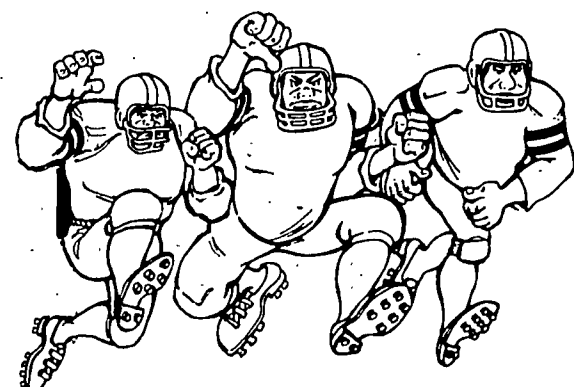

The "Flim-Flam" Man



His name was Mordecai Jones. He came from Georgia, long ago. He became famous or should I say, infamous, as the "Flim-Flam" man.

Mordecai, who was a preacher of sorts, gained his first fame as a Bible salesman. It has been said that every third Bible in the State of Georgia, was sold by Mordecai Jones. What "Bet-A-Million-Gates" did in Texas for fence wire was what Mordecai did for Bibles in the State of Georgia.

From "Bible-Thumping" to "Bible-selling," Mordecai progressed to games-of-chance. Some say, Mordecai Jones invented the shell-game. Being quick of hand and eye, he soon excelled with shells, cards and dice.

But those who really came to know Mordecai Jones personally, soon discovered what his greatest gift, his greatest charm consisted of. For although he was glib of tongue, had globs of gall, and could sweet talk his way into and out of just about any situation that presented itself, he was born with an even greater gift.

And that gift was his brilliant smile. When he smiled displaying his large, white even teeth, it was like a flash of lightning brightening up a dark, forboding sky. It was a classic, captivating smile that gave many women goose pimples, and most men a feeling of camaraderie.

Actually, Mordecai Jones' charismatic smile was used by him as a diversion so that while your attention was riveted upon his smile, like steel fastens upon a magnet, he could manipulate his shells, cards, dice, and, as he later learned, even his words.

And when Mordecai Jones, in his middle years, discovered that "words" were the real power and glory, he entered politics. Mordecai always ended his speeches with these words: "Ah loves you all". Then, he would just stand on the podium or whiskey barrel and he would give forth with his biggest and most benevolent SMILE. And, amid the cheering throngs, he would turn his greying head from left to right while his beaming, benevolent smile, like a beacon light, would sweep over the crowd again and again.

Mordecai Jones' successful political career was cut short by the Civil War when he joined the Confederacy to fight the North. Some say, he was never heard from again. Others say that he became a spy and was caught and hanged by the North. Many said that he became a spy for both the North and the South and received pay from both. Still others say that he went West and was hanged as a horse thief in Dodge City.

No one could be sure, but rumor has it that Mordecai Jones, did go West, either during or after the Civil War. And, that he wasn't hanged as a horse thief but instead struck it rich with a gold claim and returned to Georgia 20 years later and, under a different name, started a peanut farm in a small Georgia town.

Mordecai Jones never married, as far as any one knows. But that he was a great ladies man is a documented fact. It was said that he fathered almost as many children as he had sold Bibles, so one can only assume that he shook lots of peach trees in the sunny state of Georgia.

After watching and listening to President Jimmy Carter's acceptance speech, I wondered, if somehow, the seeds sown under the peach trees of sunny Georgia, by Mordecai Jones, didn't cause someone to become "born again".

For President Jimmy Carter, who has a mouthful of teeth and a charming smile, also has a "headful" of brains, politically speaking.

And beneath that benign, smiling exterior, deep down, politically speaking again, is a guy with the instincts of a swamp adder. And now, with his back against the wall of political ratings, this inept, incompetent possesses the unmitigated gall to appeal to our patriotism and attempts to explain away his own failures by trying to convince Americans that no president can accomplish much in the short time of four years.

What's he want? Another four years to free the hostages? Another four years of rampant inflation? Another four years of supporting twenty odd Carters living high on the hog in the White House?

Another four years of the amazing adventures of brother Billy Carter? Another four years of promises, promises, promises? Jimmy Carter, didn't tell it like it is, when he said, and I quote from his acceptance speech, "We've reversed the Republican decline in defense." Carter further said, "The Republicans talk about military strength, but they were in office 8 of the last 11 years, and in the face of growing Soviet threats, they steadily cut real defense spending by more than a third."

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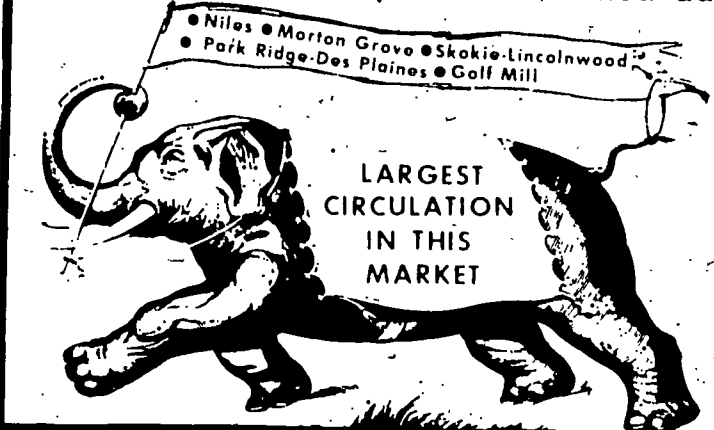

Kusper seeks voter

aid glaucoma
detection

Glaucoma: A serious eye disease which can lead to blindness if not detected in time. In the detection lies the hope, and the hope is with the Lions of Illinois Foundation and the Niles Lions Club, assisted by the University of Illinois, Department of Ophthalmology.

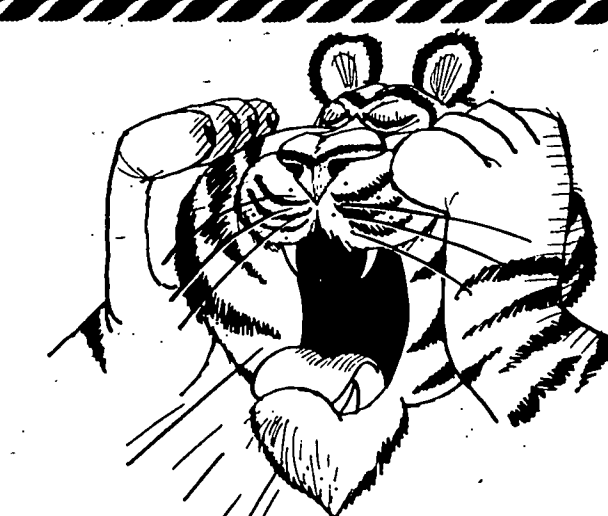
Lion President Russ McAndrew of the Niles Lions said club members are mobilizing to help staff the Lions Mobile Glaucoma Screening Unit when it arrives here Sept. 4 as part of a state-wide screening program.

The program will offer the FREE screening to residents in the Village of Niles area. "We are proud to take part in this service and feel very fortunate in having the unit visit our community," said President McAndrew. "It is estimated that more than 2% of the total population of Illinois residents have unsuspected glaucoma. So far almost 9,700 people of those already screened state-wide have been warned that fluid pressure in their eyes is sufficiently high to warrant a complete eye examination. Many others have been reassured that they are fine."

When the unit arrives, Lions and volunteers will help welcome adults wishing to take the simple, painless test, and to assist the professional staff (medical). Lion Joe Kaderabek has been named chairman for this project and is getting his crew together at this time.

In addition to glaucoma tests, visitors to the unit also will be able to take preliminary visual acuity tests for other eye problems which may need attention.

Glaucoma generally manifests itself in adults. Its symptoms rarely are noticed until it has advanced to a dangerous stage, although it is detectable in earlier, treatable stages. The disease is not inherited, but it does have a tendency to run in families.



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
