District 207 policy for free and reduced price meals

Maine Township High School District 207 today announced its policy for free and reduced price meals for children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch and Special Milk Programs for the following schools: Maine East, Maine North, Maine South, Maine West.

Children from families who income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced meals.

In addition, families that do not meet these criteria but have expenses such as unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential

and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space for signature certifying that all information furnished above in the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of Federal funds, that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to presecution under applicable State and criminal statutes.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster chidren living with them and wishes to apply for free or reduced price meals for them, the family should contact the school. If a family member becomes unemployed or if family sizes changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for reduced price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals if the family income falls at or below the levels

All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child nutrition programs, no child will be discriminated against because of his/her race, sex, color, or national origin.

Under the provisions of the policy, the principals of each of the Maine Township High Schools will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he/she may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If He/she wishes to make a formal appeal, he/she may make a request either orally or in writing to Dr. Richard R. Short, Superintendent, Maine Township High School District 207 for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

Each school and the office of the Superintendent has a copy of the complete policy, which may be reviewed by an interested party.

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





exercise caution as schools reopen

It's that time of the year again when our children are preparing to return to school. When school starts, I urge all drivers to be doubly cautious when ap**p**roaching school zones. Be alert for small children as they walk to and from school, as well as children playing on school grounds. Youngsters are difficult to see and often unpredictable in their actions, and they sometimes dart into the street from between parked cars. Watch for signs in school areas

Shaped like an old-fashioned schoolhouse, they warn of school buildings or grounds adjacent to the roadway.

School crossing signs are erected at the crosswalk. Slow down, watch carefully, and be prepared to stop. Remember that schools hold classes at different hours, and some activities are held at night. This sign also is used when there are crossing signals.

School speed limit signs are used in unicorporated areas. where both a reduced speed limit and a no-passing zone have been established. The speed and nopassing rules apply only on school days when children are

Free immunization clinics

Oct. 15, 1980 is the deadline for school-age children to receive the proper vaccinations, reported Dr. Shirley Kellie, Director of the Division of Preventive Medicine, Cook County Department of Public Health (CCDPH).

There are eleven (11) CCDPHoperated free immunization clinics in suburban Cook County providing immunizations for the preventable childhood diseases of measles, rubella, polio, diptheria, tetanus, and pertussis. Illinois state law requires that munizations. If a parent is unable to show proof of these immunizations, the school can deny

An elevated pressure might mean glaucoma, or it might mean something else. Persons with an elevated pressure are referred to doctors for a complete eye check up. Since the unit began its work in 1969, more than 370,000 Illinois residents have been screened. More than 9,700 people have been found to have glaucoma in various stages of the disease, and as a result, have been able to undergo treatment necessary to preserve sight.

The Niles Lions Club announced that screening tests for visual acuity also will be given. All tests are FREE.

"Considering how serious glaucoma can be if it is not detected in its early stages, this is a rare opportunity to safeguard your eyesight," said Russ McAndrew the Niles Lions Club President. East. At a very early age he was determined he would someday become a teacher, and at Maine East. He got his wish in the early 60's, returning after being away from the school for 6 years while he attended college.

Paul and I and 50 other Maineites sat thru Monday night's meeting hearing Maine East's special ed center would cost \$3,000,000 to replace. We heard East has a capacity for 3.300 students while North can hold a maximum of 2,500. North has a great swimming pool, great for spectator sports. East has the only large Maine indoor track, and is deeply involved in the evening MONNACEP program. North has the finest drama and speech facilities in the district. Its science labs have the greater flexibility. North's physical ed facilities are not as spacious as East's.

Enrollment will be 1,022 at North, 2,400 at East in the '82-'83

Maine East has excellent parking, the largest kitchen, the most central location, excellent transportation, highest resale value, only 10% air conditioned and 75% of the school is 25 years or older, 25% is 50 years or older. The roof needs repair and the dimmer board in the auditorium needs upgrading. It is a 70 acre facility.

Maine North has a maximum capacity of 2,500, has a 1/4 mile all-weather track, is the smallest campus with 53 acres, is 85% air conditioned, 50% is 10 years old or less and 50% is 5 years old or less. There are no major capitol outlays planned: there is great flexibility because of the dry wall and steel stud construction which can easily be enlarged or revamped though this construction has led to much van-

Energy costs for the 2 schools are quite similar with Maine North costing 66.8 cents per square foot per year while East costs 68.5 cents.

Maine North has the potential for a corporate headquarters while Maine East has the more valuable and saleable property estimated at \$19,000,000. North's value is about \$11,000,000 with the difference being in the value of the land.

Whatever, the decision of the board, which will take place Sept. 7. the board will still seek an approximate 40 cent tax raise at a November 22 referendum. A home assessed at \$12,000 would pay about \$48 annually for the high school tax

As we've mentioned so many times, you're the guy who foots the bills. You own the schools. You work hard for your buck. Let the people who represent you know what you want done with your hard earned money.

Since both schools fall within our areas we suggest whatever your convictions, you should make them known.

We're wary some Park Ridge board members might want to close Maine East. So long as East stays alive there is always the chance Maine South might be closed next. By shuttering East it would insure South would always remain

We think Niles, Morton Grove and East Maine residents should actively make their feelings known. We are presently under-represented on the school board. We were aced out of one seat on the board. It could prove detrimental to our area in the Sept. 7 vote when Park Ridge and Des Plaines board members hold the majority vote on the board.

It's our thought if Maine East is closed first Maine North will be closed a couple of years later. We will no longer have a local school in our areas to house our own children.


