## Morton Grove tax rate up 60%

Morton Grove residents were undoubtedly surprised, and not very pleasantly, to receive tax bills which reflected a 60% hike in the tax rate. Trustee Lewis Greenberg tried to explain the reason behind this hike at Monday night's meeting of the village board.

"For some strange reason the Cook County assessor's office

lowered the assessed valuation of Morton Grove property by \$19,000,000, a 10% decrease," according to Greenberg. "It is conceivable that the county has made a mistake. We cannot understand how we have lost \$19,000,000 over one year."

In other tax developments, the Morton Grove village board passed an ordinance levying and assessing taxes for the fiscal year

beginning May 1, 1990 and ending April 30, 1991. The total amount to be collected through tax levy will be \$3,944,687.


The total amount of money budgeted for the current fiscal year is \$11,140,457. This includes all money appropriated to run the village from police and fire department salaries, to garbage collection, to operating the public library. But \$7,295,770 of this total

comes from other sources such as sales taxes, licenses, federal grants, and federal revenue sharing funds.

A series of other ordinances passed at the Aug. 25 village board meeting allowed trustees to purchase property on Nagle ave. from the Oakton Community College District at a cost of \$1,205,000 to house the new public works facility.

The village has secured a mortgage from the 1st National Bank of Niles for that amount to be amortized over 20 years at 8% interest, with the full right of prepayment without penalty. This last point was especially important because trustees will be applying money from the sale of the current public works building to that loan payment.

A decision to rent space in Ballard school to the Niles library district was postponed by East Maine School District 63 until a present renter can consider relocating, probably in the same school.

Action took place at a regularly scheduled school board meeting Aug. 26 in Apollo school, 10100 Dec rd., Des Plaines.

A day school, operated by the Young Men's Jewish Council, has already asked for rooms needed by the library branch. Other renters in the building include a TESL (Teaching English as a Second Language) program and a Hebrew school operated by Associated Talmud Torahs.

Niles and Morton Grove tax rates increased from a low of 2.76 percent for residents in district 63 in Niles to a high of 15.76 percent for Morton Grove residents living in school district 70 according to 1979 tax figures released from Cook County.

The lowest tax rate in the area is in Niles in school district 71 where a 4.91 percent increase raised the tax rate to 5.916.

Tax rates can be computed by taking the assessed valuation of a home, multiplying it by 1.4966, the equalization factor, dividing the total by 100 and multiplying by the tax rate where the residence resides.

After a tedious van ride, we were welcomed by a group of loving people who made us feel like family.

Sr. Teresa, who runs the center, assigned different jobs to us each day. We worked around the neighborhood city, Clearfield, with a different group of people each day. Our jobs were suited to our abilities and interests as much as possible. Some of the teens worked on constructing a building and repairing roofs. We painted stores, porches, houses and sometimes even each other! Some of us were able to work with the deprived children in a school which the center organized. We visited the elderly, cleaned their houses and tended their lawn work. YPWC owns a second-hand clothing store where some of the teens worked. Each day, several teens stayed at the Center to prepare the evening meal and do the housekeeping.

Our chores really didn't seem like work. It was rewarding to see the appreciation on the faces of people we helped. What seemed like little work to us, was apparently a big accomplishment to the people we helped.

We actually knew how it felt to live on a very limited budget. We wore the same clothes often and the food was economically selected. This helped us to appreciate

what we have in our everyday life.

We met at the center early each evening for dinner and appreciated a chance to relax. We could spend the night by ourselves or with a few friends to ponder the things we had experienced that day. Our various endeavors created new friendships and deepened old relationships. Sometimes after evening services, we'd sing around a bonfire or just share our thoughts with each other.

My trip to Pennsylvania was an experience I'll never forget. I

saw a part of the country I've never seen before and lived a life I never thought to be a reality. I, like a whole group of young people who care, hope to go back next year, if not sooner to once again to enrich our lives.

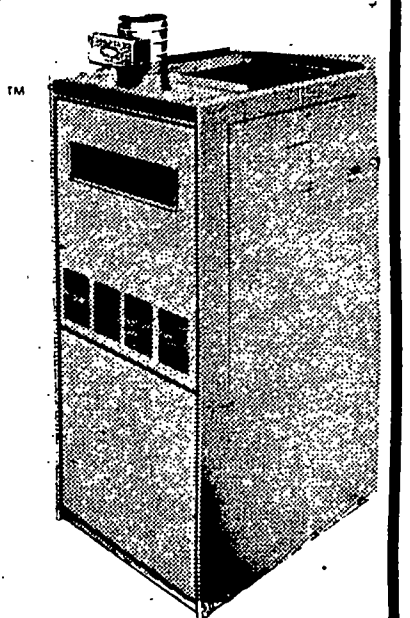

## District 207 policy for free and reduced price meals

Maine Township High School District 207 today announced its policy for free and reduced price meals for children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch and Special Milk Programs for the following schools: Maine East, Maine North, Maine South, Maine West.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size and income criteria for determining eligibility:

In addition, families that do not meet these criteria but have expenses such as unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential.

and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space for signature certifying that all information furnished above in the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of Federal funds, that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable State and criminal statutes.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for free or reduced price meals for them, the family should contact the school. If a family member becomes unemployed or if family sizes change, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for reduced price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals if the family income falls at or below the levels shown above.

All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child nutrition programs, no child will be discriminated against because of his/her race, sex, color, or national origin.

Under the provisions of the policy, the principals of each of the Maine Township High Schools will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he/she may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If he/she wishes to make a formal appeal, he/she may make a request either orally or in writing to Dr. Richard R. Short, Superintendent, Maine Township High School District 207 for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

Each school and the office of the Superintendent has a copy of the complete policy, which may be reviewed by an interested party.

## Nathanson School to house older adult Day Service Center

An Adult Day Service Center for older adults will open in September at Church and Potter roads, Des Plaines, in the former Nathanson School.

The Adult Day Service Center is part of Parkside Human Services Corporation which is affiliated with Lutheran General Hospital, Park Ridge. Services will be offered from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Mondays through Fridays. The program is designed to offer an alternative to persons who do not need the full-time services of a nursing home, but who, because of a physical or mental impairment, are not able to participate in typical community programs for older adults.

Center director Ellen Browne explains that "Our program is geared towards three types of persons: persons who need restorative therapy, such as persons recovering from a stroke

who need physical or occupational therapy and assistance with functional needs; persons who are physically healthy, who live with their family but can't be left alone when other family members go to work; and persons who are not able to function because of severe depression, persons who need socialization."

An older adult may attend the center daily, half a day, once or twice a week or intermittently, depending on the needs of the person or family. "Sometimes family members or spouses can't handle the constant demands for bathroom assistance or feedings," says Browne. A spouse or family may choose to bring the older adult to the center once or twice a week as respite from these demands, she adds. A participant who needs physical or occupational therapy will have an appointment time

### Against Park Board's Grennan Heights plan

Letter to the Editor:

The Niles Park Board has issued a 17-point defense of their decision to convert Grennan Heights field house into a private club for members only. It lacks documentation, is incorrect in some statements and does not answer the objections.

They admit needing 400 members to break even on operating costs but they did not include the cost of land, the building and bond interest in determining operating cost. Also, one member says they expect 600 to 1,000 members while Park Director Bill Hughes says there will be no parking, no flooding and no other problems. Do you think Bill Hughes saw the "Flim Flam Man" once too often?

They say the private club for members only will be paid for by members' dues. Remember they told you the ice skating rink would pay for itself? We only lose \$50,000 a year on the rink and it is used primarily by non-residents who do not pay any taxes to the Park District of Niles.

They say the private health club is an expansion of an ongoing recreational opportunity. Baloney! There is no private health club in Niles now.

However, Morton Grove has a club that any Niles family can join for \$50 or any individual for \$25. The Niles club will cost each member \$75 or \$375 for an average family of five. That's 187 gallons of milk for your family.

They say their opponents are misleading the public. Double baloney! Every statement I made at their last meeting was taken directly from one of three local newspapers. I also quoted Mr. Kosiba directly. How unfortunate they will not listen to their fellow citizens.

They refused our request for a public hearing at Grennan Heights and thus excluded many senior citizens and young people from participating in their own business. They set a meeting at a time and place calculated to draw a small crowd and one member threatened to pack this meeting with women from a gym class. They laughed and sneered at some citizens who spoke against their project and permitted their Attorney and Director to interrupt citizens.

We feel that Maine East has many advantages over Maine North: tradition, a field house, good and ample public transportation, Center Court (which would cost millions of dollars to duplicate at another facility), the possibility of housing many more students in the future (should the need for another school closing exist in the next few years), disrupting only about 600 students by closing Maine North instead of 2,000 by closing Maine East. As I understand it from the School Board meeting I attended Aug. 25, over 300 students, who presently attend Maine North would be moved to Maine West should Maine East be closed, which means only about 600 students would not be moved as opposed to the entire school population at Maine East, which I believe numbers over 2,000 students. It seems you should consider disrupting as few students as possible instead of the other way around.

Also, it was suggested that the Center Court students could be housed in a closing elementary school. I believe this is prohibited by Public Law and is also generally frowned upon in education today. I thought the emphasis was on mainstreaming these children into the main curriculum, not isolating them.

Please take these items into consideration and vote to keep Maine East open.

### Niles baseball defeated by managers' egos

The Niles Baseball League has been under criticism for a number of years concerning the fact that the league has been established for the betterment of the young men and boys of Niles.

Enrollment in the league has been down for a number of years. The problem isn't the availability of boys to play or lack of funds by parents to enroll them in the Niles Baseball League. The problem has been egotistical managers who think the every game is for the World Series Championship seventh game. Another problem is the sub-par fields that the players have had to play on. During several games that I have umpired I have had to remove glass from playing fields. Particularly Diamond 5 from rowdy softball teams who grovel in tears if they don't get their beer.

The past three years people who had kids in the league complained that the cigar chompers who sit on the board (most of the time they sit on their hands, I do believe), would vote down things that would help the boys.

As one past-president stated, "We're all in this league to help the boys and do the best things for the Niles baseball league." He then promptly nominated most of his son's team for all-stars. Most of whom were very average ballplayers, while shunning teams with more talent.

At one point most of the younger men that were managers said that they had had enough of this and vowed to get rid of the dead weight and get fresh ideas going and improve the league. They actually believed that it could be done. It's too bad that it never came about. It was a case of the old saying, "The more things change the more they remain the same."

So with the 1980 season beginning on a fresh new note, optimism ran high. Slowly it began to fade. At first it was umpires. No one really wanted the job as it was shuffled to three men before the current Umpire in Chief took the thankless job.

Mr. Walt Buses did a somewhat good job. What the board should have done was put an older experienced umpire in charge of weeding out the weaker umpires instead of giving every Tom, Dick and Harry equipment. A prime candidate would have been Hal Fritz. Hal knows the rules backwards, forwards and upside down. Hal did a good job with two sessions of training. The one thing that couldn't be taught by Hal was how managers of 8 through 17 year old kids harassed umpires. No wonder many of them quit and ones in the past wouldn't come back to the league.

It's unfortunate that one umpire will take it out on a decent manager. On some days when the fields were just barely playable, the ground crews would not bother to drag the infield one more time. There were rarely baselines covered or batter's boxes. With tournament time there were but what about the regular season. Was Niles impressing visiting teams with nice looking infields but snubbing the regular season?

The one instance that stood out in most people's minds, like the team who drove in from Elmhurst and Dunham Park in Chicago to find that on a nice sunny day after a night of rain, and with an hour or two work on the diamonds that they were unable to play because a manager of a AA team had enough pull to fix a Notre Dame diamond so that his team could play their game and said heck with the rest.

But, the thing that broke the camel's back was the firing of Marge Cieszykowski. There wasn't a harder worker in the league than Marge with the exception of her husband Bob for who knows why is still at this writing was conducting the tournaments. Marge and Bob were at the tournament games almost all the time. I can only remember one game they weren't at.

Marge would be out at 8 a.m. with Bob and their kids raking down the fields and carrying off buckets of mud while the commissioner and board of directors lay dreaming about sumpgumms dancing in their heads.

One manager who came out early from a suburban team to see if his team would play told me this.

"I came out and saw Marge, Bob and their kids along with one other guy (Mary Ellen Dugon's husband) scraping water off the field and pouring sand trying get the fields playable. At one point Marge's boy dropped his rake and started walking away. His mother yelled to him to get back to work. He just yelled back that he was sick and tired of doing all of this."

When I talked to Marge she wouldn't tell me why she was released but that she was no longer working with the tournaments. She was happy though. It's too bad she had so much enthusiasm. She's the one who arranged for the team from Rochester, MN to come and play in Niles. She arranged for a team

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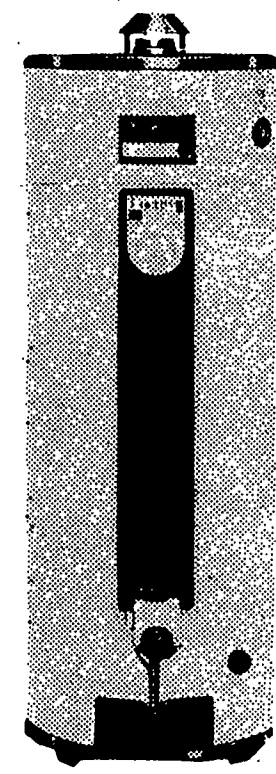

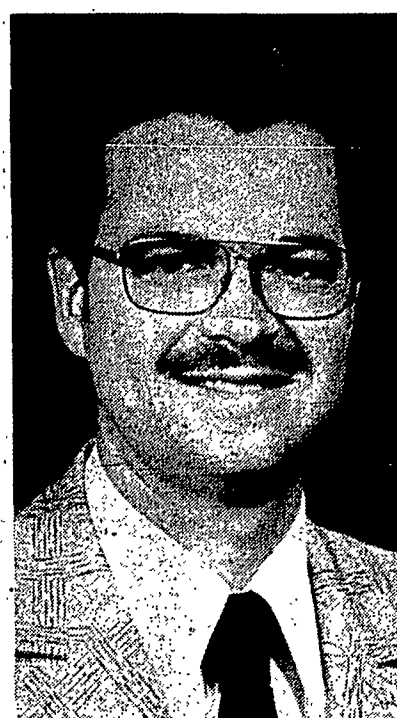

### UICC evening classes

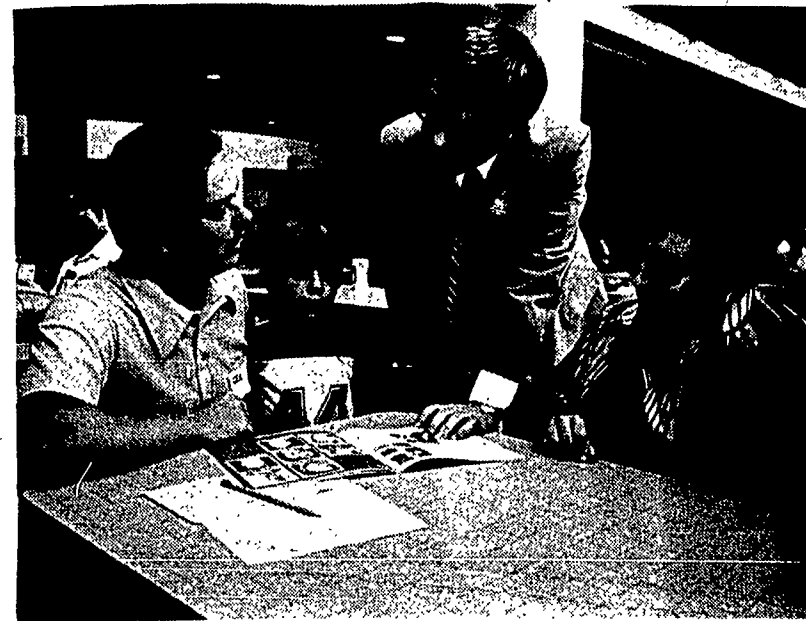

## District 219 reminds parents of immunization law

Niles Township High School Superintendent, Dr. Wesley F. Gibbs, is urging parents of District 219 students to have their children fully immunized against certain diseases before school begins on Sept. 3.

Illinois state law required all children entering school to be immunized against polio, diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis (whooping cough), measles, and rubella. Also, children are required to have physical examinations before entering school for the first time and at the fifth and ninth grade levels.

Students attending both public and nonpublic schools have to meet the immunization and physical examination requirements. Children who fail to meet the state health requirements can be excluded from attending school. Over 90 percent of the students enrolled in District 219 last year were fully immunized.

Beginning this October, school districts which report less than 80 percent of their student

## Drivers urged to exercise caution as schools reopen

It's that time of the year again when our children are preparing to return to school. When school starts, I urge all drivers to be doubly cautious when approaching school zones.

Be alert for small children as they walk to and from school, as well as children playing on school grounds. Youngsters are difficult to see and often unpredictable in their actions, and they sometimes dart into the street from between parked cars.

Watch for signs in school areas. Shaped like an old-fashioned schoolhouse, they warn of school buildings or grounds adjacent to the roadway.

School crossing signs are erected at the crosswalk. Slow down, watch carefully, and be prepared to stop. Remember that schools hold classes at different hours, and some activities are held at night. This sign also is used when there are crossing signals.

School speed limit signs are used in unincorporated areas where both a reduced speed limit and a no-passing zone have been established. The speed and no-passing rules apply only on school days when children are present.

Be aware. Our children are our greatest resource.

Oct. 15, 1980 is the deadline for school-age children to receive the proper vaccinations, reported Dr. Shirley Kellie, Director of the Division of Preventive Medicine, Cook County Department of Public Health (CCDPH).

There are eleven (11) CCDPH-operated free immunization clinics in suburban Cook County providing immunizations for the preventable childhood diseases of measles, rubella, polio, diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis.

Illinois state law requires that all children eligible to attend school during the 1980-81 school year show proof of adequate immunizations. If a parent is unable to show proof of these immunizations, the school can deny attendance to the child.

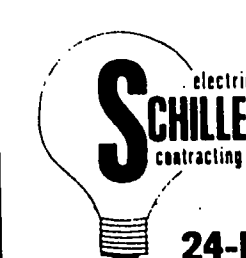

East. At a very early age he was determined he would someday become a teacher, and at Maine East. He got his wish in the early 60's, returning after being away from the school for 6 years while he attended college.

Paul and I and 50 other Mainites sat thru Monday night's meeting hearing Maine East's special ed center would cost \$3,000,000 to replace. We heard East has a capacity for 3,300 students while North can hold a maximum of 2,500. North has a great swimming pool, great for spectator sports. East has the only large Maine indoor track, and is deeply involved in the evening MONNACEP program. North has the finest drama and speech facilities in the district. Its science labs have the greater flexibility. North's physical ed facilities are not as spacious as East's.

Enrollment will be 1,022 at North, 2,400 at East in the '82-'83 year.

Maine East has excellent parking, the largest kitchen, the most central location, excellent transportation, highest resale value, only 10% air conditioned and 75% of the school is 25 years or older, 25% is 30 years or older. The roof needs repair and the dinner board in the auditorium needs upgrading. It is a 70 acre facility.

Maine North has a maximum capacity of 2,500, has a ¼ mile all-weather track, is the smallest campus with 53 acres, is 85% air conditioned, 50% is 10 years old or less and 50% is 5 years old or less. There are no major capitol outlays planned; there is great flexibility because of the dry wall and steel stud construction which can easily be enlarged or revamped though this construction has led to much vandalism.

Energy costs for the 2 schools are quite similar with Maine North costing 66.8 cents per square foot per year while East costs 68.5 cents.

Maine North has the potential for a corporate headquarters while Maine East has the more valuable and saleable property estimated at \$19,000,000. North's value is about \$11,000,000 with the difference being in the value of the land.

Whatever, the decision of the board, which will take place Sept. 7, the board will still seek an approximate 40 cent tax raise at a November 22 referendum. A home assessed at \$12,000 would pay about \$48 annually for the high school tax increase.

The guy at the beginning of this article, Paul Carlson, is my kind of guy. He gets out among the troops and fights for what he believes requires his efforts.

Maine East is Paul's "bag". He's immersed in its traditions. He can walk its campus and accept the whispers of thanks from the boughs of the mighty oaks which grace its walks. And when Mainites are singing the Messiah you'll see Paul in the middle of the choir.

similar request in our letters column this week. Both are seeking to keep Maine East open.

The decision on closing schools will take place Sept. 7. If it matters to you, as it does to Paul and Connie, take the time to write a letter to the school board.

As we've mentioned so many times, you're the guy who foots the bills. You own the schools. You work hard for your buck. Let the people who represent you know what you want done with your hard earned money.

Since both schools fall within our areas we suggest whatever your convictions, you should make them known.

We're wary some Park Ridge board members might want to close Maine East. So long as East stays alive there is always the chance Maine South might be closed next. By shutting East it would insure South would always remain open.

We think Niles, Morton Grove and East Maine residents should actively make their feelings known. We are presently under-represented on the school board. We were aced out of one seat on the board. It could prove detrimental to our area in the Sept. 7 vote when Park Ridge and Des Plaines board members hold the majority vote on the board.

It's our thought if Maine East is closed first Maine North will be closed a couple of years later. We will no longer have a local school in our areas to house our own children.

## MG tax rate . . .

Mayor Richard Flickinger also assured residents that "as soon as we see our way clear, we will start selling some of our other property." He was referring to the current village hall and old police station on Calie and Lincoln, as the new municipal building will be ready soon.

The dedication date for the new village hall has been moved to Oct. 26 to allow "certain dignitaries" to attend who could not make the earlier date.

One more expenditure which was approved at the village board meeting despite some emotional debate was for the purchase of a new fire department pumper at a cost of \$94,986. That includes a trade-in on two old pumpers.

Trustee Richard Hols argued that because "the buck stops here" they had to curtail their spending at some point. Trustee Don Snyder spoke once again to the point that the previous administration left them with archaic and antiquated buildings and equipment and if each item

had been rebuilt or replaced in its proper time, it wouldn't all fall on them now.

Trustee Neil Cashman wanted residents to be aware that money for this purchase was appropriated in last year's budget and will be covered by federal revenue sharing funds.

In other business at Monday night's village board meeting, village attorney Martin Ashman reported that the village was successful in blocking Don Cohon Oldsmobile from illegally setting up a tent sale in Goldblatt's parking lot.

The car company failed in their attempt to get an emergency restraining order, claiming that they had invested \$20,000 in the event, unaware that this type of open sale lot violated laws. They were allowed to move the sale to their own lot, as such a special use permit had been granted to that property in the 1960's. Ashman was pleased that the "integrity of our zoning ordinances was upheld."

"We're looking forward to making Centrest a vital and important hub for the performing arts for the entire Chicagoland area. Communities throughout the state have their eyes focused on us because we're serving as a model for recycling a high school which has been shut down because of a severe drop in student enrollment. Niles East was the first major high school to close in the state for that reason," says Ortmann, who graduated from the school in 1972.

A resolution for a tax increase referendum will be presented at the Sept. 9 meeting for board approval. Voting will be Oct. 25. Board members approved limitation of voting to five schools now open for student attendance.

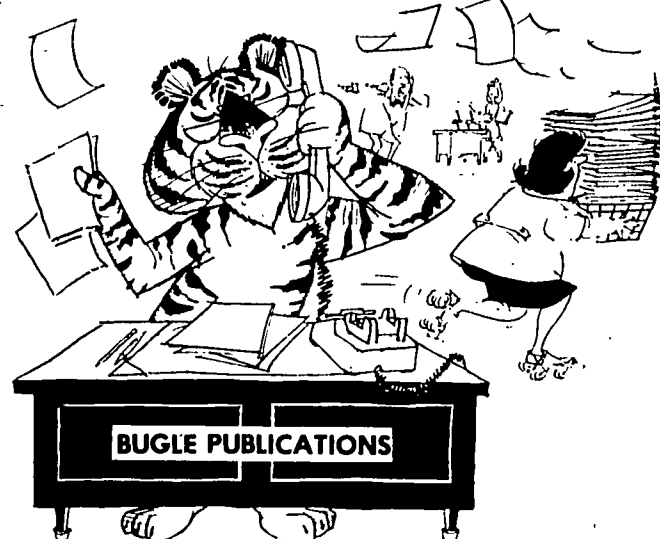

## Library board OK's tentative branch lease

Niles Library board members approved tentative plans for a lease to relocate the branch library, 9010 Milwaukee ave., to Ballard school, 8320 Ballard rd. Both locations are in Niles. Action took place at a special board meeting Saturday.

Board members are asking for a two-year lease with an option to renew from East Maine School District 63 in which Ballard is located. The lease is expected to go into effect Oct. 1.

Callero and Catino, now renting space to the branch library in the Shoppers Walk Shopping Center, charges about \$44,679 a year for rental and maintenance of the present 5,000 square foot library. A boost in the consumer price index would raise the amount by about 25 per cent next year. Rental and maintenance at Ballard school will be about \$22,630 a year for about 9,000 square feet, double the present area in Shoppers Walk.

The Library District hopes to rent about six rooms and two washrooms at Ballard. Extra ex-

penses involve new personnel and security. The net decrease will be about \$15,000 a year while doubling space available to the public," said library board member Margaret Rajski.

Previous negotiations were conducted with members of the school administration.

Board members discussed a one-year lease with option to renew but library board consensus seemed to be it takes at least two years for library circulation to rebuild.

Expenses at Shoppers Walk other than rent included two maintenance fees, glass and public liability insurance, heating and air-conditioning, scavenger service, gas, electric, telephone, and real estate tax.

Indoor and outdoor maintenance will be provided by the school district along with heat and light. Air-conditioning will probably be installed by the library district.

Final action may have been taken 8 p.m. Wednesday in the main library (after the Bugle had gone to press).
