The zonking of the taxpayers with 2 referenda in 2 months in the District 63 Maine Township area bades ill will for our pocketbooks. Part owners of School Districts 63 and 207 are likely to be adding at least \$80 annually to their taxbills.

This is a particularly rough time to pass tax increases. Even though residents are seeing schools closing and teacher cadres decreasing, the high cost of living is playing havoc with everyone's pocketbooks, which spells trouble for any

Maine High School drum beaters will be telling the natives they haven't received a tax hike in their education fund since 1968. They will tell you they're operating the 1980 schools with 1968 tax budgets.

Actually, the Maine High people are just buying time. Even with the closing of a school plus the tax increase, the district will still be staring at red figures by 1984. The projected \$14,000,000 1984 deficit will be slashed to \$7,000,000 by closing one school. But the added tax revenue from the November referendum would not turn those red figures into black.

The word came down the pike the Maine board members didn't want to ask the natives for an even steeper tax increase. They wanted to retain a credibility with the public.

One streak of optimistic light streamed through. The school district received \$500,000 more state aid than it_anticipated this year. The legislators upped the ante slightly.

If we have a correct reading, what is happening throughout the state is a shaking down of all districts. Decreased enrollment has meant decreased state aid. Thus, the belt Continued on page 43





On the **OTHER HAND**

Last week at the Niles Village Board meeting Niles Fire Chief Al Hoelbl sought to have additional Opticom systems installed at the major intersections in town. Opticom is a traffic control system now widely used in our neighboring communities of Des Plaines, Arlington Heights, Rolling Meadows and Mount Prospect, which permits the traffic signals to be activated by a light signal emitter on the fire engines, ambulances or other emergency vehicles. The emitter works from a distance as far as a third of a mile away. According to the rep from 3M who install this system, the rapidly flashing emitter sends a light signal to a detector mounted on the traffic light which instantaneously changes the light to amber and then to green allowing the emergency vehicles to proceed through the intersection

Logically a system such as this is bound to improve the response time to fire and ambulance calls since we've seen many of these vehicles come to complete stops at intersections where drivers race to beat the sirens and flashing red lights. Still many others have their windows up, their air conditioning and stereos on and are just oblivious to the sirens and lights. To try and educate the public on exercising caution at intersections when emergency vehicles are approaching is an impossible task, so the next best thing certainly appears to be the Opticom

Not only would it remove the danger of collisions, but it could be instrumental in saving lives by improving response time to calls. It also would certainly relieve some of the strain the' emergency vehicle drivers are under trying to get critically injured and ill people to the hospital safely without having an accident and putting more in the hospitals.

We remember five years ago when a Niles fire engine collided with an auto driven by an elderly couple at the intersection of Howard and Milwaukee. The couple were killed instantly and the driver and paramedic in the engine were taken to Lutheran General in shock. The traumatic experience of an accident such as this must be relived every time one of these men gets behind the wheel to answer an emergency call.

Although it was later determined the elderly couple had hearing impairments, had Opticom been installed at this intersection, the light would have changed to green for the fire engine and red for the elderly couple which logically would have made them stop their vehicle at the intersection.

Niles has a reputation for being a progressive town. We have unique services such as the free bus, senior citizen programs, consumer fraud services, family service programs and public services such as a police, fire and public works department, vhose efficiency is second to none.

Recently Federal Revenue Sharing Funds were approved for a new van for the Niles library for \$7,500 and \$7,000 was allotted for a new outdoor sign in front of the Niles'Police Station. While these are notable endeavors, we certainly feel that the installation of Opticom at an intersection such as Oakton and Waukegan or Dempster and Milwaukee would be far more beneficial to the health, welfare and safety of the residents of Niles in the long run.

In 1967, the department had a total of 41 firefighters. By 1972, the department had grown to a total complement of 48 firefighters which is the same manning strength today, even though the department answers over 3000 alarms annually and has instituted the paramedic program. The paramedic program has increased alarm time from 20 minutes to over one hour in addition to doubling the alarm work load in the last 8 years without adding additional

The efficiency of the department is attributed to the improved management technique, continuous training, better equipment and improved water supply. Chief Hoelbl said that last year, the department responded to almost 3,000 fire and paramedic calls.

According to Austin, the cities are classified on a scale of 1 to 10. No one in Illinois has a class 1 rating, the best obtainable, and only one community is rated 10, the worst possible rating. Most towns are in either class 5, 6 or 7. Chicago was the only one in Class 2, but this was recently dropped because it is no longer possible to rate large metropolitan areas,

It is a never ending game of jockeying. School districts from Indiana to Iowa are all going through the same motions we are. When the tax increases can no longer be passed and when the red figures push the districts toward bankruptcy, the state will be forced to legislate more state moneys for

You'll be paying either way. You aren't going to get out of this tax spiral no matter which way the money is fed into the schools. If the state takes over the burden, your state income tax, sales tax, tobacco tax, liquor tax and other fees will force you to pay the bills. So long as your real estate taxes can handle the burden these other taxes may be held at bay. Either

We know parents who send their children to parochial schools will look long and hard at the upcoming referenda. And older residents will think many times before supporting a tax increase. Since the communities are getting older, there are fewer and fewer residents who will understand the urgency for approving higher taxes.

If Maine Township is typical of what is happening throughout the state, the message legislators get will come directly from the voting polls. If voters push the "No" buttons, legislators are going to have to seek more revenue for the schools. If voters support these referenda, then your representatives in Springfield will get a momentary respite. This, too, will be buying time ... this time for the legislators.
