Zoners deny car wash petition

The Niles Plan Commission and Zoning Board of Appeals Monday evening denied a request to construct a 14-bay self-service car wash at 7303 W. Dempster.

Steven Hirsh, chairman of National Pride Equipment Corp., sought approval from the zoners to construct the car wash on the site which is 257 feet wide and 133 feet deep and located between ABT Television and the Ponderosa restaurant. While Hirsh presented his entourage of experts on traffic, real estate appraisal and land planning, the commissioners listened to side

Referendum vote moved to April 7

Maine North closing set for Aug. '81

At Monday night's Maine high school board meeting, school board members voted to close Maine North High School August 15, 1981, and voted to change the referendum vote from Nov. 22 until April 7. Board member Tom Reuckert abstained from voting on the school closing.

The Maine North closing could have been delayed until after the 1982 spring semester. Monday night's decision to close in August will enable summer school students to complete their work. The decision to close the school had to be made now to prepare for the following school year. School officials must have almost a year's lead time to prepare

plans for students and classes for the next school year. The closing of North will result in 400 students being transferred to Maine West and 700 students to Maine East. The present enrollment of Maine East is 2,700. With the transferring of North students the projected 1981-82 enrollment will be 3,200. The annual decrease in total students accounts for this final figure.

While attendance boundaries are just about settled a study of school district 64 students who live north of Oakton st. are still being studied. It is possible the annual 100 freshmen from this area will begin being transferred.

JO noted if we do not pass upcoming referenda for our schools, the money will eventually come from the state. Accompanying the state money will come state control, according to this very bright young lady. She said curriculum and books will be chosen by some state bureaucrats reducing local input into our local schools. Jeanenne was very emphatic it is important we pass the local referenda to enable residents to control their own local schools.

The closing of Maine North by a 4 to 3 margin emphasizes the need for local representation on the high school board. Since a change of one vote would have closed Maine East, it is essential interested residents concern themselves about the future make-up of the high school board. By 1984 a new school board will decide whether to close Maine East, South or West. If the East Maine area does not have knowledgeable representatives on the high school board, it is quite possible Maine East will be the next school closed.

Com Ed cites hazard of signs on utility poles

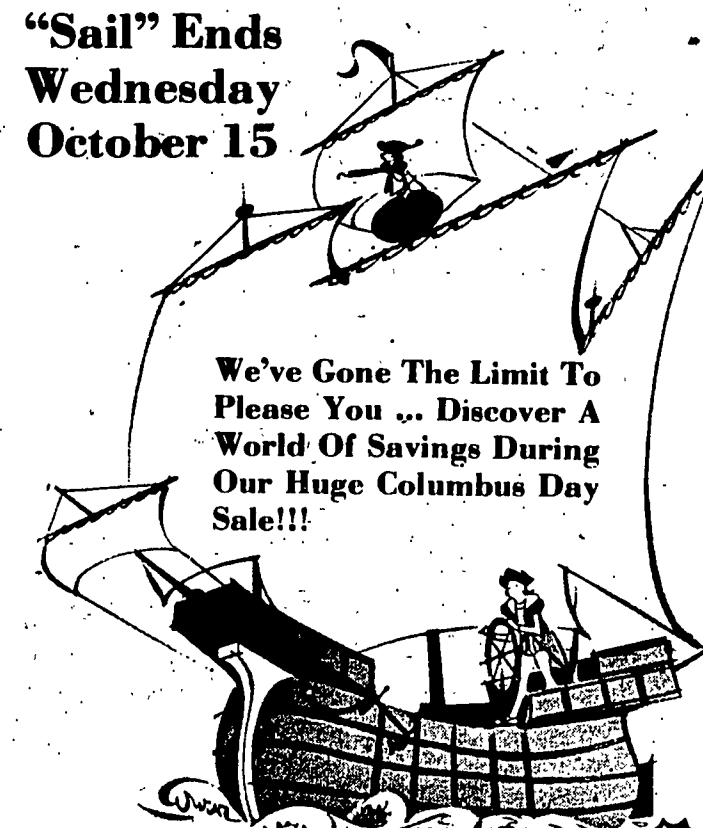
Election years are often hazard years for utility workers, according to Bob Reidel, District Superintendent of Commonwealth Edison Company.

Nails, staples and other hardware used to tack campaign posters to utility poles can cut workers' hands or cause them to slip and fall.

"At night, or during storm

restoration efforts, this is especially serious," says Reidel. "Having to stop and inspect each pole takes time that could be spent restoring service." Besides posing unnecessary risks to utility workers, the posters are often left to the mercy of the elements after the campaign ends, and end up in unsightly tatters.

Layout of proposed Niles Health Club

The existing Grennan Heights Recreation Center, located at 8225 Oketo ave., has an atrium in the center of the building consisting of three glass walls, but no roof. In an effort to best utilize the recreational facilities available to the Niles Park District, it was determined that the open atrium should be enclosed and that the adjoining recreation room, because of such limited use, would lend itself very nicely to the establishment of a health club.

The Niles Park District has shown an increase in a variety of exercise classes that it has offered over the past few years. The Niles Park District has studied other Park District Health Club facilities and have found them to be very successful. It is the obligation of the Niles Park District to continue to expand recreational opportunities for our residents and to improve existing facilities. With the development of the Health Club the full recreational exercise needs of the community will be better met.

1. The proposed health club will be located inside the Grennan Heights Recreation Center, specifically the open atrium area and the existing game room.

2. The proposed health club will not interfere with the existing gymnasium playing surface.

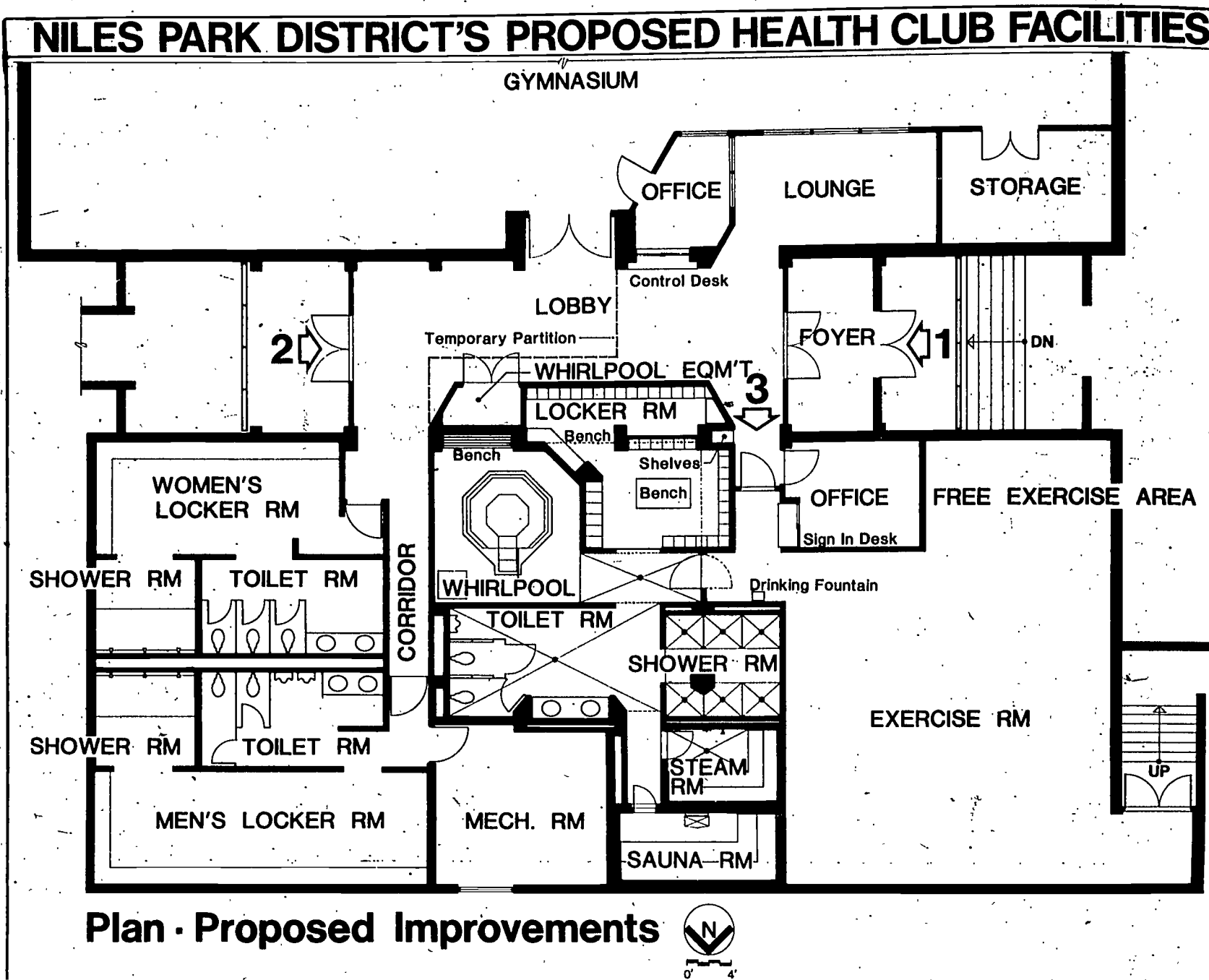
3. The proposed health club will not alter the existing locker rooms.

4. The gymnasium will continue to be used for recreational programs such as basketball, gymnastics, open gym, volleyball, exercise classes, tumbling, floor hockey, Karate, physical activities, golf lessons, special events, as well as continuing to expand existing programs and offering new programs.

5. The Niles Park District Board of Commissioners has passed a resolution stating that the tennis courts, playground and/or baseball diamonds at Grennan Heights Park will not be used for the purpose of providing a parking lot.

6. There will be incorporated in the new development of the facility additional supervisory area for the gymnasium and a lounge area for all users of the facility.

7. The health club will have the locker rooms, showers, lavatory, steam, sauna and whirlpool located in the open

An additional office, lounge and storage will be located in-

atrium by enclosing the atrium and expanding into the lobby and hallway, and the existing kitchen and small storage room off the game room.

8. The existing game room and storage area off the game room will be used for the exercise equipment which includes: An open exercise area, a variable Squat Machine, a variable Shoulder Press Machine, a variable Chest Press Machine, a Thigh/Knee Machine, a variable Leg Press Machine, a free-standing High Pulley Machine, an Arm Curl Machine, an Abdominal Board - Straight, an Abdominal Board with hump, a 2-way Ladder for Abdominal Boards, a Dip Bar, a Roman Chair, a Vertical Abdominal Raise, a Double Twister (Standing/Seated), two Pro Speed Bikes, a Multi-Exerciser, a Chin-up Bar, and a Scale.

9. The health club is an expansion of the ongoing recreational opportunities that the Park District offers the residents.

10. No resident will be turned

away from any program the Park District has offered in the past or will offer in the future as long as there is sufficient interest to offer that program.

11. The health club is simply utilizing one existing room for exercise equipment and exercise programs and, therefore, since the room already is part of a total recreational facility there should be no additional burden placed on the immediate neighborhood for traffic, parking, noise, or garbage pollution.

12. An architect has been hired to develop plans and lay-out of the facility and to develop cost estimates.

13. The estimated cost for completion of the project is \$175,000.

14. The health club will be a revenue producing facility intended to fully cover all operating expenses and repay the construction costs over a period of years so that there will be no burden placed on the existing tax revenues collected by the District.

side the Gymnasium, but will not interfere with the playing surface or Gym Programs. The existing Mens and Womens Locker Rooms remain exactly the same. The Health Club will be operated as a membership program, with the Gymnasium operating the same as in the past, where an individual can register for a Gym Program, participate in open gym or relax in the new lounge.

15. The health club will be operated as a membership facility in that when a member joins the health club, he or she will be issued a key and/or an identification card. The health club will be operated from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. seven days a week with Monday, Wednesday, Friday and 1/2 day Sunday for women only and Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday and 1/2 day Sunday for men only. There will be a minimum of five hours per day of staff supervision in the health club for the purpose of working with new members and helping out in different exercise programs for the members. Whenever a new member would join the health club, he or she will be shown by the supervisor each piece of equipment and the proper methods of using each piece. The supervisor also will be available to assist the members in setting up programs, working on certain parts of the body, and for general assistance.

16. The fee for the health club will be based on operating expenses and a repayment of the construction costs over a period of years. The fees currently being reviewed are: an individual \$75, 2 per family \$125, 3 per family \$175, 4 per family \$200, 5 per family \$225. Based on a fee of \$75 per individual and an estimated operating expense of \$20,000, the Park District would break even when 287 members have joined the club.

17. The Niles Park District will limit membership to 200 men and 200 women and will hold that membership at 200 each until a

complete evaluation can be done to determine the capacity of the health club for handling the membership and the effect on the immediate neighborhood.

18. Membership is open to all Niles residents, with non-residents required to pay a higher fee for use of the facility. The Niles Park District has a complete set of plans regarding the proposed Health Club at the Administrative Offices located at 7877 Milwaukee ave. Interested residents are welcome to stop by the office and review the plans and ask additional questions.

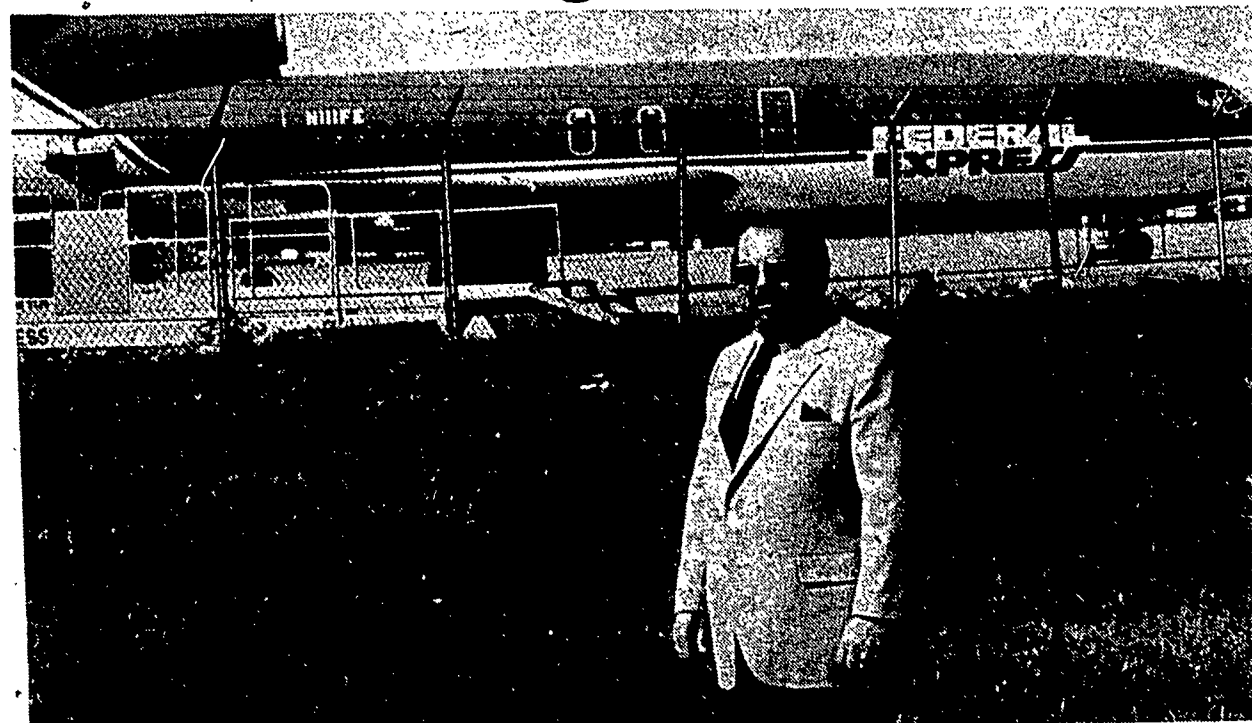

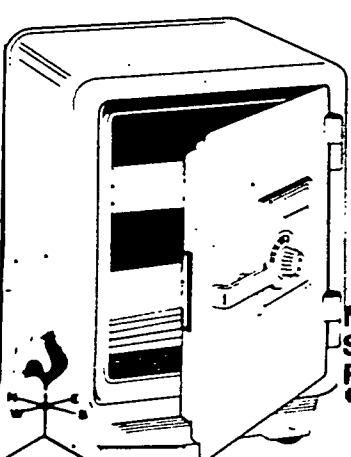

Family Life

How many people are you close to?

"You May Give without loving, but you cannot love without giving."

I discovered this expression in a book entitled "Apples of Gold." I believe it summarizes beautifully and pointedly what a loving relationship can and should be. If you truly love one another, then you can spontaneously and freely give to one another.

Furthermore, I believe that this loving relationship can best happen within marital and family relationships. However, I want to stress that it can and does happen among friends, neighbors, coworkers, counselor-client, and others who feel close.

How Many People Do you feel close to - really close to? One? Three? Five?

Who? Your spouse? Daughter? Son? Mother? Father? Friend? The longer I live and work as a counselor, the more forcibly I am struck by how many lonely and unhappy people there are.

Too often I find that a person is having difficulty letting go and really being close to another human being. They say it is too painful, or they don't know how. What do you say?

One of my clients told me that he had determined never to love again - that it just wasn't worth it. He had experienced a great deal of pain as a child because he didn't feel that he was loved. He didn't feel a closeness to his mother or father. My client related how the only way he knew that his mother loved him was by the things she gave to him.

This man wanted so much to be close to his mom and dad, but neither really tried or knew how to be close. Therefore, he had suffered greatly both as a child and as an adult.

He had experienced the truism of the expression that "You may give without loving, but you cannot love without giving." Due to the lack of closeness with mom and dad, he had concluded that he was not loved. Furthermore, he had built up a nice wall to protect himself from being hurt. He described it like a turtle shell to protect him and to hide in.

Are you trying to hide behind some wall or inside some protective defense like a turtle shell?

Fortunately, this man discovered that he was making his spouse and children suffer, and he determined to do something about it. He decided that it was a greater risk not to love than it was to love and to be close to his spouse and children. It was an uphill climb. Several times he withdrew and just about gave up. Then, something would happen to remind him that the risk was too great not to try to love and to be close - to invest himself.

Slowly but surely, this client experienced the joy of being close and really loving another person. His marriage blossomed after more than 15 years.

Certainly, the spouse helped to make this possible as she really responded in a loving and giving way. The spouse was willing to invest herself in individual, marital, and family counseling.

How much are you willing to invest yourself as a spouse? As a parent?

Something I want to make very clear is this: To love someone and to be close doesn't necessarily mean that you never get mad, aggravated or upset.

It is very human and natural to disagree, and it is good to have a dialogue that clarifies how both of you feel. This includes husband-wife and parent-child, as well as neighbors, friends, supervisor-worker.

Too often we believe that loving and giving means that you never have any negative feelings or any disagreements.

Whenever anyone tells me that he never has an argument or disagreement, I feel that he is lying to me or it is a dead marriage or relationship. When one really lives the expression, "You may give without loving, but you cannot love without giving," then it frees a relationship to express how you really feel.

Take the risk, really try to be close - it is well worth your investment. It may not be easy but the return is worth it. Try it and see.

Support our schools through local property taxes

Dear Mr. Besser:
Your Left Hand column of last week (Oct. 2) made several excellent points concerning the referendum coming up in October and November for School Districts 63 and 207. Both districts have made efforts to be fiscally responsible. Closed buildings and cut programs are not sufficient to keep either district in the black, however.

It is now necessary to ask the taxpayers for the additional monies to maintain our educational system. As you pointed out, if the taxpayers refuse to vote the additional money in property tax the state legislature will have to step in with monies raised through other taxes — taxes voted by the legislature, not by the individual taxpayers. So we have a choice — which way to support our schools.

I would extend the points that you made and argue for support of our schools through local property taxes rather than state imposed taxes for one reason — local control. We have learned and relearned the lesson of what happens if the state controls the money — they also control the schools. If we want to limit the state imposition of further directives upon us concerning mandatory programs, textbook selection, teacher employment,

bussing, curriculum, etc., we will have to accept the responsibility to fund education from our property taxes and not from general revenue funds of the state.

Inflation and recession made it very difficult to decide to tax ourselves further. But the education of our children must be of top priority in our plans for the future, whether it's our own children or those down the block. They must get the best education possible. Locally elected officials, living in our community with children in our schools are in a better position to make decisions about our school district than legislators from downstate Illinois or Chicago. Let's keep our priorities straight.

Does Mayor Blase support the health club?

Dear Editor:

The Left Hand column on Tom Flynn and the Grennan Heights problem was unusually informative. It is always interesting to see yourself as others see you. If Mr. Besser was correct in his assessment and I was too emotional and overbearing then I hereby offer my apology to the Park Board and citizens of Niles. However, I still oppose the health club at Grennan Heights.

Tom Flynn and his problems over the health club are not important enough for a Left Hand column. The important questions are (1) Should the health club be located at Grennan Heights when over 1,200 people publicly expressed their opposition to the location (2) Should a tax supported building be used for a private club (3) Do local citizens have a right to object to a project that may create a flooding, parking, children's safety, noise and garbage problem in their immediate neighborhood and (4) What rights, if any, do citizens have in how their elected officials take actions that adversely affect the citizens' environment?

There is also another question that should be answered. What rights, if any, do citizens have in determining their future neighborhood environment, the use of public property, and simply how they will live in their own homes? How should local elected officials react to citizens' concerns? It seems to me that Niles citizens have little if anything to say about any of these things.

Mayor Blase was in Europe and the Black Sea when this problem came up and coincidentally he was in Florida last year when the McDonald's problem was voted on. Does Mayor Blase support the health club at Grennan Heights? No reporter has asked him!

Steve "fighting mad" Chameraski recently told me he asked Mayor Blase for support in 1981. He also told me that Mayor Blase told him he would support Arnold, Kostka and Louella Preston, a former Board member, and not support Chameraski. If this is true then how can our Park Board vote in the best interests of the people and not in the best interests of Mayor Blase? The answer is very obvious where their loyalty lies.

I don't believe this decision should be made by Mayor Blase, Tom Flynn or any one person. The Board should listen to the people and right now 1,200 Niles citizens have publicly said they do not want the health club at Grennan Heights. When you read this the Park Board will have made their decision. The only thing you can do is not forget and organize yourselves for the April 1981 Village and Park District elections.

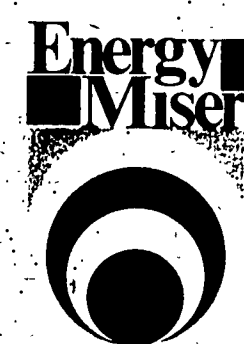

Culver commends minimum salary bill veto

On Friday, Sept. 19 Governor Thompson vetoed HB 3153, the so-called minimum salary bill. Local school board members and school administrators see this action as a solid victory for education, local control, and the taxpayers.

According to Dr. Clarence E. Culver, Superintendent of School District 71, "The board and community worked very hard to defeat this bill. We appreciate the Governor's veto. He was under intense pressure to sign this bill into law." HB 3153 would have set minimum salaries and future raises for teachers, as well as ex-

panding the personnel to be included in collectively bargained contracts.

"We are very grateful to Governor Thompson," said Mr. William Meier, President of the Board of Education of School District 71. "All too often the state has intruded into the collective bargaining process, and this bill would have been particularly harmful." School board members and school administrators say they will again work within their communities as well as with the Governor's office to oppose any attempt to override Governor Thompson's veto of HB 3153.

Immunization records required by Oct. 15

Parents of Maine Township high school students who have been notified that their children's immunization records are incomplete should act promptly to do whatever is required to complete these records. Students who fail to meet the new requirements of the Illinois Department of Public Health regarding immunization may be excluded from attending school after Oct. 15.

In the past few weeks the school district has sent letters to parents informing them that their children's immunization records are incomplete according to new state requirements. Within a few days school nurses will be contacting parents who have not responded to the letters and asking them to supply the missing information as soon as possible.

Illinois law requires that all school children be immunized against polio, diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, measles and rubella. With the new state regulations requiring that all immunization dates must be listed, not just the last booster shot, many students' records, require updating.

"While District 207 meets the 1980 compliance level of 80% properly immunized students so that we do not have to be concerned about any loss of state aid, we are very concerned about the possible need to exclude students from school because their immunization records are incomplete," Joel Morris, Assistant to the Superintendent of District 207, reported.

He added: "We will be doing everything within our power to avoid these very serious consequences for students."

District 63 referendum

A meeting was held at Apollo Junior High School on Sept. 22 for the purpose of organizing committees to work for the passage of the District #63 Referendum. The vote on the referendum will be held on Sat. Oct. 25, from 12 p.m. to 7 p.m. at the operating elementary schools.

Dr. Donald Bond, Supt. of Schools, addressed the group of approx. 75 people, and explained the financial needs of the district. Local citizens and educators feel this is a crucial time for a YES vote in order to maintain the high quality of education District #63 affords its students as well as support services to the private schools.

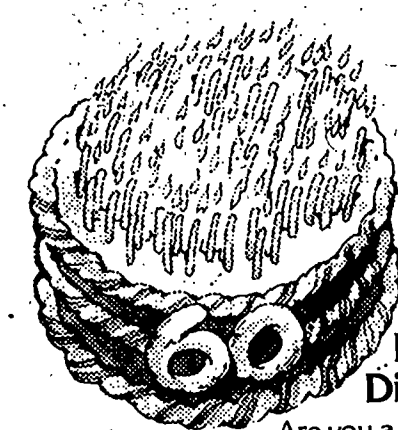

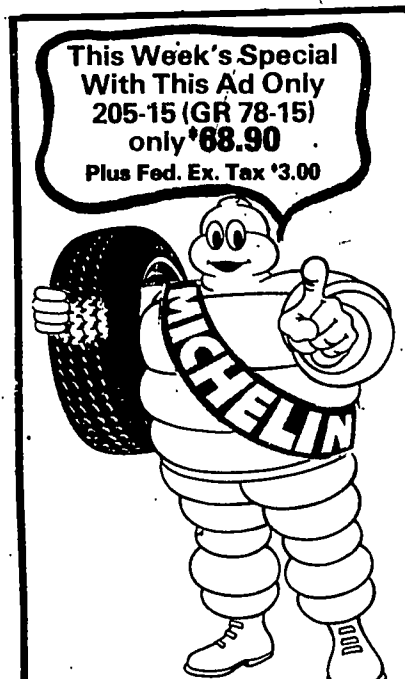

We are sounding a bit provincial in promoting well-informed people from our area to move onto the high school board. But the expected battle over Part II in the closing of Maine high schools should be considered now, not when the vote comes up in '84.

It is obvious each area in the high school district will be having representatives both on and off the school board touting their area-school remain open. If the East Maine area is under-represented, there is a strong likelihood there will be no Maine high school north of Oakton street.

Ms. Oestreich, from paragraph one, would be an excellent candidate for such a post. We would hope she would give consideration to running for the high school board.

In our letters-to-the-editor column this week, Niles Mayor Nick Blase says he supports a health club in the Niles park district. But Nick emphasizes he does not have any choice as to its location, implying this is a park board matter. Well spoken by a candidate for next year's Mayoral election, who is not out to offend any of the natives.

If we read the park board correctly, the vote to place the health club in Grennan Heights is shaky. Park board president Dan Kosiba and park board vice president Jeff Arnold are in favor of the GH location. But the necessary third vote may not be there.

Park board commissioner Steve Chamerski suggests the club be constructed at the ice rink building on Ballard rd. Obviously, it would not cause the conflict which has surrounded the Grennan Heights dilemma. We have no idea whether or not such a plan would be feasible. But if it would be, it might take everyone off the hook. The ice rink complex would become more profitable, the Grennan Heights residents would be appeased and the park district would have its health club.

The entire conflict is unfortunate. The park board commissioners were doing their jobs in trying to present one more activity for residents. They could have just sat there on their collective duffs and continued running the district without this additional problem. But they chose to do what they were elected for, to plan and improve park activities.

Niles park district, like its big brother, Niles village, is rolling along at a handsome clip. It has money in the bank and is drawing substantial interest on its reserve. But rather than allowing it to accumulate, the board and its director continue to do what's expected of them...not increase its park reserves, but provide more and better services for the people they represent.

The entire health club imbroglio got out of hand. Its idea is well intentioned. It is a shame the well intentioned should have gotten their noses caught in the proverbial ringer.

remarks from approximately 50 area residents who objected vehemently to the car wash. building to the commissioners whereupon Commissioner Angelo Troiani noted the 2-bedroom, 2-bath units had a den which also contained closet space. When Troiani questioned Mercier on this, Mercier refused to change the plans so as to incorporate all closet space in the bedrooms and not in the den. "The closet in the den makes it readily accessible to be used as a 3rd bedroom," said Troiani. "If these units are then indeed 3-bedroom units, you do not have enough square footage for the building according to Niles Zoning laws." Mercier still refused to consider an alteration in the plans and when asked by Chairman Frick if they wanted another continuance to reconsider, attorney Lavin conferred with his client and sought the continuance to Monday, Nov. 3.

In a third action the board heard a petition from Riggio's Inc., 7530 Oakton, for the expansion of B-1 Special Use to permit banquet facilities in their basement. John Duffy, attorney for the petitioner, told the board his client was seeking a 90-seat banquet facility to accommodate requests for larger parties.

Sylvester Netti, a traffic engineer presented modified plans for remarking the parking facilities on the former KingsGuard property at Oakton and Milwaukee, which Riggio's purchased some time ago. The plan called for 2 exits onto Oakton st., one of which would be 25 ft. off the corner. All the commissioners agreed this could be hazardous on such a busy intersection. Netti also testified on the results of 2 traffic surveys he had taken in July of this year.

Anthony Riggio presented the board with a lease he had with Avondale Savings and Loan in the Oak Mill Shopping Center across the street from Riggio's which allowed him 25 parking spaces for his employees.

Area residents John Hummel and Barry Fronczak presented the board with a petition containing 24 signatures opposing the restaurant expansion. They were unified in their testimony that there would be more traffic which would seek spaces on Oriole if the restaurant lot was filled. They also felt there would be more noise and rowdier crowds from banquets than from the regular restaurant facilities. After considerable discussion the zoning board decided to present the proposed parking lot plans to the Niles Police and Engineering Departments for their perusal and continued the hearing to the Nov. 3 meeting.

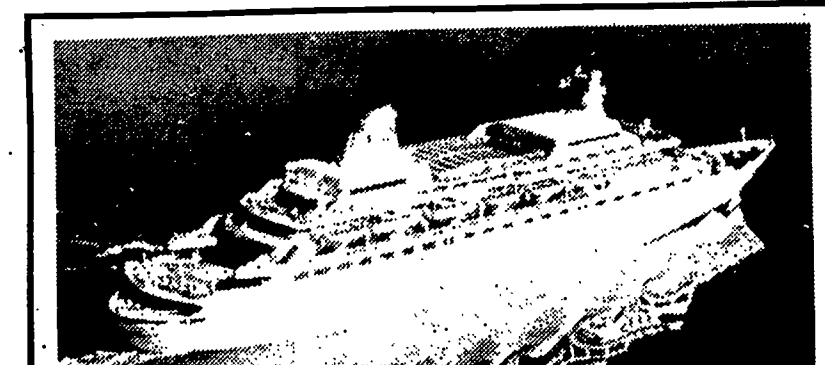

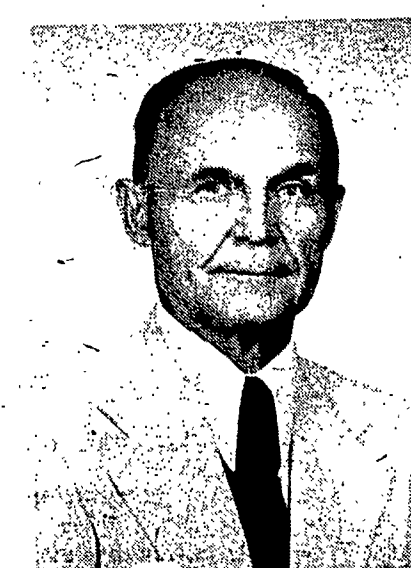
