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Set \$225,000 as minimum bid for Harrison Street property

District 63 property put on market

Board members of East Maine School District 63 approved their intent to sell the district's Harrison st. property, for a bid of not less than \$225,000. Action was taken at a board meeting Tuesday in Apollo School.

In other meetings, some residents indicated they could not support the referendum, to be voted upon Oct. 25, unless the district sold property, one or more of the closed schools, and/or closed Apollo School.

At present, board members indicated keeping Apollo School

open would provide flexibility should the district opt for a middle school which would include grades 6, 7 and 8.

A date for the consideration of bids on the Harrison st. property, located east of Greenwood ave. in a residential area, has not been determined. The property includes a little more than three acres. Useable acreage will be over 2 acres after the inclusion of easements.

About 10 percent of the bid will be tendered toward purchase of

Maine High Schools East, South and West have asbestos materials problems which needs correcting. The schools are presently waiting for direction from the Illinois Office of Education before correcting the problem.

Asbestos materials release fibers into the air which become extremely dangerous. The Environmental Protection Agency first brought this problem to light back in October, 1979. High schools built during the '50s and '60s are the most susceptible to the asbestos danger.

Maine East has a problem in a small area in the faculty lounge. The older school does not have the same dangers throughout the rest of the school as its sister schools because it was built long before asbestos was used in ceilings and walls.

Don Stillwaugh, coordinator of purchasing and facilities, told The Bugle Tuesday a lab analysis showed an asbestos problem of from 5 to 15% by volume weight. Maine South and West, two schools built during the '50-'60 era, were the schools with this high content. He said the asbestos material

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Proposed health club plans on display at park office

The Niles Park District has proposed the construction of a health club to be located inside the existing Grennan Heights Recreation Center, 8255 Oketo ave. The health club would utilize the open atrium within the building that currently has no roof, the adjacent game room, and storage areas. The health club would not interfere with the

gymnasium playing surface or any gym programs or activities. Comparable health clubs are presently being offered through the Des Plaines Park District and the Wheeling Park District. The proposed health club would be open seven days a week, 7 a.m. to 10 p.m., with 3 1/2 days being assigned for women only and the other 3 1/2 days for men only. The

proposed health club would be staffed with a qualified supervisor a minimum of five hours per day to work with members in explaining the proper use of equipment and assisting in different exercises. Peak attendance at the health club is estimated at around 20 members using the club at one time.

The tentative proposed health club fees would be \$75 per individual, \$125 for two per family, \$175 for three per family, \$200 for four per family, and \$225 for five per family. The annual \$75 membership fee per individual breaks down to a cost of \$6.25 a month, or \$1.50 per week, or a daily cost of 50¢. In comparison to other health clubs and recreational opportunities, the 50¢ per day cost for the proposed health club is extremely reasonable.

Membership would be limited to 200 men and 200 women until a complete evaluation can be done to determine the capacity of the health club and the effect on the immediate neighborhood. Membership would be open to all Niles Park District residents, with a waiting list established when registration has reached its membership limitation of 200 men and 200 women.

There are a potential 75 parking spaces on the park side of the street. Health club members would be required to park their cars on the park side of the street for the purpose of eliminating parking conflicts with the residents in the neighborhood.

The flooding conditions in the Grennan Heights Park area have been reviewed by the Park District architect and the Village Engineering Department. The construction of the proposed health club will have no significant effect on the flooding problems in the immediate neighborhood.

The Park District Board of Commissioners has adopted a resolution which states that the outdoor recreational facilities currently existing at Grennan Heights Park would not be taken away for the purpose of providing parking.

Complete plans and specifications, including drawings and layouts, are available at the Park District Administrative Office, 7877 Milwaukee ave., and are available for public inspection during regular office hours.

Update Opticom ...

Checking further into the Opticom traffic control system which gives emergency vehicles equipped with a special emitter the "green light" through intersections brought to light a few more interesting facts. When Chief Al Hoelbl presented his petition to the village trustees for accelerating the installation at major intersections in Niles, the rep from 3M who designed the system told the board the cost for Opticom at each intersection would run \$3,500 to \$5,000 plus installation, which could bring the cost up to \$7,500.

Further delving into communities who have the Opticom system revealed that many of them had installed the system using their own village personnel working under the guidance of a 3M technical advisor. We checked with Keith Peck, director of Public Service for the village of Niles, on this idea, but were told the village does not have a union electrician on their payroll which would be required since most of the major intersections in Niles are state roads. In addition, Peck noted that the electrician would also have to be well versed in the operation of traffic signals, making it unfeasible for Niles to hire a man solely for the purpose of installing Opticom systems.

Peck also noted as intersections are being modernized in Niles, Opticom is being installed at the same time. Oakton and Milwaukee was the first crossroad to get the system some five years ago and Dempster and Ozark was outfitted with it approximately two years ago when work was done on that intersection. Peck said the Opticom system is being installed at the Milwaukee-Howard, Milwaukee-Harlem and Harlem-Howard intersections which have undergone a recent facelift. Howard and Waukegan will also get the system shortly. Mayor Blase told us he plans to have the Opticom system completely installed in Niles over the next 5 years noting the village would continue to finance the installations through the federal revenue sharing monies providing the funds continue to be distributed to the cities.

The Illinois Department of Transportation has awarded a \$80,499 contract for the modernization of the traffic signals at the intersection of Milwaukee and Oakton. The contractor expects to start work, according to the info we received, on Dec. 24 which we find hard to believe... Christmas Eve!!! His anticipated completion date is April 8, 1981. The streets will not be closed to traffic, but lane closures will be in effect during work hours.

Speaking of clouds of dust, the residents of Church Street have redubbed their thoroughfare Mount St. Helen drive. Everyone has an inch and a half of white gravel dust on their parked cars from the construction now in progress.

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

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

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

Niles Days have always benefitted the village

Dear Editor: The League of Women Voters of Morton Grove-Niles supports Proposition #1, sometimes referred to as the Scavenger Sale Amendment to the Illinois Constitution, which will be presented as a blue ballot referendum in the November 4 election. Adoption requires a majority of all votes cast or 60 percent on this particular question.

Note that the amendment deals with the problem of long-term tax delinquency on industrial property which contain 7 or more units. IT DOES NOT MENTION SINGLE FAMILY HOMES, farms, or apartment buildings of 6 units or less.

Under our present Constitution, property on which no taxes have been paid for 5 years is put up for auction or "Scavenger sale" at which the high bidder receives a tax sale certificate. Under present law the delinquent owner is guaranteed 2 years to pay back taxes and buy back the property, and the high bidder cannot obtain title until the 2-year period has elapsed.

The proposed amendment would reduce this 2-year period to 90 days and thereby: (1) accelerate return of tax delinquent property to tax rolls and make more revenue available to local governments and schools, (2) prevent abuse by delinquent owners, and (3) encourage preservation and rehabilitation of property. Every YES vote on Proposition #1 will help equalize the tax burden and preserve property values.

From 1963 to 1969 a total of \$81,885.45 was taken in. These amounted to an average of \$13,615.90 per year.

There will be an advertisement for sealed bids for the older property, which will be offered as a whole, or divided into parcels. Dechert, whose position it is normally to ask for payouts for municipal buildings, said she was pleased this time to propose something that would "make money" for the village.

Also at Monday night's village board meeting, police officer Michael Starr was given a commendation by Mayor Richard Flickinger for the apprehension and arrest of an armed robber on Aug. 14.

Cashman, who happened to be in a building where paramedics were summoned, said "their professionalism and kindness was something to behold."

The Senior Hotline, received over 1,000 calls in a recent 3 month period, according to Youstra. 483 different people were aided with such services as basic health care, meals on wheels, legal advice and employment.

should be encapsulated, spraying on a sealant with a one inch binding.

Superintendent Richard Short and Stillwaugh went down to Springfield last week to try to speed up the process for correcting the default.

Stillwaugh said all schools in the district have been tested and specs are prepared in anticipation of solving the problem. But the school district is waiting for direction from the state (Illinois Office of Education) before proceeding with the necessary sealant.

The school district has applied for Life-Safety funding which is money from the County and State to correct the problem.

We telephoned OSHA, the Occupational Safety, Health Administration, and it said the federal agency does not have any jurisdiction over any public bodies.

Bob Lillander, an industrial hygiene supervisor in the Niles office, said if a private contractor was involved in the present matter, OSHA could get involved. But OSHA is a compliance agency, enforcing federal standards, but only in the private sector.

We next spoke to Charles Price, a consulting supervisor for the Industrial Services Division of the Department of Commerce and Community Affairs for the State of Illinois. He said the State has a free service aiding industrial safety but again, primarily in the private sector. But he admitted his state department would help where it can in providing services within Illinois.

Price suggested the cost of removing asbestos is expensive and dangerous and it may be wiser to cover ducts and ceilings with a sealant. If asbestos is removed from walls and ceilings, it should be under wet conditions and immediately stored in plastic bags, sealed, and then the bags should be disposed of immediately.

School employees received a memo Sept. 30 telling them what to do to prevent asbestos fibers from getting into the air. The main point the memo made is "not to handle or disturb friable asbestos-containing materials unless necessary."

The asbestos problem was brought to our attention by a concerned resident. He/she was disturbed the problem exists and it was not being immediately corrected.

We reviewed the matter calmly but share the resident's concern. What disturbs us is the potential that cancer-producing fibers will continue to be a danger until the district seals or removes the asbestos. The school district contends it's waiting until the state gives direction, and money is available. We have to ask whether the seriousness of the problem merits the school people waiting until County and State bureaucracies give their okay for direction? And is the waiting for outside moneys necessary when a health hazard exists?

The revealing of new cancer-producing agents the past few years has changed the rules for living for all of us. It seems exasperating the education community, which has uncovered these new dangers, must itself wait, subjecting the students and educational personnel to the very dangers which it has told all of us to prevent.



All Edison residential customers now on lower non-summer rate

Lower non-summer rates are now in effect for all of Common-wealth Edison's 2.7 million residential customers. The changeover from summer to non-summer rates began Sept. 15 and is now complete.

The lower non-summer rate of 4.8 cents per kilowatt-hour will remain in effect for eight months, following four months of billing at the higher summer rate of 5.9 cents per kwh. The change represents a 19% drop in base kilowatt-hour charges.

The point at which seasonal rates change depends on when your meter is read. For example, if the end of the billing period on your Sept. bill was the 24th of that month, that ending date marks the beginning of the first month of lower non-summer rate billing. The bills for the periods ending on or about the 24th of the next eight months will be billed at the lower non-summer rate. The non-summer rate period is never less than eight months.

Rates are higher in the summer-time to reflect the higher cost of supplying electricity at that time of year. Peak system loads in the summer create the need for investment in expensive new facilities.

The rates should balance out for the average residential customer, and the total annual cost should be about the same as under a rate structure with a level year-round charge. Customers who use a relatively high proportion of electricity in the summer will pay more over a year. But for those who use little or no air conditioning and watch other summer energy use closely, there's an opportunity to save energy and money.





the property. In other action, Dr. Donald Bond, administrator, reported the district had about 3,402 students, and about 171 special education students with about 90 percent of these students in the district. The district suffered a loss of about 280 students compared to last year.

Bond also reported about 23 students in the district have not complied with regulations concerning immunization records. Suspension notices will be sent out and the students not allowed to return to school until progress toward receiving immunization can be shown.

Harry Pestine, president of the Niles Library board, said the contract between the school and library for rental of space in Ballard had to have an "escape clause". He said if the public forced a back-door referendum and did not want to pay costs for the branch library, the library had no options. Attorneys from both groups will negotiate terms.

Richard Buckman, spokesman for "Operation Education", reported to the board on action taken.

In other action, the board approved resignation of certificated personnel, appointment of classified personnel, agreements for extra duty including \$680 for cheerleading, additional semester hours for certificated personnel, administrative personnel salaries, increase in tutorial stipend to \$12 an hour, and a memorandum of agreement between the board and East Maine Teacher Assn. concerning a grievance.

hearing. Mark Neyman, new administrator for the Niles Library District, told the board, "Cable TV could make an impact on the future of education. We could extend our informational services to all the citizens of Niles." Neyman noted that through the television, library services could be extended to shut-ins, handicapped and home-bound viewers. He further added, "The potential on a long range for educational TV is astronomical."

Carol Kleinberg, Assistant Professor of media based courses at Oakton Community College, reiterated Neyman's comments by stating that cable TV could become "the community college of the air." She noted Oakton was mainly interested in an integrated cable network which would permit them to reach all the residents in the OCC district. Oakton's intent is to use the cable TV system as a means of offering credit courses, general tutoring, GED programs and possibly an employment program listing job availability in the area.

Louis Crane, chairman of the Educational Resources Division of Lutheran General Hospital, told board members they were interested in a continuity hookup from community to community so they could share programming with other area hospitals such as Holy Family, Resurrection and Skokie Valley. He also noted they would use the system to have a continuing education program for the practicing physician which is now a state law requirement in Illinois for relicensing every two years.

Stan Lowe, 8242 Oleander, suggested to the board that a

questionnaire be distributed to Niles residents asking what they would like to have and what they were willing to pay. While Lowe expressed his approval of the Cable TV system, he noted that if the public wants access to library, college and hospital information, the questionnaire could determine how many are interested in that facet of it.

In other board actions, a resolution was passed unanimously urging the United States House of Representatives to pass the Cleveland Amendment which would give the right to local communities to provide their own programs for the transportation of their handicapped. Trustee Bart Murphy told board members that to outfit the entire CTA and RTA systems with conveyances for the handicapped would be a massive expenditure and the Cleveland bill would allow local communities to provide their own dial-a-bus or individual taxi service to provide for their handicapped.

The board denied a second petition for the rezoning of the southwest corner of Greenwood and Golf for the erection of a 2 story office building with a drive-in bank on the first floor and 8,500 sq. ft. of office space on the second floor.

Hoelbl stated that as a result of the action taken by Smith and Suchy, the fire was extinguished with only minor damage confined to the laundry room. The residents on the second floor were alerted and left the building, resulting in no injuries or loss of life.

Hoelbl, Mayor Blase and the trustees applauded the young men for giving freely of themselves without regard for their own personal safety and for coming to the aid of their fellow man. "This," noted Lt. Al Weber of the Niles Fire Department, "is what Fire Prevention is all about."



Funds to restore the bell to its original condition were provided by an anonymous benefactor according to Chief Hoelbl.



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
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
