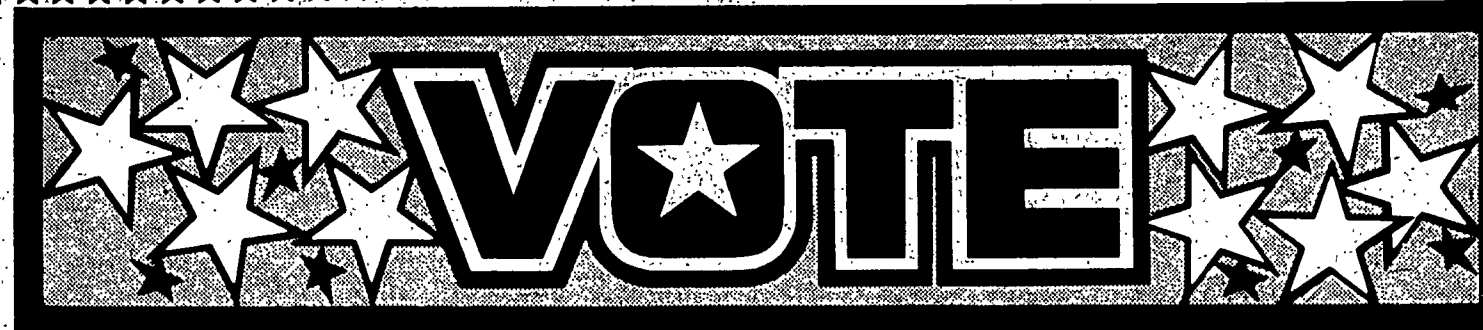

## Nelson vote defeats District 63 tax hike

Nilesites at the Nelson school precinct voted "No" by more than a 3 to 1 margin Saturday, defeating a \$40 per \$100.00 assessed valuation for the education tax fund in East Maine School District 63. More than 54% of the total "No" vote was cast at this poll in a voter turnout which was 2,000 votes less than the last referendum in 1970. Nelson voters, many of whom were former Oak School parents whose school was closed this year, opposed the increase, 1,036 to 303.

The total vote in the 5 precinct referendum was 1,901 to 1,275, the majority opposing the issue. Dr. Donald Bond, school Continued on Page 40

The local 10th District Congressional race pits incumbent Republican John Porter against 35-year-old Democrat Robert Weinberger. Porter was elected in a special run-off last February to fill the vacancy caused by former Congressman

Abner Mikva being appointed as a federal judge in Washington. D.C. Porter defeated Weinberger in the run-off.

In the national elections Republican Ronald Reagan is contesting Jimmy Carter for President. Other candidates include Communist Party candidate Gus Hall, Workers World Continued on Page 41

A preliminary hearing will be held in Niles Court Nov. 3 with the likelihood the case will be transferred to Des Plaines.

James A. Kurtzer, 7807 Odell, Niles, was arrested Friday night at home and charged with deviate sexual assault, taking indecent liberties with a minor and unlawful restraint.

## Police urge precaution on Halloween

Halloween will be celebrated this year on Friday, Oct. 31. Parents are urged to have their children go trick or treating on this day.

The Morton Grove Police Department asks that any youngsters eight years of age or younger go trick or treating with some type of adult supervision and that they do not trick or treat after dark.

Parents should also be reminded to check that when your child

is walking from house to house their vision is not impaired by masks, makeup or any part of their costume. They should use extreme care in going up and down stairs too.

Children should be extra cautious when crossing the street and walking around parked cars. Motorists are asked to drive with caution and watch for small children.

Parents should remind their children not to eat collected items

until they arrive back home and after it has been inspected. Also be cautious of any food, candy or perishable items that are not in a sealed wrapper and be sure that all fruit is washed thoroughly and checked.

Police Chief Norman Glauner recommends that: Adults remove cars from the streets, either putting the car in a garage or driveway when possible, to avoid the temptation of waxing it or more serious damage; parents prevent access to eggs and illegal fireworks (raw egg can remove paint from cars unless cleaned immediately); homeowners close garage and lock the doors; and Halloween parties should be supervised by the parents. A little common sense, plus some parental supervision, will keep Halloween incidents at a minimum.

## Paramedic Pack comes to the North Shore

After Nov. 2, paramedics in the community may be saving more lives and responding to emergencies faster. Paramedic Pack is the reason.

The purpose of this medical information pack is to encourage each household to maintain records on every family member for paramedic's use in an emergency. The pack will be distributed during Emergency Medical Services Week, Nov. 2-4.

The plastic container includes an informational brochure which explains the role of the paramedic and lists paramedic

emergency phone numbers. Most importantly, it contains personal medical history forms and an identifying sticker.

The Paramedic Pack is designed to fit onto the refrigerator shelf with a rubber band and is easily located through the distinctive emblem placed on the right corner of the refrigerator door. Paramedics are trained to be aware of these stickers and to check medical information before beginning treatment.

The Pack's medical history form helps paramedics make the decisions which allow them to do their job quickly and well. The form allows for identification of each family member, noting allergies, heart disease, high blood pressure, lung disease, diabetes, epilepsy, or pacemakers. It also includes room for the name and phone number of your physician and preferred hospital.

According to Mary Ann Marcotte, Mobile Intensive Care Unit coordinator, "each household should have this form of information readily available. In a life or death situation, the seconds saved when a paramedic has access to important medical information can make the crucial difference. The paramedic's preliminary evaluation and judgement time are also significantly reduced."

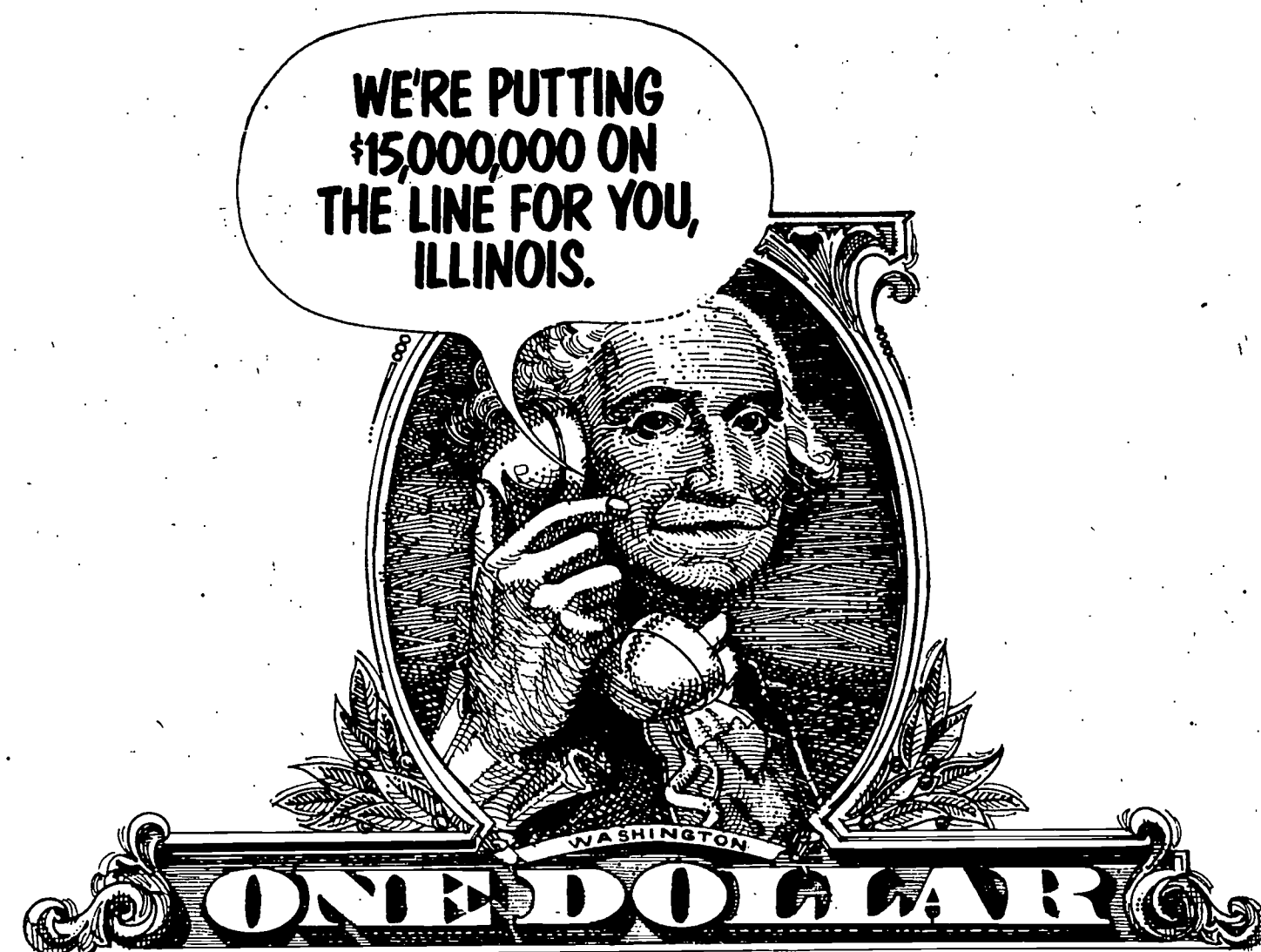
"Paramedics are equipped to deal with all medical and traumatic emergencies such as heart attacks, strokes, maternity cases, and vehicle accidents," Marcotte continues, "often a paramedic is hampered by lack of knowledge about patient's medication or medical history. A paramedic home medical registry like the Paramedic Pack could be a lifesaver."

Each paramedic is specially trained in administering emergency pre-hospital care and is employed by the local fire department or ambulance company.

Paramedics throughout the north shore and in northern Chicago receive formal training at Saint Francis Hospital of Evanston. The course includes Electrocardiogram Interpretation, I.V. Therapy, Airways Management skill and administration of emergency drugs.

The Paramedic Pack is produced for and distributed to the paramedics through Saint Francis Hospital of Evanston's M.I.C.U. paramedic training program. It was designed with the aid of Mary Ann Marcotte, R.N. and Bea Schauble, R.N., Mobile Intensive Care Unit coordinators; Robert G. Stineman, M.D., director of ambulatory care, M.I.C.U. project medical director; and Glenn E. Aldinger, M.D., director of emergency services.

During Emergency Medical Services Week, fire department paramedics will visit shopping centers, schools, and community centers to distribute the packs. Look for the posters in your community and the ads in your local paper announcing Paramedic Pack. Contact your local fire department during the week of Nov. 2-4 for your pack. Participating communities are: Evanston, Skokie, Lincolnwood, Morton Grove, Wilmette, and North Maine.

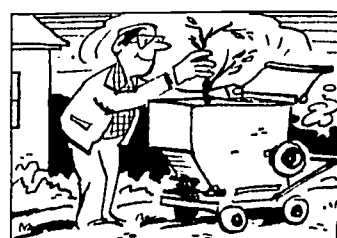

More than 25,000 books packed in 460 cartons are being unpacked at the branch library's new location in Ballard school, 8320 Ballard rd., Niles. Former housing for the branch was in Shoppers Walk, 9010 Milwaukee ave.

The new branch housing, scheduled to open Nov. 3, is being postponed a few days according to Mark Neyman, library administrator.

He said 14 staff members were working on the move Thursday and "about half that number on Friday". He said all the cartons were transferred to the school on Monday.

Board members approved the terms of a renegotiated lease with School District 63 for rental of space at Ballard. The terms would provide a three-year lease with a two-year option to renew, an annual option to terminate or "escape clause", and an option for the school district to terminate if a school is to be sold or reopened.

The "escape clause" was necessitated by a possible "back-door referendum" in which citizens might withdraw a levy to pay for operation of the branch library.

In other action, the board approved expenditures for new equipment such as a paper-copier.

Neyman reported the library

received inquiries about a possible senior citizen outreach program.

Funds were approved for staff members to attend the Illinois Library Assn. conference.

The finance committee will review a \$4,000 tax bill received by the branch library for its share of rented space at Shoppers Walk, a commercial property. The library, according to Harry Pestine, board chairman, was locked into a contract where it paid a

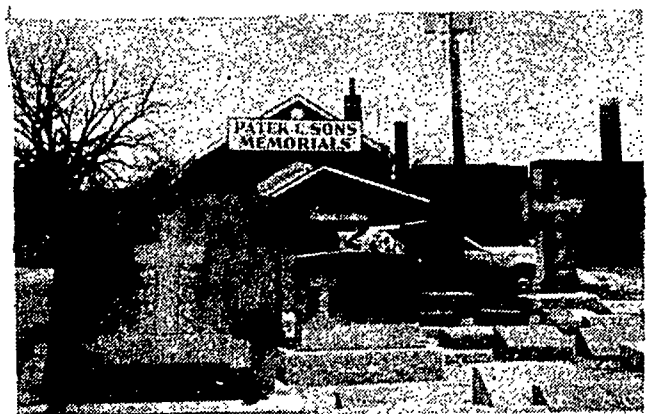

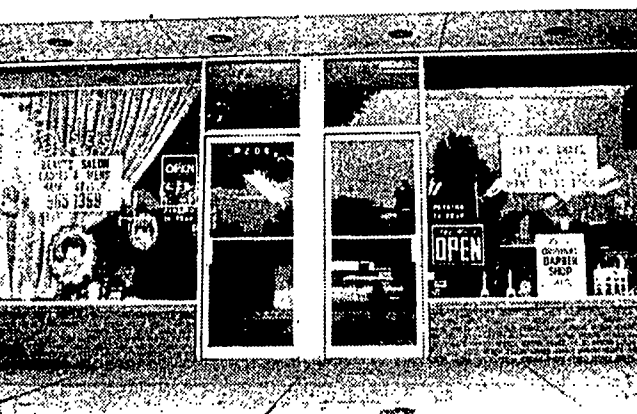

## District 63 reviews possible program cuts

Board members of East Maine School District 63 approved a canvas of Saturday's election results in which a tax rate increase for the district was defeated 1,901 to 1,275.

Action took place at a regularly scheduled board meeting Tuesday, Oct. 28.

Board member Don Weiss read a brief statement preceding an outline of the district's three year plan. Because of the referendum's failure, he suggested possible methods of saving money by considering program cuts in art, music, library, foreign languages, industrial arts, and home economics as well as increased book fees, removal of the junior high school hot lunch program and sharing of all busing costs among parents in the district.

Goals and objectives of the three year plan were developed by an administrative team coordinated by Dr. Donald Bond, school administrator.

Goals include a conclusive report on middle schools, grades 6 through 8, as well as the junior high school plan this December.

Bond indicated another elementary school may be closed if the middle school concept is approved. If it is not approved, a junior high school will be closed.

Board members will also review all district schools which may lead to another school closing and redistricting.

superintendent, told The Bugle Monday another referendum could not be held for at least 80 days. Bond noted because of the defeat of the increase, deficit financing might be an alternative which he considered a poor one for the immediate future. He said more program-cutting could take place though the music, PE, art and library programs have already been cut in half. He said such cutbacks could erode the quality of education. He added the present ratio of students to teachers has moved-up from 25.1 to 28.1 and it is conceivable it could be increased to 32 or 33 students per teacher, which he does not favor.

Bond said it is conceivable book fees could be increased. Presently, parents pay \$8 per semester for kindergarten textbooks, \$11 for grades 1 thru 6 students, and \$14 for junior high school pupils. He said the district pays a \$50 average per student for textbooks in the 8 grades plus kindergarten.

The new superintendent noted the junior high school cafeterias have increased their lunch prices 10 cents this year and they are still losing money. He said it is possible they could be closed out or lunch prices could be further raised.

Dr. Bond noted the transportation costs for busing could also be raised. These were not recommendations by the superintendent but alternatives which could be considered in seeking more revenue for the school district.

At the district administrative offices Saturday night when all but the Nelson precinct was accounted for, the "Yes" vote margin was ahead by 112 votes. When the Nelson "No" landslide came in, it doomed the hopes of the many supporters who were optimistically waiting for the expected "Yes" vote. Many concluded a large senior citizen vote turned out at Nelson to voice their resistance to the tax increase.

dt and the District 70 School Board, the Village Hall is now operating in the Grove School.

During its 80 year history, the Grove School reflected the growth of Morton Grove by changing and enlarging to meet the needs of the community. As population growth stabilized and school enrollment declined, the Grove School, like schools in mature communities throughout the country, was closed. Shortly after the children were gone, work began on giving the Grove School a new life as a modern and long-needed Village Hall and Police Station.

Following the closing of the school, the Village entered into a contract with Alice Construction Company of Chicago to remodel the building. Alice was the low bidder for the project which was to be completed in the fall of 1979.

The completion date was later extended to June of this year. In July, when the project was still uncompleted, the Village Board voted to terminate its contract with Alice. Village officials said they had shown extraordinary patience with the slow progress but that the work was not being done "diligently" and "expediently" as called for in the contract. Another deadline for completion was set and when it was not reached, the contractor was fired.

Mayor Flickinger said at that time and again today that sufficient money had been held back to complete the project and that the final cost will not exceed the amount raised through the bond issue.

In July the Village Board hired the Arthur Johnson Construction Company to complete the project. When he was hired, Arthur Johnson, President of the

Company, indicated he hoped to complete the job in about eight weeks, a promise which was fulfilled when the Village offices and Police Department began operating in the new facility on Sept. 22.

A third contractor was also involved in the remodeling effort. Slezak Construction Company was the low bidder on the Senior Citizen Center portion of the building. This work was financed completely by a \$137,000 federal grant and was completed expeditiously and to the satisfaction of Village officials long before their patience with Alice was exhausted.

The old Grove School building was redesigned by Charles Conlon and Associates, Architects. Gary Greenfield designed the landscape plan and Bertold Nursery and Garden Center was the landscape contractor.

The building's new appearance on the outside has been designed to blend into the neighborhood, on the inside, to bring together under one roof the various Village departments which had been located in several crowded buildings within the Village.

Mayor Flickinger expressed praise for Village Building Commissioner Edward McMahon, Sgt. George Incedon of the Police Department and James Huber, Director of the Health Department, who, in addition to their regular responsibilities, coordinated and supervised the project.

The Mayor explained that the new Village Hall and Police Station and the selection of the old Grove School as its location have the same purpose as local government itself—to serve the people of the community as neighbors.

Lieutenant Frank Stankowicz, whom we've cited many times in past years, did exceptional work. When he heard the girl describe the area she was taken to as being near a white tank, Stankowicz immediately went to the Sony industrial area at the southeastern end of Niles. He began combing the area and discovered a roll of black tape which was similar to tape found in the assailant's car. It was sent to the police lab.

The most significant effort was the citizen noting the strange car and man who had been in the area for several weeks. Her alert observations and subsequent call to the police was the key to apprehending the man. She is reluctant to discuss the matter until after the case has gone to trial. When the matter has been adjudicated, both she and Stankowicz should be cited by Niles for their efforts.

Thirty minutes after receiving the details from Niles police, we received a telephone call from the assailant's attorney. He said the man has never been involved in any incident before, never having had any run-in with the police in any area. He said the bond was reduced from \$100,000 to \$50,000 which would enable him to be freed on 10% or \$5,000. The money was posted Monday morning and he was released from jail. The attorney said he would enter Lutheran General Hospital and undergo psychiatric tests.

The attorney asked us to leave the man's name out of the newspaper. He said he had no previous record and his wife and teen children would suffer from the story.

We told him the Chicago metropolitan newspapers had already reported his identification which compelled us to report to who he is.

Another thirty minutes later another telephone call came from a local resident who was appalled the man was able to get out of jail. She suggested we get a picture, blow it up, and let everyone know what he looks like so they can alert their children.

We couldn't comply with the lawyer's request because we would have been delinquent in doing our job. It is our job to report names and addresses and we feel responsible in doing the job without being wishy-washy about it. On the other hand we commiserate with the man's family. It is indeed a great burden to handle this problem and we're not interested to add to their burden.

The lady phone-caller who suggested we publish a picture of the assailant was over-reacting. The man had never had a previous record of any kind. When we told the lady we didn't see the need to blow the story out of proportion, she emphasized she had small children and her concern was for the well-being of the children in the area. At this moment her feelings did not concern themselves with the man or his family. She and a subsequent caller said they didn't intend letting their children out of their sights.

We may have been presumptions in telling the fearful callers you can't go thru life looking over your shoulder. It is well she should caution her children, but arousing undue fear certainly is unwise.

More than 20 years ago our first child would not go to kindergarten the first days of school. She had been frightened by a story she had heard about a similar assailant, and she refused to stay in school without her parents.

Such problems always exist in a society as complex as ours. And we're appalled how common they are. One young friend of ours told us how a friend of hers was attacked in a local store. We're sure these crimes are more common than are known to the general public. So many cases go unreported.

It's every parent's responsibility to make sure their children understand they must avoid strangers. And it's also everyone's responsibility to report any such crimes or any approaches of a suspicious nature to the police. Both actions are essential.

From a local newspaper's point of view we don't hide the news. We also don't aim to unnecessarily embarrass innocent people who suffer from such reporting.

It's a neat balancing act to do our job while exercising discretion. It's often an imperfect act.

The metropolitan newspapers are more impersonal. Names and addresses are so many letters and numbers to people who report from many miles away. But a newspaper inside a community must do its job with responsibility and accuracy, without pulling too many punches, but still retaining a compassion for the many victims who are on both sides of a story.

In the election for Judge of the Appellate Court Republican Edwin Berman is opposed by Democrat William White.

In the race for Commissioners of the Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago Republicans Bonnie Hickey, Robert Hall and Edward Gjersten are opposed by Democrats Chester Majewski, Nicholas Melas and Louis Viverito.

Two constitutional ballots will also be before voters Tuesday. The purpose of the Proposed Amendment to Sections 1, 2 and 3 of Article IV is an amendment to reduce the size of the House of Representatives from 177 to 118 members and to provide for the election of one Representative from each of the 18 districts.

The second constitutional ballot is the Proposed Amendment to Section 8 of Article IX. It concerns a law dealing with delinquent tax sales on long-term tax delinquent commercial, industrial, vacant non-farm, and large multiple dwelling residential properties. It has no effect on single family homes, farms, or apartment buildings containing 6 or less units.

The present Illinois law attempts to place long-standing tax delinquent properties back on the tax rolls after 5 or more years of non-payment of property taxes by the owner. To this end, the county treasurer conducts an auction, or scavenger sale, at which time the high bidder receives a sale certificate.

Following the scavenger sale, the Constitution now guarantees the delinquent owner 2 years to redeem or buy back the property. The high bidder cannot obtain title to the property until after this 2-year redemption period has elapsed.

The proposed amendment would allow the General Assembly to reduce the 2-year redemption period to no less than 90 days following the scavenger sale.

she had seen in the neighborhood for several weeks. Her response and subsequent identification was largely responsible for the apprehension of the suspect.

Niles police lieutenant Frank Stankowicz, who knew the victim vaguely identified the area she was taken to as being near a white tank, recognized the Sony area, and after combing the area found black tape on the ground.

Other activities for the day include showing of the movie "The Remembering Eye", an historical account of Niles Township and Skokie, and a string quartet adding music to the event.

As a special feature, all adults attending the event will receive a specially minted bronze coin commemorating the dedication.

"We believe this will be a very happy day for us in government and for all our citizens," Skokie Mayor Albert Smith said. "And we want as many Skokians as possible to share it. This building addition and renovation was done for the citizens of Skokie, and we want them to see it and be as proud of it as we in government are."

The addition onto Village Hall adds 27,000 sq. ft. to the existing facility and brings into the same building all village departments except for fire, police, public works and the Office on Aging. The health, planning, housing, and public information departments all moved from other buildings into the Village Hall.

"It will help us immeasurably to have these departments in the same building, working nearer the other departments," Village Manager Robert Eppley said.

The \$2.1 million project began in May, 1978 with a feasibility report and continued with a groundbreaking for the expansion in May, 1979. The expanded wing was completed in May, 1980 and a number of village departments occupied the building then. Remodeling of the "older" portion of the building was just completed recently.

Skokie's original Village Hall was built in 1927, when only 3,000 people lived in what we now know of as Skokie. The building was remodeled at a cost of \$600,000 in 1958, but not expanded.

The meeting is free and open to the public, and extra copies of Voters Guide and other materials will be available at the Election INFO booth. Red, white and blue refreshments will be served.

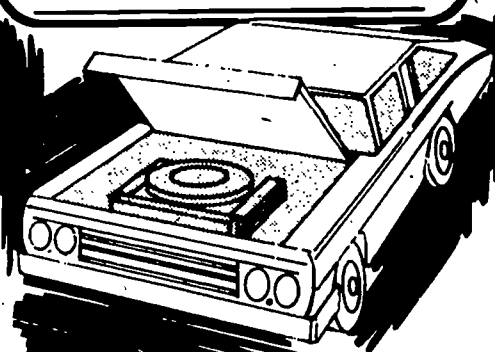

## Porter returns unspent funds to treasury

Congressman John Edward Porter has returned \$19,938.70 to the U.S. Treasury in unspent office allowances, with the prospect of returning another \$20,000 before the end of the year.

Porter said the \$19,938 already returned represents money saved from his office budget for the first two quarters of 1980.

He will be able to return a slightly larger amount to the government for the final two quarters of 1980, Porter said, if there is no lame-duck session of Congress after the Nov. 4 election.

Cook County Clerk Stanley T. Kuser, Jr., confirms that a new registration record has been set by suburban voters.

"A record number of Cook County suburbanites are registered to vote in the Nov. 4 General Election," Kuser announced. "If there's any voter apathy, it doesn't appear to exist in the Chicago suburbs," Kuser said.

Following the final registration, there are 1,221,937 registered voters in suburban Cook County. That tops the previous record established in 1976 (the last presidential election)

tion) by 37,926, according to final figures released by Kuser. (Registrations in Berwyn account for 30,320 voters who were not under Kuser's jurisdiction in 1976.) The current registration exceeds the 1978 general election suburban registration by 106,159 voters.

Kuser credited the cooperation of suburban banks, savings and loan associations, currency exchanges, park districts, libraries, school districts, community colleges and village, township and city clerks for "an outstanding voter outreach effort."

"These public-spirited people volunteered their efforts to set a suburban voter registration record," Kuser said. "They have proven that the public and private sectors can work in an atmosphere of cooperation to benefit the entire community."

## Gomberg advocates gun control

Larry Gomberg, Democratic candidate for State Representative in the Fourth Legislative District, today called for stricter measures to control the sale and possession of handguns.

Gomberg pointed out that deaths and injuries caused by handguns in the possession of criminals are an ever-increasing concern of law-abiding citizens.

"I support prohibiting the sale and possession of 'Saturday Night Specials' as a significant step in the fight against violent crime," said Gomberg, who is a Cook County Probation Officer and has a master's degree in sociology with an emphasis on criminology.
