This will require school districts to bus outside their boundaries.

MAJOR TENETS OF SB. 1812

• Free transportation shall be provided to any student living more than 1 1/2 miles but less than 5 miles from the student's residence;

• Six or more students must require the transportation to a non-public school in an adjoining





The purpose of the project is to reach more Illinoisans with information on organ donation and to increase the number of people who are willing to sign organ donor cards.

Local participating banks are: Des Plaines National Bank, The Des Plaines Bank, First National Bank of Morton Grove, Golf Mill State Bank in Niles and Unity Savings Association of Chicago in Niles.

"We are tremendously grateful to Secretary Dixon for helping us secure this opportunity," stated Mrs. Noel. "Alan Dixon has repeatedly shown his concern for this important program and recently provided vital backing for proposed legislation to include a donor card on the back of the drivers license. With this type of concerned support we hope someday soon kidneys and other needed organs will be available for everyone who wants a transplant."


By signing an organ donor card, a person can "will" his kidneys, corneas, liver and other organs to be used for transplantation after death. Organ donation can provide the priceless gift of sight for the blind, or the chance for a new life for those suffering from kidney failure.

Without a kidney transplant the person afflicted with kidney failure must undergo dialysis treatments three times each week to cleanse the body of toxic wastes and excess fluids normally eliminated through the healthy kidney. The treatments are long (four to six hours each), and sometimes are accompanied by muscle cramps, nausea and headaches.

In addition, the dialysis patient experiences a lower energy level and must follow a strict diet which forbids many foods and limits the amount of fluid intake to a few ounces per day. Moreover, children don't grow at a normal rate while on dialysis.

and Steve Chameriski have been appointed as a committee by Park Board President Dan Kosiba to check into the feasibility of purchasing the club.

According to Heinen, "The club would be perfect for the Niles residents and would be a tremendous asset to the Niles Park District." Heinen said the club has 6 indoor tennis courts, 2 saunas, a whirlpool, beautiful locker facilities and sufficient space to set up exercise equipment for the convenience of those attending the club. Heinen and Chameriski are scheduled to meet with the broker for the tennis club property next Monday and should have more definite information to present to the board at that time.

Both Chameriski and Heinen told the board last month when they voted against the proposed health club in Grennan Heights that they felt the purchase of the Tam O'Shanter tennis club would be the answer to all our problems. There was plenty of parking there and no residents would be inconvenienced. They both also reiterated their inten-

tion to make the tennis club available to residents on a single visit basis and not on a membership basis as was proposed for the Grennan Heights Health Club.

In other actions President Kosiba also appointed a committee to check into the enclosure of the atrium at Grennan Heights. The committee consists of Walt Beusse, Steve Chameriski and Walt Beusse. Ironically, these are the 3 commissioners who voted against the enclosure of the atrium and the proposed health club for that area. The board is currently seeking revised costs for the atrium improvements from their architect James Follensbee & Associates before proceeding with any further plans. district.

• Enrollment of the non-public school must be 75 students;

• Transportation does not have to be provided on days when the public school is not in session;

• If mass transportation is currently available, the public school does not have to transport;

• If transportation is not being provided to any resident pupil in the public school does not have to transport non-public students;

• Funding for the additional costs of this bill shall be borne 100% by the state on a current basis in 2 installments; the public school does not have to continue to bus if the state does not pay for additional costs;

• Chicago is excluded from the bill;

• The effective date would be July 1, 1981. (This assumes passage in the House by a simple majority.)

According to public school officials and the Bureau of the Budget a preliminary estimate for 1981-82 places the cost to taxpayers of such a transportation system between \$10 and \$20 million.

The final form of this legislation has passed the Senate and awaits action in the House. During the fall override session, Rep. Jane Barnes, the House sponsor of SB. 1812, can call the bill for a vote which will require only 89 votes to pass.

Dr. Clarence E. Culver, Superintendent of School District #71, said, "This bill will be very costly for our schools. We will have to provide 3 additional buses, 3 drivers, and more insurance, to say nothing of the extra hours of administrators' time. We may be running numerous bus routes to accommodate a handful of students going to private schools in different directions. Even though the bill specifies that the state will assume full financial responsibility for transporting non-public school students we cannot depend on that. Last session, an \$8.6 million supplemental appropriation bill to cover the shortfall of last year's state mandated transportation system failed to pass. The amount not paid by the state had to be covered by taxpayers from their local education dollars. For FY '81 there is a \$13.5 million deficit in the transportation fund."

Mr. William Meier, President of the Board of Education of School District #71, said, "Our district residents, parents and non-parents, have fought this issue many times, and they will do so again. Public schools are already providing free transportation to private and parochial school students within the district's boundaries. This bill would be a terrible burden for the public school system. There are only so many dollars allocated by the state for education. If they keep mandating programs without increasing that amount taxpayers will see more of their locally raised education dollars spent in covering programs they do not need and should not have to provide. We will continue to resist any legislation requiring out-of-district busing."

Dr. Clarence E. Culver said that they are preparing to contact every Representative and every Senator. He said that in the past they have voted to oppose the issue. "We will work to keep their support (try to persuade the Representatives and Senators not to vote in favor of non-public school busing this time)."





valuable to the paramedics attending an emergency. The pack is designed to fit into the refrigerator shelf and households involved in this program will be identified by an emblem placed on the right corner of the refrigerator door.

The packs can be obtained at these locations: Fire Stations at 9024 Gross Point, 8340 Hamlin, and 7424 Niles Center; Office on Aging, 5140 Galitz; and Les-On Drugs, 5301 Dempster.

Skokie is one of 10 north suburban communities affiliated with St. Francis through its paramedics, that is participating in this program. Others include Evanston, Niles, Wilmette and Morton Grove. All of these communities use St. Francis as a training facility for paramedics.

While the program was initially designed with senior citizens in mind, hospital and fire officials urge all residents to become part of the program and keep a pack on all members of the family.

"There's no question this will be a great aid to our paramedics in an emergency situation," Skokie Fire Chief Jerome Burke said.

Before joining the St. Francis program, both Office on Aging and Fire Department officials had, in recent months, been reviewing several "vial of life" type programs to determine which would suit Skokie best.

The addition onto Village Hall adds 27,000 sq. ft. to the existing facility and brings into the same building all village departments except for fire, police, public works and the office on aging. The \$2.8 million project began in May, 1978 with a feasibility report and continued with a groundbreaking for the expansion in May, 1979. The expanded wing was completed in May, 1980 and a number of village departments occupied the building then. Remodeling of the "older" portion of the building was just completed recently.

Skokie's original Village Hall was built in 1927 when only 3,000 people lived in what we now know of as Skokie. The building was remodelled at a cost of \$600,000 in 1958, but not expanded.

The Village Planning Department has made those revisions and the board is expected to vote on the statement at the special meeting.

Very shortly after the policy statement is approved, the village is expected to send out requests for proposals to nearly 20 cable television companies who have expressed an interest in the Skokie franchise.

"After long and careful work on this, we are now at the final stages of the study of our cable needs," Village Planner Robert Molumby said. "Soon we'll hear from the cable companies and get their proposals. We hope that everyone who is interested in the prospects of cable television will attend on Dec. 2."

Susan Buske, of Cable Television Information Center, will be on hand at the special meeting to aid the village board and staff. She helped the planning department review the policy statements.


Buske and the CTC staff will be studying and evaluating the proposals of the cable companies, and then providing recommendations to the village board. Once the request for proposals are sent out, the cable companies will have 90 days to submit proposals to Skokie's specifications. Those proposals will then be evaluated by CTC. CHEESE BALL SPREAD

- 1 Gouda Cheese (about 10 oz.)
- 1/4 cup butter
- 1/2 cup walnuts or pecans, finely chopped
- Puerto Rican rum
- Tabasco

Use a sharp paring knife to make scalloped edge around the top of a 10-oz. Gouda cheese. Scoop out cheese, leaving a 1/2-inch shell. Grate or chop cheese. Use an electric mixer to cream 1/4 cup butter. Beat in cheese, nuts and enough rum to make spreadable mixture. Add Tabasco to taste. Spoon cheese spread into shell, cover and chill.

CHILI CON CARNE

- 2 pounds chopped beef
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 cups chopped onion
- 1 green pepper, chopped
- 1 can (2 lbs., 3 oz.) tomatoes
- 1 cup hot water
- 1/2 teaspoon celery seed
- 1/4 teaspoon cayenne
- 1 bay leaf, crumbled
- 1/2 teaspoon crushed cumin seed
- 2-3 tablespoons chili powder
- 2 cans (1 lb. ea.) kidney beans

Brown the meat in a large heavy skillet, breaking it up with a fork as it cooks. Add butter, onion, green pepper and garlic. Cook until soft. Add tomatoes, hot water and seasonings. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer until it thickens or about two hours. Add more hot water, if necessary. Stir in the beans and heat through. Serves 8-10.
