Blase heads opposition to Chicago water rate hike

It looks as though Chicago and its 74 municipal suburban water customers are in for a head-to-head confrontation over water rates.


It is a continuing story that started three years ago when 47 suburbs brought suit against Chicago, challenging the legality of the rate they were being

Village Board cites traffic problems, pollution and noise as reasons for denial

'No soap' for Dempster St. car wash

The Niles Village Board of Trustees Tuesday evening upheld the recommendation of the Zoning Board and unanimously denied a car wash at 7303 Dempster St. Amid cheers of approval from approximately 40 residents, trustees cited the excess traffic on Dempster, fear of icing on streets in the winter from the excess water, pollution from running motors and noise from auto radios as their reasons for denying the petition from National Pride Equipment.

Attorney James Marovitz representing the petitioner Steven Hirsch, chairman of National Pride, told the board their proposed 14 bay self service car wash would be open from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. and during peak periods would handle 60 cars per hour. They also noted there would be a manager on duty at all times to handle any problems. Hirsch explained they have 172 self service car washes in 18 states and have been commended by many Continued on Page 35

From the LEFT HAND

Out on the northeastern rim of the Golf Mill Shopping Center parking lot it was very cold and winter-like Monday morning. About 30 guys, wrapped in London Fogs, were braving the late-November chill as they stood in front of a home-made podium, face to face with such stalwarts as Blase, Volberding, Niski and Lawson. These names went with the personages of Mayors, a Chamber of Commerce president and an engineer from the Illinois Department of Transportation. They were present at the ribbon-cutting ceremonies which culminated in the completion of the Golf rd. improvement which winds its way through Niles, Morton Grove, Glenview and the East Maine unincorporated area.

It was our kind of ribbon-cutting. Nobody got carried away with his oratory. The Mayors spoke about co-operation with the many public bodies in the area. The Chamber man spoke funny and quick. And the engineer mentioned the project was finished six months ahead of schedule; five minutes later the very cold London Fogs were ensconced in a local restaurant for some well-earned refreshments.

It seems the Golf Road improvement has been going on forever. Back in the late 60's and early 70's we remember parents from St. Isaac Jogues and Washington Schools trudging to endless public meetings protesting the proposed widening of Golf Road. They felt the widening to a six-lane thoroughfare alongside their schools would wipe-out the student bodies there. The thought the kids would be wending their way through an obstacle course, where high-powered Jaguars and other 8-cylinder cats would be bearing down on Continued on Page 36

MG Cable TV firms responds to Hilkin charges

Dear Editor:

Recently you published a letter regarding Cable TV in which the author made some serious, albeit, erroneous, allegations. From a base of a few complaints, the author made a quantum leap to an indictment of the selection process. As to the few complaints—although we constructed a telecommunications system passing more than 8,000 residential units in Morton Grove, and although we have installed more than 2,500 subscribers to date, there have been fewer than 40 complaints (many of them unwarranted), a percentage of satisfied people that is better than Ivory's 99-44/100's pure.

As to the selection process—the writer asks, "Why did Morton Grove rush into a long time franchise with an unknown cable company...?" There are several

blatant errors in this question. Let's examine the "unknown cable company." First, Continental has been in the Cable TV business since 1963, and at the time of the award it was actively serving over 100 communities throughout the country with 14 active systems in Illinois dating back to 1965 Quincy, Illinois. Continental has been in the Cable TV business longer than any of the other applicants for the Morton Grove franchise. Continental is serving more than 320,000 subscribers in the nation with over 40,000 in Illinois alone. Hardly an "Unknown" company!

As to the long term franchise statement—the 15-year term has long been the period set by municipalities in awarding franchises in order to permit cable companies to recoup their in-

vestment.

As to "rushing," the officials of Morton Grove received applications from a number of companies including Centel, Cablevision, Metrovision (associated with the Lerner Newspapers), Northern Illinois (associated with Storer), Coaxial Communications, as well as Continental.

The mayor, the trustees, the staff, as well as the village attorney spent countless hours interviewing cable companies and in the final stages contacted municipalities where the finalists had operating systems. Only after a study of the track record in other communities was Continental selected. Hardly a rush!

As to the other allegations, free expense paid trip to New York,

pressure from Cook County officials, etc.—they are categorically untrue! It is interesting to note that Continental has been selected by a number of other Cook County communities and by the city of Elmhurst whose committee report characterized Continental's record as "impeccable and spotless."

Because the officials of Morton Grove assiduously devoted themselves to the task of selecting a company, the residents of Morton Grove now have the pleasure, at their option, of the wonders of the world of cable television.

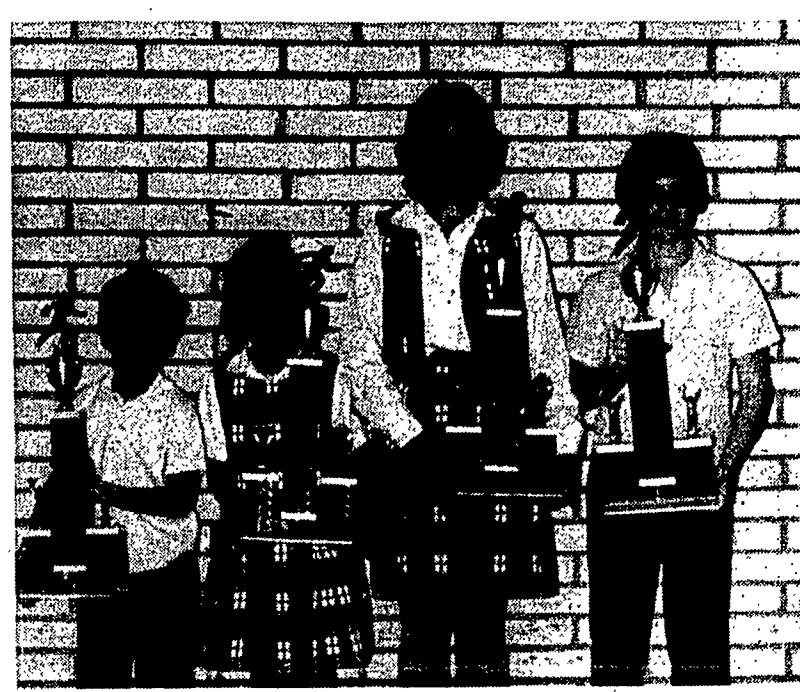

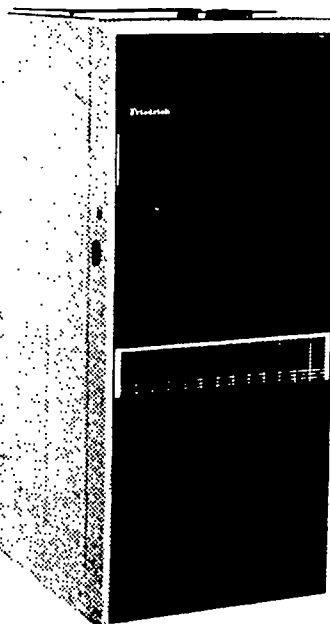

Count Judge dismissed the suburbs' complaint. Round 2 went to the suburbs, when, in a lengthy, strongly-worded opinion, the Appellate Court practically threw the book at Chicago when it held that the suburbs' complaint stated a valid cause of action which, if proven, could entitle the suburbs to a substantial reduction in current and future water rates, as well as substantial damages or credits for past water charges, and referred the case back to the Circuit Court for trial under guidelines set forth in its opinion.

Round 3 was won last week by the suburbs when the Illinois Supreme Court denied Chicago's Petition to Appeal the decision of the Appellate Court.

Nicholas Blase, Mayor of the Village of Niles, and Chairman of the Suburban Mayors' Water Committee, indicates that Round 4 will probably occur when and if the Chicago City Council, by ordinance, increases Chicago's water rates to include suburban water customers, Mayor Byrne has requested a 53% water rate hike.

"We have directed our special counsel, the law firm of Ancel, Glink, Diamond & Murphy, P.C., to immediately move for an injunction to prevent any increase in the water rate

charges to the suburbs," stated Mayor Blase. "Based upon the Appellate Court's opinion," he noted, "we believe we are entitled to a reduction in our water rates, and substantial damages, instead of a water rate increase."

Whatever happens in Round 4, Round 5 will probably put the Chicago Water Operation under severe scrutiny when the prove-up of the suburbs' water case gets underway in the Circuit Court.

The suburbs purchase approximately \$30,000,000 of Lake Michigan water annually from Chicago. "We believe," Mayor Blase stated, "that we can prove an overcharge of at least \$10,000,000 based on the present annual water rate to the suburbs. In any event," he said, "we will now have the opportunity to do what has been previously denied us . . . that is, to prove our case."

According to Niles Village Manager Kenneth Scheel, the village currently pays the city of Chicago 46¢ per 1,000 gallons. Niles residents are charged \$1.65 per 1,000 gallons to cover the village's costs for repairs and maintenance. Should the 53% increase be implemented by Chicago, the Niles water rate would be forced up to \$1.76 per 1,000 gallons.

communities for their appearance and the efficiency of their operations.

Regarding water usage, about 15 gallons is used per car or two gallons per minute. According to Hirsch, if the car is washed at home, it takes 150 to 200 gallons and their facility would use only 10% of that amount.

Representing the area homeowners, Burt Daymont, 7322 Carol, told the board that in addition to the obvious traffic noise and pollution problems, he felt this facility would deteriorate the area and cause a severe depreciation in the value of their homes.

After considerable discussion the board voted unanimously to deny the petition.

In other business the board approved the request from SFA Developers for Industrial Bonds not to exceed \$7,000,000 for the development of the Green Lakes Shopping Center on Golf rd. in Niles. Attorney Edward Kapel representing Mr. Walter Samuels, president of Realty Investors Development Corp., New York, told the board they are seeking to have the industrial bond monies placed in an escrow account which will control the monies' use so that it will be spent 100% in the village of Niles. Currently K-Mart is planning to take over the vacated Woolco store and other plans are in process for the upgrading of the center.

Mayor Blase also told the developers that he would like to have them to request a Niles post office address since that area is currently handled by the Des Plaines post office. The board unanimously approved the issuance of the bonds.

The board also approved membership in the Regional Emergency Dispatch Center for the Niles Fire Department. The only dissenting member, Peter Pesole, cited the fact that Niles would operate the communication center for the five participants. In addition to Niles, the fire departments of Morton Grove, Glenview, North Maine and unincorporated Glenview would be participants. Pesole's

major objection was the cost factor to the village of Niles. Fire Chief Al Hoelbl and Captain Harry Kinowski explained the mutual effort by the departments would be a "model for all communities" and would also save the village "a lot of money".

Hoelbl told the board an inventory list of equipment and personnel would be turned in by each participating department and no department would be able to cut down their personnel or not replace equipment because their calls would be handled by another department. The operators of the communication system would be selected from a mutual RED system roster.

Hoelbl also said the communities were looking into a collective maintenance system whereby each department would not have to pay a full-time mechanic to service their equipment. In addition mutual instead of individual training programs for the fire departments were also being studied. This would involve a large savings to the communities in the long run. The board passed the motion for the RED membership with only Trustee Pesole dissenting.

Board approved a five year plan for the installation of the Opticom devices on traffic signals allowing emergency vehicles to change the lights to green when they are approaching an intersection.

Blase also told the board to consider several complaints they have received regarding the parking of large trucks, over 12,000, with 'C' plates in the driveways of residential areas. Neighbors have cited obstruction of roadways and unsightliness as their major complaints. Niles currently has an ordinance regarding the parking of boats and trailers on residential driveways. Blase said the major offender would be trucks used for construction work and tow trucks. The subject will be discussed at next month's meeting.

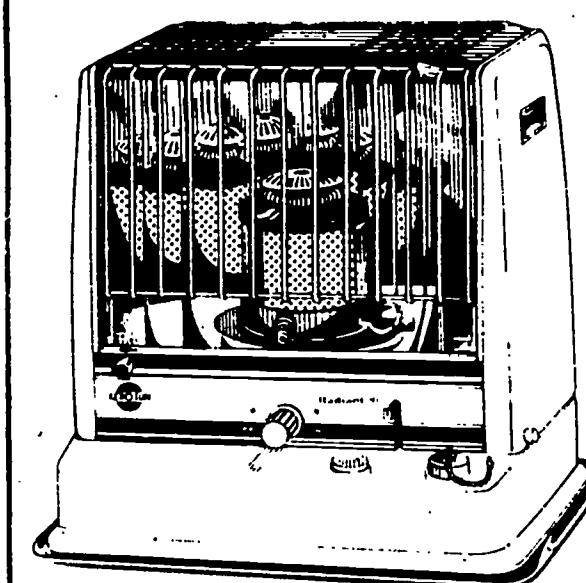

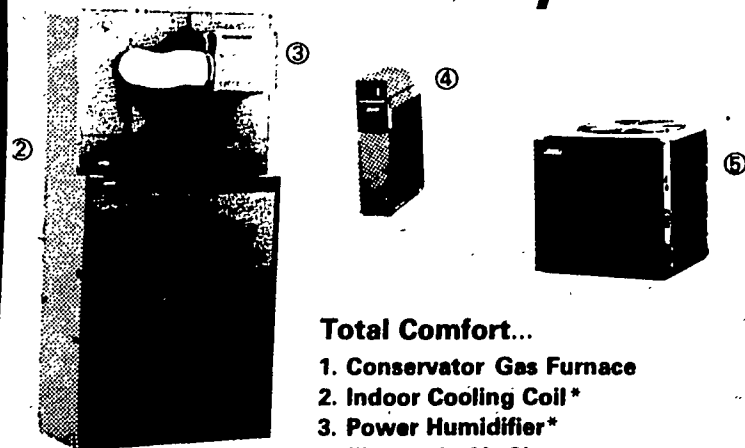

ment closest to the incident would respond, as well as the home village unit. Brady said this form of cooperation has actually been in existence for quite awhile, but now responsibilities are part of a legal document.

In regard to a second intergovernmental legal document approved Monday evening, village attorney Martin Ashman explained the insurance pool will become effective Jan. 1, 1981. It should represent almost a 25% savings to the village in the first year, according to Ashman.

Current policy premiums, including workmen's compensation, stand at \$321,798. With the Illinois Municipal League Risk Management Association, the payment would be \$241,349.

Ashman admitted two drawbacks with the new system however. "We will have deductibles now, but they will not exceed \$10,000 for the year." Also the League wants the full premium immediately so "there will be something of a cash squeeze."

decision on job salaries or benefits if they are personally involved."

In addition Boznos told The Bugle "pressure is put on Park Director Dave Huber who is caught in the middle since his job is contingent on approval of the park board."

The issue in question came up Monday, Nov. 17 at the monthly board meeting when Boznos sought to amend the personnel policy which states no person may be employed on a full time basis that is a member of a commissioner's family, a director's family or of a full time employee's family. Boznos' amendment would exclude employment for friends and relatives on a part time basis also. His amendment was voted down.

In addition Boznos said the board did pass a ruling that excluded anyone except park personnel from using park equipment for park use only. He alleged that park board members and other park personnel had used snow plows, park vehicles and tools on their personal property.

Boznos' exact statement to the park board at the park board meeting was as follows:

"Boznos' exact statement to the park board was as follows: 'I have been your commissioner for the past 20 months, and have on occasion felt it necessary to speak out on certain issues affecting the taxpayer.'

"Since I've been in office, I've attended two state and two national conventions and have discussed many issues with commissioners throughout the country. One area of interest is the issue of commissioners' relatives working for their park districts. Without fail, the consensus was that this practice is unethical, and the various park districts would be better served if this practice did not exist. Firstly, it can interfere with the objective judgments a director must make and, secondly, it can cause additional stress on an already busy director.

"Throughout the past years, it has been the policy of our park district to allow the employment of commissioners' relatives. This policy is still in effect. During the past year, however, I became aware of specific cases in which special treatment of the commissioners' relatives was asked of the director. The office of commissioner should not be sought after as a means of insuring employment or special treatment for relatives. It is the duty of this elected office to serve the public needs. I, therefore, feel obligated to request that this policy be re-examined."

Joan White, president of the Morton Grove Park Board, expressed her feelings on Boznos' charges in the following statement to The Bugle:

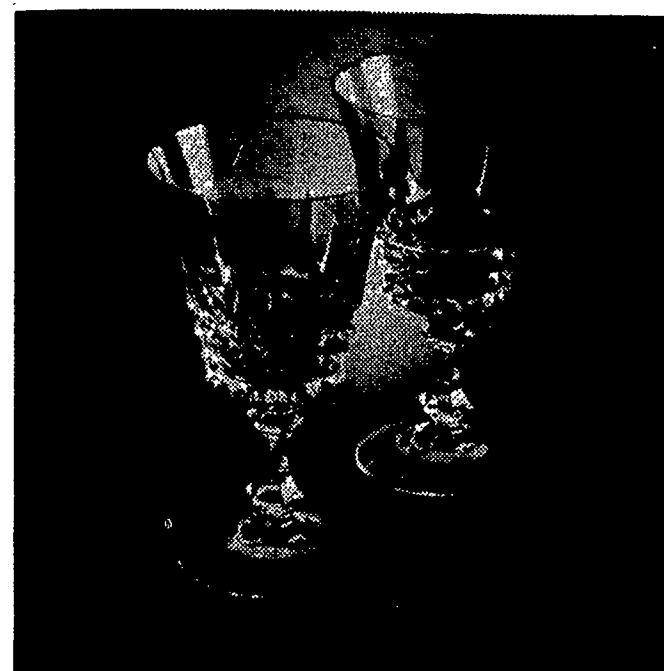
"As President of the Morton Grove Park Board, I feel that I must speak out on an issue related to the media by Commissioner Boznos. He refers to the pressure and stress put on our director because of family members of commissioners holding part time jobs. What he fails to tell the media is the undue stress put upon our busy director by his (Boznos) interrogation of individual employees, and demands that certain employees be discharged without any provocation.

"Mr. Boznos is certainly entitled to express his views, and make motions supporting them. However, when any of his motions are voted down, he cannot accept defeat, and immediately contacts the newspapers in order to make it a public issue.

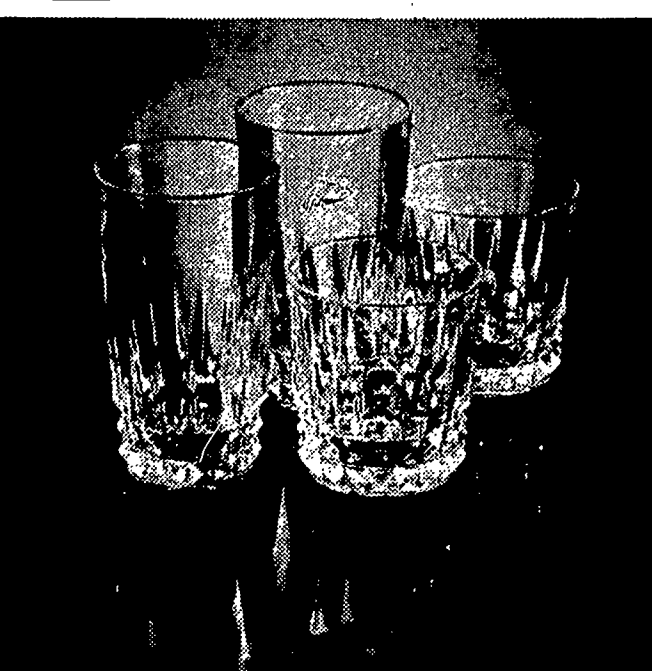

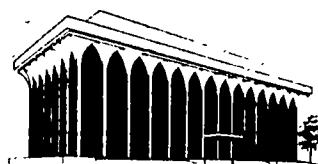
