Chicagoland's own Inaugural Ball

The Presidential Inaugural Committee - 1981, a non-profit corporation appointed by President elect Ronald Reagan pursuant to the Presidential Ceremonies Act of Congress, today designated the Chicagoland Inaugural Ball, being held Tuesday, January 20 at the Ramada O'Hare Inn in

suburban Rosemont-Des Plaines as an "Official Inaugural Event". With the designation assured, the Chicagoland Inaugural Ball will be eligible to participate in the satellite transmitted closed circuit TV broadcast of the events in the nation's capital. TNT Communications of New York

City, operators of big screen TV sports events nationwide, will install the large screens in the O'Hare Inn to tie the local ball into the national events. William R. Bond cites yearly savings of \$302,000 to district 63 by closing Apollo school

Apollo parents irate over projected closing

Dr. Donald Bond, administrator of East Maine School District 63, recommended the closing of Apollo Junior High School by June, 1981 for a projected savings to the district of \$302,144 at a meeting of the whole January 6. Parents and some board members heatedly debated the issue with a few parents saying an investigation is being conducted in to the annexation of their area with Glenview School District 34. Parents cited the lowering of property values by closing all public schools north of Golf. They also questioned why their children were being moved from one closed school to another, busing, and advance publicity of the proposed closing. Bond said he recommended

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'The Library Notebook'

This is the first of a regular monthly column graciously provided to the library by The Bugle. As administrator of the Niles Public Library District I am pleased to be able to report monthly to Bugle readers on a variety of topics related to the library.

Most often I will describe new books and other materials recently acquired by the library. Other columns might include information on new programs and services, or might feature a department of the library.

For openers, I have recently enjoyed a new biography "Woody Guthrie: a Life" by Joe Klein. If one were to ask many young people today if they know who Woody Guthrie was most would probably only know him as the father of contemporary folk and pop singer, Arlo Guthrie, of "Alices Restaurant" fame. Most would not know that he produced over a thousand songs, many of which have passed into our national folk heritage and that he was a major influence on contemporary music through his idolization by a generation of folk singers and song writers like the likes of Bob Dylan, Joan Baez and Judy Collins.

Joe Klein's biography of Guthrie is the first major book written about this fascinating man. It covers in rich detail Woody's career from his birth in Okemah, Oklahoma in 1912 to his death in 1967. Guthrie's early days on the dusty plains of the midwest imbued him with a sense of the land and the people, particularly the farmer. His early performing was with small country style local bands and was in a style that was unabashedly "hillbilly". After achieving moderate success performing on radio stations in the Southwest and Mexico he began to roam. He rode the box-cars, camped in the hobo jungles, drifted with the migrant workers, and lived in the dust bowl refugee camps. It was during this period that the songs started pouring out and it was also during this time that Woody's political convictions began to form. He became a radical, a union organizer, and flirted with the communist party. His greatest song, "This Land Is Your Land" was written during this period and was actually a quasi-Marxist parody of "God Bless America".

Emergency phone service for the deaf



The Village of Niles, through the cooperation of R.E.D. (Regional Emergency Dispatch Center) has installed a TDD (teletypewriter device for the deaf) at the fire station at Dempster and Cumberland. This equipment came about through a grant from the Illinois Department of Public Health and allows people who are deaf or have impaired speech to talk on the telephone by using a typewriter-like keyboard coupled to a visual display unit. R.E.D. Center dispatcher, Bruce Ringquist, is shown demonstrating the new unit. Niles Fire dispatchers can now accept information over these devices when help is needed for fire fighting, emergency medical assistance, police and other emergency services. This service is now available to all persons living in the village by calling 827-1100.

If you are a person in need of this type of service, or if you know of anyone needing this type of aid, you may contact your local telephone representative to receive information regarding the cost and regulation in having a telecommunication device for the deaf installed in your home.

Leaning Tower Seniors install new officers

The Leaning Tower Senior Adult Center has over 1,000 members and over 80 different activities and is one of the most active Senior Centers in the Niles Township Area. The officers are pleased with their new jobs and are looking forward to serving fellow members with much enthusiasm.

In addition to the regular activities, the Senior Center's Outreach Program has 7 Friendly Visitors and 2 Staff workers who cover 8 area Nursing Homes and about 75 isolated Seniors in their own homes. These Friendly Visitors visit about 250 seniors, who otherwise would not see a soul, each week.

Lifestyle screening for District 219 staff

The Good Health Program of Skokie Valley Community Hospital will provide lifestyle screening for faculty and staff members of School District #219 Tuesday, January 13, and Wednesday, January 14, at Niles West High School and Thursday, January 15, and Friday, January 16 at Niles North High School, during the hours of the regular school day.

The screening is part of the comprehensive health program developed by the hospital to identify health risks in the lifestyles of apparently healthy individuals. Procedures include height and weight, skin fold, blood pressure, cholesterol level, urine sugar, step test for exercise tolerance, carbon monoxide levels due to smoking, Hemocult for colon cancer and tonometry for glaucoma. These procedures are combined with a computer questionnaire, which calculates each person's risk of dying due to his lifestyle and cites potential years to be gained by lifestyle changes.

All faculty and staff of the school district who participate in the screening will be eligible to take a series of health-promoting classes, which will be offered at both schools, beginning the week of February 16. Classes will include stress management, nutrition, exercise, weight control, alcohol use and abuse, instruction in self examination and a stop smoking clinic.

Half of the cost of both the screening and health-promoting classes will be paid by the Board of Education of School District

#219, with the remainder paid by the participating faculty and staff members.

Skokie Valley Community Hospital's Good Health Program provides employee, union and civic groups with a means to improve the lifestyles of their constituents. Potential benefits include a better quality of life, increased morale and productivity, and a reduction in medical costs.

Since January of last year, programs have been given at Brunswick Corporation in Skokie, Northwestern University's Evanston and Chicago campuses, Quaker Oats Company in Chicago, Allstate Insurance Company in Northbrook and Washington National Life Insurance Company in Evanston.

Family Life

"Saying You're Sorry Can Help Mend Marriage"

In Erich Segal's book, Love Story, "Love means never having to say you're sorry".

I believe this is fantasy-utopia or euphoria-not real life. Some married couples and families try to live in such an unrealistic environment by their own making, but "it just ain't so"! Rather the opposite is more nearly correct: "love means you can say you are sorry".

I find that many couples and families try to ignore and to deny and/or fantasize and to be unreal about their true relationships with one another.

Frequently, it continues this way until either the husband or wife, or one of the children, tries to upset the pie in the sky, dream world, that has been created in the home.

In my counseling I have noted that the children frequently help bring this utopia to an abrupt halt through some unacceptable behavior that forces mom to look at dad, dad at mom, child at parents, and parents at child.

At last the stage has been set for some honest, gut level involvement and communication.

I had a case where the parents called about one of their teenagers without any intention, at first, of involving themselves.

They thought the work would be with their teenager who was presenting some behavior they could not tolerate or understand.

They were even ready to consider sending the child to an institution. Fortunately, the couple did involve themselves as well as their other teenager.

The results were quite astonishing to them as they discovered several things:

Their marriage was in serious jeopardy and they had grown apart rather than together in such areas as verbal, feeling, physical and spiritual communication.

Their other teenager added greatly to the family problem and did whatever was necessary to get mom and dad against this problem child.

The mom, dad and the other child had used the family problem child as their scapegoat without really being aware or cognizant of what they had done or were continuing to do.

Mom and dad for the sake of your children as well as your own well-being and happiness, don't try to ignore, run from, deny or project your marital difficulties and personal unhappiness and maladjustment onto one of your children.

You may say, "I would never do such a thing," just like the couple I mentioned earlier also said.

Sure, they didn't intentionally try to use their child in a premeditated way as a scapegoat, but there is what happened.

They really had not tried to face some of their ambivalent, confused, unhappy, depressed feelings with one another. As a consequence they lived out their frustrations through their child.

Fortunately, however, this family did take a good look at themselves and what their interaction was like and to make some constructive gains.

You can do the same. Sure, it takes a lot of mutual understanding, patience, tolerance and compassion, but it is worth it when you begin to see results. Certainly, most of us want to achieve the greatest measure of happiness possible.

This can be done, I believe, only by really reaching out for one another in an accepting, loving and understanding way.

If you are constantly tearing someone down and pointing out their faults, or believing yourself better than they are, then they will fight back and become quite withdrawn or overtly active in relation to their spouse or child in the family.

Usually, at first, the overt action will be directed toward the child because the parent is less threatened by the child. At the same time the parent probably will become more passive and noninvolved with his spouse.

Is any of the above hitting close to home? If it is, then try to open up channels of communication with your spouse-see what really is going on in your marriage.

If you can look there first and help to remedy some of your relationship problems, then you will be a happier and more contented couple; then you can better handle your child's problems fairly and more appropriately.

If you find that you have helped to create an unreal environment with little or no gut level involvement, then try to remedy it and, if necessary, seek out professional help.

Be able to express true love and say that you are sorry and go about correcting the situation between you and your spouse; then the two of you together help your child or children. This can be a very positive and edifying way to start 1981.

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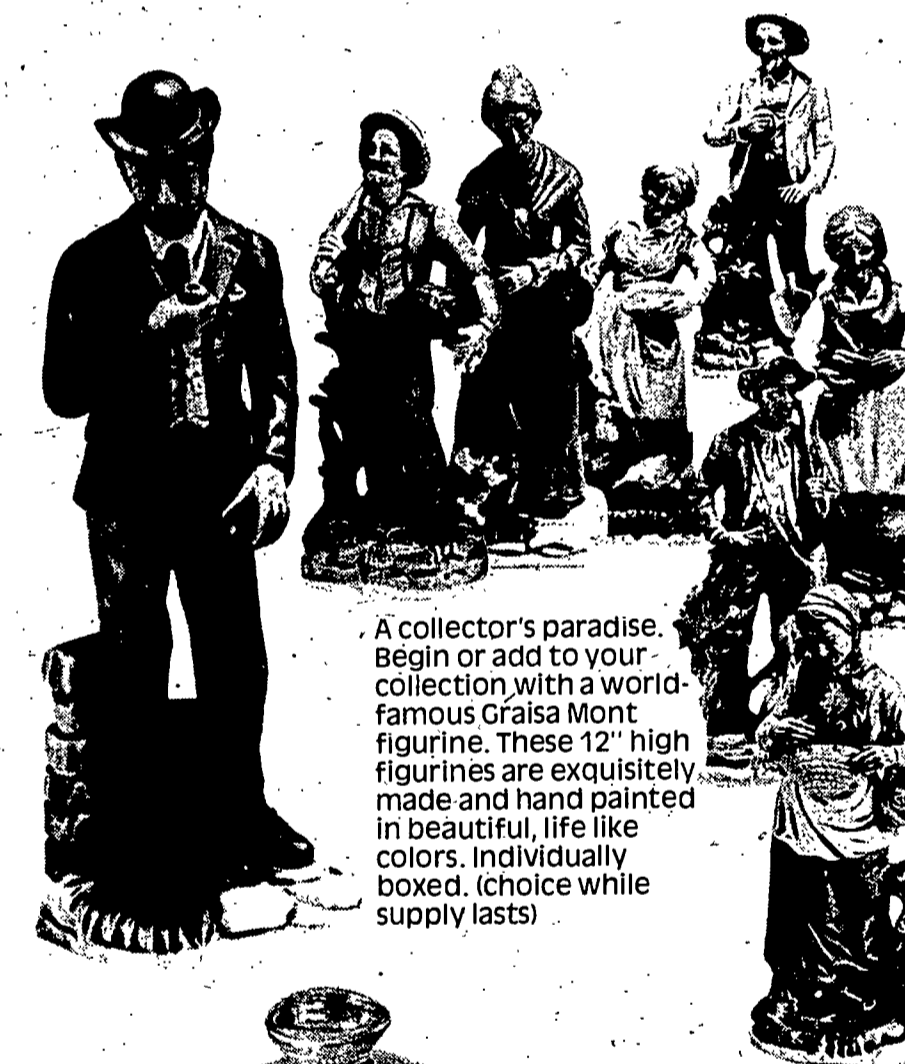

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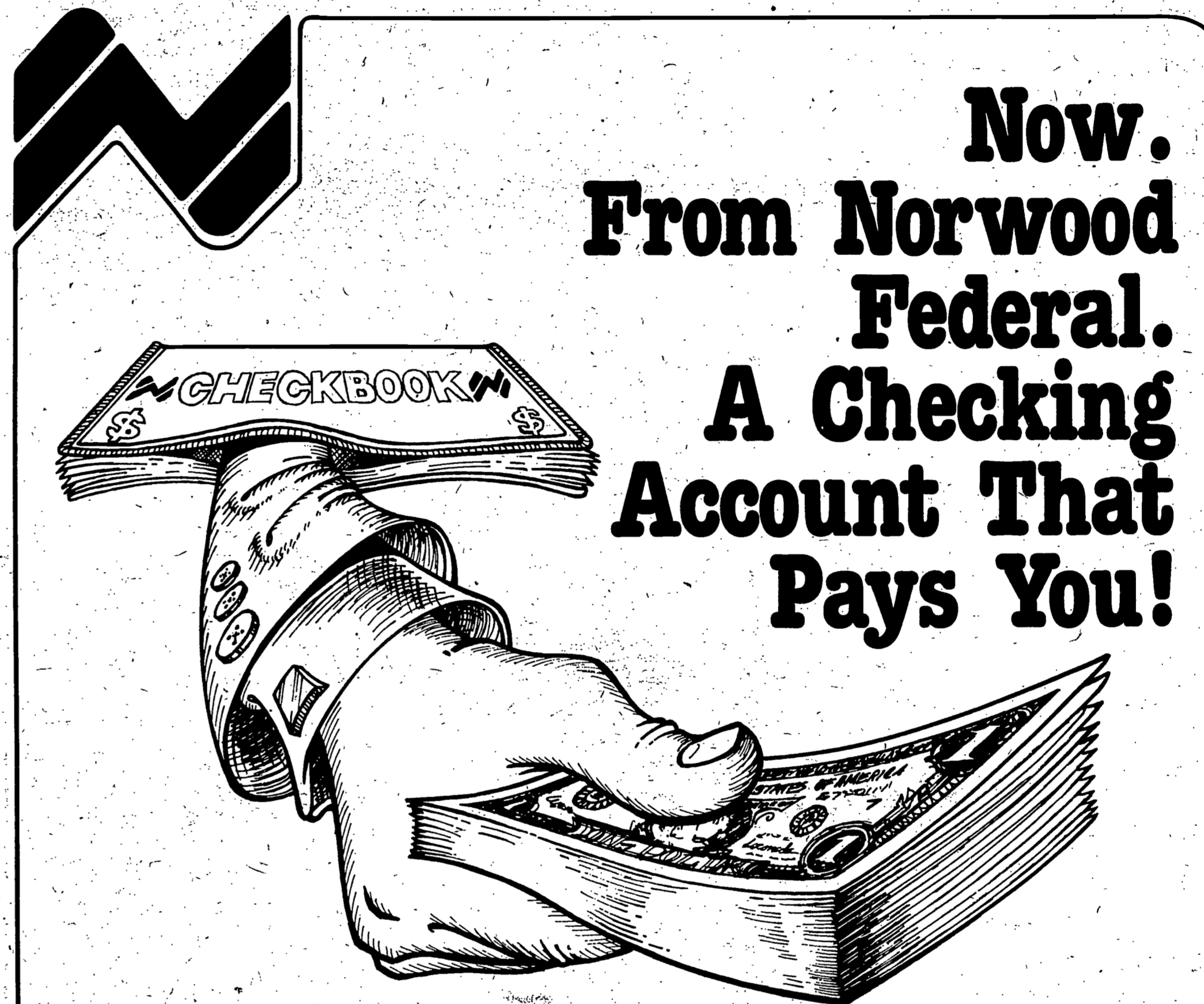

District 207 exploring alternative uses for Maine North

The Buildings and Grounds Committee of the Board of Education of Maine Township High School District 207 has begun the process of exploring alternative uses for Maine North High School, scheduled to close on August 15, 1981.

At its Dec. 16 meeting, the committee and District administrators listened to Allyn Franke, school district legal counsel, and David Allen, Asst. Superintendent for Business, District 39-Wilmette, discuss the legal and practical considerations of selling or leasing the school, located at 9511 Harrison St. in unincorporated Des Plaines.

Franke outlined for the committee, chaired by Board Member Thomas Rueckert, the procedures the District must follow should the Board decide to sell the school as surplus property. He said the Board would have to adopt a resolution, including exact details of provisions for the sale, publish the notice of sale for three successive weeks in local newspapers, and conduct the sale in an open auction after establishing a minimum-acceptable bid price.

He explained that once a building is no longer used for school purposes it comes under the jurisdiction of the local zoning board, in this case the Cook County Zoning Board. The Maine North property is zoned P-1, public use. It would have to be rezoned for any other type of use.

He noted that a sale of the property may have to be made conditional to the zoning board

granting a rezoning "because buyers are reluctant to commit to a multimillion dollar sale without knowing whether a rezoning will be approved."

In the area of leasing school property, Franke remarked that leasing may be more inviting to potential users of the property because new legislation has made it possible for school districts to offer leases for ten years rather than five years.

After reviewing the new legislation, Franke will give the committee his opinion as to whether or not the new law broadens the restriction on school districts in making leasing arrangements to include other than non-profit organizations.

David Allen brought to the committee the practical experience of a school district which has successfully found alternative uses for three of four closed schools in the Wilmette district.

He said the first step the Board must take is to make sure the school building will not be needed in the future. He said the school district must provide good data the community can have confidence in that the property is really surplus.

Dr. Richard Short, Superintendent, District 207, commented: "Unfortunately, that is not a problem, with enrollment projections showing the student population declining over the next five years and beyond. It was the citizens' committee working on Project SED (Secondary Education for the Eighties) that recommended

to the Board the closing of a Maine High School."

Allen told the committee that there are many potential uses for surplus school buildings such as health care facilities, offices, and residential uses. "To be successful you must be creative in marketing the property," he said.

He suggested that the Board begin with an inquiry process to help determine probable uses of the site. A questionnaire is sent out to prospective buyers. From the replies, a potential market is developed for the property and a price range. He added that his school district also attracted interest in its properties with advertisements placed in the Wall Street Journal and other newspapers and trade journals.

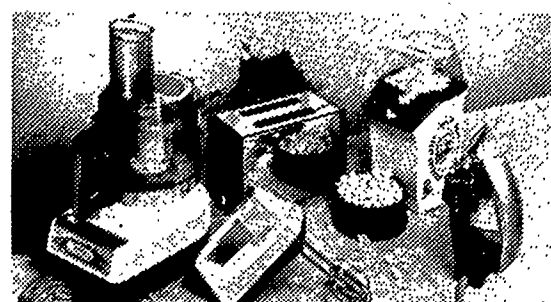
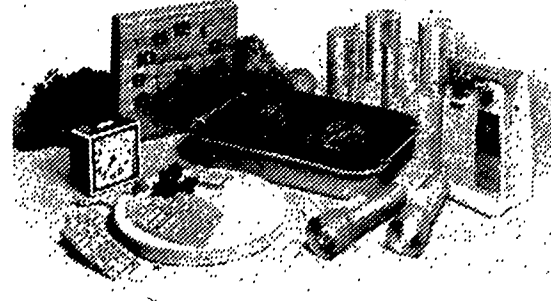
Allen also advised the committee to have two appraisals of the property made, prepare an attractive brochure about the property, acquire an up-dated survey of the site, develop simple floor plans, and collect operational cost data on the building.

With the prime rate having jumped to a new high of 21% only that day, Charlotte Storer, Board President, commented that the District could make the sale of Maine North more attractive to buyers by offering to hold the mortgage on the property.

The meeting concluded with the committee recommending preparation of a descriptive sales brochure of Maine North, an updated survey, and a list of potential qualified appraisers.
