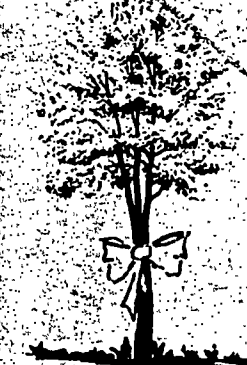

Suburbs seek injunction against Chicago on new water rate hike

The continuing legal dispute over the rate paid for Chicago water took a new turn on Wednesday, Jan. 14 when the Executive Committee of the Chicago Water Suit headed by Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase met at the Niles Council Chambers with representatives of the communities involved in the lawsuit.

The total number of communities now numbers 87 with the addition of 10 new suburbs during the past month. According to Mayor Blase, "There are still 14 communities not in the lawsuit whom we are approaching to join us." At the Jan. 14 meeting the Water Suit committee was

Homestead exemption applications available

Robert P. Hanrahan, Niles Township Assessor would like to advise senior citizen homeowners they can apply for their homestead exemption at his office if they have reached the age 65 on or before January 2, 1981, and use the home as a principal residence.

The exemption reduced the equalized valuation of a senior citizen's home by \$1500, thereby

reducing the real estate taxes which are based on that valuation.

Senior Citizens should bring a recent tax bill, proof of age, and proof of ownership. Please call the Assessor's Office at 673-8300 for further information.

Maine East Senior earns his wings

Many students have a driver's license, but only a few have a pilot's license. George Unger, a senior from Morton Grove is one of the few students who does have a pilot's license, and he has had it since last August.

George's ambition has always been to fly, and now his goal has been achieved. He started taking lessons in July, 1979 and now has 75 hours of flying. He took flying lessons in Rockford at the Rockford Airport. In the summer he had six or seven lessons a month, but in the winter he had only three lessons a month. George paid for the lessons himself, and the total cost was \$2,000.

George does not own a plane so when he goes flying he rents one. He flies out of Rockford Airport and usually flies around the same area.

When one is 16, he may get a student's license, and when he is 17, he will get his private pilot's license. In order to get a pilot's license, one must pass a federal written exam.

George says, "Flying a plane is easy to learn but a lot less unforgiving to human error." He thinks flying is safer than driving because the requirements for getting a license are harder than for driving a car. He also says, "There is a lot less traffic in the air but that most small planes (the one George operates) which have accidents are caused by human error."

George is also on the golf team and was this year's MVP. He plans to attend either the University of Arizona or the University of Illinois Engineering School. He would like to get a degree in aeronautical engineering and would like to get a job as a pilot for a commercial airline. He says, "The airlines want someone with a college degree and more hours than someone who was in the Air Force."

Motor Club hints on car starting

During the cold days of winter, motorists should resist the temptation to continuously pump the gas pedal when trying to start their cars, according to the AAA-Chicago Motor Club.

To make the starting of your vehicle easier, the AAA-CMC advises:

- Turn off all accessories before turning the ignition key. These include the radio, heater, lights, and windshield wipers.
- Turn the key and press the gas pedal to the floor once, or follow the instruction in your owner's manual. Do not grind the starter for more than 15 or 20 seconds. If the car does not start, stop and make repeated attempts, allowing 30 to 45 seconds between tries.

What to do when you're involved in an accident

Do you know what to do in case you're involved in an accident? Captain William Burt, State Police Chicago District Commander, explains what is required of Illinois motorists.

"If you are involved in an accident you are required by law to stop," states Burt. "The penalties for leaving the scene of an accident are severe."

Check for injuries of all parties involved. In the event of serious injury, make the victim as comfortable as possible. Only in the event of imminent danger should you move the victim. Many injuries can be further complicated by improper handling.

Notify the nearest police authority and request ambulance assistance if necessary. If you are a passerby and have no assurance the parties involved have received aid, you can be most instrumental as a communications link.

Protect the scene until the police arrive. Often, more serious injuries are sustained in a second collision. Enlist the aid of bystanders to warn oncoming traffic of the obstruction. Move the vehicles off the roadway when possible. Keep traffic moving.

It is your duty to provide your name, address and registration number (license plate) to the other parties involved in the accident. If requested, you must show your driver's license.

Finally, in the event of death, injury or property damage to the property of any one party in excess of \$250, each party must make a report to the Illinois Department of Transportation within 10 days.

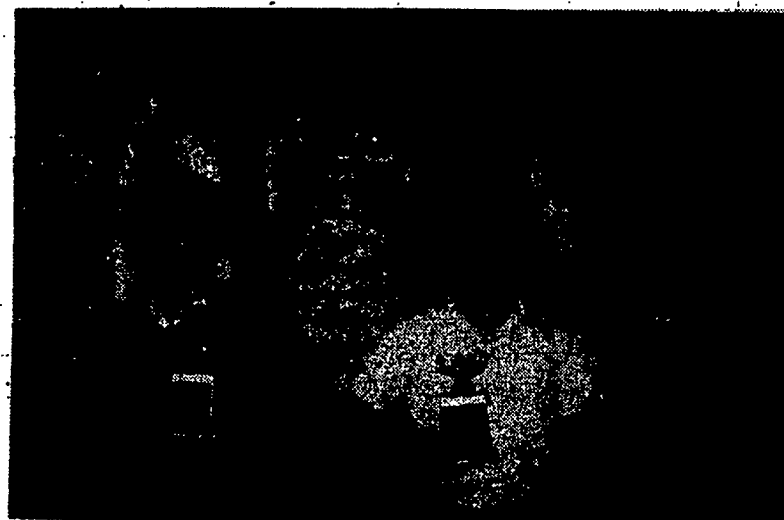

All of us who have been involved in Niles politics through the years, and have a non-partisan interest, would like to see strong competition for all elected posts. It makes everyone work a little harder and think a little more strenuously, resulting in better representation for all of us. New ideas, and proposals come out of a vigorous campaign which adds to everyone's well-being.

Nick Blase has run a tight ship and he'll be difficult to unseat. He has many troops who've been through many campaigns and will do the hard work which brings in votes. They've been in many township elections, as well as village elections, and their know-how adds up to a great many votes. Nick also has a supporting cast of people whose jobs are on the line whenever he runs. They'll be in the forefront in working on behalf of their candidate.

Blase is very vulnerable. And he can be had. But the likelihood of it happening is slim. It takes lots of digging to unseat an incumbent. He has sources for acquiring money from many people who've profited from his years in office which all helps re-elect a candidate.

Ms. Heinen could be a pretty tough candidate. She talks tough and has a way of flailing out which could score lots of points for her candidacy. But this potential virtue could also be a liability if voters think she's just a loud-talking gal who lacks responsibility.

"The gal" aspect of Elaine's candidacy might also be a problem. Despite all of us saying men and women are equal, in politics in particular, men are a little bit more equal. Many male voters would hesitate voting for a woman just because she is a woman. And many women would measure a woman candidate a bit differently than they'd measure a male candidate. As an example a male candidate could make some off-color remarks which many would smile at or dismiss without second thoughts. But if a woman candidate was to use similar language, she would be castigated from pillar to pillar.

Years ago Nick ran for Congress opposing Ab Mikva in the Democratic primary. Nick was speaking in a church in Evanston before an out-of-town crowd which didn't know Nick well. While on the church rostrum Nick let loose with a few "damns" and "bells" which were embarrassing to all of us. A partisan Blase supporter sitting with me slithered down in his chair when Nick spoke this way. In contrast to the very classy Mikva, Nick spoke like some guy who came off with the rough edges showing. While there were only 35 or 40 votes in that church, it was unlikely Nick garnered many of them that night. Had Nick been a woman candidate he would have been talking to an empty hall.

Elaine has her problems. She needs an organization with some savvy. She needs some dollars to match the Blase fund and most important, she has to convince Nilesites she can do the job. After passing these tests she then has to create some issues. They're easy to find. She just has to have the acumen for presenting them well and the guts to follow through. It's a tall order for a political neophyte. But 20 years ago Nick Blase was in the identical position. The only difference is Nick had a great deal of very savvy help which Elaine is unlikely to have.

vised by their attorneys that they will appear before a Chancery Judge by the end of January to ask for an injunction against the City of Chicago to prevent them from applying their 51% water rate increase to the suburbs. Blase told the committee, "Keep in mind that this increase is to start May 1, 1981 unless halted by the Court."

The request for injunctive relief is separate from the previous lawsuit pending for the past 3 years in which the suburbs contend they are overpaying for water by approximately \$12 million a year. According to research gathered by the suburbs, Chicago is passing on charges for repair and maintenance of its 42,000 fire hydrants and more than 100,000 water meters. In addition the suburbs are sharing the cost of a water loss amounting to \$6 million a year of unmetered water due to the leaking, decrepit system. The lawsuit will be heard shortly by a Circuit Court Judge to establish whether the rate being charged by Chicago is reasonable or unreasonable.

The attorneys handling the lawsuit for the suburbs are Ancel, Gluck, Diamond and Murphy, a Chicago law firm.

Another contemplated change for the park district will involve the summer park programs. Park director Dave Huber will be recommending to the recreational committee on playgrounds that the playground programs at Mansfield and National Parks be dropped, although bus service from Mansfield to Austin Park and from National to Oketo Park be provided. The reason for this change is past low registration in the park program. Huber will recommend that instead, a 5th and 6th grade camp be conducted at National and a kiddie camp at Mansfield.

Huber did report, however, that winter park district program registration was up considerably. Adult program participation rose 17% and youth programs 43%. He attributes this increase to the work of Laurie Freeman, Niles Park secretary.

In other business at the January 19 park board meeting, names of those who have thus far filed as candidates for the upcoming election of commissioners were released. Joan White and Richard Schnell hope to retain their seats; also running for those two positions are Doris Connelly and John Mastrow. Other interested residents must file for office by 5 p.m., January 26. The park board will meet at 7 p.m. on January 26 to confirm the final list of candidates.

The park district contract for their new computerized system has been awarded to The Byte Shop on Dempster, in Skokie. The price for the Vector Graphics system is \$11,650, with a monthly recurring cost of \$154. Computer consultant Ed Walsh had been hired by the board to set specifications for the network and help select the most appropriate bid.

Also, a brochure printing bid was awarded to Liberty Press.

Business and Finance, noted that the OCC building is both lighted and heated electrically, resulting in a current yearly electric bill of \$275,000. If Commonwealth Edison was granted the entire 18% rate hike, it would result in a \$50,000 increase in the yearly OCC electric bill.

To participate in opposing the rate hike, the Board of Trustees allocated up to \$2,500 for payment to the law firm of Meyer and Maton. Hilquist added due to increasing oil prices it would be impossible to prevent the electric company from receiving a rate hike, however, by joining with the other schools, he felt it was possible to limit the size of the rate hike.

In other business the OCC Board of Trustees approved a plan to run a 6 week pilot experimental project which could result in the summer session being reduced from two 6 week sessions to two 8 week sessions. The proposed plan, to be implemented this coming summer, involves shortening the first term to 6 weeks followed by the regular 8 week session. If the 6 week session is found to be acceptable, it will be used for both sessions beginning in the summer of 1982. The cost of the plan was set at \$14,750. Included in the cost were administrative fees and coordinating expenses, honoraria for participating faculty and ad-

having was one option available to board members after attorney Lawrence Weiner said, "I recommend the board take some action on behalf of the citizens of the village to clarify the matter."

Weiner said, "It is my opinion, based on my investigation, on what I was told this evening, and on this note (passed to board members by Czerwicz) that Mrs. Czerwicz is not a resident."

Czerwicz will be entitled to representation by a lawyer at the hearing. All testimony will be conducted by a lawyer at the hearing. All testimony will be conducted under oath and the proceedings transcribed by a court reporter. If not a legal resident, Czerwicz will be compelled to vacate the board.

Question of her legal residence was first brought to the library board meeting December 10. At that time, Czerwicz said she was the legal resident of a Greenleaf address but not able to move in because former residents were being evicted in lengthy legal proceedings.
