MEDICARE - SOME PROBLEMS Americans are living longer and in the process accumulating more chronic diseases: arthritis, emphysema, high blood pressure, heart disease, and anemia, among others. Inflation has eroded the purchasing power of older citizens, many of whom live on fixed incomes, so medical costs become a very

pressing problem, indeed. service provided.

reimbursed by Medicare.

After a period of hospital confinement there may be a problem as to what will happen when the patient goes home. There may be no one to take care of them or look in on them and they may not be strong or well enough to take care of themselves. Also, they may be extremely hesitant to enter a nursing home.

When there is no hospital care involved the patient under a doctor's care may also require visits that are medically necessary. In both the above mentioned cases an unlimited number of

visits (even 365 days a year) can be provided by a federally approved in home health care agency under Medicare. Effective July 1, 1981, these skilled nursing care visits are intended to help to rehabilitate the patient to continue to control his/her own life in familiar surroundings of their own home. The home health agency under Medicare can provide part-time skilled nursing care, physical therapy, speech therapy, nutrition counseling, occupational therapy and a medical social worker.

Basically here are the changes in the home health care visits program effective July 1: The number of visits is increased from 200 per year to an unlimited number when medically needed; The three day hospital stay is no longer required; Occupational therapy is authorized; You will no longer need to pay the \$60 deductible under Part B of Medicare for the home visits. For further Medicare information call E.D.S. Federal Corp. at 635-6020.

'Reading provides respite from winter blues

When the chill winds of mid-winter buffet windows, freeze automobiles, and generally make life uncomfortable, my recreational reading usually takes me to warmer climes. might travel to the South Seas with Herman Melville or to the Indonesian jungles with Joseph Conrad. It's a lot cheaper than a super saver flight to Florida and I don't have to leave the comfort of my armchair.

Recently, however, I have become engrossed in a novel that has caused me to pile on another comforter and jack-up the heat another notch or two. The book is Sloan Wilson's "Ice Brothers", and instead of an equatorial setting the author takes the reader on a frigid tour of the coast of Greenland. "Ice Brothers" is a stirring and realistic account of life on a U.S. Coast Guard trawler patrolling the sub-arctic ice packs during World War II.

Paul Schuman, and Nathan Green, two young coast guard Ensigns and the "brothers" of the title, are assigned to the coast guard trawler Arluk in the early days of the war. Paul is pure Ivy League with some sailing experience and Nathan is a shy intellectual with no sea experience. The commander of the Arluk is a hard bitten martinet with an overt fondness for booze, but a skilled ice pilot. The Arluk's assignment is to deliver supplies to Danish and Eskimo settlements on the Greenland coast. On this first voyage Paul and Nathan learn the special techniques of navigation and ship handling through the constantly shifting ice

When a sister ship, assigned to locate and destroy enemy weather stations on the east coast of Greenland is reported missing the Arluk is sent to find her and complete her mision. During the voyage the commander of the Arluk is hospitalized because of his drinking problem and Paul assumes temporary command of the Arluk.

Substituting ingenuity for experience and using a primitiv radar set assembled by Nathan, Paul and the crew of the Arluk locate an enemy weather ship hiding in the ice pack. The result is a tense and exciting cat and mouse game as the two vessels dodge and weave through the ice fields. When the enemy ship's shore base is located Paul organizes a sea and land assault on the base. This action forms the exciting climax to the novel.

The author, Sloan Wilson is perhaps best known for his classic novel of the business world "The Man in the Gray Flannel Suit." "Ice Brothers" must be considered partly autobiographical since Wilson served on three coast guard vessels on the Greenland patrol during World War II and his grandfather and uncle were arctic navigators.

"Ice Brothers" is a fine tale of courage and friendship bonded by the rigors of war. It presents a little known operation of the war in a realistic and entertaining manner. Wilson's narrative powers are at their best when describing the unexpected beauty of the polar landscape and the gentle nature of the eskimo inhabitants. This is a rousing sea yarn for those long winter evenings, so throw on another blanket and enjoy.

District 63 test results

At the January 27-meeting of the Board of Education of the East Maine Schools, the board members reviewed the administration's report on the Sep-tember, 1980 standardized testing program. Dr. Lenore Page, Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum and Instruction, gave an oral presentation discussing student achievement in each of the grades tested, two through eight. The results shared indicated that the average student grades two through eight i achieving above the national norm ranging from two months above grade level in grade two to one-and-one-half years above. grade level in grade 8. "We are highly pleased with

the academic growth of our students as evidence by these test scores," stated Dr. Donald E. Bond, Superintendent. "The composite test score (a score comprised of totals in all academic disciplines) for the average student in second grade is 2-2, third grade is 3-3, fourth grade 4-5, fifth grade 6-1, sixth grade, 7-1, seventh is 8-1. Our average eighth graders are achieving two years above grade level in reading and one-one-half years above grade level in mathematics and language arts. In use of reference material, social studies and science, these eighth graders are achieving at least two-and-one-half years above grade level."

The Board of Education received this report favorably. Detailed results will be shared with the community in an upcoming issue of the District's newsletter, the Community 63 Forum.



School elections will take place next November for the first time. If you live in Maine Township now is the time to begin thinking about next fall's election. The candidates who will be elected for the high school will be sitting on the high school board in 1984 when the likely closing of either Maine South or Maine East takes place.

Most people in the communities could care less. And we know that. They care if their taxes go up. And they run screaming to board meetings if their sewers back-up, or they have a garbage problem. If their kid's music program is curtailed or their local school might be closed, they'll suddenly turn-out at a meeting, much too late, to complain about the immediate problem.

It certainly isn't fair to say the wrong people run for public offices. Because both the wrong people and the right people run. On all public boards there are members who are dedicated to the well-being of the community. They have no angle. They have no ulterior interest in serving. And there are many of them.

There are also a great many egoists who serve on boards. Whatever is lacking in their every day existence is compensated for by their becoming public board members.

There's also the money angle. There are a very small number of public people who are in the public spotlight because of the money angle. Everything they have has been dependent on their political position, and they jealously seek to protect their one avenue to the money tree.

In Niles elections in April, there are candidates who have no chance of winning, but nevertheless will be seeking office. We're not sure what category such candidates can be included in.

One area where public-spirited citizens could be drawn from is among the seniors in the community. They have much to give, rich in experience and knowledge, and we've long wondered why they are not more active in the political process.

In School District 63, where we've monitored their meetings for more than 20 years, we've always been aware the parents of the children in those schools serve on the District 63 board. Likewise, the high school board generally has parents of high school students serving on those boards. Only at the college level is representation more varied. Few Oakton College board members have their children attending while they're on the board. From this we might conclude student participation in the schools shouldn't be a necessary requisite for their parents serving on their school board.

The District 63 imbroglios through the years make us wonder if a few senior citizens, or people who do not have any children in the schools, might be more objective board members. Rather than having board members whose decisions are based on the interests of their own children, it might be preferrable to have board members who can stand aside and take a more rational approach. Presently, we've been told one board member was insistent the school system convert to a 6-7-8 middle school. We were told the board member thought his wunderkind would benefit from such a program. It was never reported what the board member thought was in the best interests of the other 3,000 students in the district.
