

Niles sign ordinance shows effects after first year

The effects of Niles' 14 month old sign ordinance are being dramatically seen throughout the village as over 250 signs have been removed from the front of area businesses.

The sign ordinance, passed in November 1979, prohibits the use

of a wide variety of signs by local businessmen. Among the newly outlawed signs are those which extend from buildings on poles or atop roofs and signs painted over brick walls on the sides of buildings.

Also signs are no longer allowed to extend from buildings

if there is less than 100 feet frontage or width in front of a business. Additionally, billboards advertising products have been banned in Niles.

Joe Salerno, Niles Director of Building, Zoning and Planning, said the effect of the sign or-

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April 7th referendum seeks increase from \$1.63 to \$2.03 in Educational Fund

District 207 seeks 40¢ tax hike

In the April 7 referendum for District 207 the school district is asking to increase its Educational Fund tax rate from \$1.63 to \$2.03 (40 cents) per \$100 equalized assessed valuation of property. The total tax rate for District 207 in all funds today, including 36 cents for the Bond and Interest Fund, is \$2.50 per \$100 equalized assessed valuation.

According to District officials, as it pays off its bonded indebtedness (currently \$18.5 million) the tax rate levied by the school district for the Bond Fund decreases each year so that in 1987 the District will no longer levy a tax for bonded indebtedness. The result is that the tax rate for District 207 in 1987 will

That old flatterer, Tom Flynn, Mayor candidate in Niles, applauds The Bugle for informing the public about the conflict of interest of Niles village attorney. While representing Niles, Village Attorney Troy's law firm is also representing Continental Cable TV, one of the four finalists vying for a cable franchise in Niles.

Tom cites Canon 5 in The Illinois Code of Professional Responsibility adopted by the Illinois Supreme Court in 1980 which says: "A lawyer should exercise independent professional judgment on behalf of his client". Canon 9 adds: "A lawyer should avoid even the appearance of impropriety".

At last week's village board meeting the attorney, Dick Troy, was voicing his opinions in favor of Cable TV using market surveys via their cables into Niles homes. Niles trustee, Carol Panek, who chairs the Cable TV committee, held reservations about Troy's opinions.

The question which has to be asked is whether Troy is giving his opinion based on the best interests of Niles, which he represents, or the best interests of Continental Cable TV, which his firm represents.

Readers might think we're a bit picky. But Troy's firm has two seniors in the firm, and Troy is one of them. Obviously,

Income tax assistance for seniors

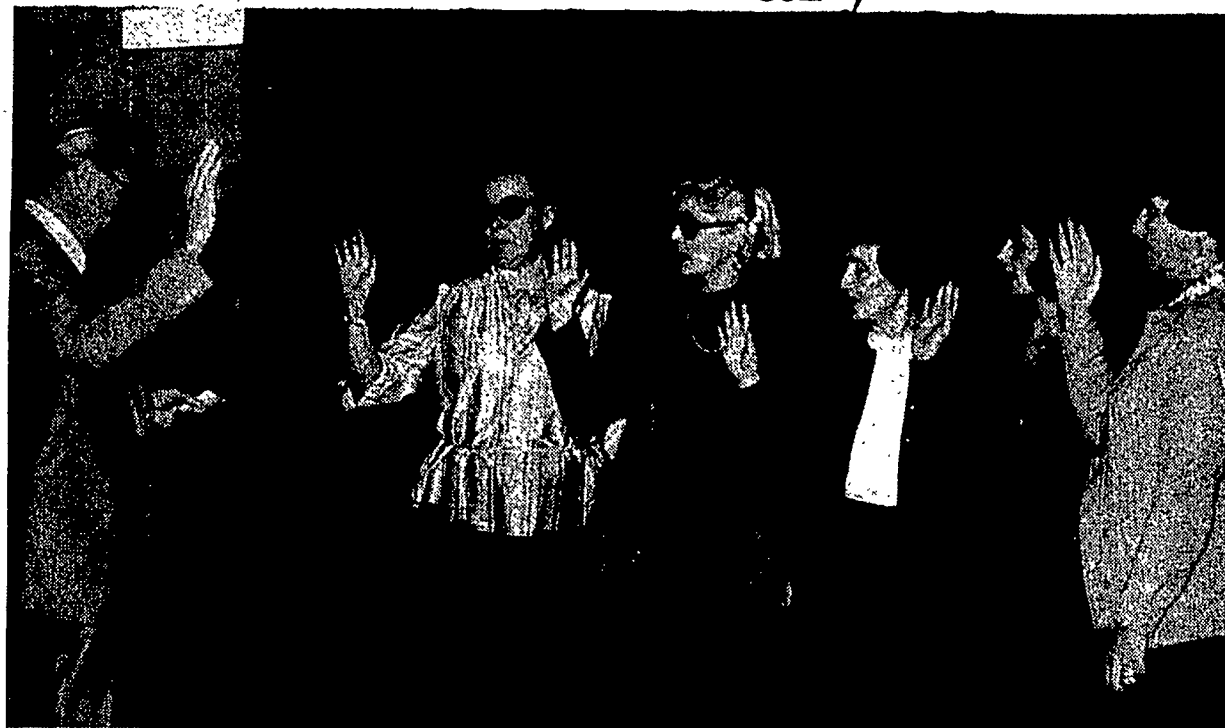

1981 White House Conference on Aging

The 1981 White House Conference on Aging is a significant part of the growing national commitment to improve the overall quality of life for older Americans. At the beginning of 1980, an estimated 25 million Americans aged 65 and older made up over 11 percent of the population, or every ninth American. Clearly, this rapidly increasing segment of our population requires a national forum to deal successfully with the problems confronting it. Out of this need has grown the impetus for previous conferences.

Congressional initiative in calling for the 1981 conference resulted in the translation of the conference's subsequent recommendations into concrete actions. The establishment of Medicare, Medicaid and the Older Americans Act, creation of a federal Administration on Aging, and funding for research on aging issues and services.

The 1971 White House Conference resulted in efforts to increase funding and further strengthen and expand the Older Americans Act and its programs.

The issues and concerns discussed in Community Forums by seniors, including those residents of Morton Grove, can now be brought into sharper focus at the state conference this May 27-28 at the University of Illinois' Kranert Center. With a large senior citizen attendance, a statewide consensus can emerge from this conference on health care, economic security, housing, and transportation. The delegates selected to represent Illinois will then convey our state's concerns to the national conference.

There are funds available for local seniors who would like to attend the state conference. Anyone interested should contact Barbara Rabyne at the Suburban Cook County Area Agency on Aging, 341-1400, right now.

Income Tax help

Morton Grove's Chapter of the American Association of Retired Persons, and the Internal Revenue Service will provide free assistance again this year for seniors who need help filing their income tax returns.

An added service to this year's expanded program will be to assist in preparing returns for shut-ins. Anyone needing help filing their tax returns can call the Senior Hot-Line, 965-4658, weekdays from 9 a.m. until noon for an appointment.

Health care costs

As most seniors know, Medicare is not a complete health insurance policy. The latest figures show that seniors pay 70 cents for each dollar their physicians charged. This is partly explained by the annual \$60 deductible, monthly premiums of \$11 (increased from \$9.60 starting in July), and a 20 percent co-insurance provision, which means that the patient is expected to pay that share of the costs.

But the major reason for the \$1.1 billion-a-year financial burden on old people is that most doctors who participate in Medicare, charge more than the program's maximum established fees. Those physicians who do not go above Medicare's established fees are said to be those who "accept assignment".

Although the care these physicians render is as much as two or three times less expensive, there is no evidence to suggest that it is inferior. Where can senior citizens find such a doctor? The Public Citizen-Health Research Group in Washington suggests that seniors write lawmakers, asking for changes in the Medicare law that would allow government to publish directories listing doctors who apply extra charges and those who do not.

Niles attorney's Cable TV interest 'an obvious conflict of interest'

Dear Editor:

The Niles Bugle recently informed us that the law firm of our Village Attorney represented one of the cable TV companies applying for a license to transmit in Niles. We were also told our Village Attorney was drafting the cable television ordinance that this company must comply with. That is an obvious possible conflict of interest. The Illinois Code of Professional Responsibility was adopted by the Illinois Supreme Court on July 1, 1980 and says,

Canon 5, A lawyer should exercise independent professional judgment on behalf of his client, and Canon 9 says, A lawyer should avoid even the appearance of impropriety.

I submit that Mayor Blase and the Village Board are wrong to permit the Village Attorney to continue representing Niles in any capacity related to issuing a license to a cable TV company.

I suggest that Village Manager, Ken Scheel, immediately contact Terry Murphy, Director of the Chicago Bar Association's Lawyer Reference Plan and seek and hire an independent law firm that is skilled in representing local governments against cable TV companies. I do not believe that Mayor Blase should be allowed to select another law firm and that it is imperative to hire an independent law firm recommended by the Chicago Bar Association. I do not believe any violation of the "Code" will have occurred if Mayor Blase follows this suggestion.

I would urge the Niles Bugle to continue to editorialize in favor of my suggestion and continue to inform the citizens of Niles of questionable governmental practices.

Heinen's Cable TV revenue figures 'completely erroneous'

Dear Editor:

I read your "Left Hand" column last week (Feb. 26, 1981 edition) and in the article it was stated by Elaine Heinen that Cable Television would bring a revenue of \$100,000 per month to the Village of Niles.

Being Chairman of the Committee on Cable Television for the Village of Niles, I have to correct Ms. Heinen's figures as they are completely erroneous.

The Village of Niles would not get \$100,000 a month as Ms. Heinen claims but will get much, much less than that. The village will receive 5% of all subscriber fees. In the village we have approximately 10,000 homes and

dwelling and even if half or 50% of those 10,000 homes were to subscribe to cable television (the average is 40% according to the past experience of the cable companies) that would be 5000 subscriptions from the Village of Niles. Figuring an average \$20.00 per month per subscriber bill, that would amount to \$5,000 per month that would be given back to the village which would amount to \$250,000 per year and not \$1,200,000 as Ms. Heinen claims.

Higher gas prices are the fault of the government

Morton Grove's Advisory Commission on Aging is of the opinion that rising costs and inflation are having a staggering effect on the financial stability of senior citizens. In this connection, the following was sent to David Stockman, Management and Budget Director protesting additional taxes now being placed on the taxpayers caused by decontrol of crude oil production and pricing.

On Tuesday, Jan. 27th, the editorial page of the Chicago Tribune praised the decision of you and the President to decontrol domestic oil production and gasoline prices, stating it would afford an incentive to oil companies to increase domestic production of crude oil. The Tribune editor stated that "If Mr. Reagan removes the controls now he stands to reap all the benefits of decontrol, in higher production and lower imports without the liability of higher prices". And furthermore, this editor stated "removing controls would help producers without hurting consumers." We see nothing particularly wrong with this theory.

But then on the front page of the following day's Tribune, Wednesday, Jan. 28th, an article on decontrols appeared, quoting you, Mr. Stockman, "decontrol would mean prices of gasoline would increase three to five cents per gallon within the next several months and eight to thirteen cents later on "WOW!!!"

All major oil companies promptly raised gasoline prices at the pump six to eight cents per gallon. This immediately appeared to be a "Rip-Off" by the oil companies, and we all blamed the oil companies for "Profiteering".

In Friday's Wall Street Journal Editorial page we learned that the "Windfall Profits Tax" has nothing to do with windfall profits. It is an Excise Tax on domestically produced oil - the more domestic oil produced, the higher tax returns to the Government from the oil companies, except for about 15% that can keep, but in the end, it is all passed on to the users of petroleum products, such as gasoline, heating oil, fuel for airplanes, etc., all of which caused increases in prices and rise of inflation. So, you state, "decontrol is a way of bringing the budget closer to balance, as the Excise Tax or Windfalls Profit Tax will bring in \$20 to \$25 billion into the Government Coffers."

So, the Government, and not the oil companies, is to blame for higher gasoline prices.

There are other ways to balance the budget and reduce inflation than raise taxes, and some alternate ways would be to "cut out the fat" in Government spending and operations, as the new Republican Administration claims it will do.

It is hoped that Congress will take note of this serious situation and take appropriate action to correct a piece of bad legislation, this being the excise tax. Sincerely,

LWV to discuss referendum and recall in Illinois

Should the state of Illinois extend its use of referendum and provide for recall of government officials? That question will be considered Saturday, March 7, at an open meeting of the Morton Grove-Niles League of Women Voters from 1 to 3 p.m. at Morton Grove Public Library, 6140 Lincoln. Ellen Van Laningham and Mary Lou Moriarty will lead discussion.

Referendum on the state level allows voters to accept or reject a proposed constitutional amendment or a law passed by the legislature. Recall enables the electorate to remove officials from office before their terms are up. Both processes are linked with initiative, by which a required percentage of voters have signed petitions to make referendum compulsory.

Last year the Illinois leagues studied initiative and reached agreement to endorse a limited extension of this process. In addition to the already constitutional means whereby voters were enabled to reduce the size of the legislature and abolish cumulative voting last November, the Illinois LWV now supports legislation to amend the Constitution to provide what is called "indirect initiative." This means that voters could petition the General Assembly to enact a particular piece of legislation, but referendum would not be mandatory unless the lawmakers rejected the people's proposal. "Direct initiative" would require referendum in any case.

This year Illinois leagues expect to reach consensus in April on certain aspects of referendum and recall. These are the questions being considered: 1. Should the present power of compulsory referendum on constitutional amendments be retained? The electorate will have to vote in 1990 and every 20 years thereafter on whether or not to call another constitutional convention, unless the General Assembly has already called for one during a particular 20-year span.
