Tom cites Canon 5 in The Illinois Code of Professional Responsibility adopted by the Illinois Supreme Court in 1980 which says: "A lawyer should exercise independent professional judgment on behalf of his client". Canon 9 adds: "A lawyer should avoid even the appearance of impropriety".

At last week's village board meeting the attorney, Dick Troy, was voicing his opinions in favor of Cable TV using market surveys via their cables into Niles homes. Niles trustee, Carol Panek, who chairs the Cable TV committee, held reservations about Troy's opinions.

The question which has to be asked is whether Troy is giving his opinion based on the best interests of Niles, which he represents, or the best interests of Continental Cable TV, which his firm represents.

Readers might think we're a bit picky. But Troy's firm has two seniors in the firm, and Troy is one of them. Obviously, Continued on Page 19 T.......



1981 White House Conference on Aging

The 1981 White House Conference on Aging is a significant part of the growing national commitment to improve the overall quality of life for older Americans. At the beginning of 1989, an estimated 25 million Americans aged 65 and older made up over 11 percent of the population, or every ninth American. Clearly, this rapidly increasing segment of our population requires a national forum to deal successfully with the problems confronting it. Out of this need has grown the impetus for previous con-

Congressional initiative in calling for the 1961 conference resulted in the translation of the conference's subsequent recommendations into concrete actions. The establishment of Medicare, Medicaid and the Older Americans Act, creation of a federal Administration on Aging, and funding for research on aging issues and services.

The 1971 White House Conference resulted in efforts to increase funding and further strengthen and expand the Older Americans Act and its programs.

The issues and concerns discussed in Community Forums by seniors, including those residents of Morton Grove, can now be brought into sharper focus at the state conference this May 27-28 at the University of Illinois' Krannert Center. With a large senior citizen attendance, a statewide consensus can emerge from this conference on health care, economic security, housing, and transportation. The delegates selected to represent Illinois will then convey our state's concerns to the

Income Tax help

Health care costs

As most seniors know, Medicare is not a complete health in surance policy. The latest figures show that seniors pay 70 cents for each dollar their physicians charged. This is partly explained by the annual \$60 deductible, monthly premiums of \$11 (increased from \$9.60 starting in July), and a 20 percent coinsurance provision, which means that the patient is expected to pay that share of the costs.

But the major reason for the \$1.1 billion-a-year financial burden on old people is that most doctors who participate in Medicare, charge more than the program's maximum established fees. Those physicians who do not go above Medicare's established fees are said to be those who "accept

Although the care these physicians render is as much as two or three times less expensive, there is no evidence to suggest that it is inferior. Where can senior citizens find such a doctor? The Public Citizen-Health Research Group in Washington suggests that seniors write lawmakers, asking for changes in the Medicare law that would allow government to publish directories listing doctors who apply extra charges and those who do

In Friday's Wall Street Journal Editorial page we learned that the "Windfall Profits Tax" has nothing to do with windfall profits. It is an Excise Tax on domestically produced oil - the more domestic oil produced, the higher tax returns to the Government from the oil companies, except for about 15% they can keep, but in the end, it is all passed on to the users of petroleum products, such as gasoline, heating oil, fuel for airplanes, etc., all of which caused increases in prices and rise of inflation. So, as you state, "decontrol is a way of bringing the budget closer to balance, as the Excise Tax or Windfalls Profit Tax will bring in \$20 to \$25 billion into the Government Coffers." So, the Government, and not the

legislature. Recall enables the tain local government issues electorate to remove officials from office before their terms are up. Both processes are linked with initiative, by which a required percentage of voters have signed petitions to make

referendum compulsory. Last year the Illinois leagues studied initiative and reached agreement to endorse a limited extension of this process. In addition to the already constitutional means whereby voters were enabled to reduce the size of the legislature and abolish cumulative voting last November, the Illinois LWV now supports legislation to amend the Constitution to provide what is called "indirect initiative." This means that voters could petition the General Assembly to enact a particular piece of legislation, but referendum would not be mandatory unless the lawmakers rejected the people's proposal. "Direct initiative" would require

the conflict of interest is notable. He represents Niles, which is paying him, and he represents a Cable TV company, which is paying him.

Nick Blase, who has run things pretty well the way he wants. has an obligation to Nilesites to have another lawyer represent Niles in this matter.

Niles trustees, who never seem to want to go up against Nick, are sitting on their hands. And there's just too many bucks involved in Cable TV for them not to express themselves more forcefully.

Cable TV is a megabucks operation and everyone is getting in on the act. One firm, Metrovision, contacted local publishers and offered them a 10% take if they could persuade their local hometown politicians to use their services. No investment, just a little friendly persuasion. Every local publisher, including The Bugle owner, was sought in seeking a franchise for Metrovision. Just get your local boys to deal them in, and the unbiased publishers would get their 10% cut, each and every month. Subsequently, only The Bugle and The News publishers were not part of the pressure groups which were to "contact" local officials.

We cite the behind the scenes machinations to let you know there's big, big bucks riding on okaying a Cable TV franchise in each one of these communities. We are told a community will be paying \$100,000 monthly for such a service.

Since the simon pure publishers were not adverse to picking up a larger bit of pocket change by contacting their favorite village officials, we imagine other types of contacts have also been made. And that is why it is so essential the selection of a Cable TV outfit be above reproach.

Mr. Troy and Mr. Blase are unnecessarily vulnerable. If they won't take action to remove this obvious conflict, it behooves Niles trustees to take action. Their role in representing Nilesites is identical with Niles village president. It's time they show a great deal more independent

When the many problems in Niles police department were previously aired, the trustees left the police problems in the hands of the village president. Several thousand dollars later a management firm reported the politicos were to keep their hands out of the department. The report was referring to Blase and his many dealings with the men in the department. Unfortunately, Niles trustees remained mute at a time when they should have been sounding off. They have another opportunity to prove they are independent advocates by eliminating the Cable TV conflict. To continue to remain silent tells a great deal about the way Niles is run.







Included in the sign ordinance was a provision establishing the Niles Sign Board of Appeals. The board is made up of five residents of Niles appointed by the mayor. Working with the board is Niles Inspector George Braun who has inspected most Niles businesses which have signs.

Local businessmen requesting special treatment or dissatisfied with the new requirements may appear before the Sign Board of Appeals. The board is empowered to grant variances to the ordinance up to ten percent. For a larger variance, a local businessman would have to appear before the village board.

Depending on the changes required by the sign ordinance, local businessmen have from 60 days to 5 years to bring their signs up to village requirements. Salerno added the village has almost completed the first phase of implementing the sign ordinance with the removal of a large number of hand painted signs as well as signs painted on walls. The second phase will include removing roof signs and those protruding from buildings on poles. Salerno hopes the
