## Flynn cites goals in mayoral race

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## Lack of Federal \$\$ cuts library hiring

A federal freeze on funding for CETA (Comprehensive Employment Training Act) workers will force the Niles library district to abandon plans for hiring seven more CETA workers.

Five employees, hired under CETA, will be retained said R. Mark Neyman, library administrator. Neyman gave his report at a regular library board meeting Wednesday, March 11.

Neyman said the library will lose about 50 per cent of its expected CETA funding. Neyman said, "We are delighted with the

Officials and administrators received copies of conventional photographs of buildings surveyed, thermograms and a written report pinpointing energy inefficiencies.

Results of over 600 surveys completed since the program's inception suggest energy savings efforts on the part of school administrators and officials could save taxpayer dollars.

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## District 207 tax rate up 1% since 1972

Most persons probably aren't really shocked to hear that since 1972 the cost of gasoline has gone up 204%, that the price of heating a home with gas is 212% higher, and that the cost of groceries is up 142%. But the taxpayer in Maine Township may well be surprised to learn that the total tax rate for Maine Township High School District 207 has risen only 1% since 1972.

"Actually the District 207 tax rate has remained almost constant at near \$2.50 per \$100 equalized assessed valuation of property since 1968," Dr. Richard Short, Superintendent, District 207, reports.

After 13 years without an increase in taxes for the High School, District 207 is asking the voters to approve an increase in its tax rate in referendum on April 7. The district is seeking a 40 cent increase in the educational fund tax rate, from

\$1.63 to \$2.03 per \$100 equalized assessed valuation.

"We simply have to turn to the community now to finance more of our budget," Dr. Short says, "because the other major source of revenue for the school district—state aid—is going to be seriously curtailed because of the district's drastically declining enrollment."

"It is not easy to come to the community in these difficult economic times to ask for a tax rate increase," comments Donald Goll, General Chairman of the Citizens' Committee for the District 207 Referendum. "It is a thing that must be done if we are to maintain a quality high school educational program for the children of Maine Township."

"The District is going to be in a serious financial crisis by 1985, with a \$10 million projected deficit," he explains. "Since unfortunately, the cost of operating the school district and providing a responsible educational program doesn't decline proportionately to the number of students, most of that lost state aid is going to need to be replaced."

## Homeowners Exemption forms

Robert P. Hanrahan, Assessor of Niles Township would like to advise residents that verification of occupancy is now required in order for them to be eligible for the Homeowners Exemption in Cook County and throughout the State of Illinois. Up to \$3,000 was automatically deducted from the equalized assessed valuation of your residence since 1979 as a set-off against rapidly increasing property values.

Niles Township residents who are also eligible for the Senior Homestead Exemption will not need to worry as they are already officially accounted for as residents by the Cook County Assessor's Office.

However, all other residence owners should receive a form from the Cook County Assessor's Office by March 27. This form simply requires an affirmation of residence and a signature. It is to be mailed back to the Cook County Assessor's Office on or before April 10.

If you do not receive a homeowners verification form in the mail by March 27, contact the Niles Township Assessor's Office at 5255 Main St., Skokie

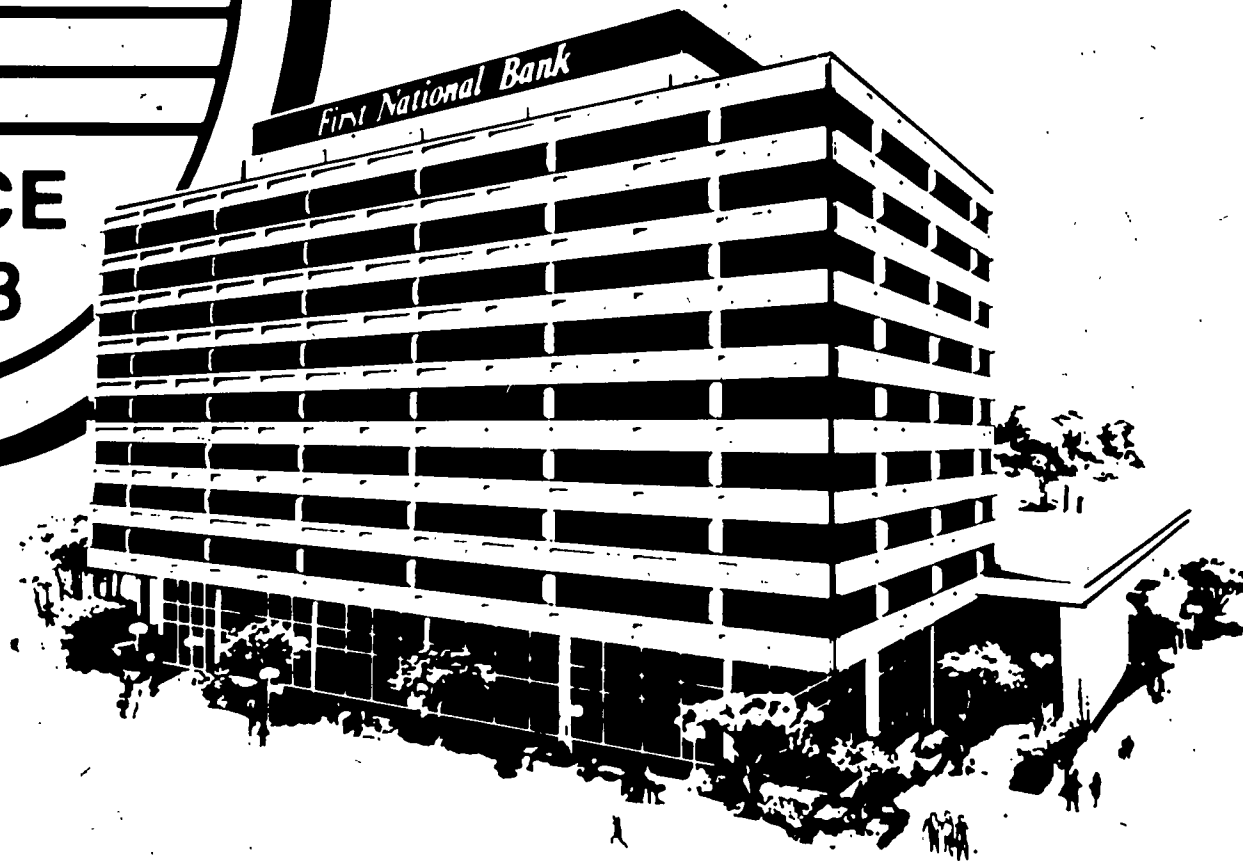
## Holy Family Health Fair

## 'The Library Notebook'

### Time to turn thoughts to gardening

The February thaw has come and gone. March seems more lamblike than lionlike so far and the long range weather forecast predicts a milder than normal spring. The rising of the sap produces in many an atavistic impulse to get outside and dig around in mother earth. For some this impulse results in beautiful arrays of healthy flowers and vegetables and for others perhaps only a forlorn row of radishes and a clump of Marigolds. Whatever the results, most of the fun is in getting there, and to help you get there, the Niles Public Library offers a wide range of books on gardening.

To help solve the most specific problems there is "Taylor's Encyclopedia of Gardening" with 1329 pages and over 15,000 entries. Not exactly the sort of thing one would curl up with for an evening's reading but nevertheless a comprehensive reference guide to gardening. Stanley Schuler's "How to Grow Almost Everything" is a little lighter weight in size and tone, but would probably meet the needs of most gardeners. If you like a lot of pictures I suggest "Reader's Digest Illustrated Guide to Gardening", with over 600 pages of beautifully illustrated text.

For the more specialized gardener the library has a broad collection of books on nearly every type of gardening and plants. Each volume of the strikingly illustrated Time-Life series, "Encyclopedia of Gardening" deals with a different type or family of plants, method of gardening or condition. For example, the volume on "Shade Gardening" presents a comprehensive guide to those plants which thrive in shade. In addition to outstanding color photographs, the Time-Life series offers a clear well written text, and an alphabetic section describing each plant mentioned in the text. Growing flowers for indoor arrangement is the subject of Jack Kramer's "The Old Fashioned Cutting Garden". The book covers standard advice on annuals and perennials and includes chapters on cutting and displaying flowers, preserving flowers, and, most unusually, eating flowers (complete with recipes).

For those who really want to get back to the soil the library offers a number of good books on organic gardening. "Digging It" How to Grow Things Naturally" by Diane Globus offers hints on organic fertilizers, and natural insect control, and would be considered a good basic book for the neophyte. For the more experienced organic gardener I suggest "How to Grow More Vegetables Than You Ever Thought Possible on Less Land Than You Can Imagine" by John Jeavons. If you can get by the long title, this book presents a thoughtful demonstration of the Biodynamic/French Intensive Method of Organic horticulture and the ecology of vegetable gardening.

Finally for those of us who feel there is more to life than countless hours in the garden I can suggest "The Two Hour Garden" by Roger Grounds which means exactly as the title describes (per week), "The Reluctant Weekend Gardener" by Carla Wallace, and the hopefully titled "Gardening Without Work" by Ruth Stout.

These are just a few of the hundreds of books available on gardening at the Niles Public Library. So dig in with book in hand and, with a little help from the weather, you will later be able to reap the bountiful fruits (and vegetables) of your labors.

Almost half the homes in the village have been subscribed to the cable television service. Flickinger pointed out that "it was no accident that we are the first in this entire area to have cable tv. We recognized early on that there was substantial money to be made for the village and we worked hard and planned carefully for it. While all the surrounding towns are still negotiating for cable service, we're receiving and putting to work thousands of dollars from cable tv revenue."

### Heinen lists major questions Niles residents ask

The laws for setting utility rates were written in 1921 when utilities were servicing individual towns. "These are not all the questions to be asked," Mrs. Heinen concluded, "and we don't have all the answers. But we pledge to get the answers, and then pursue the solutions when I am elected mayor on April 7."

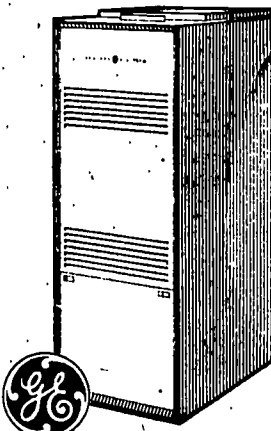
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### Flynn plans interest free home loans

On the issue of school aid, Kustra cautioned that schools would probably have to settle for less state aid than they requested because of reduced state revenues.

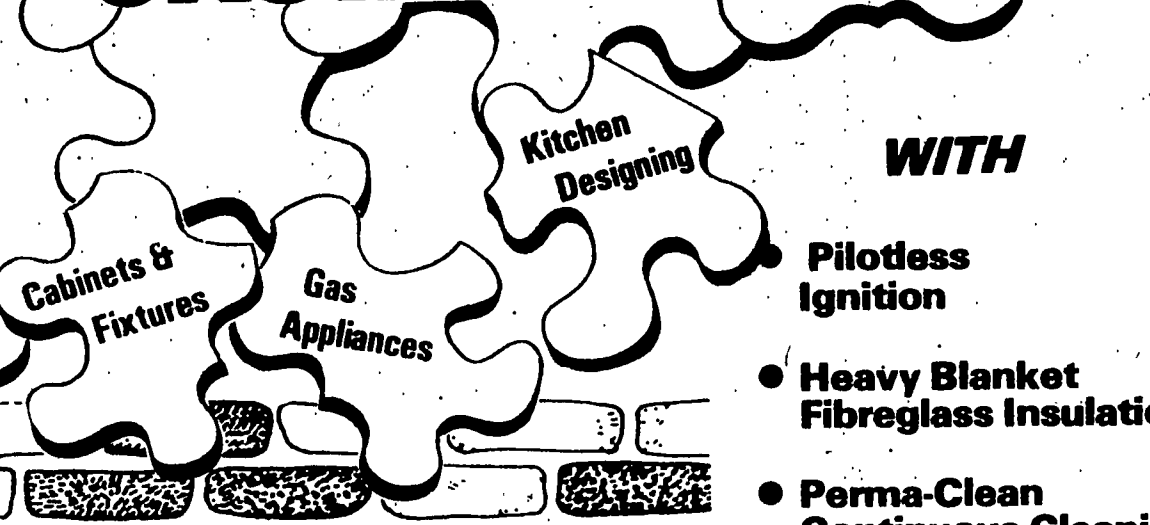

## Kusper extends tax abatement deadline to hold down taxes

Cook County Clerk Stanley T. Kusper, Jr., in a move to hold down real estate taxes, has extended the deadline for county taxing districts to file tax abatements with his office from December 31 to April 1.

"We must act responsibly and do everything in our power to hold down taxes for the people of Cook County," Kusper said. "By extending the abatement deadline to the last possible moment for the 620 taxing districts in Cook County, we will enable taxpayers to enjoy lower rates."

While all of the taxing districts within the county have already filed their tax rates with his office, Kusper noted that some districts have recently experienced a dramatic increase in the assessed valuation of properties on the tax rolls within their boundaries.

"By extending the abatement filing deadline, we will permit those taxing districts able and willing to do so, to lower their real estate tax rates to reflect the increases in assessed valuation," Kusper said.

"I hope that the taxing districts of Cook County will join us in our efforts to reduce taxes for the people of Cook County," Kusper said.

Historically, the deadline for all Cook County clerks to extend the tax abatements has been December 31 because there is a great deal of work to be done, some by computer and some by hand, for the 620 taxing districts within the county. Kusper said April 1 would be the absolute latest deadline to set up the county's computers and extend the county real estate tax rates.

Kusper urged the districts to cooperate in meeting the extended deadline.

"We have established a realistic alternate deadline," Kusper said, "But April 1 is the absolute latest we can accept tax abatements."

"I am not going to add to the tax burden by permitting my office to be forced to be late in preparing Cook County real estate tax rates because of the lack of timely action by a taxing district," Kusper warned.

Any later deadline would jeopardize the efficient preparation time for establishing real estate tax rates for each of the county's taxing districts. Late tax extensions would mean late tax bills which would require borrowing money to fill the gap until taxes could be collected.

"Borrowing means paying interest in today's high-interest loan market, which means creating debts, which would have to be paid from future taxes,

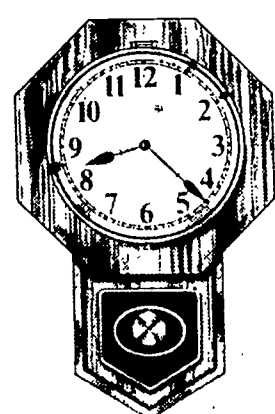

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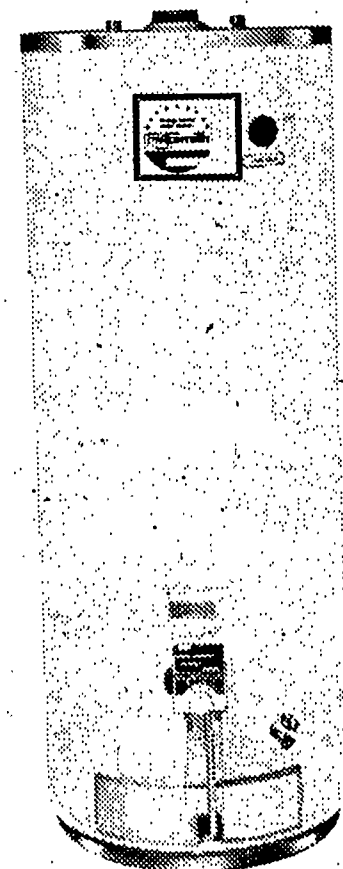

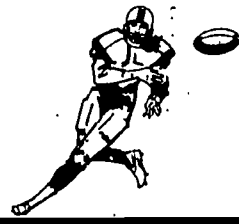
Joe is the son of Mr. & Mrs. Walter Wrona, 5819 North Melvina, Chicago.

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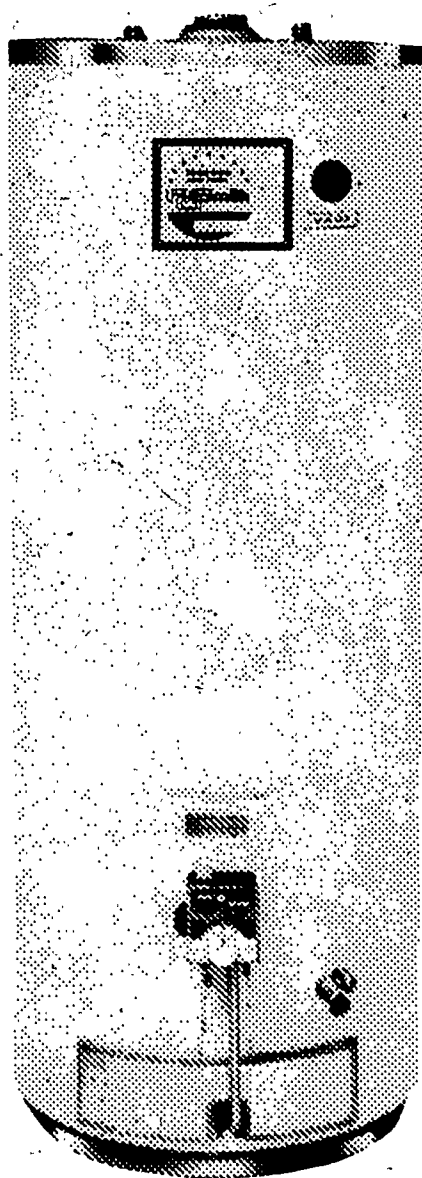
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### Niles bowlers in state tourney

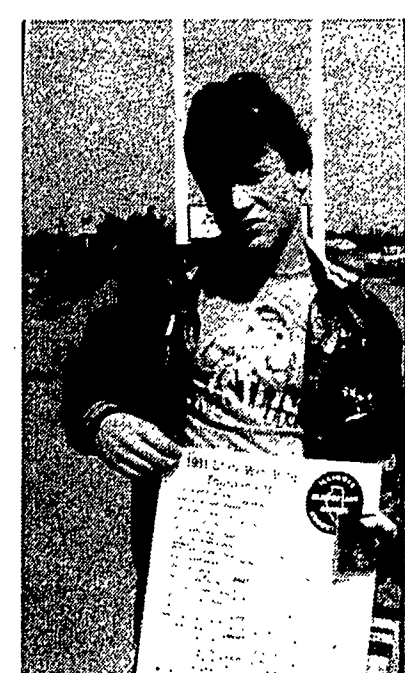
## Busiel named Lawrence MVP

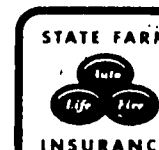
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## Legion Membership Award presented to Ralph Hintz

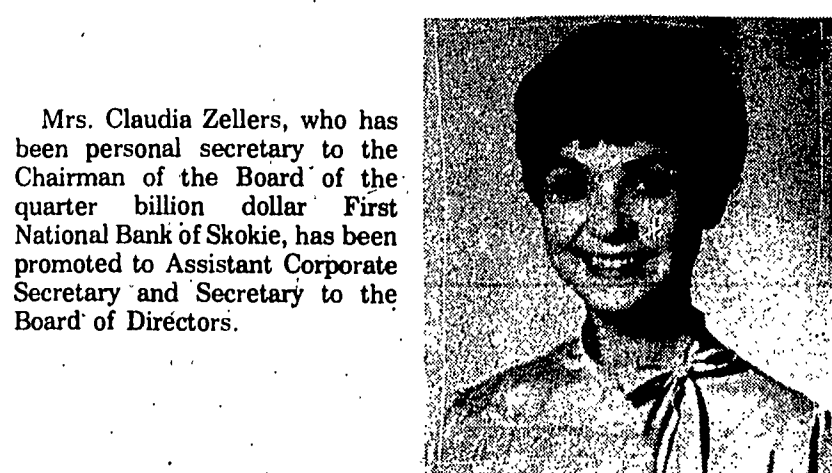

Extensive damage to the library and to an area in the school auditorium was estimated at \$17,500. Coburn said additional clean-up costs as well as custodial fees could bring this cost up to \$20,000.

According to Coburn, Des Plaines police are looking for 2 to 4 people who broke into the school by prying open a main floor door with a crow bar-type tool. Once inside the school the vandals broke 53 windows in the library.

The money being offered by the district was donated by area businessmen, according to District 207 Public Information Officer Charlene Louis.

District Superintendent, Dr. Richard Short, said a Maine West employee spotted one of the vandals as he was leaving the library. Short said the vandal was described as a "mature young person" wearing a suit and tie. Short said there was no evidence to indicate that Maine West students were involved in this incident.

Maine West principal James Coburn said there had been no previous vandalism preceding the destruction in the library on Sunday.

Additionally, Coburn said Des Plaines police have assigned three detectives to work full time on this incident.

Police-Fire Commission and replace it with a "Public Safety Commission".

Flynn's new commission would supervise the police and fire departments as well as the public works department and a newly created Civil Defense group.

Creating this new supervisory body would, according to Flynn, "end the political interference in the present departments and give Niles residents and employees equal opportunity in hiring, training, transfer and advancement."

While noting that Niles "has one of the best police departments," Flynn said he would also replace Niles Police Chief Clarence Emrikson. Said Flynn, "He hasn't stood up to Nick Blase's political interference." Additionally, Flynn said the morale of the police force is low due to Emrikson's poor leadership.

Flynn's most diversified program is his proposals for Niles' senior citizens. Flynn recommended the creation of a new Senior Citizens Commission to work with current senior citizens organizations and to develop new senior citizens programs.

Among the programs Flynn suggested were a new food assistance program, the creation of special classes for seniors at Oakton Community College, and the construction of 800 to 1,400 new rental units for Niles' senior citizens.

Flynn urged the issuing of low interest mortgage bonds to encourage private industry to build these units. Financing construction this way sharply contrasts with Mayoral candidate Elaine Heinen who has said she would seek federal or state assistance to build senior citizen housing.

"There is presently no federal or state program in existence to build a new senior citizen apartment building such as the Huntington," said Flynn. "The only exception is the Chicago Housing Authority program which will not guarantee Niles seniors a preference."

Referring to Heinen's proposal Flynn said, "Elaine Heinen

The fire began in a basement storage area beneath Maine East's Center Court building. Classes for students with learning and physical disabilities are held on the first floor of the building and the art department is located on the second floor.

Though originally thought to have been an electrical fire, District 207 Superintendent Richard Short said firemen had ruled out malfunctioning equipment or a short circuit as being the cause of the fire. Short said the cause of the fire "is of a suspicious nature."

According to Short, suspicions have been further raised because the area where the fire originated is occupied by a shipping clerk all day except when the clerk goes to lunch. On Monday the clerk went to lunch at 11:55 a.m. and the fire alarm was activated by the heat at 12:20 p.m., said Short. Short added that it would have been unusual for an accidental fire to have started and then become

However, Niles Park Director William Hughes notified the board Tuesday night that the club's owner, the Arlington Heights Federal Savings and Loan, has offered to lease the club to Niles. This follows the savings and loan's unsuccessful attempt to find a buyer for the club.

Niles Park Commissioner Steve Chameriski requested a committee be formed to consider the offer. Park Board President Dan Kosiba, in an apparent attempt to minimize future controversy over this latest offer, appointed the entire park board to the committee.

Kosiba, along with Vice President Jeffrey Arnold and Commissioner Walt Beusse, had previously stated they did not think the tennis facility could generate enough revenue to support itself. According to Arnold the tennis club would have to bring in \$187,000 annually to break even. In the event that the club ran at a deficit, the park board would have to use monies from other park programs to pay off the tennis club.

Lastly, Niles mayoral candidate Thomas Flynn asked President Dan Kosiba if, after the April 7 election, he would attempt to have the Grennan Heights field house converted into a health club. The park board had previously voted 3 to 2 not to build the health club. Kosiba and Arnold had been in favor of the club at Grennan Heights.

Stating he was basing his answer on the wishes of the residents of the Grennan Heights area, Kosiba said, "absolutely not". When questioned by Flynn, Commissioners Walt Beusse and Elaine Heinen said they would also vote against converting the Grennan Heights field house into a health club after election.

Additional items Flynn proposed included assuring that all Niles fire department ambulances have two paramedics, outlawing pinball machines and creating a new Niles Youth Commission, "to fight vandalism and drug abuse and provide educational and entertainment opportunities for Niles teenagers and young adults."

Among the possible solutions to this problem, said Flynn, is to

serious enough to activate a fire alarm within the 25 minutes the clerk was gone.

Set ablaze were large quantities of paper forms which were kept in bundles on pallets in the supply room. Referring to the 25 minutes the room was vacant, Short said, "You can't get pallets started that quickly."

Assistant Principal Ken Faulhaber said the school office was notified of the fire by a teacher shortly before the automatic fire alarm was activated. Faulhaber said he immediately went to the basement storage room and notified principal Robert Barker that a fire was in progress. Barker then announced to the students and faculty over the public address system that this was not a drill but an actual fire.

Faulhaber said the school was evacuated in a little over 3 minutes.

Park Ridge fire official Richard Arthur spent Tuesday at Maine East interviewing anyone who was near the storage room before or during the fire. However, Arthur refused to answer questions because of his ongoing investigation.

One official involved in the investigation told the Bugle, "From the preliminary investigation it appears the fire did not start accidentally." However, this official said there was still not enough information available to allow fire officials to announce their findings. "So much hinges on the testimony of the individuals who were present before the fire," said the official.

Short refused to rule out a connection between the vandalism at Maine West on Sunday and the apparent arson at Maine East on Monday. As a result of Monday's fire, Short temporarily ordered security doubled at Maine North

and Maine South High Schools.

Late Tuesday afternoon District 207 announced a \$500 reward was being offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of those responsible for the Maine East fire. Anyone with information is being urged to contact either the Park Ridge Police Department or Maine East principal Robert Barker.

At the same time District 207 announced a similar reward is being offered for information regarding the \$17,000 damage done to the Maine West High School library by vandals on Sunday, March 15. The money for both rewards was donated by local businessmen, according to District 207 Public Information Officer Charlene Louis.

In addition to damage to the storage room, Superintendent Short said smoke and soot may have caused irreparable damage to a video tape studio also housed in the Center Court building. Short said the sophisticated equipment in the studio was particularly vulnerable to smoke.

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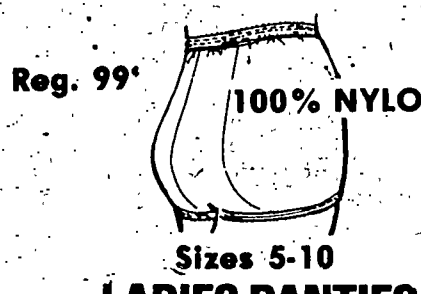
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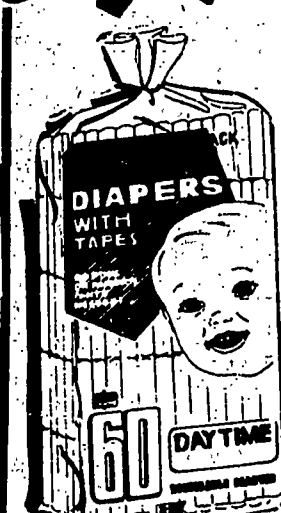
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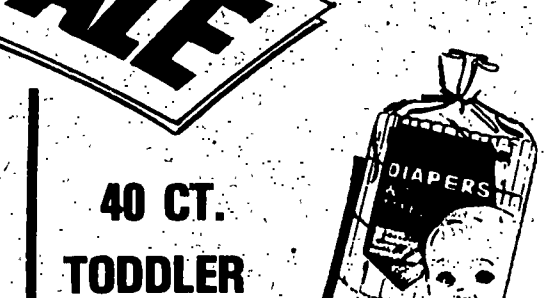
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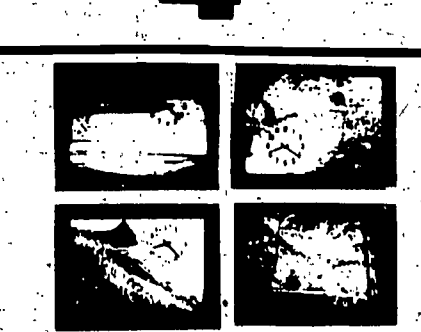


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
