



a broken record - same thing all the time. I hear husbands and wives complain in marital counseling that their marriage is dead, that there isn't any spark left.

This can easily happen in most marriages if there isn't an open, frank and honest communication between husband and wife Sure, the wife can become cold, drab and indifferent, especially if she is home most of the time with the kids, furniture, and the dog or

one another"

Many women need more stimulation, interaction and relationships than what furniture, household chores, dog or cat, and yes, even their children, can provide.

Though I do not believe it is advantageous to children for their mother to work outside the home, at least I can understand their need for and wish to do it

This is where many men fall down They are not understanding and empathetic of their wives' needs feelings, and wishes. Too often the husband believes that he fulfills his responsibility as breadwinner, therefore, the wife should carry through as mother and homemaker

What the husband fails to see is that he is able to be away from home, kids, dogs, neighborhood, etc., while the wife has to daily adjust to it. Is it any wonder then that more and more women are now working outside the home?

The man usually has some variety in his day through his travel, office or plant, co-workers, customers or acquaintances, etc. This is not nearly as true with the wife; it's usually much more routine, calculating and unstimulating for her

Perhaps the wife was better able to buy her homemaker when she didn't have so many automatic gadgets when she was challenged more to being creative This is not to say that the responsibilities and

Men are now buying groceries, preparing meals, doing dishes, washing clothes, cleaning house, scrubbing floors, changing diapers, rocking the baby, caring for and helping with the children, etc. Responsibilities once should ered by basically women are now being shared by men. Likewise women are now doing more of the breadwinning role and taking some of the pressure off men to produce and to make all of the money This is termed today as men and women becoming more "androgynous"

What it boils down to is that we all must find some measure of satisfaction or fulfillment in what we do, in any of our roles that make up our life

Certainly, if a husband as breadwinner doesn't find some measure of satisfaction or fulfillment in his job, he is quite likely to look for another job or take out his frustrations on his wife and children.

The same is true for women and perhaps even doubly so because of their great need to be creative. Is it any wonder then that a woman might become cold,

calculating and predictable? Of course, wives - the same question could also be raised about your husbands!

Wife or husband, we all need to find meaning, purpose and satisfaction or fulfillment in our roles or some drastic change is

going to almost automatically take place. Much too often the changes that take place are that the wife or husband: sue for divorce; use their children as the scapegoat; the wife goes to work, more material things, gadgets, etc., are ob-tained to pacify; or a new fad such as group sex or wife swapping is instituted; or worse still; turning to drugs and alcohol to escape.

As most who have tried these things can attest, they are only momentary answers to boredom, loneliness, lack of stimulation, and being unfulfilled

The real solution rests with you and your family facing your feelings honestly and openly.


The beauty of marriage and family is how each can adjust and better meet the needs of one another. The key is awareness on the part of husband, wife and children as to whether they are uptight, unsatisfied, lonely, or feel dead and cold.

Feelings must be listened to and responded to just as much as words, wishes, and commands

Officials have also noted the closing of Maine North High School in August will not have any effect on the projected deficit. The failure of the referendum, according to its proponents, means a curtailment or elimination of several school activities and programs. Programs mentioned for possible cutbacks were athletics, drama, band, and orchestra.

Officials also noted the possible curtailment or elimination of the Vocational Education and Advanced Placement program could take place since this is a very costly program. Possible reduction of the amount of courses being offered to students and the banning of student work loads were also mentioned as cost cutting alternatives. More than 50% of the students now carry 5 to 6 courses and under the proposed cutback would not be allowed to carry more than 4 courses.

District officials finally stated failure of the referendum might possibly mean the closing of another high school.



Someone else repeated, "It was simple politics". Elaine then bounced back to Blase again, "He owns this town", and her voice trailed off, "It was so much work".

We moved on to Courtland Avenue, over to Dempster Street. east to Harlem Avenue and stopped off at Morton Grove's Act-On Party headquarters. The incumbents were 3 to 1 winners and the victors had already moved east to the American Legion Hall. Amidst the clinking of glasses and the joy of victory Mayor Dick Flickinger told us, "Morton Grove voters are more intelligent...they weren't scared by their lies (the opposition). The people are terrific. They didn't win a precinct. We had lots of faith in the voters. We had a tremendous organization. There was no scandal. We have integrity. We will continue to work for the people".

The score was now 1 to 1. One for the downers and one for the uppers.

We next headed to Nick Blase's office on Milwaukee Avenue. It was crowded outside: It was jammed inside the Democratic Township headquarters. Euphoria rode the waves. Blase's forces were on a high. They were trouncing the opposition.

The tapes with long figures were scattered all over his desk. And the Bulls were still losing on his up-on-the-wall TV screen but losing less than they were on my TV screen 30 minutes earlier. Nick had a phone in his hand, 3 reporters with notebooks at the ready were by his desk. And Nick's savoring his 6th local victory was being shared by several hangers-on, friends, insiders and sycophants who bordered the room. They were regaling in these moments of victory.

Back to the room next-door we headed for the tote boards, eagerly seeking all the scores ... and most curious about the park election results.

Rich Harczak moved into our path and spoke ever so softly, "Did you hear about Ang's son?" Here was another messenger...but this time he was bearing the worst of news "Tommy Marcheschi was trapped in an underground sewer cave-in in Rolling Meadows this afternoon. He was killed instantly." Tommy was Niles trustee Angie Marcheschi and his wife, Val's, only child.

That ended our election day. We glanced up at the tote board and the numbers meant nothing. The excitement and the anticipation of the entire day collapsed like a pricked






