District 207 tax hike defeated by 2 to 1

Maine Township voters turned down the proposed 40% tax hike sought by High School District 207 by a 2 to 1 margin. Unofficial tallies as of Wednesday morning showed 9,879 votes in favor of the referendum and 18,976 against.

District 207's Public Relations Director Charlene Louis told The Bugle they felt the consolidated elections made a tremendous difference in the voter turnout considering the 28,000 plus votes cast. The previous vote for a tax increase in 1971 garnered only

12,000 total votes which had been the highest ever cast at that time. District 207 had sought to raise the tax rate in the educational fund from \$1.63 to \$2.03 per \$100 equalized valuation. The educational fund is used to pay

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Blase wins sixth term by 4-1

Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase won an unprecedented sixth term in office as his Achievement with Economy Party devastated the field of poorly financed and loosely organized opposing candidates. With all 39 precincts reporting in shortly before midnight on Tuesday night, Blase had collected an overwhelming 8,130 votes compared with challengers Elaine Heinen's 4,053 and Thomas Flynn's 615. The largest vote getter of the election was Village Manager Frank Wagner who chalked up an impressive 7,963. Wagner ran unopposed on the Blase-sponsored Achievement with Economy ticket. As the results showed there was no contest in the mayoral race so the same proved true in

the trustee elections as the Blase-backed trustees ramped over the independents or loosely affiliated trustee candidates. The top vote getter among trustee candidates was incumbent Carol Panek who received 5,272 votes. Incumbent Peter Pesole followed with 4,848 votes and the final member of the Blase team was Abe Selman with 4,346 votes. The terms in office of village trustees Bart Murphy, Angelo Marcheschi and Orville Ottow will not be up until 1983. Like the winners Tuesday night, they, too, are members of Blase's Achievement with Economy Party. Top vote getter among independent candidates for village trustee was Mike Provenzano

Solid victory for Maine GOP

The Maine Township Democratic candidates for township government were soundly beaten Tuesday night by the incumbent Republican administration. Though the Democrats ran an aggressive campaign, they were unable to overcome the huge majorities the Republicans received throughout traditionally

Republican Park Ridge and Des Plaines areas. With only one precinct unaccounted for, incumbent Maine Township supervisor Paul Halverson had beaten Democratic challenger Barry Lpin 14,706 to 9,546. Township Clerk Stephen Stolton collected 13,934 votes to Democratic

Tom Marcheschi killed in sewer cave-in

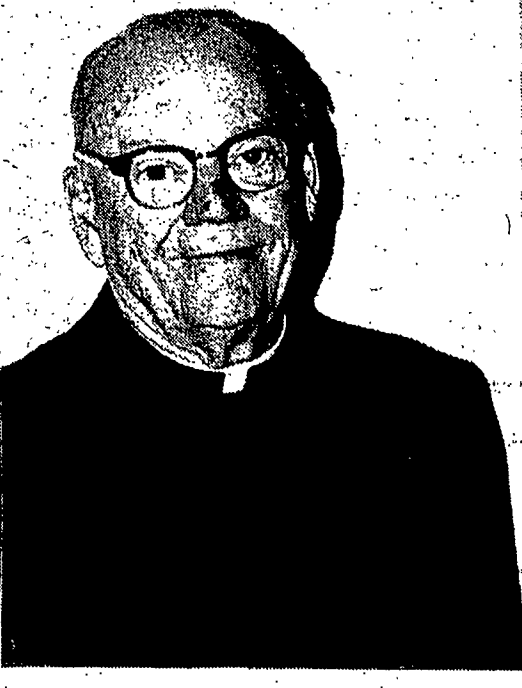

Family Life

"Helping and understanding one another"

Some husbands remark, "My wife isn't fun anymore. She is like a broken record - same thing all the time." I hear husbands and wives complain in marital counseling that their marriage is dead, that there isn't any spark left.

This can easily happen in most marriages if there isn't an open, frank and honest communication between husband and wife. Sure, the wife can become cold, drab and indifferent, especially if she is home most of the time with the kids, furniture, and the dog or cat.

Many women need more stimulation, interaction and relationships than what furniture, household chores, dog or cat, and yes, even their children, can provide.

Though I do not believe it is advantageous to children for their mother to work outside the home, at least I can understand their need for and wish to do it.

This is where many men fall down. They are not understanding and empathetic of their wives' needs, feelings, and wishes. Too often the husband believes that he fulfills his responsibility as breadwinner; therefore, the wife should carry through as mother and homemaker.

What the husband fails to see is that he is able to be away from home, kids, dogs, neighborhood, etc., while the wife has to daily adjust to it. Is it any wonder then that more and more women are now working outside the home?

The man usually has some variety in his day through his travel, office or plant, co-workers, customers or acquaintances, etc.

This is not nearly as true with the wife; it's usually much more routine, calculating and unstimulating for her.

Perhaps the wife was better able to buy her role more as homemaker when she didn't have so many automatic gadgets, when she was challenged more to being creative.

This is not to say that the responsibilities and work done as mother and homemaker is easy.

Certainly, the opposite is quite true as most husbands have discovered when performing these duties while their wife was sick or away. In fact, due to more wives working, more husbands are starting to help more. Men are now buying groceries, preparing meals, doing dishes, washing clothes, cleaning house, scrubbing floors, changing diapers, rocking the baby, caring for and helping with the children, etc. Responsibilities once shouldered by basically women are now being shared by men. Likewise women are now doing more of the breadwinning role and taking some of the pressure off men to produce and to make all of the money. This is termed today as men and women becoming more "androgynous".

What it boils down to is that we all must find some measure of satisfaction or fulfillment in what we do, in any of our roles that make up our life. Certainly, if a husband as breadwinner doesn't find some measure of satisfaction or fulfillment in his job, he is quite likely to look for another job or take out his frustrations on his wife and children.

The same is true for women and perhaps even doubly so because of their great need to be creative.

Is it any wonder then that a woman might become cold, calculating and predictable?

Of course, wives - the same question could also be raised about your husbands! Wife or husband, we all need to find meaning, purpose and satisfaction or fulfillment in our roles or some drastic change is going to almost automatically take place.

Much too often the changes that take place are that the wife or husband - sue for divorce, use their children as the scapegoat; the wife goes to work, more material things, gadgets, etc., are obtained to pacify, or a new fad such as group sex or wife swapping is instituted, or worse still, turning to drugs and alcohol to escape.

As most who have tried these things can attest, they are only momentary answers to boredom, loneliness, lack of stimulation, and being unfulfilled.

The real solution rests with you and your family facing your feelings honestly and openly.

The beauty of marriage and family is how each can adjust and better meet the needs of one another. The key is awareness on the part of husband, wife and children as to whether they are uptight, unsatisfied, lonely, or feel dead and cold.

Feelings must be listened to and responded to just as much as words, wishes, and commands.

If feelings are continually repressed then you become like an iceberg - mostly unseen and dangerous in disguised ways that are much harder for loved ones to detect.

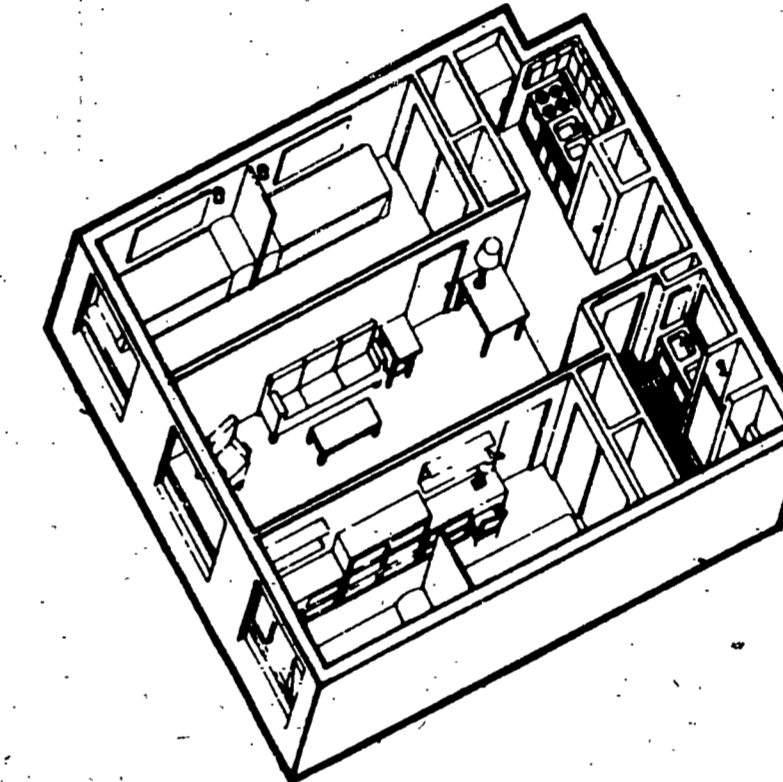
Beware! Face these concerns, issues and feelings together; not to could be disaster.

State police inform public on Illinois speed laws

Are you familiar with the Illinois Speed Law - maximum and minimum requirements? No vehicle may be driven upon any highway of this State at a speed which is greater than is reasonable and proper with regard to traffic conditions and the use of the highway, or endangers the safety of any person or property. The fact that the speed of a vehicle does not exceed the applicable maximum speed limit does not relieve the driver from the duty to decrease speed when approaching and crossing an intersection, when approaching and going around a curve, when approaching a hill crest, when traveling upon any narrow or winding roadway, or when special hazard exists with respect to pedestrians or other traffic or by reason of weather or highway conditions. Speed must be decreased as may be necessary to avoid colliding with any person or vehicle on or entering the highway in compliance with legal requirements and the duty of all persons to use due care. No person shall drive a motor vehicle at such a slow speed as to impede or block the normal and reasonable movement of traffic except when reduced speed is necessary for safe operation of his vehicle or in compliance with law. Illinois State Troopers participating in the federally funded Concentrated Speed Enforcement Program (CSEP) are hired back on their off duty hours just for that purpose—speed enforcement. Captain William Burt, Commander of District #3 in Chicago, released for February's enforcement efforts on the Edens Expressway (I-94), Troopers made 278 arrests, and handed out 42 written warnings. A total of 344 hours were worked using a total of 43 personnel.

38 applicants for paramedic tests

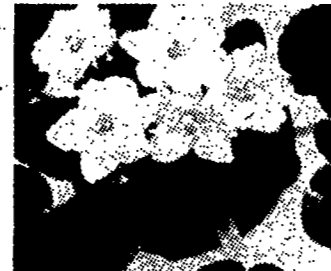

New schedule for Community College election dates

Traditionally, this is the time of year Illinois community colleges, including Oakton Community College, hold their elections for Trustees.

However, starting this year, this will no longer be the case, according to Raymond E. Hartstein, secretary, Board of Trustees, Oakton Community College.

This year there will be a new schedule for community college elections. In accordance with a new state law that mandates consolidation of elections.

"No longer will community college elections be held in the spring," Hartstein said. "Nor will they be held on a Saturday afternoon. Nor will their conduct be the sole responsibility of the college. And they will not be held ever year."

From now on, community college elections will be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, in odd-numbered years. Candidates must still file with the secretary of the Oakton Community College Board, or the secretary's designee. But the responsibility for holding the election has been given to county clerks.

In the past, candidates have had 24 days to file their petitions. Now candidates have not more than 78 days nor less than 71 days before the election to file their petitions.

In addition, terms of community college trustees have been changed to four years from three. There is a provision in the new law that allows a college board to have a referendum on whether voters want six-year terms.

for salaries in the district, educational supplies and equipment and utility costs. The tax rate increase of 40¢ was the first sought by the high school district since 1968. According to school district officials, the average increase in a homeowner's tax bill would have been \$50 a year based on a \$1,000 tax bill.

District officials have pointed out the increase would be offset by a reduction in the bond and interest fund which will be retired by 1987 making the net tax rate increase 5¢ instead of 40¢.

leave the district with an estimated \$8 million to \$10 million deficit in the educational fund by 1985.

Officials have also noted the closing of Maine North High School in August will not have any effect on the projected deficit. If Maine North is sold, the money must be placed in an escrow account to pay off the outstanding bonds on the school. The money would not become a part of the District's General Education Fund.

The failure of the referendum, according to its proponents, means a curtailment or elimination of several school activities and programs. Programs mentioned for possible cutbacks were athletics, drama, band, and orchestra.

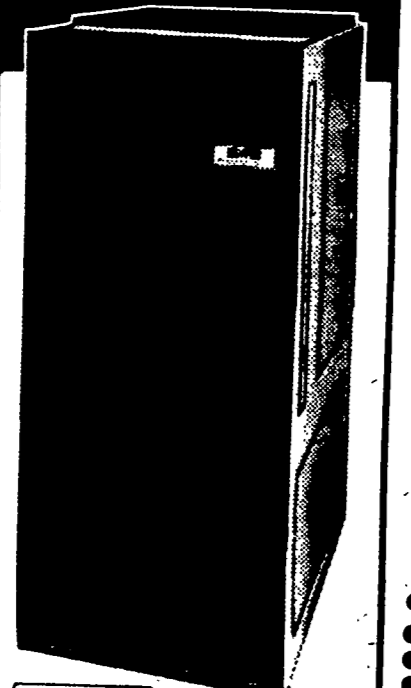
Officials also noted the possible curtailment or elimination of the Vocational Education and Advanced Placement program could take place since this is a very costly program. Possible reduction of the amount of courses being offered to students and the banning of student work loads were also mentioned as cost cutting alternatives. More than 50% of the students now carry 5 to 6 courses and under the proposed cutback would not be allowed to carry more than 4 courses.

District officials finally stated failure of the referendum might possibly mean the closing of another high school.

Someone else repeated, "It was simple politics". Elaine then bounced back to Blase again, "He owns this town", and her voice trailed off, "It was so much work".

We moved on to Courtland Avenue, over to Dempster Street, east to Harlem Avenue and stopped off at Morton Grove's Act-On Party headquarters. The incumbents were 3 to 1 winners and the victors had already moved east to the American Legion Hall. Amidst the clinking of glasses and the joy of victory Mayor Dick Flickinger told us, "Morton Grove voters are more intelligent...they weren't scared by their lies (the opposition). The people are terrific. They didn't win a precinct. We had lots of faith in the voters. We had a tremendous organization. There was no scandal. We have integrity. We will continue to work for the people."

The score was now 1 to 1. One for the downers and one for the uppers.

We next headed to Nick Blase's office on Milwaukee Avenue. It was crowded outside. It was jammed inside the Democratic Township headquarters. Euphoria rode the waves. Blase's forces were on a high. They were trouncing the opposition.

Next door in Nick's office he was holding court as he always does on election night—though Tuesday night he seemed strangely subdued. Nick likes the tumult. The tapes with long figures were scattered all over his desk. And the Bulls were still losing on his up-on-the-wall TV screen but losing less than they were on my TV screen 30 minutes earlier. Nick had a phone in his hand, 3 reporters with notebooks at the ready were by his desk. And Nick's savoring his 8th local victory was being shared by several hangers-on, friends, insiders and sycophants who bordered the room. They were regaling in these moments of victory.

One young man died Tuesday afternoon. Tuesday night in Niles had no meaning.
