## Blase urges schools not to sell vacant buildings

Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase has issued a plea to the superintendents of School Districts 63 and 64 and the board members of both districts to consider carefully the consequences involved before selling any of the vacant school properties in their districts.

Blase noted he was reaffirming the position of the Niles Village Board when he stated he was concerned "with the vitality of our neighborhoods. According to Blase, "This vitality is conditioned to a great extent by the presence of school buildings located in the neighborhoods. If

such school buildings are sold, the neighborhood of necessity loses some of its vitality. Homes depreciate in value, etc."

Blase further reiterated his position by stating, "I want to emphasize to you as strongly as I can that our Village Board is

## Dr. Short to leave Oct. 1 for LGH position

# District 207 head resigns school post

Richard R. Short, Superintendent of Maine Township High Schools District 207, will step down as head administrator of the school district on October 1 to become Vice President of Education and Research at Lutheran General Hospital in Park Ridge.

The announcement of the resignation was made during a morning press conference on Wednesday, April 15 by District 207 school board president Charlotte Storer. Storer admitted that board members had known Short was considering resigning, however, were still surprised by the announcement.

Storer said a nationwide hunt for a new superintendent will begin immediately and she anticipated Short's replacement would be chosen by the time he leaves the district.

Noting there are qualified candidates for the district's top job within the current staff, Short still recommended the school board open the search outside the district because of the district's excellent reputation.

Short, 53, became superintendent in District 207 in 1966 following his position as school superintendent in Hastings, Nebraska.

Is Maine High school superintendent Dick Short getting out of the kitchen before there's too much heat? The 53 year old educator will be leaving the district after this year to become vice president of education and research at Lutheran General Hospital.

From The Left Hand it looks like Short is getting out before the blood-letting takes place in the district.

All the battles which are now being fought in the grade schools will be moving up into the high schools within the next 2 or 3 years. Diminishing enrollment will force the closing of a second Maine High School and the guy who has run the show since 1966 is getting out while the getting is good.

Battlelines will be drawn in the community between Park Ridge, Des Plaines and all the rest of us. Whether to close Maine South, West or East will preclude a conflict which may rival the Civil War.

Short is moving out of one of the "cushiest" school superintendent jobs in Illinois. He came into a school district which long before he arrived created a superior educational environment.

## Oakton recommended for 7 year accreditation

The evaluation team of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools has recommended Oakton Community College for continued accreditation with the next visitation in seven years.

The recommendation was made after a recent review of the college by the evaluation team. "We believe, as a result of our visit, that Oakton Community College has a clear and publicly

stated purpose; we believe you have the procedures and conditions needed for realizing these purposes," said Richard Brown, chairman of the NCA evaluation team. "In our view, you are accomplishing your purposes substantially; we think you have the economic resources and procedures in place to continue to accomplish them."

## A memorial to Lt. John Christie

Niles is wearing its heart at half mast today with the passing of Lt. John Christie, Commander of the Investigative Division of the Niles Police Department. Christie, 45, died Tuesday in Resurrection Hospital after suffering a cerebral hemorrhage 4 weeks ago.

Our lives are touched each day by the people we encounter and they all leave their mark, positive or negative. John Christie touched the lives of many individuals in his 21 years on the Niles Police force. His was not a job that made for pleasant conversation over the dinner table at night, but he handled it like the professional and caring individual he was.

Those who came in contact with him each day, especially his co-workers, knew him as the kind, conscientious and dedicated gentleman he was, devoted to his career and his family.

His astuteness as a police officer was evident many times during his career when he was directly responsible for the apprehension of law breakers.

In our many contacts with John over the years, we always found him not only helpful when we had questions to be answered, but always with a smile and a kind word to brighten an otherwise hectic day. His eyes would twinkle and his sense of humor was most obvious when he would tease us with remarks about "our scandal sheet." We always laughed with him knowing he was clowning in his own inimitable way.

Commenting on the passing of Lt. Christie, Niles Police Chief Clarence Emrikson said, "Nobody is irreplaceable in this world but

### Activated smoke alarm alerts neighbors

Recently, three different neighbors in the apartment complex at Highland Towers heard the wailing sound of an activated smoke alarm in an unoccupied apartment near them. They immediately contacted the maintenance of the building who opened the door and put out a fire

that started in a waste basket and traveled to the baseboard and wall of the apartment. Stated Chief Hoelbl, "It was because of the noise from the smoke alarm that neighbors were alerted which resulted in not only saving the apartment from complete destruction but stopped the fire from spreading throughout the building. We will never know the damage and personal injury which could have resulted if it weren't for the sound of the smoke detector. This is a lesson to all, not only for apartment dwellers, but private residences as well, that smoke detectors can save lives and property."

## Niles 50/50 Sidewalk repair

The Village of Niles is offering a sidewalk replacement program for residents who will pay half of the cost to repair cracked public sidewalks in front of their homes.

This year because of bid competition the Village received a good price, that is, \$1.86 per sq. ft. for sidewalk removal and replacement as against last year's price of \$2.32 per sq. ft. This will give a net savings of 19.82% over last year's price. Since there is limited quantity of work to be done this year, the applications will be accepted on a first come first service basis.

The Engineering Dept. is handling the program which allows the Village to repair the sidewalks at half price to residents. A minimum of two sidewalk squares must be repaired for a resident to participate in the program.

LAND VALUATIONS

The land valuations as set forth are the 1980 appraised full values of land (reduced to appropriate assessment level required by the Cook County Board ordinance) per front foot for all city and suburban lots or per square foot or per acre for industrial and farm lands. The determination of full value of a rectangular lot is obtained by multiplying the unit front foot value of the lot by the number of feet frontage, modified by the shape, depth, corner or other influences which affect any individual lot or tract of land.

BUILDING VALUATIONS

Similar development of sound data and procedures were used in valuing buildings under the conditions as of January 1, 1980. Simplification of the rules are careful revision and applications of unit building costs based on sound data, which included determination of reproduction cost (new) of different types of buildings with allowance for age, condition and obsolescence produced equitable and uniform assessment of buildings of all classes. Some building values are partial assessments based on occupancy for a fraction of the year. They will be fully assessed for following years.

PROPERTY VALUES

The figures listed herein for the lands and improvements are the assessed full values of such property as of January 1, 1980, as determined by the assessor of Cook County (reduced to appropriate assessment level required by the Cook County Board ordinance).

It is the duty of the assessor to assess all taxable property on a uniform basis of valuation so that the assessed full values of the various properties are a just and equal assessment of such properties according to law.

The assessment roll recording the values of property determines only the distribution of the total tax load among the individual property owners. The assessor of Cook County has no control over the amount of taxes levied, nor the public expenditures. The amount of these assessed values does not determine the amount of your tax bill. The established tax rate does that. The assessor does not make the rate. He merely finds the value of the property.

PERMANENT REAL ESTATE INDEX NUMBER

The permanent real estate index number system was designed for the purpose of simplifying the very complex assessing, tax collecting and tax distribution problems in Cook County, Illinois. In this system areas and sub-areas are established. Generally, areas substitute for townships and sub-areas represent sections. These sub-areas are divided into blocks, as follows:

- Blocks 100 to 199 are located in N.W. quarter
Blocks 200 to 299 are located in N.E. quarter
Blocks 300 to 399 are located in S.W. quarter
Blocks 400 to 499 are located in S.E. quarter

vironment. The 3 schools, which will still be operating next year, were here before he took his post. He had few confrontations and ran both the school district and the school board with a minimum of waves.

Short will be leaving a \$60,000 a year job (with benefits) for an even more lucrative job. He'll be heading an educational program which now has 100 resident doctors and 200 nurses at the teaching hospital. He will also be involved in the research program and with the media department.

While the old cantankerous Bugle can't blame a guy for moving on in the world, we look at his move with some misgivings. Somehow, we consider school administrators dedicating a lifetime to this type of work. Getting out is equivalent to journalists moving into the public relations field. There's more \$ but the social commitment is no longer there.

Perhaps we're making too harsh a judgment but we would have liked to see the "sap" stick around for the upcoming battles which will be taking place in the next years. Instead, Short is dumping the heaviest problems he's been confronted with in the lap of a new man or woman, one who will lack his experience in the district, and certainly will be less knowledgeable about the workings of the different Maine communities.

Short never has had to work with the money shorts. Now that the district has turned down a referendum for more money, it will take some clever foot work to keep the district's many programs on an even keel without cutting back too much. And when Park Ridge-Des Plaines-East Maine residents begin fencing without foils, epees and sabers, in their attempts to keep their schools open, it would be nice if Short stuck around for the main act. His adroitness in past years to work around problems would be better tested during this upcoming skirmish.

Interestingly, the mortality rate among superintendents seems linked to the cutting back in the many school districts. The East Maine revolving door which moves superintendents in and out of the district can directly be related to such cut-backs. Now, as the problem moves into the high schools, we begin to see the disappearance of the high school guys who rode thru the years during calmer days.

While it would be unfair to imply Short is "copping out" or "chickening out" when the going gets tough, it would be more accurate to write Short has long had other ambitions. It was rumored he was one of the leading contenders for the state

superintendent's job. But ambitious or not, we're sorry the district won't be able to take advantage of his experience he received here at a time when it will be much needed.


