Because our communities are beginning to age, there should be a concentration by village halls to attract younger people into our villages. With more people living on fixed incomes while taxes and living costs increase, there could be a crisis in our communities before the end of the decade.

School closings could be ominous signs for our towns. Without schools in the neighborhoods, the attraction to moving into a community could be lessened. Nick Blase's call to the school district boards to lease rather than sell vacant schools has much merit.

Niles has now seen Ballard and Oak Schools closed in its community. With the possible closing of Jefferson School on Oakton Street, it could be the precursor for troubled days in

While villages and school districts have run their own shows without interference from one another, now seems to be the time when village boards must take another look at what's going on in the schools. And even though we have mixed feelings about endless studies by joint committees, the time has come for villages to actively begin working with the schools to insure future residents will have local schools in

It has been our opinion of one, in order to retain grade schools in the villages, the junior high schools should be sacrificed, and return the middle school students to the neighborhood elementary schools. While the more specialized facilities at the junior high level may be attractive, it is more essential the stability of the neighborhoods be retained by keeping open the local grade schools. It is essential for the future of all our villages.

Gordon Michalsen, Duty Chief of the Niles Fire Department resurveyed the theatre after the publication of the incident and made recommendations to the Village of Niles. A meeting was subsequently set up for Monday. April 27 which was attended by Michalsen, Niles Fire Chief Al Hoelbl, Village Manager Kenneth

Scheel, Joseph Salerno, Director of Building and Zoning for the Village of Niles, Patrick O'Shea, **Operations Manager for the Golf** Mill Corporation, Jerry Kaufman, principal stock holder in the Mill Run Playhouse which he leases from the Golf Mill Corporation and Butch Wonders, nanager of the playhouse.

As a result of the meeting, a removal order for a hazardous fire condition has been issued which gives a 30 day deadline to the playhouse for the installation of additional exits at the upper level of the building to accommodate 400 more people. According to Michalsen if they (Mill Run) prefer to put in two 44" exits or one 66" wide double exit to accomplish this, it is 'strictly up to them and their architect.⁴ In addition either iron stair type fire escapes or a wide ramp style escape is acceptable by the Fire Department.

Both recommendations for the exits and the fire escapes are based on the Life Safety Code which was put into effect after the Mill Run Playhouse was built in 1964. The installation of the sprinkler system which comes under the village building code and not the Life Safety Code was strongly recommended by fire department.

Joe Salerno told The Bugle it is assumed that an extension of the 30 day deadline will be sought by Mill Run and the Golf Mill Corporation to allow for an architect to draw up plans for the appropriate construction and the letting of bids for the work. Salerno also noted that surveying for sufficient exit lights on the
