## Mill Run bans ticket sales to wheelchair patrons

In what could hardly be described as a tribute to 'The Year of the Handicapped', Mill Run Theatre personnel have refused, possibly illegally, to sell show tickets to persons in wheelchairs. In addition they have also turned away wheelchair

patrons who had previously purchased tickets for shows, are refunding their money and not allowing them to enter the theatre.  
These actions came about 3 weeks ago after The Bugle reported a near panic situation at the theatre on March 19 during a sold

out performance by Liberate when a light bulb above the stage caught fire. After the incident, several patrons contacted The Bugle regarding their concern for the lack of exits in the building.

## Dispute over roofing bids in Dist. 63

About 12 roofing contractors or representatives of firms dealing in roofing products almost "raised the roof" over an alleged misrepresentation in a bidding process by Orput & Orput, architects for East Maine District 63.

Action occurred May 12 in Apollo School, 10100 Dee Rd., Des Plaines. A low bid of \$899,000 from North Central Insulation for reroofing of Apollo and Gemini junior high schools and Ballard, Melzer, Nelson, Washington and Wilson elementary schools with a silicone product manufactured by General Electric Co. was approved by the board.  
Fred Canady, Professional Urethane Co., said "I am not here to impugn G.E." Canady

said the architect specified Urethane and should have submitted addenda if alternates were to be considered.  
Silicone is an inorganic substance based on sand or quartz. Urethane is organic and a petrochemical.

Charles Dare, representing Orput & Orput, said either futura (urethane) or silicone would "do the job." He also said alternate bids were discussed at a meeting for bidders.

A representative of a urethane product and a General Electric spokesman, from Waterford, N.Y., argued the merits of their respective products. A representative of Empire Foam compared samples of silicone and futura

I'm not much of a hat man. The last full-time piece which adorned my top was an old ace wool cap, which formed a peaked point in front and kept those 9 year old ears from freezing off back in the neanderthal days of the 30's.

But as a member of the hatless brigade, I more often than not would crush my army cap in the crunch of my hand and wander down the street sans hat. Once in Berlin no less a personage than General Lucius Clay caught me out of uniform and subjected me to several days restriction in the barracks for this infraction. That was kind of dumb, but once a member of the hatless brigade, it's tough to join the chapeau-wearers fraternity. What was even dumber was walking around without a helmet the first time I heard machine-gun fire at the end of World War II. We were wandering around the Remagen bridge in Germany when a machine gun (one of ours) began shooting at miscellaneous items travelling down the river under the bridge. We were helmetless for the last time.

In the late 40's while we were wandering through Academia, an acquaintance down at school had 5,000 orange and blue beanies stowed away under his bed, in his closet, and sticking out of drawers all over his room. He figured he

The SJB boys also beat an all star team from Northbrook by 7 points. The Northbrook team was comprised of the best

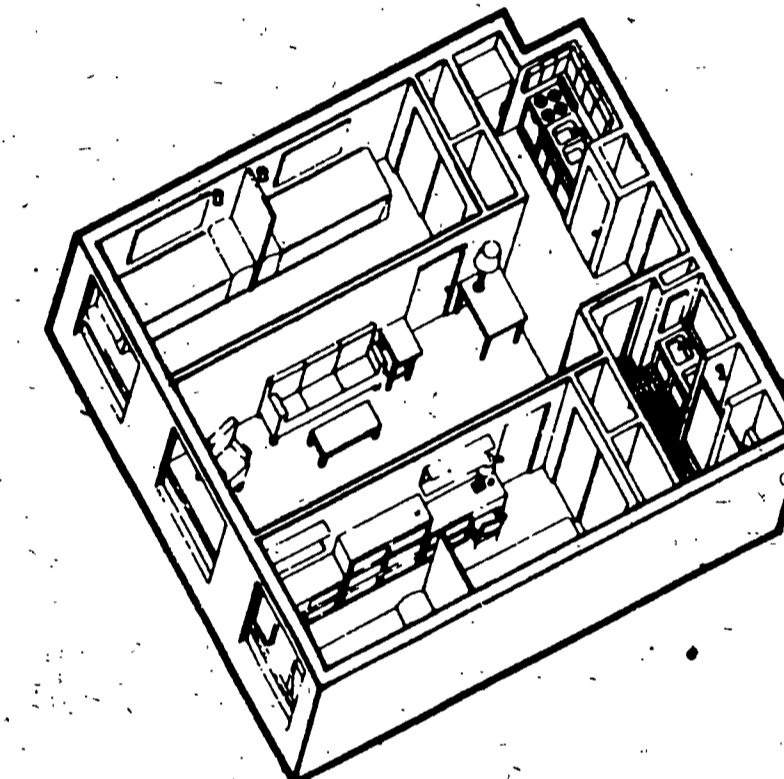

At the last park district meeting, a SPIN group spokesman made the point of saying there was mismanagement in the running of the Ballard Sports complex. They seemed to say that because the facility was constantly in debt, it had to be mismanaged. But specifically, from what they could see, when the bonds were paid up next year, it would still have a \$15,000 deficit.

From what I know about the Ballard ice rink management, some groups that buy time there have their time subsidized to the extent of \$10 an hour by the park district. Because they are a Niles related group, they get \$10 off on their per hour rate. After all expenses are taken into account, it costs \$85 an hour to make the place pay its own way, but some

groups pay only \$75 per hour. The SPIN group is one of those groups that gets this subsidy. Now I don't for one begrudge them this special favor because the things they do are good, but please, gentlemen, you seem to want to bite the hand that is partially feeding you by calling it mismanaged. It's a simple matter to get them out of their dilemma of debt, by fully paying the way.

I, for one, would like the park district to tell me at the next meeting who is getting the special favors and to what extent. In other words, what is the actual short fall due to the subsidy of \$10 per hour per group.
