

Anatomy of a controversy

Following weeks of controversy and accusations it seems the Village of Niles and Mill Run Theatre have at last decided on how to allow people in wheelchairs to see performances in the theatre without obstructing the public aisles. The solution found is simple; Mill Run is going to install a front row of temporary chairs which can be replaced by one or more wheelchairs. However, while the solution seems simple, slicing through the charges and countercharges to try and determine who the bad guys and who the good guys are is not quite as easy. And while it is not easy to judge who the winner is, it is a sure bet that for the brief time they were used as pawns by the theatre, the people in wheelchairs were the real

Built in the early 1960's Mill Run Theatre is owned by the Golf Mill Corporation. It has been rented to Tiffany Productions, Inc., of Chicago since 1970. The head of Tiffany is its chief stockholder

Jerry Kaufman. In the 11 years Tiffany has rented Mill Run they have been at odds with the village during at least the last eight years, says one village official. The cause of the friction has been Mill Run's continuous "uncooperative attitude" when inspected by the village, said Joe Salerno, Niles Director of Building and Zoning.

For instance, for years there seems to have been a problem with the obstruction of aisles during performances. The village is particularly concerned about keeping aisles clear in case people should have to leave quickly during an emergency.

Of all the village agencies which have been involved, it is the fire During inspections by fire officials while performers were on stage, numerous warnings have been given when portable chairs were used in exit ways. Fire officials even had to demand an exit way be cleared when the theatre had an orchestra set up in an aisle during a children's performance.

Fire officials said it often occurred that following an order to clear an aisle, inspectors would find the aisle again obstructed only days after being issued the previous warning.

As an example of how difficult the theatre has been when asked to meet fire standards, fire officials recalled trying to work with the theatre to install new exit doors. The fire department felt larger double doors at the main entrance would help get people out quicker in an emergency. However, according to officials, theatre representatives were very uncooperative resulting in a drawn out set of talks between fire officials and the theatre before the doors were finally installed.

This uncooperative attitude was fairly typical of Mill Run, according to fire officials.

As in so many controversies Mill Run does not quite recall the facts as the village tells them. Mill Run claims it is a victim of a petty and arbitrary fire department which has distorted the truth and presented a false picture of the theatre.

One Mill Run employee seemed dumbfounded by charges of having been uncooperative. Claiming Mill Run has always been more than willing to assist village officials, he noted Mill Run has been so concerned about the public's safety that following a deadly theatre fire in Kentucky, they asked Niles Fire Officials to inspect the theatre and advise on how to upgrade its fire safety standards. Mill Run officials said there have been very few citations issued

by the fire department during the past 11 years. And after receiving a citation, they would work to correct the situation cited. After receiving so much unfavorable publicity because they would not sell tickets to patrons in wheelchairs, the employee noted Mill Run "has always been very accommodating to people in wheelchairs..." as well as to the blind. The employee said Mill Run has had blind patients from Hines Veterans Hospital at many

The latest dispute between Mill Run and Niles officials began following the igniting of a theatre light during a sold-out performance of Liberace on March 19. The Bugle and Niles officials received several letters from people in the audience stating when the light ignited, smoke gathered at the top of the theatre and some patrons sitting in the upper level momentarily panicked. Letter writers described a few patrons climbing over seats to try and reach an exit. However, the incident lasted only minutes and the

Niles' Millionaire's Club will seek village permission to build a stage in its restaurant to become a dinner-playhouse. The Golf Mill restaurant is planning on presenting its plan in July to the Niles Zoning Board. Village officials noted the restaurant will decrease its seating capacity by constructing the stage.

District 64 residents should head for the education center at 164 S. Prospect in P.R. next Tuesday when school board members will offer as many as 6 proposals pertaining to the closing of schools in the district. The vote will take place that night, May 26...Emerson Junior High will graduate 189 students and Lincoln school will "promote" 279 students into the high schools. Oakton st. is the border determining which school high school students will attend.

Graduation figures continue to tumble in the Maine Township high schools. In 1981, Maine South graduates 682 students compared to last year's 739. Maine West grads total 630, down from 679 last year. Maine East has 624 graduates, down 33 from 1980. Maine North's final graduation has 303 graduates compared to last year's

Trustee Ang Marcheschi disclosed during the May 12 Village Board meeting that Niles has purchased three more Mercedes Benz buses for their free bus system. The three buses were located at Woodstock, Vt. where they had been repossessed. Niles bargain hunters purchased the three buses for \$55,000. A new bus now costs up to \$55,000. Senator John J. Nimrod, R-Glenview, who recently returned to Springfield from Washington, D.C., following a 2-day briefing by the Reagan administration, declared today that more duties and responsibilities are being transfered from the Federal to



situation quickly returned to normal. The letter writers wondered why there was no fire escape easily accessible for people sitting in the upper section of Mill Run. The letter writers said it would have been necessary to have gone to doors on the main floor in the event the theatre was evacuated.

Again, there are disputes as to what occurred. A Mill Run employee who said she was present at the time of the incident said there was absolutely no panic.

Nonetheless, Niles fire officials met with Mill Run representatives on April 29 and ordered the theatre to install an outside fire escape for patrons sitting in the upper level. Village officials noted that in the seventeen years since the theatre was built, there have been numerous fire and building codes which have been upgraded to require the additional fire escape. The theatre was given until May 30 to install the fire exit and escape or ask for an extension.

Also during that same meeting fire officials again ordered the theatre to keep the aisles clear of wheelchairs and folding chairs. When people in wheelchairs attend performances at Mill Run, they are positioned in aisles for the duration of the performance. Often their companion is seated in a folding chair next to the wheelchair

Mill Run officials claim this order by the fire department meant they could not sell tickets to people in wheelchairs. And just to bring this point home, they told people in wheelchairs to complain to the fire department and mayor if they did not like it.

Fire officials say the intent of their order was to insist that Mill Run provide space for people in wheelchairs by replacing a few permanent seats with temporary seats which could be removed and a wheelchair put in its place.

Mill Run employees said it was rare for there to be even two people in wheelchairs at a single performance. Following a few days of refusing to sell tickets to the handicapped, these people began calling The Bugle as well as other newspapers. The newspapers were quick to pick up on what seemed to be an obvious injustice against those in wheelchairs and

it was only a short time until even the Chicago Tribune was reporting the story. Village officials seethed with anger as the theatre box office personnel told patrons and newspapers they could not allow people in

wheelchairs into the theatre on order of the village. Finally on Friday, May 15, Village Manager Ken Scheel arranged a meeting between village officials and Mill Run representatives at Mill Run theatre. Scheel invited the press to attend.

Representing Mill Run was Jim Herbert from Jerry Kaufman's Tiffany Productions. Also present was Golf Mill Corporation executive director Patrick O'Shea. Perhaps as evidence of the years of frustration the village has

had with Mill Run, the village was represented by Village Manager Ken Scheel, Village Clerk Frank Wagner, Niles Fire Chief Al Hoebl and his Duty Chief Gordon Michalsen. Also Niles Director of Zoning and Building Joe Salerno was present at the meeting. Held inside the empty theatre the two sides quickly made their intentions known. Niles village officials were there to find a

solution to this latest Mill Run problem. They made it very clear there was no time or patience left for delays. Using a vardstick village officials and Herbert determined how much room would be available if seats were removed and how many seats would be removed. Noting that Mill Run owner Jerry Kaufman had previously said it would be impossible to remove a row of seats because of steps which, in fact, do not exist, Village Manager Ken Scheel said, "I didn't know who to believe until we

came here to see for ourselves." Mill Run's Herbert said, even at that late date, he had still hoped the village would allow wheelchairs to be put in a service exit aisle about 15 feet wide. But Village officials were not leaving until they had permanently resolved the problem.

Herbert finally agreed a section with ten seats would have to be removed and temporary chairs put in their place. Scheel said the plans for the wheelchair section would have to be on his desk by Wednesday, May 20.

Also, Scheel stated Mill Run had not kept appointments with him in the past and told Herbert to call him before coming over to the Niles Administration Building.

As for the original question of who are the good guys and who are the had guys, the facts seem to support Niles contention that Mill Run has been neither cooperative nor professional in their dealings with the village. They've been told by the village during numerous inspections not to block aisles and yet they repeatedly ignored village warnings.

To their credit, it is true Mill Run has not allowed equipment to become defective or hazards to compound each other which would result in a fire. However, it is also true that Mill Run's allegation the village is "picking on them" is unfounded. For if the village was singling them out, points out one village official, Niles would have simply ordered the theatre to clear its aisles, to install an outside fire escape and to make the main floor exit doors larger or

face being temporarily closed down. But instead the village met with theatre officials so both sides could discuss their differing interests. The village always tries to operate in just such a professional manner and, in the case of Mill Run Theatre, was continuously met by stalling techniques.

Mill Run's turning away wheelchair theatre-goers because of what they contended was a directive from the Niles Fire Department was childish and grossly insensitive, not to mention illegal. By their box office personnel telling wheelchair persons "to complain to the fire department or the mayor if they did not like it,"

they were in fact trying to pressure the village. And the hard feelings caused by this action may result in Mill Run having to deal with a considerably less patient and understanding village in the future.

Following the meeting Pierski explained his proposing Beusse for the presidency, saying, "I don't believe there should ever be an election for president, with only one candidate." Adding that "Walt Beusse would do a good job," Pierski observed that Kosiba's reelection "proves" that he has done a good job.

Commenting on his reelection Kosiba said, "I'm really excited about this year". Kosiba described the new Park Board as "a good working board" and said he hoped the park district would be able to continue "moving forward" during the next two years.

Following the election for President, Beusse was elected Park Board Vice President. Beusse received the vote of all board members except his own due to his abstention.

Attending their first meeting after being elected in April were Commissioners Mary Marusek and Jim Pierski. Marusek had served on the Niles Park Board prior to being defeated in 1979.

In other action the Park Board unanimously voted to appoint former Commissioner Jeff Arnold as the new Niles Park District Treasurer. Arnold had been a Park Board member for six years prior to his decision not to seek reelection this past April. Arnold will succeed Tim Sheehan whose resignation became effective upon Arnold's appointment.

Niles Park District Director of Parks and Recreation, Bill Hughes was also reappointed by the board during a unanimous decision which was preceded without discussion.

Also Park Board secretary Grace Johnson and Park Board attorney Gabriel Berrafato were unanimously reappointed by the

During his report Hughes said pole with a light will be installed in Jonquil Terrace Park. According to Hughes a resident living next to the park had complained of groups of teens in the park after dark. The light, which will cost \$1,400, is expected to help discourage teens from gathering in the park at night.

Also, Hughes said a contract has been prepared to formalize the hiring of a local security firm to patrol Niles Park District property. The cost for the firm, Protection Group, Ltd. of Niles, will be under \$10,000 and will include one and two trained guards patroling parks from May through October. Hughes was careful to note that last year college students were hired at a cost of \$8,000 to patrol the parks. However, Hughes said, with the cost of insurance and normal employee benefits the cost was almost the same as for the security firm. Hughes said Protection Group, Ltd. will pay for its employees' insurance,

benefits, and uniforms. Park Board President Kosiba said he and other board members had recently returned from Springfield where they had lobbied State House Representatives on behalf of various park related legislation. Kosiba reported four of these bills passed and will now be taken up by the Illinois State

parents. She left the impression the Spinners include some outside provocateurs.

In School District 63 you've been reading about the parents at the north-end of the district who are attempting to disannex from District 63 and annex into Glenview District 34. Presently, they have not been able to acquire enough signatures for these two procedures.

Both the Spinners and the Annexers have much in common. They have zeroed in on one issue and seem to ignore the much larger issues which they should be concerned with.

The Spinners have been whirling around like over-spun tops in their desires to coerce or intimidate the park board into giving their children an all-year-round skating program. They have one essential point to make in their monthly and bi-monthly harassment of the park board and they refuse to look at the overall programs in the park district. While they endlessly seek what they want, they disregard what the board is doing in so many other areas within the district. Considering the park board oversees programs in about 15 parks, a gymnasium, two swimming pools, a golf course, many, many, tennis courts, day camps and programs ad infinitum, the Spinners ignore these rather substantial efforts, only seeking favor for their limited group in an area of their private interest.

The ice rink has been run at a very substantial deficit through the many years. Yet, the Spinners are asking the park board to increase activities in the rink during the summertime, which will have an even more costly price tag added to its already substantial one.

Over in District 63 the problem is not dissimilar. A small group of very vociferous, and sometimes vindictive, people have been out to "get" School District 63. The closing of Wilson School at the extreme north end of the district started their efforts which had led to the petitions for disannexation. If they should be successful, the move could take off about \$30,000,000 from the tax rolls, which could prove an extreme hardship for the remainder of the district. As one Annexer told us, if they should be successful, the District 63 area should disband and residents should join neighboring school districts. And this all started because these people's neighborhood school was closed:

For the people who sign the annexation petitions, they have to be made aware they will be double-taxed. They still will be responsible for bonds in their own district as well as being responsible for the costs in their new district. It seems foolish to accept this double-taxation, because their children might have to go about 4 blocks further to school.

The Annexers are as single-issue minded as the ice skating parents. They are not concerned about the many programs in their present district, nor are they concerned about the success of the children who have moved to higher learning after having been given the sound background they receive in District 63. They're spitting mad at the district which closed their local school and they intend the spit goes in the collective eyes of those in the district who remain.

Both the Spinners and the Annexers are obsessed by one issue. Both seem geared toward getting their ounces of flesh from the two boards they're encountering.

Both groups serve a private and selfish issue. Both seem willing to throw away the baby along with the bath water. They do not serve the interests of the community. But by raising and raising the volume of their cries, they hope to wear down the public boards they harass.

Single-Issuers have one great advantage over the rest of the community. They seldom have much counter-opposition which resists their efforts. While we don't often ally ourselves with public bodies, these are two times when local boards should be relieved of the punishment they take from these people. Both their causes seem excessive. And from here in Bugleland, both of the one-issuers' demands seem highly unreasonable.
