Dempster Street construction progressing on schedule

Students may also face a bus fare increase in the fall

NORTRAN to eliminate school bus routes

RTA economic problems will result in the elimination of NORTRAN bus routes near the homes of Maine High students beginning in the fall term. Also the 35 cent student bus fare may be raised by the opening of the 1981-82 school year.

Outlining the new bus plans during a public meeting held at Maine East High School on Wednesday, May 27, school officials said students will only be able to ride buses running on major thoroughfares. Current laws state that school bus service must be provided within one mile and a half of students' homes. Commenting on the new routes, District 207 Superintendent Dr. Richard Short said, "There will be bus routes within a mile of students' homes." **Continued on Page 30**

It might presage an era where sports teams would be playing to empty seats in their stadia while attendance of plus-millions would be paying a monthly fee to be sitting in their homes and watching Chicago's sports teams perform. Research team to study heart attack victims

"Can heart attacks be prevented by lowering cholesterol?" That is the question posed by a team of doctors conducting a national study on the relationship between cholesterol and heart disease.

"Heart disease is the leading cause of death and disability in the United States," said Dr. Henry Buchwald, head of the Twin Cities based study. Nearly all heart disease results from atherosclerosis, or hardening of the arteries - the tubes which must continually supply blood containing life-giving oxygen and nourishment to the heart and other organs.

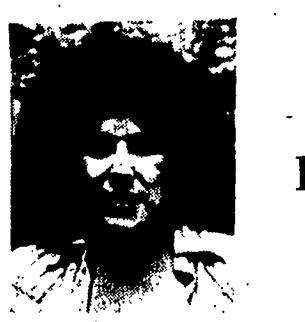

The Niles Zoning Board approved the re-wording of Niles zoning ordinances on Monday night to further express the village's desire that East Maine District 63 not sell its public schools located in Niles.

Among the changes unanimously approved was including the word "public" to include all public elementary, junior high schools and high schools.

Under current zoning laws those schools which must receive special use zoning permission from the village are only parochial schools. However, as a result of last Monday night's meeting, "non-public" and "private" schools have also been included in the special use category.

In effect, these zoning changes will mean that if a school is sold, for instance, to a private school, the new owners would have to receive permission from the village to run such a school from what formerly was a public school.

Referring to the outspoken concern of Niles officials, Padnos said the school and the village officials "...are interested in our residents and both of us have to work for the well-being of these residents."

Social Security number

Your social security number is your key to future protection against loss or reduction of income for you or your family due to your retirement, disability, or death.

Your future social security benefits will be based on the record of earnings kept under the number shown on your social security card. Many people have the same name, but each person has his or her own social security number. That number separates your record from over 200 million other records.

To be sure that you receive proper credit for your earnings, you should always show your social security card to your employer and make sure the employer copies your name and number exactly as shown on the card. This will help avoid any mistakes when your employer reports your income.

You should also double check the social security number shown on your W-2 form. If that number is wrong, you may not receive credit for your earnings. So you should immediately notify your employer of any error in your name or number.

When you receive your social security card, you should save the "stub," keeping it with other important papers. If you lose your social security card, you can bring the stub and identification to any social security office to apply for a replacement card. Having the stub can expedite the processing of your replacement card. Your new card will show your same numbers.

In remarks to local officials and other guests at the 8:30 ceremony, Wayne K. Norris, Centel's Vice President-Illinois, pointed out that the new store is a prototype for the Centel System. "We expect that the new center will initially provide service for about 2,000 customers each month," he said. "The last customer to leave the store on Friday, June 5, will be asked to draw the winning ticket."

The Pick-a-Phone Center has weekday hours of 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., and provides customers with most of the services available at the company's first Des Plaines store, at 2004 Miner St.

Both Centel locations are now serving the public. "Displays featuring Centel's extensive phone selection add a colorful note to the new office. In addition to new instruments, refurbished phones are being sold whenever available. The new center also includes a phone depository, where customers can drop off equipment during non-business hours for credit."

"We have a night depository for bill payments," Meyer noted. "And for customers who have questions related to billing during regular business hours, we have a telephone hotline connected directly to our business office on Miner St."

Meyer said that trained representatives are on hand in the new center to help customers select phones and to explain such

services as call-forwarding and three-way calling. "The store includes a return-for-repair service" he added. "Customer-owned phones still covered by our warranty can be replaced or fixed free of charge."

"Leased phones are also covered by return-for-repair," he continued. "Customers who bring in a broken leased phone can wait while an on-site repair-person fixes an instrument, or they can drop it off and pick it up later. Or, if one of these phones can't be repaired, we're equipped to provide a substitute instrument to replace the damaged one."
