#### Research team to study heart attack victims

"Can heart attacks be prevented by lowering cholesterol?" That is the question posed by a team of doctors conducting a national study on the relationship between cholesterol and heart

"Heart disease is the leading cause of death and disability in the United States," said Dr. Henry Buchwald, head of the Twin Cities based study. Nearly all heart disease results from atheroscerlosis, or hardening of the arteries — the tubes which must continually supply blood containing life-giving oxygen and nourishment to the heart and other organs. Atherosclerosis gradually thickens and narrows arteries until blood can no longer flow through them; the result of this narrowing is usually acute illness, the most prevalent of

which is a heart attack. According to Dr. Buchwald, cholesterol, a fatty substance, is found in diseased arteries and may represent a clue to the cause of atherosclerosis. Also, the amount of cholesterol found in our blood can predict, somewhat, how likely we are to have heart attacks. Facts such as these puterized "on-line" reference Saturday, June 6 at the Health have led many doctors to use various means to lower blood cholesterol in their patients; it is still uncertain, however, whether such lowering can actually prevent heart attacks.

The University of Minnesota research team is now seeking individuals from 29 through 64 years of age who have had only one heart attack in the past 5 years with no history of heart surgery, diabetes or stroke. ## Bugle Digest Local News Briefs

The 16 year old Maine East student who confessed to starting the March 16 fire in the high school basement pleaded guilty during his recent trial. Following the juvenile trial the youth was sentenced to an undetermined sentence in the juvenile correction facility in downstate St. Charles. The student apparently had a history of serious behavioral problems and was permanently assigned to a class for such students at Maine East. The fire, which caused up to \$250,000 damage, was set while 2,700 students were in the building....And Des Plaines Police report that two Maine West students charged with vandalizing the school library on March 15 go on trial beginning Tuesday, June 9 in Des Plaines. The students are accused of causing nearly \$10,000 damage to the library following their going on a destructive rampage after breaking into the school in the middle of the night.

The next hearing in the James Kurtzer case, the Nilesite accused of sexually molesting a 6 year old girl in the Lawrencewood Shopping Center, is scheduled for June 25. Kurtzer, who has pleaded guilty, could be sentenced to 6 years imprisonment on the Class X action charges.

**Karol Verson HIS AND HERS:** Do We Throw in the **Towel or Put Our Brains Together?** 

I don't hate men! I don't even dislike them! I simply don't understand that other half of the species called homo sapien. I'd really like to, but there seems to be a problem. It can be explained by that old familiar catch-word: COMMUNICATION! I know, all we have to do is sit down to talk, to air our grievances and we're O.K. But, did you realize that men and women speak and think in two different languages? Yes, it's true. Hang in there and I'll illuminate our dilemma.

Being with a man, I have remarked to my friends, is like being in a foreign country. There's the exhilaration, the challenge, the contrast of views, of life styles, the self discovery, but-he might as well be speaking Swahili or Kurdish! And it's not so much the words which issue from his mouth, but a total world view-a perception of reality-a way of thinking which either makes me incredibly angry or makes me giggle under my breath.

Yes, I know. During courtship there's never a problem with male-female conversation. We are too busy impressing each other, discovering each other; all of which is sustained by sexual tension. But somewhere along life's craggy road we discover that Mr. Right has a flaw; well, he has a problem. It is called "male conversational dysfunction." It's not treated by Masters and Johnson. It's usually not even talked about. I will enlighten you with a handy-dandy guide to its symptoms.

1. When discussing a controversial subject with a man and he is proven wrong, he will never admit to being in error. His need to protect his macho ego will supersede his discovery of the truth; ergo, mulish stubborness and inflexibility.

2. Men often do not really listen when women speak (however, they do perk up when another man is speaking). The usual response is either an uninspired nod, a 'hmmmmmm', or switching gears to another subject.

3. Men are deficient in both demonstration of non-verbal communication (and I don't mean touchy-feelies) and in reading nonverbal communication. #### FREE HEARING TESTS

Perhaps you have noticed at one time or another that a person with whom you were talking was embarrassed by missing part of the conversation, or a word here and there. Perhaps you, yourself, have had the experience of missing part of a general conversation, especially in a group. This could happen to people with normal hearing, but when it occurs frequently it may indicate a hearing loss. Free hearing tests will be conducted by the Chicago Hearing Society on June 11. The screenings will take place at the Morton Grove Senior Center, 6101 Capulina from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. and are available to all residents. Someday you or someone in your family may suffer from arthritis. There are more than a hundred ways in which people can be so afflicted. Common misconceptions about this disease include: it is not serious, it has no effective treatment, it only strikes the elderly, and it can be cured with home remedies.

These are all false. The Morton Grove Health Department will be sponsoring a special lecture on Arthritis, on June 22 at 7:30 p.m. in the Baxter Room of the Morton Grove Library. Ms. Anne Robinson of the Arthritis Foundation will be the speaker for this free program to all residents.

#### WHAT IS LAETRILE?

Laetrile is a product name given the chemical amygadalin. The amygdalin used in the production of Laetrile is extracted from apricot pits. It is currently packaged either in tablet form or in vials of liquid for injection. It was described as a cancer remedy as early as the 1920's by its "discoverer", Ernst T Krebs, Sr. Krebs argued that cancer was a single disease, and that a single agent could wipe it out. In fact, cancer is a group of over 100 different diseases. Of 50 proven anti-cancer drugs, no one drug is effective against more than a few forms of cancer. The American Cancer Society, along with the Food and Drug Administration, and all major cancer centers and cancer researchers, totally reject Laetrile as a substance of any benefit in the treatment of cancer. Legalization will introduce an un-proven therapy, will defraud the public, can endanger the lives of countless persons...and can open the door once again to countless, worthless "remedies". bites and waxes "eloquent", or she demonstrates feigned interest in the subject he introduces. 9. In groups of women, conversation consists of an intimate

sharing of personal experiences, a weaving of the personal into the general and political, and freewheeling speculation unrestrained by academic rules or boundaries.

10. In groups of men, conversation consists of impersonality and abstraction with personal questions and anxieties disguised as generalities.

11. Men often turn aside the content of a woman's conversation because they don't approve of her particular "style" of delivery. Heaven forbid! If she assumes an angry tone, he judges her incanable of 'reasonable' discourse and cuts off communication. If her man would hear her out, she wouldn't have to trot off to her women's consciousness raising group.

I have tried to discover why this all came about. Voila! I have learned the key difference between male and female. No. It has nothing to do with the genitalia or with physical structure. The truth is that men and women have different brains. Men are dominated by the left hemisphere of their brain and women by the right hemisphere. So what does that mean, you ask?

(Obviously, there are some men who are exceptions to my gross generalizations. They are, however, all gay.)

It means that there are two ways of "knowing". Each hemisphere of the brain processes the same information in two different ways. The Left hemisphere mode is responsible for: verbal, rational, analytical, logical and on-time thinking. The Right hemisphere mode means: intuitive, subjective, relational, seeing overall patterns, and time-free thinking. Research indicates that even before birth, our hormones imprint a code on the brain. In addition to which, cultural experiences can masculinize or feminize the brain. So, equal rights notwithstanding, we are coming from different places. Hence, our problem with communication.



professional sports in Chicago, with the owners of the teams also owning the TV networks.

What is the tie-up between the Eddie Einhorn of plenty's money maker and local residents? Simply, if a guy who has been in TV for many years can foresee the potential of cable TV. why couldn't a local community, which has a great deal of money and know-how, also get into the ownership of cable TV in its community? What we're asking is, why couldn't dollar-rich Niles, perhaps the most progressive community among all Chicago suburbs, own its own television franchise?

Niles free bus service manifests a town which is getting a great deal of money from its shopping centers and other sources above and beyond what its neighbors are getting. It would seem Niles would be the one town in our area which could handle owning its own cable TV franchise.

Tuesday morning we spoke to a representative of Continental Cable TV, which has the franchise in Morton Grove. He said presently the complete package costs M. G. residents \$20.85 per month which comes to \$250 per year. In the fall an additional service will be offered to Morton Grovers which will raise the price to almost \$28.00. Gradually, the cost increases. It is likely the fee will be closer to \$50 a month within the immediate years. What we're writing is cable TV has an unlimited potential which could cost residents \$600 per year. What a bonanza this would be for a community which would have the fortitude to undertake owning its own franchise. A community such as Niles with about 10,000 residential units could have the potential to take in \$6,000,000 annually from a village-owned cable TV franchise.

In Morton Grove the Continental man told us the basic service for cable is \$6.95 monthly. For another \$6.95 you purchase Cinemax. An additional \$6.95 will get you Home Box Office, a third service, and in the fall for another \$6.95 you can purchase Showtime, a fourth service. The initial \$6.95 buys you the basic 34 channels. Each additional \$6.95 buys these other programs. You can see the endless potential for adding fees for additional programming.

When you consider the taxes you pay today, you might get an understanding of what cable TV revenue could do for a community if it was owned by the community. If an eventual \$600 a year is spent by the TV watcher, how much better it would be to pay it to your community rather than to a private franchise which would take the money out of the community. It is quite possible if Niles ran cable TV, it might cost residents only \$200 per year. The village could use the additional revenue in other areas, and quite likely reduce other taxes to its residents.


