




As a guest columnist I have been given license to say aloud what is buried, superficially perhaps, in the back of my mind. This opportunity does not come often and I must grab onto it lest it disappears before left-handed Bud realizes what he has created ... a monster from the right hand.

I would like to give applause and send kudos to the maligned village officials of Morton Grove for showing North Shore pitty-pats they are ready to play in the Major League when they stood tall with their stand on gun control. There has been much criticism as to how and why they can't make it work, but at least they are ready to stand up and swing. That, by golly, is Major League mettle. At least they are in the game - strike out, maybe, but they are swinging.

Years ago, when Nick Blase and his village officials took a similar stand - against much opposition - when a minority family would not be bullied out of Niles, that was Major League. To back off would have been criminal and Niles came out swinging with a sociological plus. Come on Nick, where are you now?

What is so tragic is that so many of us will die this year because of the defense of "the right to bear arms", a right I really don't think the constitution guarantees to each individual citizen.



Kids will find guns and shoot each other and their families "accidentally". Homeowners will have "unloaded" hand guns discharge when cleaning. Short-tempered neighbors and motorists will lose sight of common sense and do something silly. When is the last time any of us needed to display ownership of a handgun in order to protect ourselves? Probably never!

It's time for those of us who share borders with Morton Grove to put "tochus offen tisch", (an ancient biblical proverb that dates back to at least my grandparents) and start supporting their Major League effort toward putting reasonable gun control laws on our books. We do not have to boast of the highest handgun death rate in the world. We do not have to stimulate aggressiveness by allowing handgun possession. We do not have to let someone else do it. We do not have to stay in the Minor Leagues.

Other incidents of vandalism which have occurred this summer included the breaking of a security light in Kirk Lane Park off of Jonquil Terr. According to Beusse, the light was installed following requests by neighbors for additional lighting because of crowds of children in the parks after closing. He added the light was broken within days of being installed.

Two poplar trees were killed in Grennan Heights park this year after vandals stripped them of their bark. Also, at Grennan Heights park, the supports behind a basketball backboard were broken and paint was peeled away from newly painted equipment by area vandals. Additionally, a window in the lobby of the Grennan Heights park was broken earlier this year.
