Vandalism in Niles parks this summer has been more widespread and more destructive than ever before, according to Walt Beusse, Niles Park Board Vice President.

Giving this appraisal during Tuesday night's park board meeting, Beusse said park vandalism is becoming "more and

more severe as the (summer) season goes along."

Estimating that vandalism may be up as much as 25 per cent over past years, Beusse said it is "just astounding to see this happening in Niles."

Beusse noted over \$700 damage has been done in Greenwood

## Bugle Digest Local News Briefs

There appears to be at least three separate law suits pending to prevent the village of Morton Grove from enacting its controversial ordinances banning the sale and possession of handguns within the village. Morton Grove resident and attorney Victor Quilici was the first to file a suit within days of the passage of the ordinances. Morton Grove official Jim Sloan reports that the 2nd Amendment Foundation of Bellevue, Wash., an anti-gun control group, will also take Morton Grove to court.

Lastly, former U.S. Attorney Tom Sullivan, who is working with Morton Grove representing the Jenner and Block law firm, said that Chicago attorney Adam Bourgeois has filed suit to block the Morton Grove ordinances. Also Arlington Heights will be deciding on whether to adopt similar gun control ordinances on July 27 and citizens in Palatine and Mt. Prospect are urging their city fathers to enact legislation similar to Morton Grove's. Buffalo Grove failed on Monday night to pass restrictive gun handgun control measures when village trustees voted 4 to 3 against the handgun ordinances.

A 75 year old former Nilesite David Fleming called The Bugle recently to fill us in on a little memorabilia. Fleming, now a resident of Albuquerque, New Mexico said that 52 years ago when he was a young man of 23, he was a truck driver for the Park Ridge Coal Company. He said he hauled all the coal, sand and gravel used to build the Leaning Tower replica at 6300 Touhy ave. in Niles.

Fleming noted the building was erected by the Borg Construction Company and was built one ring at a time. The entire project took approximately one year to complete. Fleming stated that while he was not too impressed with the project at that time, he took great pride in driving by it recently knowing it was a landmark in Niles. He also remembered two swimming pools being in front of the building which were used by the Robert Ilg family who owned the property.

Fleming is currently visiting his daughter Betty Riley who is an employee of the Village of Niles.

## Brebeuf Parish receives award



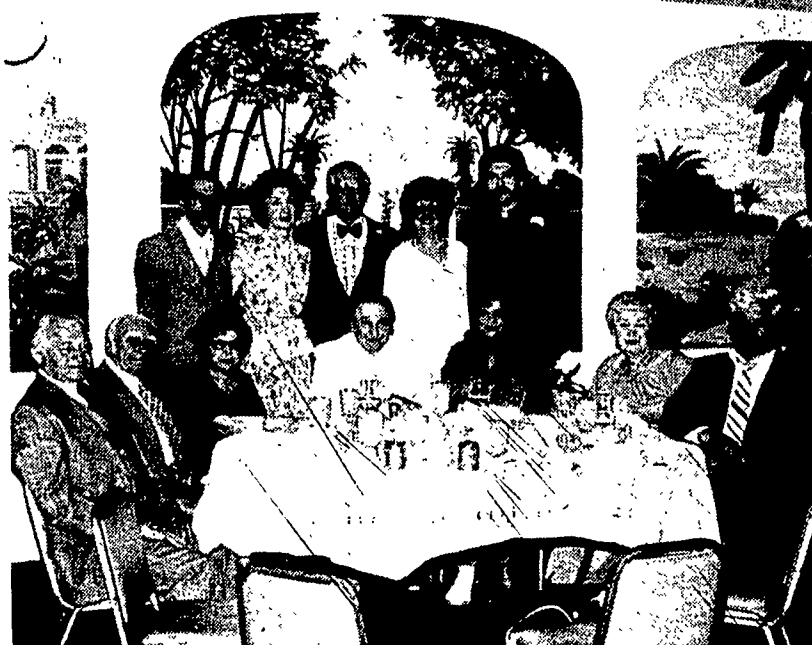

They may have been "just kids" yesterday, but Maine East High School's Class of '71 recently celebrated its 10th anniversary with a reunion dinner-dance. Over 500 people attended the dinner including about 350 members of the Class of '71. As with all such affairs, it was an opportunity to pick up on lost friendships, ask all those "whatever happened to good old so-and-so" questions and, in general, remind yesterday's children that, like it or not, time just doesn't stand still.

The reunion was held Saturday, July 11, at the Holiday Inn-O'Hare in Rosemont. The evening began with cocktails followed by dinner, a slide presentation using pictures from past yearbooks and, lastly, a dance. However, following the dance many graduates lingered late into the morning, socializing at the hotel bar or in rented rooms.

Any suspected act of misconduct by an elected or appointed state, county or city official or by a law enforcement officer may be reported through the hotline.

### Safety hints for moped drivers

Popularity of mopeds (motorized pedalcycles) in Illinois is on the rise. The 21,247 registered mopeds in 1980 was an increase of 4,377 over 1979.

Pedaled like bicycles or driven like motorcycles, mopeds are equipped with motors that produce a maximum speed of not more than 30 miles per hour on level ground.

Mopeds are licensed on the calendar year with a registration fee of \$12 and a \$3 certificate of title fee. Anyone may operate a moped with a current, valid drivers license, regardless of classification.

Drivers are prohibited from carrying a passenger unless the moped is designed to carry two persons. Two-person mopeds must include a seat, permanent handgrips and footrests for the passenger. No special goggles, shield, helmet or glasses are required for either the driver or passenger.

If a moped will be driven at night, it must be equipped with a lamp on the front which emits a white light visible for at least 500 feet. A red reflector on the rear must be visible from 100 to 600 feet when directly in front of the lower beams of the headlights on a motor vehicle.

## Time for retirees to review earnings

With the year half over, now is a good time to review your earnings if you work and receive social security checks.

It may be that you have earned more or less than you expected. This could affect your social security checks.

The general rule is that you can receive all checks for the year if your earnings do not exceed the annual exempt amount. In 1981, this amount is \$5,500 for people 65 or older and \$4,080 for people under 65.

If your earnings exceed the annual exempt amount, then \$1 of your benefits is withheld for every

\$2 of your earnings above the limit.

This annual earnings test applies to all people under age 72 getting checks from social security. People getting checks because they are disabled have different rules about work however.

There is an exception to the annual exempt amount. A monthly test can be used the first year you have a month you do little work even though your yearly earnings exceed the limit. Under this test, you can get a check for any month you earn less than the monthly limit or do little work in self-employment. The

1981 monthly limit is \$459 for people 65 or over and \$340 for people under 65.

Remember that gross pay counts for purposes of the earnings test, not just your take home pay.

If you find that you are earning significantly more or less than you expected you should notify social security so adjustments in your benefits can be made if necessary.

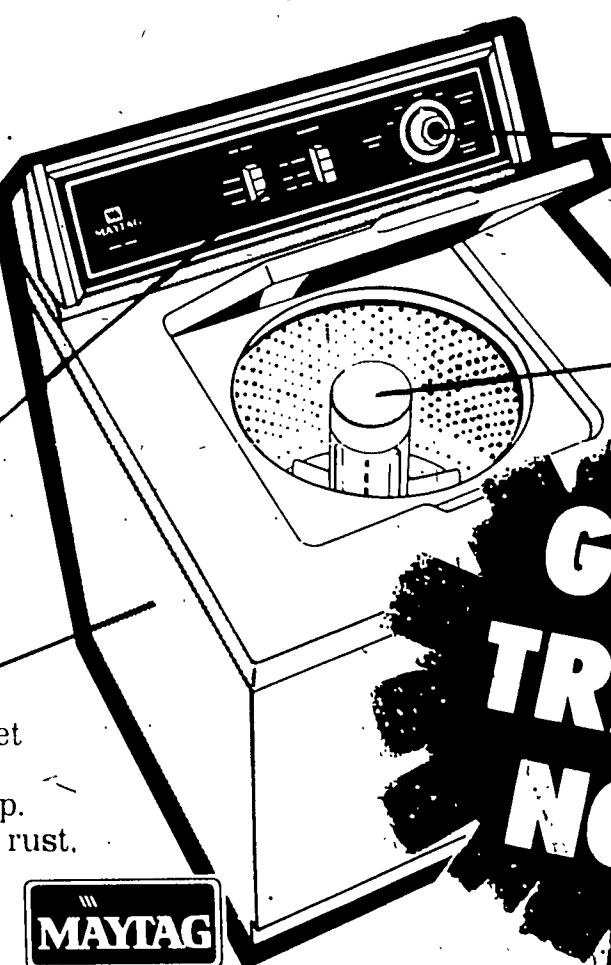
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## Niles Park District's July 4th parade participants

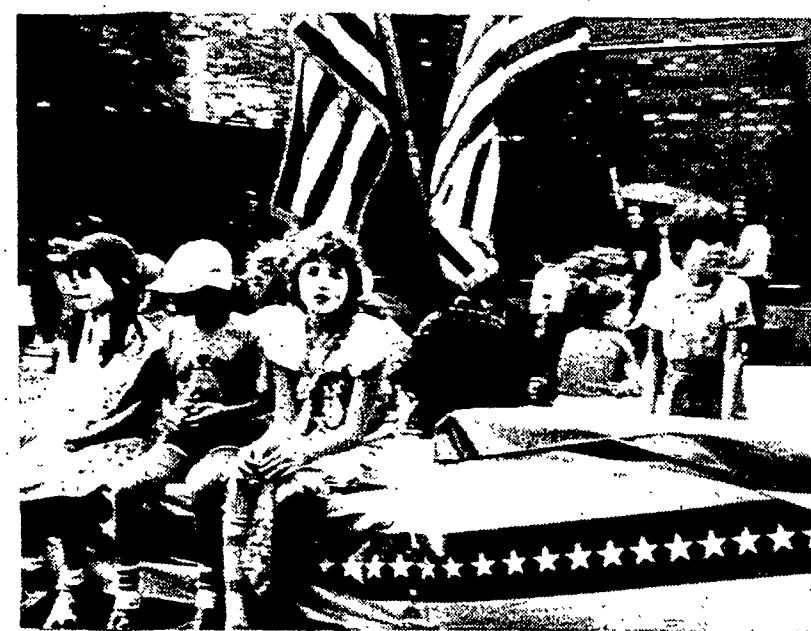

## Illinois Delegation protests FAA's Action

Congressman John Porter (R-10th), along with the entire Illinois delegation, is protesting the Federal Aviation Administration's continuing efforts to close its Des Plaines office and move its operations to Kansas City. The delegation believes the move should be in the other direction.

In a letter to FAA Commissioner Lynn Helms, the 24 member delegation cited reports claiming the agency was going ahead with its reorganization despite assuring Congress the move was off, pending further study.

"On the second of the month," Porter said, "the FAA told us the reorganization was 'on hold' until questions concerning the cost effectiveness of the plan were answered. Thursday, we picked up the newspapers to learn the FAA is reportedly going ahead with its plan despite requests from Congress and the General Accounting Office to answer questions regarding the cost of such an undertaking and also to satisfy doubts about the overall wisdom of the reorganization."

The letter to Commissioner

Helms emphatically protests continued action until all the facts are in and an intelligent assessment can be made.

"We are committed to the savings inherent in such a merger of offices," the Congressman said. "But we believe that O'Hare Field, as the nation's busiest airport, should have the government's agency concerned with air safety located within its environs. In addition, the loss of 400 jobs in Illinois, at a time when our state is experiencing economic decline, is a matter of great concern. Finally, it would be unfortunate if the FAA office with which the Suburban O'Hare Commission has gained great rapport on the question of airport noise were to be moved 700 miles away," Porter explained.

"Simply put," the Congressman continued, "we're asking that these factors be considered and cost effectiveness be definitely determined prior to proceeding with such a move. We thought we had the FAA's word on this. We expect them to live up to their promises," Porter explained.

## M-NASR wins National Gold Medal Award

The Maine-Niles Association of Special Recreation (M-NASR) has been selected as one of four Special Recreation Districts being considered for the National Gold Medal Award for Parks and Recreation Excellence. This award goes annually to a Special Recreation District representing outstanding community achievement for disabled populations; M-NASR is in the under 250,000 population category.

### Researchers on spinal cord injuries to speak in Champaign

Dear Editor:

Three years ago my nineteen year old daughter, Melissa, broke her back. She became a T-4 paraplegic, paralyzed from the armpits down. Doctors have given her no hope of ever walking again.

Through the Spinal Cord Society Newsletter I have learned that spinal cord injured come in all ages, from babies to war veterans. There are probably a half-million paralyzed in the United States with 10,000 new victims each year. All have been told there is no hope of them ever returning to a normal life. But I have also learned that some medical schools in the East were working on a cure and that for the first time the future looks bright. I called three schools, NYU,

Dartmouth College, and Georgetown U. and persuaded three nationally known researchers to come to Champaign in August to talk about their spinal cord injury research projects.

Now I am searching the Midwest for spinal cord injured. I want them or their families to come to Champaign to listen to the researchers. I want to gather together as many people as possible to call the public's attention to the plight of the paralyzed. I want the researchers to know that there are a lot of us impatient for a cure.

If you are paralyzed or if you know someone who has a spinal cord injury, please contact him and tell him there is hope for a cure but we must work for it. Write or call me so I can give you the information I have. Money at this point can not buy a cure, but if we join together and yell loudly enough, maybe we can change things soon.

I want my daughter to walk again. I want her to be able to do the things that kids her age do. Help Melissa and help yourself. God willing, we'll end this nightmare soon.

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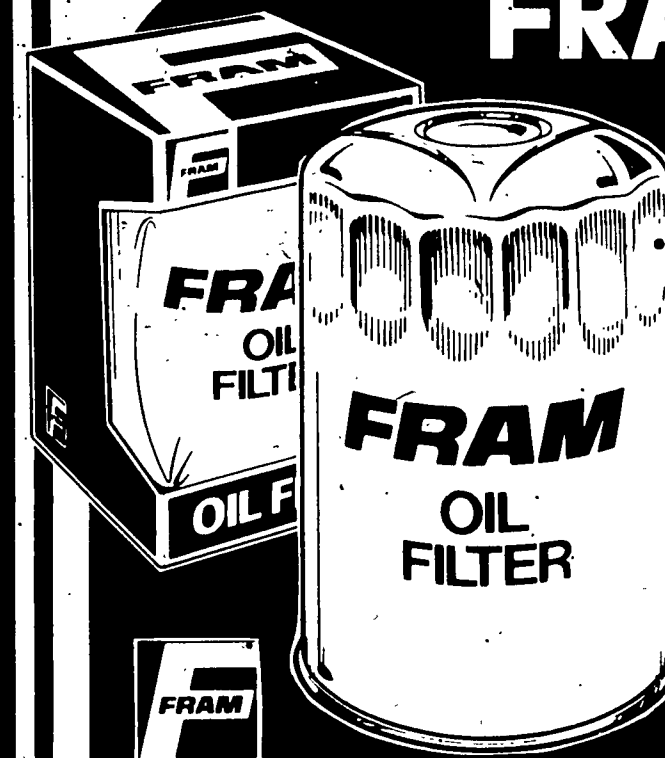

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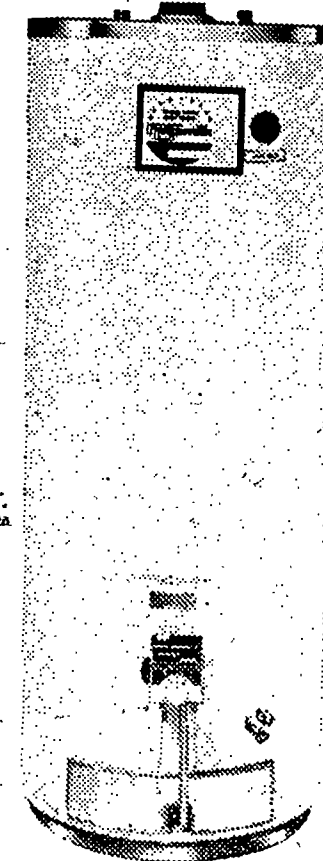

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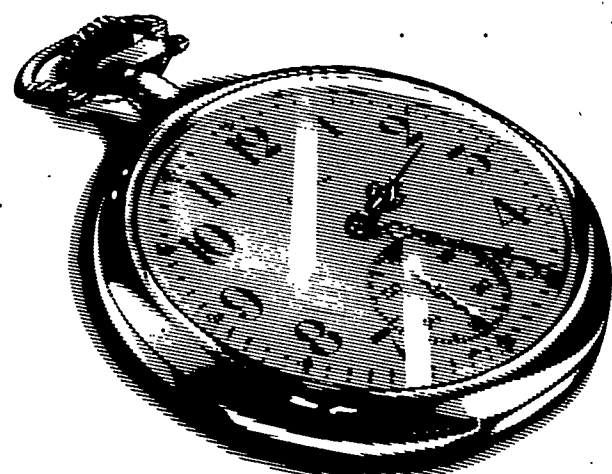

Midwesco, Inc., Niles, recently marked 50 years in the business of energy and environmental control. The company, located at 7720 Lehigh Avenue, celebrated its anniversary with an Open House and Reception in honor of employees, customers, suppliers and friends. Co-founders of the company, Paul R. Unger and Erwin W. Mautner greeted more than 700 guests. Current officers David Unger, President and Henry M. Mautner, Chairman of the Board, are sons of the founders.

Midwesco, Inc., founded in July, 1931, began as a two-man firm that designed, installed and serviced oil burning systems in the Midwest. "Changes in the costs of different fuels, the development of more efficient and safer systems and the need for heat recovery, use of waste fuels, and pollution control altered the course of our business during these years," stated Paul R. Unger and Erwin W. Mautner.

Originally called Midwest Heat Service, the company began by installing and servicing oil burners and selling fuel oil. "Looking back to July, 1931, the heart of the depression, it seems absolute madness for two engineers/peddlers with practically no money to start a technically oriented business," said Unger.

Although oil was considerably cheaper than gas during the thirties, gas was readily available and as an incentive, gas companies were offering low priced contracts. Midwest Heat Service grew in size and reputation by successfully installing both oil and gas burning systems in railroad stations, meat packer plants, breweries and other plants requiring high pressure steam. Projects aboard oil tankers and tugs on the Great Lakes led to the company's participation in the Victory Ship Program for the Maritime Commission during

World War II. In 1945 Midwest Heat Service was awarded the coveted Maritime "M" Pennant, the Victory Fleet Flag, and Maritime merit badges for all employees as recognition of their contribution to this war effort.

The coal strike in the mid-forties brought Midwest Heat Service into the oil conversion business. "We were working 24 hours a day to convert customers such as Caterpillar Tractor and Pabst Brewing Company to oil before their supply of coal ran out," recalls Mautner. During this period, the company started a small air conditioning business and increased their service activities. The diversification of work prompted the company to change its name to Midwesco, Inc. in 1957.

Midwesco's growth, characterized by continuous expansion and diversification, reflects the changing energy and environmental needs of the industrial and commercial sectors in the country. Several acquisitions, including, Enterprise Heat & Power Company, an oil burner business in 1961; Kewanee Standard Welding in 1969; Resco, Inc., a major air conditioning service company, in 1976 and William Adams Engineers, Inc. in 1977 broadened Midwesco's range of operations.

Today, Midwesco operates nationally and internationally through five divisions, staffed with more than 500 employees. Since 1977 headquarters for Midwesco Energy Systems, Midwesco Mechanical, Perma-Pipe, Thermal Care and Mid Res Service Divisions are located in Niles. In addition, manufacturing and warehousing facilities for the Midwesco Energy Systems, Mid Res Service and Thermal Care Divisions are at this site. ## Tips help your air conditioner keep you cool

The most important appliance in your home this summer may be your air conditioner. Here are some tips from the makers of Bryant, Day & Night and Payne air conditioners which will help your air conditioner work more efficiently and keep you cool longer.

"Don't fiddle with the thermostat. Set the temperature to a comfortable level and forget it. Excessive 'on and offing' can damage the components of the unit. Besides, energy will be wasted as the air conditioner tries to keep up with your changing cooling demand."

"If your clothes dryer vent is close to the air conditioner or heat pump, consider other ways of venting the dryer. Hot vapor from the dryer places an extra load on the air conditioner. Lint from the vent can cause damage."

"Run appliances such as a clothes dryer and do as much cooking as possible in the early

morning hours. This is better than at night because in the evening on a hot day, the air conditioner is still working to bring down the temperature from the daytime heat."

"Keep curtains closed on sunny windows during the day. Homes in humid areas should be kept 'closed' with the air conditioning turned on during July and August - even if the weather is cool but humid, say the experts. Because dryer air seems cooler than humid air, your air conditioner can be 'on' less when the humidity is low."

"Trim shrubbery and limbs back. Landscaping that hides an air conditioner or heat pump may look more pleasing but reduces efficiency by curtailing air movement. Shrubs could cause damage if leaves or twigs are sucked into the unit."

"Have the unit cleaned and checked by a qualified service representative. Coils should be

cleaned. This is a job some homeowners can undertake themselves but first they should have the dealer's service representative do it and observe - especially learn how to properly shut off electricity to the unit."

"Filters, too, need to be cleaned, if permanent type. Disposable ones should be thrown away. Check these once a month. It is a good idea to buy a throw-away filter to use while the permanent filter is being cleaned (with a garden hose on the driveway) and is drying."

"Consider planting a strategic tree or build a sunscreen to shade the condenser unit. This would be useful if your condenser unit or heat pump is located on the south or west side of the house. However, it should be far enough away to minimize potential problems with leaves."

"Insulate duct work."

"Caulk storm windows as well as main windows and doors."

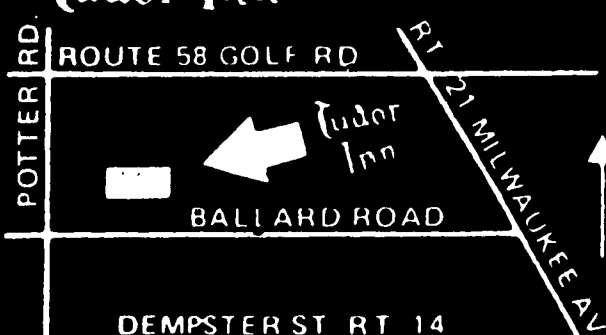

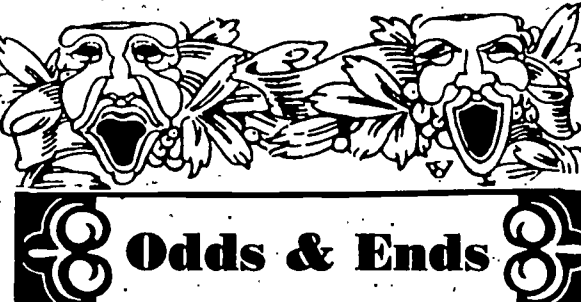

The Wolff-Berger Chapter has members from all over the Chicagoland area and everyone from the area is invited to attend the picnic and learn about the group.

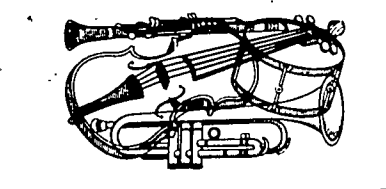

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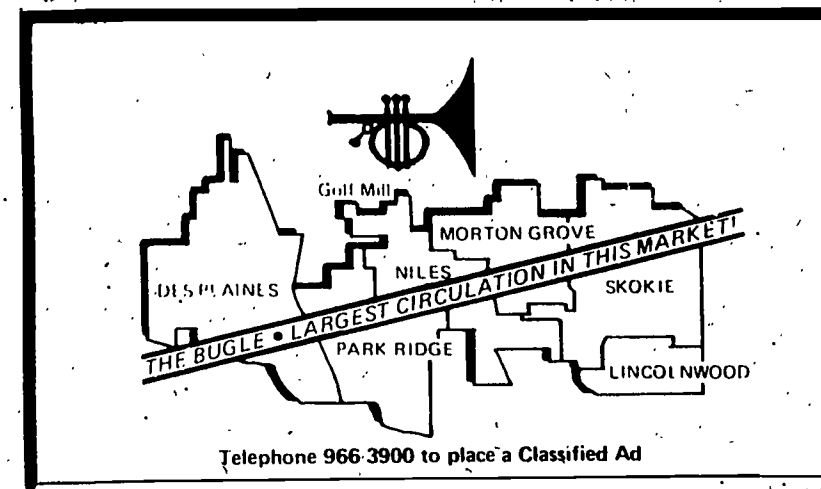

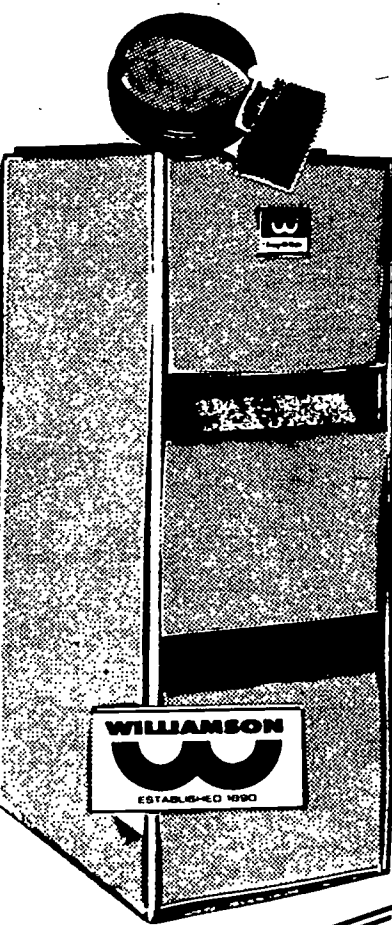

## Maine High Schools below national drop-out average

With the student drop-out rate from schools averaging 6% nationally, Maine Township High School District 207 can be justifiably proud that its student drop-out rate for the 1980-81 school year is a mere 1.4% of the school district's 9,273 enrollment.

According to Dr. Richard Short, Superintendent of Schools, at the time when students withdraw from school, the main reasons they give for their action are lack of interest and employment.

"It is the lack of interest factor", he said, "that disturbs educators at Maine today and continues to give the District grave concern."

"Financial restrictions and declining enrollment are making it necessary for District 207 to tighten its belt both in the areas of curriculum and extra-curricular activities. Some cur-

ses and extra-curricular activities are being eliminated for the 1981-82 school year. Additional cuts are being planned for future years", Dr. Short reported.

"There has to be great concern how this reduced educational program will affect marginal students, those most likely to drop out of school. These students are less inclined to remain in school when there are fewer opportunities for them to be challenged by in school," he said.

He concluded, "While we will do everything within our power to keep our students in school because we know the great value of a high school diploma from Maine, we must not delude ourselves that a reduced educational program could not affect Maine's enviable student drop-out rate seriously in years to come."



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

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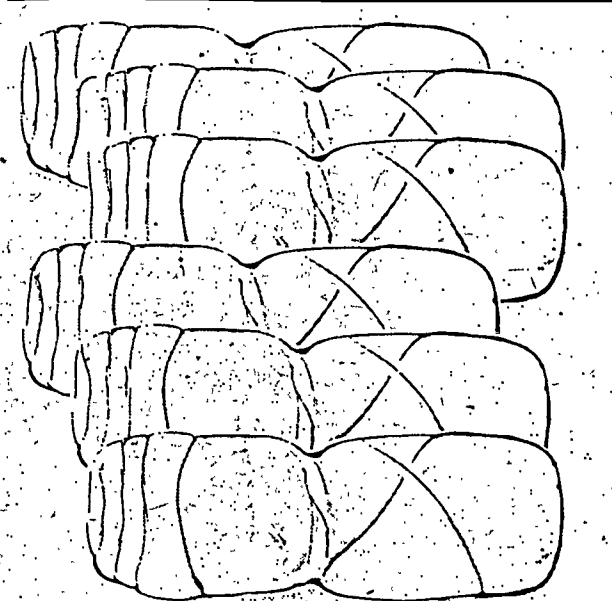
