## Indicted for Niles Murder

A Cook County Grand Jury indicted Eloy Sanchez, 52, of Chicago on Monday charging him with the fatal shooting of his wife and wounding of his son and mother-in-law in Niles on Friday.

The indictment charges Sanchez with murder and attempted murder. Under Illinois law, if Sanchez is found guilty he could be sentenced to terms ranging from twenty years to life imprisonment. Additionally, San-

chez could be sentenced to the electric chair if convicted of the murder of his wife.

Sanchez has been denied bail and is currently being held in Chicago's Cook County jail.

Police report Sanchez shot his family members as they were arriving for work at Apracor Co., 6412 Vapor Ln., in Niles at about 7 a.m. on Friday. Sanchez allegedly used a shotgun to shoot the three as they were walking

from their car into the building. Sonya Sanchez, 37, estranged wife of Sanchez, died at Lutheran General Hospital after being shot in the chest. Admitted to Lutheran General Hospital was Sanchez' son Pedro, 20, with wounds in his arm and chest and Eugenia Suarez, Sanchez' mother-in-law, with gunshot wounds in her left thigh.

The Niles Chamber of Commerce and industry recently welcomed some of the community's most notable industrial firms in the Chambers' membership roster. 11 year old Jimmy Larkin of Glenview remains in critical condition in the burn unit of Evanston Hospital after a gasoline-related accident has left him with second and third degree burns over forty per cent of his body. An 18 year old Glenview youth has been charged with reckless conduct by Cook County Sheriff's Police after he allegedly spray the boy with ignited gas from a makeshift 'flamethrower.' A fund has been established to help with the medical bills at the National Bank of North Evanston. Niles and Morton Grove residents received their quarterly water bills in the mail this past week and were quick to note the rate increase. Because the City of Chicago recently raised their water rates to the suburbs by 51%, it was necessary to pass this increase on to the users. In the meantime, Niles and Morton Grove are two of 47 suburbs suing the City of Chicago over their increases in the cost of water. Nilesites received an increase from \$1.05 per 1,000 gallons to \$1.38. Morton Grovers' increase was from the present \$1.50 per 1,000 gallons to \$1.80.

Chestnut st., Des Plaines. She was a student at Maine West High School. The teen was last seen on Thursday, Aug. 6. She lived with her parents and 22 year old brother. Cause of death was listed as drowning, but investigators were still attempting to determine how the girl drowned.

## Medical services for elderly

Liz Gregory, Director of Social Services at Holy Family Hospital, and Kenneth Beckman, M.D., family practitioner on the hospital's Medical-Dental Staff, are participating in a project designed to integrate the myriad of services for the health-impaired elderly in the Northwest Suburbs.

The project, made possible through a grant from a private foundation, is being implemented by the Northwest Service Coordination for the Health Impaired Elderly of Cook County. "The organization's goal is to establish a network linking the more than 150 hospitals, nursing homes and other agencies serving senior citizens in Barrington, Palatine, Wheeling, Niles, Maine, Elk Grove, Hanover and Schaumburg townships.

The Northwest Service Coordination hopes the network will

improve aid to the area's growing elderly population by eliminating duplication and gaps in services and setting up a case management system that will make sure needy senior citizens are identified, referred to the appropriate organizations and monitored on an on-going basis.

"We want to make sure the elderly are aware of all the services available to them and how to go about securing the services that they need," says Ms. Gregory, who serves on the Northwest Service Coordination's medical advisory council, of which Dr. Beckman is chairman.

## Coping with Cancer Program

September 4 is the registration deadline for the Autumn session of the "I Can Cope" program being offered for cancer patients and their families at St. Francis Hospital of Evanston.

The program begins on September 14 and runs for four consecutive weeks on Mondays and Thursdays at 7:30 p.m. at St. Francis Hospital, 355 Ridge Ave. The program is offered free of charge and is designed to help cancer patients regain control of their lives by increasing knowledge of the disease and helping them to set goals and develop strengths. ## Has anyone seen Dr. Earle??

The friendly and attractive secretary in the superintendent's office bore devastating news: "I'm sorry, Mr. Carlson, but the Earle portrait is not in the administration building of District 207. We've looked several times for it. There is no such portrait here." I smiled but was frustrated to the core. Another local artifact was missing—and it was so unnecessary.

These past years have not been kind to the memory of one of the giants of Maine Township's past. Dr. C.A. Earle had long been a fixture in Des Plaines. His contributions in the development of secondary school education for youngsters in Maine Township is equaled only by those made by Charles Hime, Maine's principal from 1915 to 1936. Earle served as president of the Maine School Board from 1901 until 1925. Until he and a few other farsighted, civic-minded men came along, teen-agers wishing to go beyond grade eight traveled into the City of Chicago for a high school education. Since the area was mainly farmed by tough and frugal families close to the soil, there was little reason for the vast majority of young people to opt for a diploma on the secondary school level. Earle and others saw that times were changing and decided to do something about it. Eventually this dentist gave the high school its first athletic field; Central School on Thacker Street in the heart of Des Plaines sits on the property today. The first Maine Township High School was across the street; it was a lovely school-I know because I taught in the building at the opening of its last decade of life when it was a junior high school.

A portrait of this "benefactor" of public education was placed in a position of honor when the beautiful new school-our Rolls Royce edifice on the largest campus in the Middle West—opened in 1930. The portrait remained a "fixture" in the main office for thirty-five years. Back when Maine took good care of its traditions and made certain that the history and lore of this Township was taught to the impressionable frosh so that school spirit and pride would become "subtle" but albeit "potent" weapons in the ongoing battle to curb vandalism and maintain high student morale in the classroom and on the playing field, students were taught something about Dr. Earle. We knew when we stepped into the office why the portrait was there and why we should respect it—even though he passed from the scene a quarter of a century before we got there. When I returned to Maine as a member of the faculty in 1980 the portrait was still there.

I remember the day the portrait was taken down. It was in early June of 1965. The principal was retiring. One of his trusted aides decided that the very costly oil painting of the retiring principal should be placed in that particular spot. The Earle portrait was moved to the basement. Maine consisted of three floors of classrooms and halls and lounges of various sizes on several acres of ground, yet there was only one place to hang the new portrait. The same "maneuver" was repeated in 1978 when the Clouser portrait was hung. This time, however, the predecessor's portrait was rehung. The Earle portrait remained in the basement. I tried to interest someone in rehanging it but to no avail.

In 1981 a young man in Des Plaines interested in researching Dr. Earle's contributions came looking for the portrait. He was brought to me. He wanted to see the painting. I was certain that it was still in the basement. I was mistaken. Once again Maine and the community lost something of value.

OCC Family Night

Oakton Community College will hold two family night programs on Wednesday, September 2, at OCC Skokie and Thursday, September 3, at the Des Plaines campus. The first legal ruling is expected within 60 days on the constitutionality of Morton Grove's landmark handgun control ordinances, according to Morton Grove village attorney Martin Ashman.

Ashman was quick to note that this ruling will almost certainly be appealed and that a final ruling on the constitutionality of the ordinances could take from "one to seven years."

Morton Grove trustees passed the most restrictive handgun control ordinances in the country on June 8. The ordinances outlawed the private ownership of handguns by most residents and also prohibited the sales of handguns within Morton Grove.

Shortly after the ordinances were passed, three law suits were filed to block the implementation of the ordinances.

Morton Grove resident and attorney Victor Quilici was the first to ask the courts to find the ordinances unconstitutional. Quilici's suit is believed to have the support of the National Rifle Assoc.

Additional suits have been filed

by two groups of Morton Grove residents, one of which has the support of the Second Amendment Foundation, an anti-gun control organization. The third suit filed by Morton Grove residents with the support of the Illinois Rifle Assoc. claims the ordinances violate the Illinois Constitution.

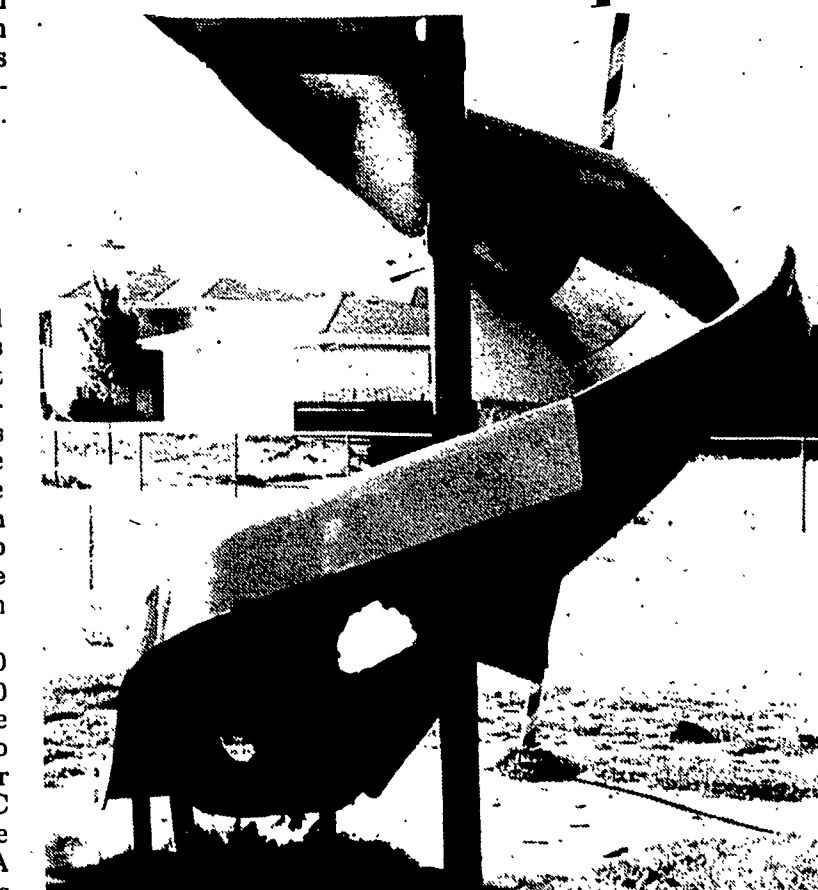
Last week U.S. District Court Judge Bernard Decker ruled that Quilici's suit would have to be tried in federal court rather than in state courts as Quilici had requested. Additionally, Decker said the one of the remaining two suits would be combined with Quilici's suit so both suits could be heard at the same time.

It is thought that by denying Quilici's request to have the suit tried in a state court Judge Decker has assured that expected appeals will be heard quicker than if they first had to be filed in state courts only to ultimately be referred to federal appellate courts.

Ashman indicated that the third suit is expected to be "stayed" or delayed until a

## Holy Family moves Outpatient Department

As part of an interior remodeling project, Holy Family Hospital has moved its Outpatient Department to new quarters that will expedite patient registration, provide more versatile treatment facilities and improve efficiency by centralizing several related services.

Houses with the Outpatient Department in the newly remodeled suite on the ground floor of Holy Family are three other ambulatory care services that deal heavily with outpatients: the employee Health Service, Gastroenterology (GI) Laboratory and Early Disease Detection Program. Previously, these services were located in different areas throughout the hospital.

Another advantage of the remodeling project is the availability of more versatile treatment facilities. Previously, the services had five examination areas and two multi-purpose rooms. Now, there are six multi-purpose rooms and one room designed specifically for proctological exams. Although the

number of treatment rooms has remained the same, they can be used for a wider variety of purposes.

A further benefit of the new quarters is its central registration and reception area, a feature that will also be used by the nearby Cardio-Respiratory Department.

The Outpatient Department provides private rooms where outpatients may be examined by their physicians. The GI Lab performs specialized tests on the stomach and intestines. The Early Disease Detection Program offers area residents a personalized health program based on an analysis of their lifestyle and medical history, a series of diagnostic tests and a complete physical examination. The Health Service gives annual check-ups to Holy Family employees and the personnel of area businesses on a contractual basis.

The services' new home is located near Holy Family's Mother Frances Pavilion and the interior entrance to the Holy Family Professional Plaza.

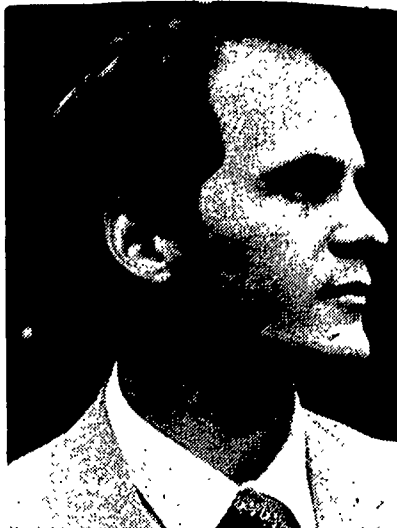

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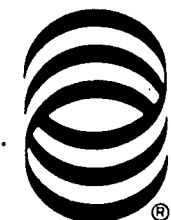

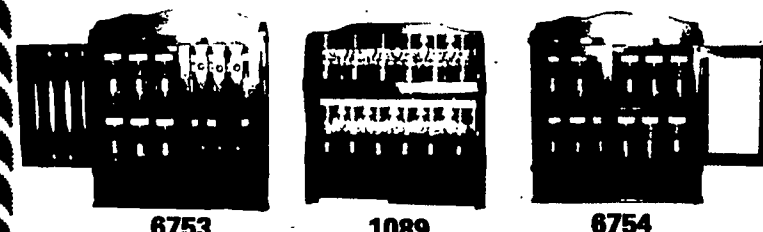

## New Burglary law

### Two arrested after battling Police

A 23 year old Skokie man and a 20 year old Skokie woman were arrested after a melee Sunday when the men battled 4 Niles and Morton Grove policemen who tried to quell the Skokian's fighting.

Early Sunday evening the offender double-parked his car in front of the Petit Palais restaurant, 7003 Milwaukee ave. Inside the restaurant he was asking waitresses to sign a cast he was wearing. When store Manager Spiro Karahalios asked him to leave the waitresses alone the offender told the manager to call the police. After calling Niles Police Karahalios was slapped in the face by the offender who then left in a taxi cab.

Three hours later he returned to the Petit Palais and proceeded to chase the manager around the restaurant and again fled before police arrived.

Niles police sergeant Katsoulas spotted the offender and his woman friend at 8124 Elizabeth. Three additional Niles officers and one Morton Grove police officer arrived. When the woman emerged from the car a small brown bottle was visibly seen in her possession. When a police officer asked what was in the bottle she said, "Speed"; and was promptly handcuffed. When her male friend was charged with battery he began fighting with police officers. He bit the right thumb of one officer, hit and kicked him in the arm, hit another officer in the eye with the cast he was wearing, also punching him in the head and stomach, kicked a third officer in the groin and kicked the 4th officer in the right leg. He then hit his head on the corner of the police car cutting his eye and, while falling, dragged two police officers down with him.

During the scuffle a plastic bag of black capsules fell from his person.

As he was apprehended and taken to the police station he continued fighting police officers kicking still another officer in the groin. He struggled from the time he left the police vehicle until he was placed in the lock-up.

The Skokie resident was later transferred to Lutheran General Hospital for medical treatment. His bond was later set at \$20,000. The young woman's bond was set at \$1,000. He received 3 charges for aggravated battery, 3 charges for resisting arrest and 3 charges for battery. Both persons were charged with possession of controlled substances.

Governor James R. Thompson announced Friday, Aug. 21 that he had signed legislation that raises the penalty for residential burglary.

"Burglars should think twice about burglarizing a home now, knowing they could go to prison for twice the length of time that the state law currently calls for," Senate Bill 214 toughens the penalty from a Class 2 felony, which carries a three-year to seven-year prison term, to a Class 1 felony, which calls for four years to 15 years in prison.

The crime also would be non-probationable. The legislation, which takes effect January 1, 1982, was sponsored by Senator John Davidson and Representative Irv Smith, both of Springfield.

### Drive safety hints for returning school children

School is starting soon and I urge all drivers to watch for children when approaching school zones.

Be especially alert for small children, as they are often unpredictable in their actions and difficult to see.

Signs which warn of school areas and crossings are extremely important. Shaped like an old schoolhouse, they warn of school buildings or grounds next to the roadway, or established school crossings ahead.

A school crossing sign is erected at the crosswalk, or where there are school crossing signals. Slow down, watch carefully, and be prepared to stop. Remember, schools may hold classes at different hours, and many schools hold activities at night.

School speed limit signs are used in areas where a reduced speed zone for a school area has been established. The speed regulation applies only on school days when children are present or a beacon is flashing.

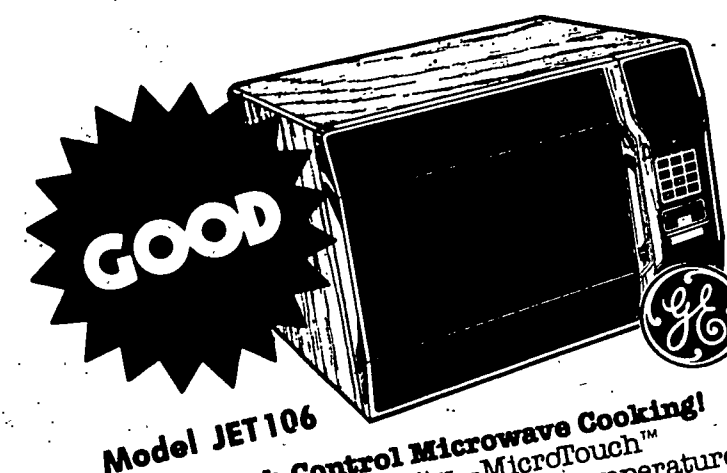
#### Niles 7-Park Ridge 2

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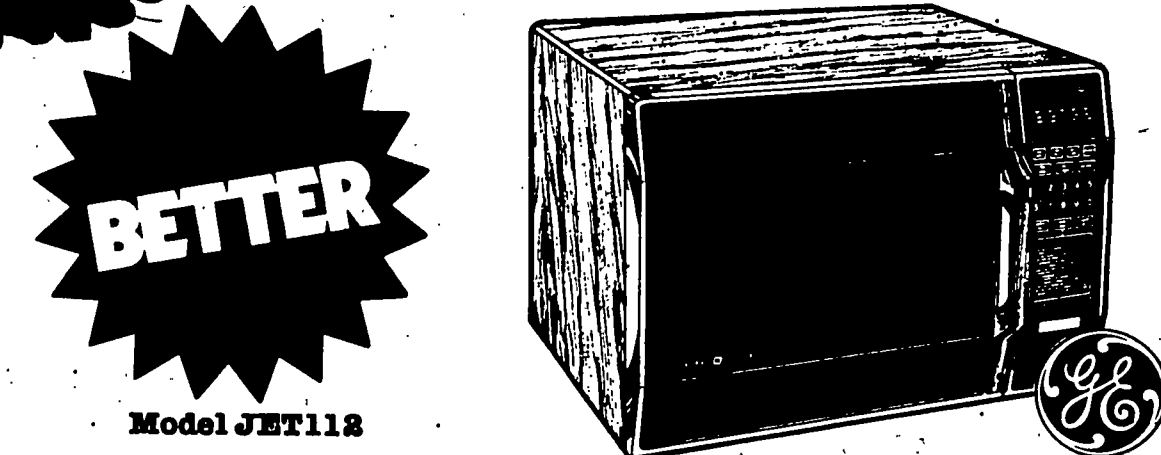
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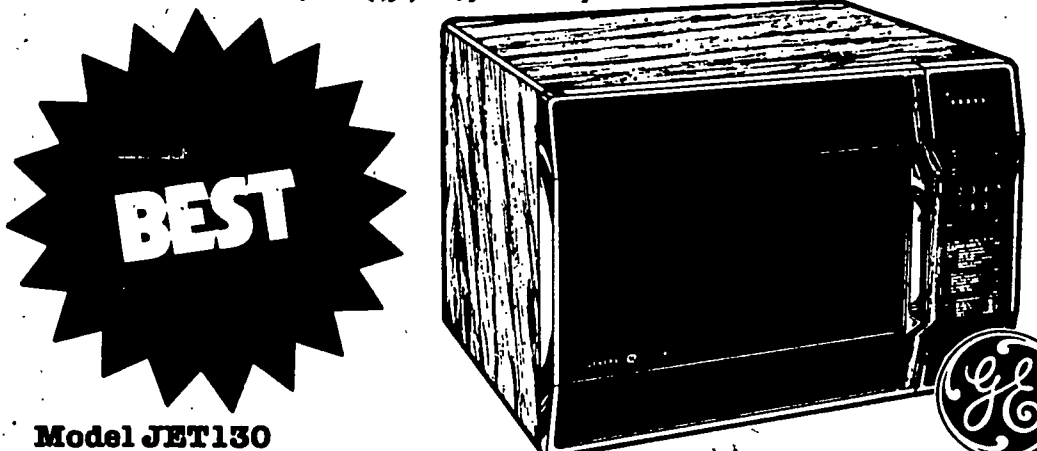
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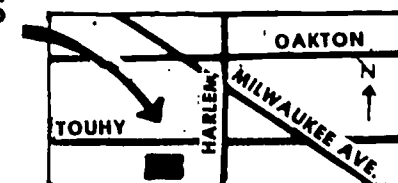
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## Pony AAA round robin tournament

## Vaccinate students now

In the rush to accumulate all the items needed to get your children back to school, don't overlook the one thing that may be more important to your children's well-being than loose leaf paper and ball point pens - getting their shots.

Immunizations - vaccinations - baby shots - whatever you call them, the state health department urges you to protect your children against diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, polio, measles and rubella.

These immunizations are required by state law before a child can enter an Illinois school. But, you shouldn't wait until your child is of school age before the shots are started. Polio, diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough immunizations should be started when your child is two or three months old. Measles, mumps, and rubella shots should be given at 15 months. A shot for

mumps is not required for school entrance but is advised by the state health department.

A child is fully immunized if he or she had three DPT shots and two DPT boosters, four doses of oral polio vaccine, one measles immunization and one rubella vaccination.

Since 1967, the Illinois School Code has required that all school-age children be fully immunized.

Lack of money need not prevent any child from having immunizations. Local health departments, county nurses and Visiting Nurse Associations provide immunizations, either free of charge or a very minimal cost.

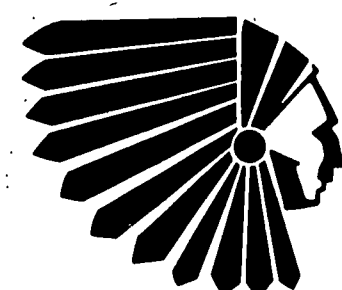

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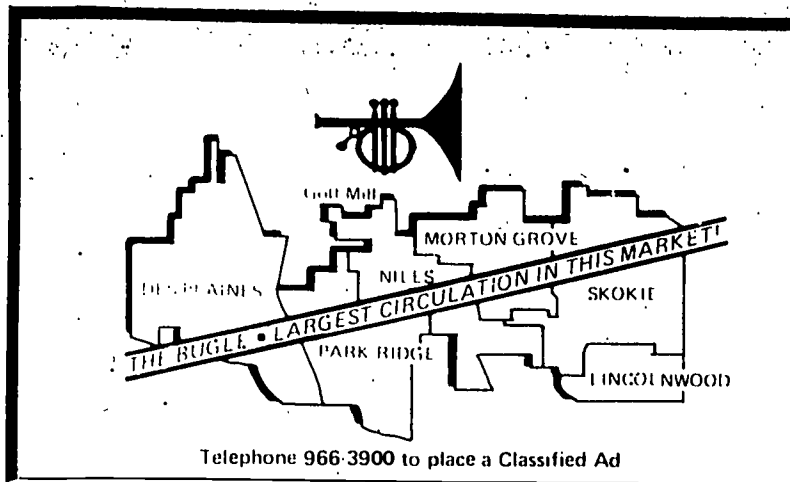

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The family of chemicals is chlorofluorocarbons, or CFCs. First discovered in the 1920s, they are used widely as a refrigerant in air conditioners and refrigerators and in the production of many frozen foods. They are also used to make lightweight flexible foam for cushioning, packaging, mattresses and furniture, and rigid foam insulation for homes.

CFC-based solvents are used where high-reliability cleaning is essential, such as electronic equipment for America's space programs and cardiac pacemakers.

Another important use of the chemical is to sterilize, hospital and medical equipment safely.

In all, there are approximately 260,000 domestic business locations which use CFCs, reports the Alliance for Responsible CFC Policy, a national coalition of CFC users and producers. The annual value of goods and services which depend to some extent upon CFCs exceeds \$28 billion.

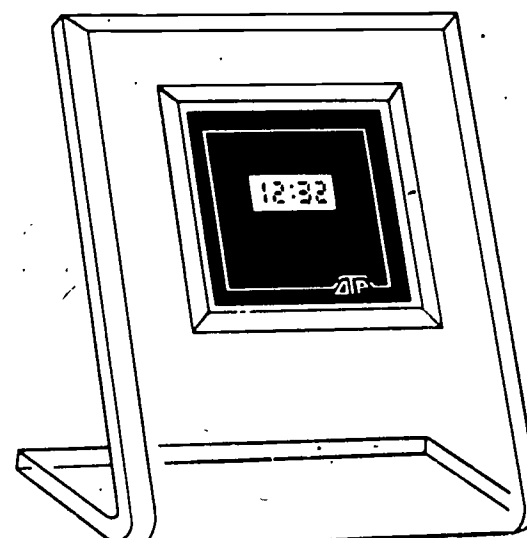
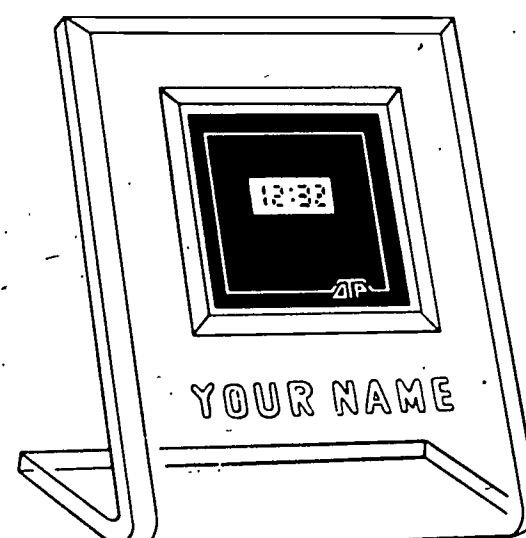

## Holy Family relocates Cardiac Rehab Department

Holy Family's Cardiac Rehabilitation Department has been relocated to newly remodeled quarters on the ground floor of the Mother Frances Pavilion.

The move enables the department to be closer to several related service areas for the convenience of patients. These services include Electrocardiogram (EKG), which takes readings of heart activity, and Non-Invasive Cardiology, which performs tests on the heart without the use of injections.

The Cardiac Rehab Department, which was one of the first in the Northwest Suburbs when it opened in 1977, is designed to reduce the physical and psychological impact of heart disease through a comprehensive recovery and prevention program. In the educational facet of the program, group and individual classes are held in the

hospital on topics such as cardiac anatomy and physiology, medications and the control of "risk factors" which can lead to heart problems.

The other facet of the program is progressive exercise—a key step in strengthening the body's cardiovascular system. Patients start with low-intensity bed exercises while inpatients at Holy Family. They progress gradually until they may begin exercising on an outpatient basis on bicycles, treadmills, rowing machines and other types of equipment in the department.

Patients' heart beat and blood pressure are closely monitored throughout the program and a personalized exercise prescription is developed for each participant. Exercise sessions at the hospital are reduced as patients gradually increase their exercise at home.

In other business, village engineer Bill Mottweiler reported on what he termed "the two horrendous storms" which hit the area recently. He said his office appreciates phone calls so they know where the main flooding problems are and they are then plotted on the village map.

Mottweiler encouraged residents to pressure their legislators to extend the deep tunnel and reservoir projects through Morton Grove before funds are curtailed.

Mottweiler hoped that residents were aware that since June 15, 1979, Morton Grove has participated in the federal flood insurance program which allows homeowners to participate in such coverage. Residents who experienced storm damage should contact their individual agents.

Mr. Lee Brandsma of Glen Golf Disposal addressed the village board with a request for a 4 year extension of their contract. Brandsma explained that his

company will be selling a Municipal Bond Issue to help build a transfer station for refuse since the sight which they utilize in Des Plaines will be closing down in March of 1982.

He said Glen Golf will be making a large financial commitment for this facility that will enable villages such as Morton Grove to feel secure that their refuse will be handled productively and economically.

The board voted, however, to postpone a decision to give the village attorney time to research if the contract needs competitive bidding.

Also tabled until the next meeting is a decision on a cab fare increase requested by Randy Moss of the American Taxi Cab Co.

Lastly, six sealed bids for the now vacant village property by Lincoln and Ferris were opened at Monday evening's meeting. The board will be reviewing the bids before a decision is announced.

There is a lesson in this for us. We travel to Europe to see the things that were a part of our ancestors' lives—including portraits. Yet, we yawn and take little interest in preserving the things that help to explain our own local past. When the original Maine High School was torn down in 1967 citizens in both Park Ridge and Des Plaines woke up to what they had lost and decided to establish historical societies. Niles recently saw the need to examine its "roots" and established a similar society. Morton Grove followed suit.

We are approaching Maine's one hundredth anniversary. 2001 is no farther in the future than the Kennedy administration is in the past. My own professional career will end at that time and I am quite certain that I will look back on these next twenty years and wonder where they have gone as I do on the twenty-five that have passed since I signed my first contract. It is not too early to begin collecting items that will help us "put the story together." Dr. Earle was a big part of that story. Niles and the other suburbs owe him a great deal for his contributions. But the portrait is gone.

Great institutions do not lose sight of their past. If they do, their greatness usually evaporates. The Earle Portrait only emphasizes the problem that exists: Traditions help ensure stability and a sense of mission.

Has Maine "misplaced" anything else? Of course. A bust of Charles Himes, the principal who guided Maine from 1915 to 1936 and gave her most of the "anchors" that ensured her success and academic position as one of the nation's leading secondary schools, is gone. Gone, too, is a portrait of our last Civil War soldier, a man by the name of Meyer who lived to be a hundred years old, a celebrated guest on Maine's campus every year. The Honor Roll Plaque memorializing the names of the hundreds of Maine graduates who fought in the second World War was ordered off the wall and burned in the late fifties. "Though this situation has been brought to the attention of many over the past two decades a yawn has usually been the only visible reaction to the story. The celebrated trip to Washington, D.C., and the yearly trek to the Tomb on the Unknown Soldier to place a wreath of remembrance and gratitude on behalf of the students at the Rolls Royce school have also disappeared. These were not "new" traditions. They were scrapped by the Wiltse administration after some twenty-five years of existence.

Families wishing to instill in their sons and daughters a sense of the clan's past turn to the family album, the old Bible, and the scrapbook. Towns wishing to maintain their distinct personalities and sense of being "one of a kind" when growing up next to a city like Chicago nurture an interest in the old homes and see that the local school system conveys the legacy to impressionable middle school youngsters; discerning citizens realize that they must support the local historical societies by attending their meeting and keeping up their membership to say nothing of sending a financial contribution once in awhile and taking the children and grand children to view the artifacts—including the war memorial.

The loss of the Earle portrait underscores the need for editorials of this type. We prate about the growing vandalism every year. Why should we be upset with the vandalism caused by the younger generation when we are willing to tolerate and indeed support the credo of the Vandal of old: destroy what is past and live but in the present. That spirit is what removed the Earle portrait in the first place. That creed is what is responsible for endangering the links that anchor us all to those who gave us what we presently celebrate as being "worthwhile."

## Emergency Aid for the Deaf

Deaf persons who have access to the proper telephone equipment, will now be able to report fires and medical emergencies to the R.E.D. Communications Center, which dispatches emergency equipment in the five town areas of Niles, North Maine Fire Protection District, Morton Grove, Glenview, and Glenbrook Fire Protection District.

The equipment, known as the TTY-Deaf Communicator, is now attached to any of the five emergency numbers of these towns. On the receiving end, a Porta Printer II has been installed in the central dispatching office, now housed in a modern alarm room in the Glenview Fire Station. The printer, similar to a teletype printer, enables the alarm dispatcher and any person having the special type phone to communicate by written message.

The specialized equipment was developed some time ago after it was realized that deaf persons had no capability in reporting emergencies over the phone because of their inability to hear. The communicator was installed by virtue of a State Grant.

The R.E.D. System, which makes it possible to receive emergency aid based on the closest station response rather than geographic boundaries, was started as an experiment over two years ago to give the best possible protection and coverage to taxpayers, regardless of their location. The system has met with such great success, that it was necessary to move the nerve center to larger, more modern quarters from its former location in the Niles Fire Department.

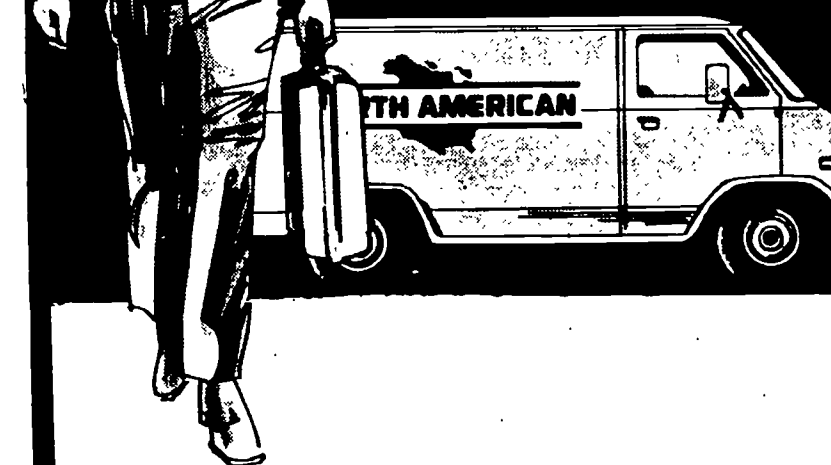

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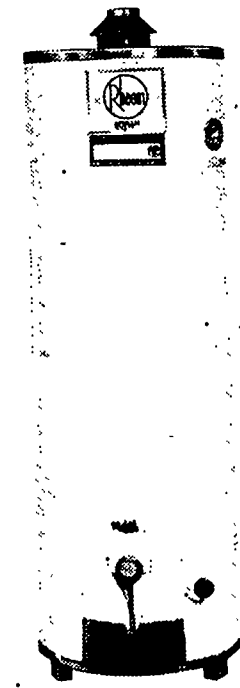


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
