The controversy shouldn't center around personalities such as Carol versus the village board. 

Niles Trustees' rebuttal on Cablevision choice

Dear Editor:

In a recent news release some questions were raised regarding the choice of a Cable Company for the Village of Niles. We will address ourselves to these points and why we believe that the selection of Cablevision is the right choice for the Village of Niles.

We, too, served for over two years on the Niles Cable Committee and we, as well as the other board members, studied all reports and proposals and traveled to other communities to observe existing cable operations in an effort to find the best Cable Company for Niles. On May 22, 1979, the Niles Village Board passed a resolution requesting the Northwest Municipal Conference to establish a committee to study the problems attendant to Cable Television in the Northwest Municipal area. The committee was to establish a checklist of criteria that are most important to the community but not to make recommendations that would preclude certain Cable Companies from entering our marketplace.

A consultant, Malarkey-Taylor was hired, specifications were prepared and eventually 14 proposals were received by the con-ference. The specifications dealt only in proposals for installation of cable systems from the cable companies, but did not specify the number of subscribers or franchises, nor the previous experience of the individual companies. Malarkey-Taylor submitted an evaluation recommending Cablenet, Cablevision, and Warner-Amex among the top five companies. Cablenet was the only company to offer a 5 year buy-back agreement while the others stood firm on 15 years which forced many of the other companies to withdraw from the conference. The Niles Board felt this was an important feature. With the 5 year agreement, Niles could cancel the agreement at the end of the term if Cablenet did not perform satisfactorily which influenced the Niles committee's recommendation that Cablenet should be the first choice with Cablevision the second choice. Shortly thereafter, Cablenet withdrew the 5 year, buy-back condition and returned to a 15 year agreement which eliminated the prime reason for considering Cablenet in the first place.



The inference has been made that the board made its selection solely on the basis of a pre-payment to the Village of \$500,000, and that Niles was getting an inferior Cable system, when, in fact, a number of very important considerations which will affect the majority of the Village residents, weigh heavily in our decision.

1. Cablevision is the largest and the most established Cable Company in the Chicago suburbs, having been franchised by over 26 area communities, most recently the City of Evanston. It is now providing service in 16 Chicago suburbs and among them are Oak Park, River Forest, Homewood, Downers Grove, and Darien. In these suburbs they are serving over 14,000 subscribers' homes. Cablevision's East Coast affiliates serve over 220,000 subscribers within the New York City suburbs. Cablevision is an Illinois company with local management in place and whose personnel have successfully experienced similar market conditions over the past 10 years. On the other hand, Cablenet, a Canadian company, only has 1 operation in the United States (Southwestern Cable TV in southern Illinois) in which they purchased 51% interest.

2. Our investigations, which included phone calls and visits to municipalities which provided service by Cablevision, showed a continuing track record of meeting their commitments to these communities as well as an extensive record of providing Cable service in communities like ours.

3. Cablevision was one of three companies which qualified for the final selection by the NWMC. It was the only company which was rated by the consultants, Malarkey-Taylor, as excellent in both programming and rates (which includes a \$4.50 basic service vs. a \$5.95 basic service by Cablenet) an area which will have the greatest impact on those residents who choose Cable Television service.

An additional McDonalds restaurant will not be built in Niles following the decision of Circuit Court Judge Arthur Dunne on Wednesday, September 2. McDonalds Corp. went to court to force Niles to issue a special use permit to construct a restaurant and five stores at Demoster St. and Grace Ave. Niles had turned down this request during a May 13 Village Board meeting in which representatives from area schools and homeowner associations turned out to voice their disapproval of the eatery being constructed on Dempster





Some people with arthritis or other conditions that limit motion may find it hard to hold a toothbrush. To overcome this, the brush handle can be attached to the hand with a wide elastic band or may be enlarged by attaching it to a sponge, styrofoam ball, or similar object. Those with limited shoulder movement might find brushing easier if the handle of the brush is lengthened by attaching a long piece of wood or plastić. Electric toothbrushes are of benefit to many. Careful daily brushing can help remove plaque, a sticky, colorless film that forms on the teeth and contains harmful germs. If the plaque is not removed every day, it hardens into calculus (tartar), a substance that can be removed only by a dentist or dental hygienist. The buildup of plaque and tartar can lead to gum disease, in which the normally pink gums begin to redden, swell, and occasionally bleed.

Even though brushing is the most important means of removing film and food particles from the mouth, there are many places a toothbrush cannot reach. To remove germs and pieces of food from between the teeth and near the gum line, dentists recommend daily "flossing" with dental floss. A dentist or dental hygienist can instruct you in its proper use.

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District 64 receives Federal funds for Math program

Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 is a government program which was developed to provide finan-cial assistance to meet educational needs of children. It addresses itself specifically to the educationally disadvantaged child who has a need for extra help even though he may not be eligible for special education. This year, as in the last two years, District 64 applied for, and was granted, funds under the Title I provision. Our project has been written to provide help in arithmetic. Based on the federal

regulation for Title I, only certain of District 64 schools qualify for these funds. They are Carpenter, Franklin and Jefferson. Children selected for the

program will be excused from regular classes to attend 30minute periods, 3 to 5 times a week. These sessions will supplement regular math classes and emphasize computational skills, speed and accuracy as well as concept formation. All Title I classes will be limited in size to no more than six children. Small classes provide more chance for individual attention so that each child learns at his own rate. Preand post-testing will be done to assess progress. Children will be accepted into the program according to teacher recommendations, past performance and past test results. Miss Barbara Bowers, has

been designated team Leader for the Title I Project in District 64 and will provide these services at Carpenter School. She will be assisted by Mrs. Barbara Frederick, who will provide the arithmetic help at Jefferson and Franklin Schools.

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



receive a median salary of about \$20,000 per year. Most of the personnel earning this salary have five or more years of college. Salaries for 12 administrators other than Bond were also approved with a median of about \$38,000.

Board members, although scheduled to ratify a tentative contract with the teachers, hesitated because a contract with specific language was not yet available. Barbara Korb, vicepresident of EMEA and a union negotiator, suggested school board members ratify the tentative contract as the teachers had done August 31. Board members complied with her request to indicate "intent" pending presentation of the formal contract.

The school district and teachers reached an agreement in eight negotiating sessions for a salary increase of 20.2% for the total two-year contract.

Several parents again complained of the long and hazardous route children must take to Twain school in order to bypass a stockade fence place by Courtland Square Condominiums on the east side of Western avenue north of Golf road.

At a former meeting, the school administration was directed to contact Courtland Square in order to obtain permission for installation of a gate and lock in the fence. The major difference between systems in the 2 communities is Evanston will have more time for programming. According to the Cablevision people, the 2 communities have different needs. Evanston has Northwestern University which it implies will require wider cable services than Niles.

We assumed the different needs of the communities means different equipment and studios will serve Niles and Evan-

The complexities surrounding the entire cable TV subject obscures the many facets to understanding the subject. In our office Marcheschi and Ottow explained how they went out of town and investigated on the spot cable TV operations in other communities. They devoted more than 2 years to studying the subject And they are far from experts. In our discussion with them, they disagreed with each other as to the requisites needed in acquiring a 3% return from fees versus a 5% return, which Niles will be eligible for. It manifested how complicated the subject is and how difficult it is to make a sound judgment in assessing cable TV's potential.

Cablenet was the first choice of 17 northwest communities that joined with Niles in studying companies. Cablevision, which Niles chose, was their 3rd choice. Niles passed a March resolution. which favored Cablenet. Just a few weeks ago Cablevision came up with \$500,000 upfront money which switched Niles into their network.

According to Marcheschi, after they switched, Cablenet offered \$600,000 for use in the installation of a tornado warning system.

The strongest argument in Niles' favor is there are 16 active Cablevision franchises in this area while Cablenet has only one, down south in Edwardsville. Marcheschi and Ottow also contend Cablenet was the first choice by the 17 communities, largely because they were willing to limit their franchise contract to a 5 year period. Subsequently, they changed it to 15 years, which Marcheschi contended was a consideration in changing Niles board's collective mind away from Cablenet, their first choice.

As we attempt to weed out all the chaff, we're trying to seek key points which should be the significant ones in reaching a sensible choice.

According to the cable people, Niles upfront money will be deducted from future revenues based on a 3% figure. Niles could be eligible for a 5% revenue return. This point seems worth exploring and one on which Ottow and Marcheschi disagreed. We were told in order to be eligible for the 5% fee, the money received must be used in the cable TV field. It is only our assumption, but if Niles takes the advance \$500,00 and places it in its general fund, it may not be eligible for the 5% fee return but will only receive 3%. The point should be clarified.

The studio, facilities, equipment and services should be the other areas to be compared. We believe this is where there can be a vast difference between companies. Less facilities should limit services. And less equipment and other services will decrease the quality of cable services to the community.

Ottow was a bit disturbed as he walked from our office. He told us we're out to sell more newspapers. He was angry. But we still have the echo in our ears from Friday, when Cablevision's own representative said it is a "trick" to hand out money upfront, it is not good business, and it is depriving future village boards of revenue.
