### Niles files suit against Chicago on sales tax

The Village of Niles filed suit Tuesday charging the controversial City of Chicago sales tax on suburban retailers is unconstitutional. Niles is the first municipality to challenge the Chicago tax. The Niles Village Board unanimously voted to sue Chicago on September 8. The suit

will be heard by Circuit Court Judge Anthony Scitillo. Village Attorney Richard Troy expects the suit will move quickly through the courts and be heard by the Illinois Supreme Court within a month. The financially strapped City of Chicago created the one per cent. Continued on Page 20

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### From the Left Hand

We telephoned the F.C.C. legal counsel in Washington Tuesday morning in pursuit of an answer to a key question surrounding cable television.

Presently, communities can receive 3% of gross revenues from all forms of services which they get from their cable television company. The 3% gross includes revenue received for installation fees as well as additional Pay-TV programming.

Communities can petition for a waiver up to 5%. The community must prove the present 3% is inadequate to meet expenses and is inadequate to meet programming the village chooses to be involved with.

This seems to be very important, and is being missed in discussing cable TV. There seems to be little chance a community can apply for the additional percentage IF the 3% revenue is not being used for offsetting TV expenses.

Since Niles took the \$500,000 upfront money, there seems no way they can apply for the 5% in the immediate future, since they wouldn't have any way of proving their revenue is inadequate. Had they not accepted the upfront money, they could apply quickly for receiving the 5% figure and much more likely prove their need for it. Additionally, by not being able to receive this additional 5%, they will not be able to program as much local TV as they would by receiving the full 5%.

### Niles Library adopts budget; approves Neyman's contract

Niles Library board members adopted the fiscal year 1982 appropriation and budget ordinance and extended the contract of Mark Neyman, library administrator, another year in separate meetings Wednesday, September 9 at the main library, 6960 Oakton St.

The recommended working budget will be \$869,286. The working budget of fiscal year 1981 was \$839,600 although only \$747,170 was spent. The appropriation showed a decrease of almost \$300,000 from \$1,373,625.

According to board president Harry Pestine, the appropriation reflects a "wish list" while the budget consists of the real figures in use.

Neyman, formerly of Marietta, Ohio, served 11 years as administrator of the Washington County Public Library there. He

has been with the Niles Library one year at a salary of \$24,000. A new salary has not been negotiated but is scheduled to be approved Friday, September 18 when the board reconvenes. Also scheduled to be approved September 18 is the tax levy which will not be known before that time. Continued on Page 20

### Summer rains, ice rink mishap cost \$20,000-\$30,000

## Flooding, Freon leak costs Niles Parks \$\$\$

Floods and mechanical problems have cost the Niles Park District \$20,000 to \$30,000 during the past 4 or 5 months.

At Tuesday night's park board meeting, it was reported flooding at TAM golf course this past summer may have cost the district from \$15,000 to \$20,000 in lost fees during weekends when the silt back-up and river flooding washed out golf at TAM. Commissioner Walt Beusse said there

is a need for the Corps of Engineers to dredge the river's bottom to prevent similar flooding. This has been a many-year problem along the river which has had public boards continuously seeking aid in preventing the wanton flooding of low spots along the river.

Commissioner Beusse also reported a Freon leak at the ice rink last week resulted in the loss. Continued on Page 20

### Public Works employee retires



Village on Niles employee Edward Clark recently accepted a retirement plaque and words of appreciation from Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase. Clark, who was Superintendent of the Public Works garage operations, has been a village employee for the past seventeen and a half years.

Clark, a life time resident of Niles, was born and raised in the village. His family were early pioneers in Niles, coming from England and arriving here in 1779, by way of rafts that floated

on the Great Lakes from Long Island, New York. These ancestors settled here by acquiring land at \$1.00 an acre, thru the Homestead Act. Clark's father was Mayor of the Village of Niles from 1932 to 1936. At one time he held five different public offices, one of which was Cook County Highway Commissioner for forty years. It was during these early years that Ed's father had the responsibility of constructing the first concrete road in Cook County.

## Bugle Digest Local News Briefs

The Niles Zoning Board approved zoning variations to allow additions to be built on two Niles homes during Monday night's zoning meeting. Requesting variances were Donald Lapin, 8201 Merrill st. and Albert Pieroni, 8619 Merrill st. Commissioners Angelo Troiani, Luella Preston and Board Chairman John Frick patiently worked with both residents altering their blueprints to bring the proposed structures into compliance with Niles zoning codes while still allowing for the square footage requested by the petitioners.

Niles Park District Director Bill Hughes reports that vandalism in Niles parks has "tapered off" since park board members began campaigning to combat the vandalism. Park officials estimate vandalism this summer may account for between \$5,000 and \$7,000 in park funds being spent for repairs. Park Board Commissioner Walt Beusse noted that vandalism in Niles parks this year was the worst he had ever seen.

The Niles Park District Ice Rink officially opens on Saturday, September 19. Located at 8455 Ballard rd. the ice rink will be available for area residents interested in hockey, broom ball and figure skating. Ice rink demonstrations will be held at 4 p.m. and a

## History of Niles finds home in Wisconsin

Once again the History of Niles has found a new home at the Hoard Historical Museum in Fort Atkinson, Wisconsin. The historical museum started in 1933, and first occupied a room in the basement of the Dwight Foster Public Library. In 1956, when the museum had outgrown its library facilities, W.D. Hoard, Jr. offered his twelve room house to the city of Fort Atkinson to be utilized as a museum. Since then, the Hoard family has continued its support in developing the museum.

The museum is a two story building with a new wing addition, it consists of two parlors, a reference library, hall, toy room, bird room, meeting room, and a gallery.

The first curator was Mrs. Zida Ivey, and since Mrs. Ivey's death in 1967, Hannah Swart has been curator. Mrs. Swart donated the information about the museum to Dorothy Tyse, author of History of Niles, Illinois, and requested that Mrs. Tyse issue an autographed copy to the Hoard Historical Museum.

The July strike by the Heavy Equipment Operators' has resulted in the postponement of four area construction projects until next spring.

Among the projects postponed was the repaving and construction of new street sewers, street curbs and sidewalks on Maryland St. from Ballard Rd. to Church St. Similar work has been put off on Courtland Ave. from Milwaukee Ave. to Church St. and on Caldwell Ave. south of Dempster St. Additionally, the roof on the water reservoir located at Touhy and Milwaukee Ave. would have to be patched so all four lanes will be open until next spring.

However, the projects will be rescheduled for next spring, according to Robert Kahler, Superintendent of Engineering for Niles. Also, there will be no additional cost to the village because existing contracts with construction companies will be extended through next spring, explained Kahler.

Agreeing with Kahler, Niles Village Manager Ken Scheel said the one year delay in these projects "won't cause problems." "I don't see where it's going to slow up anything. There will just be more work done next year," said Scheel.

## Court upholds Niles decision against McDonalds



The Niles Village Board decision to deny a McDonald's 110 seat sit-down and carry-out restaurant near the corner of Dempster and Cumberland was upheld in court last week. Cook County Circuit Court Judge Arthur L. Dunne ruled that the Village Board was correct in refusing to permit the building of the restaurant.

The McDonald Corporation, in 1980, applied to the Village for rezoning and a special use permit to build the sit-down, carry-out restaurant, with a drive-in facility, along with five other adjacent retail stores. After being denied permission by the village, the McDonald Corporation filed suit in the Circuit Court of Cook

### FALL GARDENING - START A COMPOST PILE

Compost is well rotted organic matter with a pleasant earthy smell that can improve any garden soil. It's easy to make and free. Many things can be used to contain the pile such as snow fencing, garbage cans, plastic trash cans, and bricks. Save fruit and vegetable scraps, leaves, grass clippings and weeds. Spread the organic matter in a layer. Cover with soil, and sprinkle with a handful of a fertilizer. Continue layering organic matter, soil, and fertilizer up to 4 feet high. Dish the pile in the center to catch moisture. In a month or less, the pile should be hot in the center. Turn the pile each month to hasten decomposition. Rabbi Fasman was president of Chicago Zionist Federation from 1974 to 1976, and is currently president of Associated Talmud Torahs of Chicago.

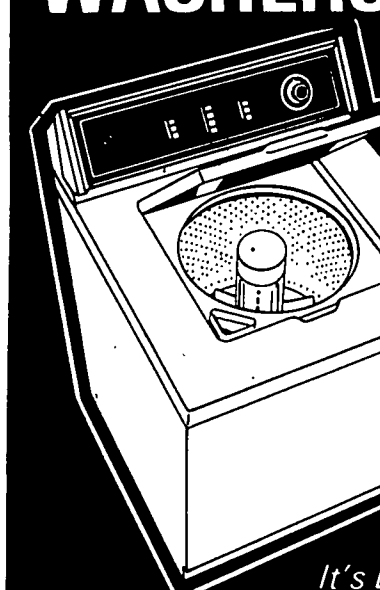
He is currently the rabbi of Congregation Yehuda Moshe in Lincolnwood.

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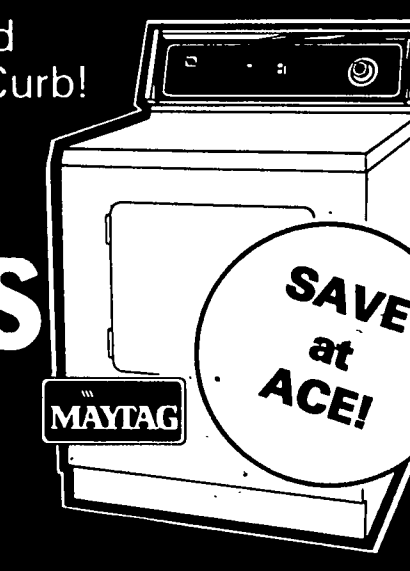

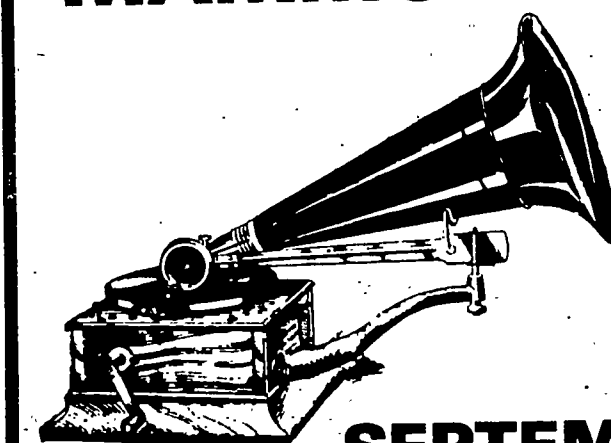

## New laws on drunken driving in Illinois

Drunk driving accounts for 1,000 deaths and \$5,000 injuries to Illinois citizens every year.

A new law (Senate Bill 457), signed recently by Governor James R. Thompson, sends a loud and clear message to persons who drink too much and drive, that beginning the first of the year, when this law takes effect, Illinois gets tough on drunk drivers.

Senate Bill 457 was designed to streamline the arrest process and will plug many loopholes in the current law. It provides:

1. Abolishing the 90-minute waiting period for a suspect to decide whether to submit to a test for alcohol or drugs, or both.

2. Increasing the penalty for first refusal to take the test from a three-month to six-month suspension of a drivers license.

3. In addition to the current breath tests, blood and urine may be tested to determine intoxication level.

And police officers will be able to test and process a single drunk driver in an hour, rather than four hours it takes today.

I am as concerned as anyone about safeguarding individual rights, but I am convinced the present law has gone too far toward that end, and as a result, has jeopardized the lives and rights of the millions of persons who use our roads and don't drink and drive.

This is the most important life-saving legislation signed into law in many years. We have taken one of the weakest drunk driving laws in the nation and made it one of the toughest.

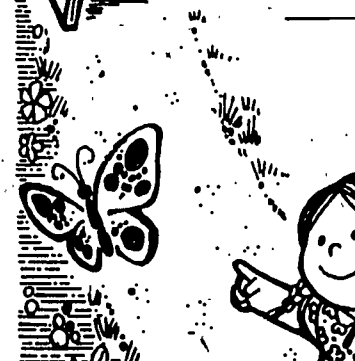
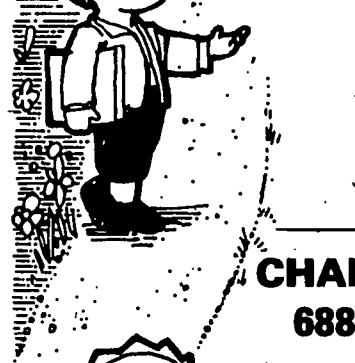
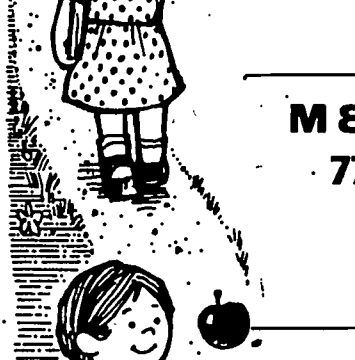
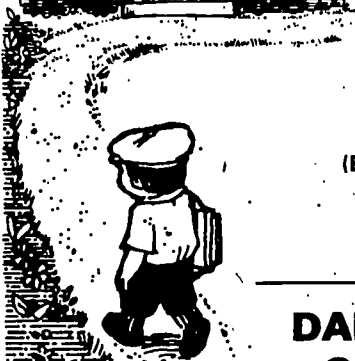
## What to do when you encounter a school bus

Now that schools are back in session every motorist should know what the law expects of him/her whenever he/she encounters a school bus on the highway," commented Captain William Burt of the Illinois State Police.

He continued, "Very simply the law states that when you, as a driver, come upon a clearly marked yellow school bus stopped, loading or unloading passengers, its red flashing lights on and stop signal arm extended, you must not pass the bus. The penalty if you do is a possible 30 day suspension of all driving privileges."

What about the following circumstances? You have brought your car to a stop behind a bus which is flashing its red warning signals. The driver gives you a hand signal to proceed but the warning lights still are in operation. "In this case," stated Burt, "since the driver has signaled you to proceed, you may do so."

You are approaching a stopped school bus on a two-way highway from the direction opposite to that of the school bus, which has its flashing red lights in operation. Burt answered, "You must stop since this is required of motorists when overtaking or meeting a school bus from either direction, except where lanes of the highway are separated in the center by a median strip which is not surfaced or suitable for vehicular traffic."

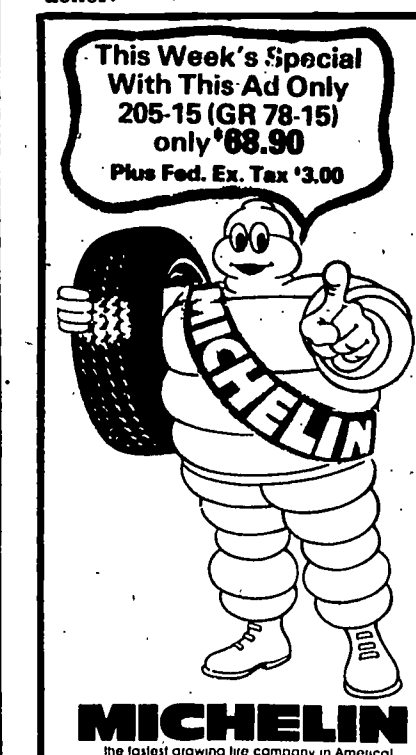
## Blood Drive at E.P.L.C.

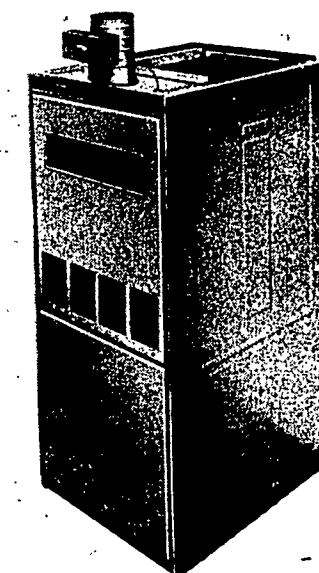

of 2,500 pounds of Freon. It costs \$3 per pound which resulted in a dollar loss of \$7,500. Beusse noted it was a "freak accident" and assumed a valve opened and closed automatically resulting in the leak. A thorough search for the leak was never found. He said no pipes were broken under the ice area and "ice has been holding since Wednesday".

In other action the Schreiner Gym will have a new maplewood gym floor this winter.

Park director Bill Hughes was authorized to have specs drawn up for the new gym floor which is estimated to cost between \$25,000 and \$39,000. Bids are expected to go out by October and come in by November. The gym will be shut-down for 2½ weeks and it is expected the floor should be ready

for use by December.

The 10 year old gym has a cement floor with asphalt tile on it. Commissioner Walt Beusse told The Bugle sleepers (wood slats) will be placed between the tile and the new wooden floor and clips will be used in attaching the floor. Beusse noted while the quality of the floor would be the same, the color of the wood can change the bid price by several thousand dollars.

It was announced the assessed valuation of the park district has increased 18% to \$289,006.351.

Cmr. Heinen reported park money investments have drawn between 16¼% and 17¼% interest during the past month.

Completion of work in installation of the 4 ton air conditioner at TAM golf course's clubhouse will be completed this week. Beusse reported they are looking for an enclosure for the conditioner. He also reported a foyer is needed for the west door.

Beusse reported nothing has yet been decided about the game room at the Grennan Heights Recreation Center. However, he did say after the new gym floor

has been installed, a storage area will be needed to protect the mats at the center.

The park board is seeking the use of the Oak School library and gymnasium in exchange for the estimated \$14,000 of services the park board contends it gives to District 63 schools in maintaining their Gemini, Nelson, and Oak school grounds. No action has yet come from the school board.

It was reported it was a quiet month for vandalism in the district.

Golfers have dug deep divots in the ground in Greenwood Park.

Beusse reported there has been "a lot of response" to the upcoming ice hockey program. He said new programs include the Rangers using the rink this season plus Oakton College's use for skating lessons and for its physical education program. He noted the Chippewas will also use the ice for 10 Friday afternoon programs.

The park board is looking intensely for a new lighting system at the ice rink, perhaps changing the light fixtures.

161 responses have been received from senior citizens regarding their "wants" for park programs. The report on the compilation of the questionnaires will be reported at the next regular park board meeting.

There will be an open day at the ice rink Sunday, September 19. Free public skating will be from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. Free figure skating, demonstrations of figure skating, hockey and broom ball will take place from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. An open house reception will take place from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m.

Director Bill Hughes reported a diligent job has been done in promoting a soccer program for the upcoming season. The district has 93 registered youngsters in grades 3 thru 6 and 56 young people in grades 1 and 2. Hughes said Nelson School already has 2 teams and many other students have come from St. John Brebeuf and other public schools. He said only Niles Elementary School has not been active in promoting the program. Hughes noted the park district is most anxious to start the program with the younger children because of their potential of staying with the program thru their school years.

## Lower non-summer electricity charges in effect

Commonwealth Edison's 2.7 million residential customers began receiving a 19 percent decrease in kilowatt-hour charges for billing periods beginning after Monday, September 14. All residential customers will be phased into the lower 5.75-cents-per-kwh rate by October 13.

The lower non-summer rate will remain in effect for eight months. This follows four months of billing at the higher summer rate. Beginning July 6, the rate was 7.07-cents-per-kwh.

The four-month summer period charges the higher costs of producing electricity at that time of year. Summer peak loads create the need for investment in new facilities and require the use of existing high operating cost equipment.

Heavy use of air conditioning is the major but by no means only reason for higher customer demand in summer. The cost of producing electricity in summer is higher regardless of how the

electricity is used — for fans, dehumidifiers, refrigeration equipment — or air conditioners. All electricity use contributes to the peak load. Surveys indicate, however, that about 80 percent of all residences in northern Illinois have some type of air conditioning.

As the four-month summer period ends, residential rates do not "return to normal," as some customers erroneously believe. When the Illinois Commerce Commission instituted seasonal rates in 1979, the non-summer rate was set below the existing year-round rate, so the average customer would pay the same amount over the year as he would pay without seasonal rates. This rewards those customers who use electricity wisely during the summertime and/or do not have air conditioning. These customers pay less than they would if a level year-round charge were still in effect. On the other hand, customers who use large amounts of electricity in summer, because of air conditioning or other reasons, pay more on an annual basis to reflect the higher cost of producing electricity in summer.

The service tax, the constitutionality of which is currently being decided by the Illinois Supreme Court, requires professionals conducting business in Chicago to pay a one per cent tax on revenue they collect in Chicago.

Niles retailer Martin Keller of Alert TV, 7658 Milwaukee Ave., has joined with Niles in the sales tax suit. According to Keller, the sales tax would result in "more paper work and more bookkeeping and I just don't want to do it."

Keller said he has both Chicago and suburban customers and, in addition to a store in Niles, he owns a store in Schaumburg.

A prolonged discussion followed the necessity of approving use of funds from the Working Cash fund to the Corporate fund in case of a possible deficit. The auditor and attorney disagreed with the auditor saying the board would have a "clearer status" of the picture after October and the attorney saying "legally" the transfer should be approved by a motion of the board.

The possible deficit is due to late return of tax money to the library. A motion to transfer funds was defeated by a tie vote with board members Lois Grant and Martin Hodes voting "yes", Margaret Rajski and Harry Pestine voting "no", and two abstentions by Irene Costello and Rita Breitbart. One board member, Josephine Buck, was absent.

Pestine reported the library received a ruling from the Illinois Secretary of State that library districts will be allowed to receive corporate property taxes.

The Grants committee reported \$11,000 received by the library in per capita grant will not reduce the tax levy from the State.

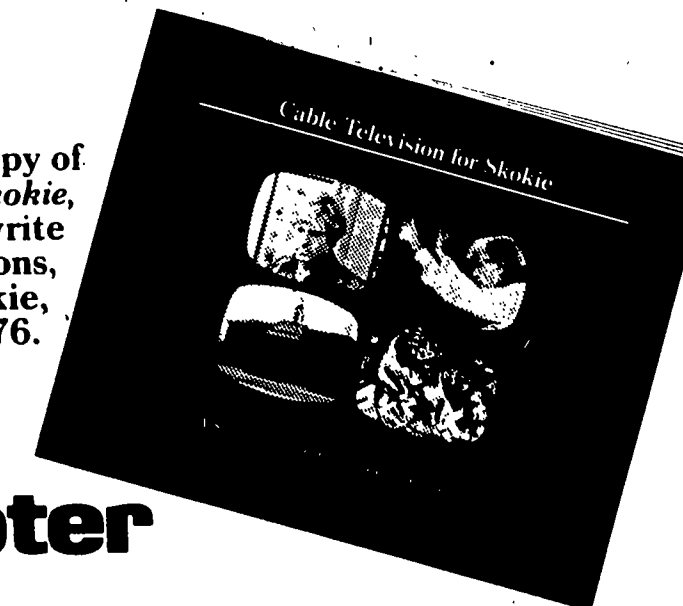

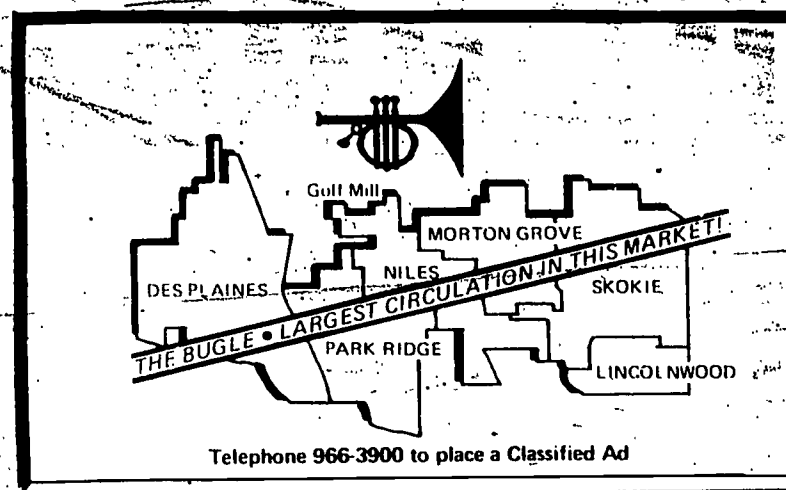

resident cannot come to the door.  
Under the current  
arrangement (with indoor  
meters), if the meter reader is  
unable to get in to read the meter,  
a card is left which asks the  
homeowner to read the meter and  
send the reading back to Village  
Hall. If the card is not sent back,  
an estimated bill is made, based  
on past usage. This process is  
time consuming and labor inten-  
sive and costs money that could  
be better spent providing im-  
proved service.

The outside reading device is a  
receptacle installed on the out-  
side of the home which is con-  
nected to the water meter through a  
one-quarter inch conductor  
cable. It registers water usage  
by magnetic impulse and does  
not require any connection to  
your electrical circuits.

There is no charge to the owner  
for installation, which takes  
about one hour. Home and  
business owners are notified  
when crews are working in their  
area and an appointment is made  
for the necessary work.

The Village of Skokie has a con-  
tract with Central Installation  
Company of Fraser, Michigan to  
install the remote devices. Each  
of their employees wear unifor-  
ms, carry identification and have  
marked vehicles. Residents can  
call the Public Works Depart-  
ment at 673-0500, ext. 328 or 271  
to confirm the individual is em-  
ployed by this company.

Village officials point to the ex-

County.  
Representing Niles was Village  
Attorney, Richard J. Troy, who  
commented that the court  
decision to refuse the restaurant  
and retail facility was predicted

problem. Troy, who brought in a  
number of village department  
administrators to testify in the
