Niles to begin checking trucks for overweight

The Niles Village Board approved on Tuesday night using \$50,000 in revenue sharing funds to purchase an industrial scale to weigh overweight trucks driving through Niles. The request for the scale, made by Niles Police Chief Clarence Emrikson, was

approved by the board unanimously. Trustee Peter Pesole was not present at the meeting. Emrikson said the scale will make overweight trucks avoid Niles streets which he hoped would result in a "tremendous" savings on road repairs caused

by overweight trucks. Emrikson added federal cut-backs will be resulting in more village money having to be used for road repairs in the future. The scale, which is 75 feet long, will be able to weigh trucks up to 100,000 pounds. Emrikson said

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Tax levy hearing set for tonight

Resolution finalizes District 63 bond sale

Board members of East Maine School District 63 approved a resolution pertaining to the closing sale of \$5,300,000 in bonds as approved at a former special meeting. Action took place at Apollo Junior High School, 10100 Deerd., Des Plaines.

They also approved the setting up of an escrow fund in order to refund the bond issue.

The one issue of three bonds would include \$1,500,000 for the working cash fund, \$1,700,000 for school fire prevention as well as safety and energy conservation, and \$2,630,000 for refunding.

Repairs or other alterations are necessary on the 11 district

schools in order to conform to the State's life and safety regulations.

A hearing on the proposed budget and tax levy increase is scheduled to be held at 7 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 24 in Apollo school. Sufficient taxes are necessary in order to fund bond interest as it becomes due.

Board members also approved a tentative two-year contract with the East Maine Custodial Maintenance Assn., the custodians' labor union, subject to approval of the written contract. About 27 persons will be affected with an average monthly

Over in Morton Grove the park board commissioners are getting a bit obstreperous with one another over advanced expense money given to commissioners for conventions. NI-Gas to give refund to customers

Northern Illinois Gas Company is refunding to customers a total of \$34.8 million including interest from NI-Gas of about \$1.4 million as a result of a recent U.S. Supreme Court ruling invalidating a Louisiana tax on natural gas transported through the state. The decision provides for refunds to be received by NI-Gas throughout the year and passed on to customers over 12 months. An average reduction of approximately .6 cents per therm in the purchased gas adjustment will be made to cover both the refund and interest. For the typical residential customer, billing for the next year will be reduced an estimated \$10 because of this decision.

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Bugle Digest Local News Briefs

Niles businessmen joined with Mayor Nicholas Blase last Friday, Sept. 15, as two busloads converged on the Daley Center for the filing of a lawsuit against the City of Chicago challenging the validity of the new 1¢ sales tax as it applies to places doing business outside Chicago. Judge Anthony Scitllo of the Cook County Circuit Court set a hearing for 2 p.m. Wednesday, September 23 (after press time) on Niles request to block Chicago from penalizing merchants for not collecting the new 1¢ sales tax from buyers. Niles was joined in their suit by Alert TV, 7658 Milwaukee as representative of the suburban merchants who are required to collect the city tax.

In a meeting held on Sunday, September 20 at Centre East in Skokie, Senator Charles Percy told mayors from Skokie, Wilmette, Morton Grove, Niles and Lincolnwood that the Metropolitan Sanitary District has kept the Chicago suburbs from getting the much-needed federal funds for flood control by siphoning all available monies into the Deep Tunnel project. Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase told the group that we have been getting "a 20 year rain every 2 years" and while we have spent millions of dollars in our villages to provide adequate sewer systems, the outlets are jammed and the water is backing up in our basements. The North Branches of the Chicago and Des Plaines rivers are incapable of handling severe storms in a short period of time. Blase charged the State and Federal government with "shortsightedness" by not providing outflow in federal and state controlled river outlets.

The Village of Morton Grove's treasury could be fattened by approximately \$77,000 as various rights and options are sold to ABC. The TV network is currently negotiating with the village for a made-for-TV movie about the recent adoption of ordinances banning both the possession and sale of handguns in Morton Grove. If the deal is finalized Morton Grove Mayor Richard Flickinger said the village could make \$35,000 from movie rights and options while he and the board members could make approximately \$6,000 each. Flickinger and the board members have unanimously agreed they would not personally accept any money for the movie rights, but would turn their shares over to the village. These monies would probably be earmarked for a special project.

While we're on the subject of movies, the showing of the movie "Skokie" has been rescheduled by CBS-TV from Oct. 13 to Nov. 17. The film which tells of the Nazis' attempted march on the village stars comedian Danny Kaye in his dramatic debut.

The State of Illinois is currently accepting bids for the widening and resurfacing of Austin ave. from Dempster st. to Beckwith rd. in Morton Grove. In addition drainage structures will also be installed.

With the resolution of the machine operators' strike, construction is once again starting on projects in the Village of Niles. The resurfacing of Courtland ave. from Milwaukee ave. to Church st. began Tuesday, Sept. 22. Storm sewers are also being installed on Courtland. Completion of the work, dependent on weather conditions, is expected this fall. In addition the storm sewer which has been dead-ended on the west side of Milwaukee ave. in front of Chateau Ritz is currently being brought across Milwaukee ave. for hookup with the storm sewers on the east side. Keith Peck, Public Works director said this should help residents in the Courtland Park area considerably with any problems they may have previously had with flooding. In addition Peck said the design of the intersection of Courtland ave. with Milwaukee ave. is being changed so that drivers can go onto Milwaukee ave. at right angles making it a safer situation at that corner.

East Maine School District 63 is planning to approve a tax levy for 1981 of \$10,178,905 after a public hearing which is planned for 7 p.m. tonight (Thursday, Sept. 24) at the Apollo School, 10100 Deed rd., Des Plaines. This is a 49 per cent increase over the last year.

Jim Bowen, Business manager for District 63 qualified the tax levy by stating the district was uncertain how much the Maine Township's assessed valuation would increase after the quadrennial reassessment next year and for this reason, were setting the high tax levy.

Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase sent a letter to District 63 School Superintendent Bond, Jim Bowen and the school board members noting the following information: "You are conducting a Public Hearing on September 24, 1981 to discuss your suggested increase of 49% on the amount of taxes to be levied in School District #63 for the coming year. Maine Township is going to be reassessed this year and if we accept the precedent of what happened last year in the Townships of Wheeling, Northfield, New Trier, and Niles, we can expect an assessment increase of over 30%. Therefore, if you levy a 49% increase in your property tax, it could well be that you will get all of the money that you are requesting, that being \$10,178,000, or an increase of \$3,361,700 over last year. This could raise property taxes on homes in our

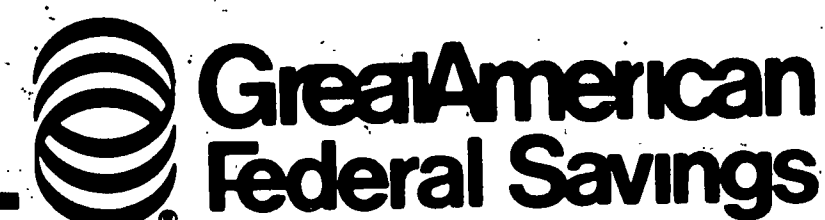

Unclaimed guns destroyed by Sheriff



Sheriff Richard J. Elrod views more than 300 firearms recently on display in his Daley Center office prior to their court-ordered destruction. The weapons consist of rifles, pistols and shotguns taken into custody by deputy sheriffs, primarily during evictions throughout the county. When a gun is encountered by a Sheriff's Eviction Crew and the owner is either not available or cannot produce required state and local permits, the weapon is impounded. It can be reclaimed when the owner appears at the Sheriff's Office with a State of Illinois Firearms Owner's Identification Card and a local permit, if required. Sheriff Elrod noted that the various police agencies within Cook County confiscate and destroy thousands of illegally possessed or abandoned guns every year.

Seat belts are life insurance

Strict enforcement of the 55 miles per hour speed limit has cut Illinois' traffic death toll to 1049 fatalities for the first seven months of 1981 from 1083 for the same period last year.

Captain Hugh S. McGinley, Commander of State Police District 15, would like to cut that death toll even more and knows how it can be done at no cost to the motorists. Statistics indicate that a national death toll of over 50,000 traffic deaths per year and a state toll of 1994 per year could be cut from 25 to 50% if all motorists would only use their seat belts. At present only 9% of the people riding in motor vehicles use seat belts. Here in Illinois that could save 499 to 997 lives per year," McGinley stated.

People always seem to find some excuse why they won't wear their seat belts. The most popular one is the misconception of being trapped inside the vehicle in case of fire or falling into the water. Accident records show that less than one percent of those who die in traffic accidents are trapped in the vehicle. In most cases the victims have been knocked unconscious by impact with the windshield or some other part of the car interior.

Another excuse is that I might be saved if I'm thrown clear of the car in an accident. Wrong! The fact is that your chances of being killed are almost 25 times greater if you are thrown from your vehicle.

Captain McGinley added, "In times when costs are rising daily,

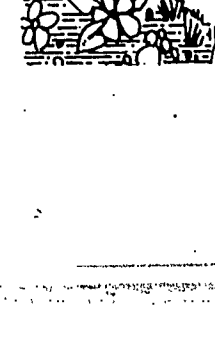
I'm surprised that people don't take advantage of the free life and accident insurance by just fastening their seat belts."

Tighten laws on drunk drivers

On August 20, 1981, Governor James R. Thompson signed Senate Bill 457 into law. The new legislation makes numerous changes in the Driving Under the Influence and Implied Consent laws. These changes will simplify the processing and prosecution of subjects arrested for Driving Under the Influence. The new provisions of the law will go into effect on January 1, 1982.

How is the Illinois State Police preparing itself? Training sessions will be held during the months of November and December to appraise all sworn personnel of the new procedures that will be followed. Plans are being made to streamline the DUI process. Copies of the new enforcement sections were sent to all personnel so they can familiarize themselves with it.

"The enforcement of this law will be a very high priority of the State Police. The passage of this legislation by an overwhelming vote, its strong support by the citizens of Illinois and the Governor's charge to us clearly makes vigorous enforcement of this law a mandate," stated Ronald J. Miller, Superintendent of the State Police.

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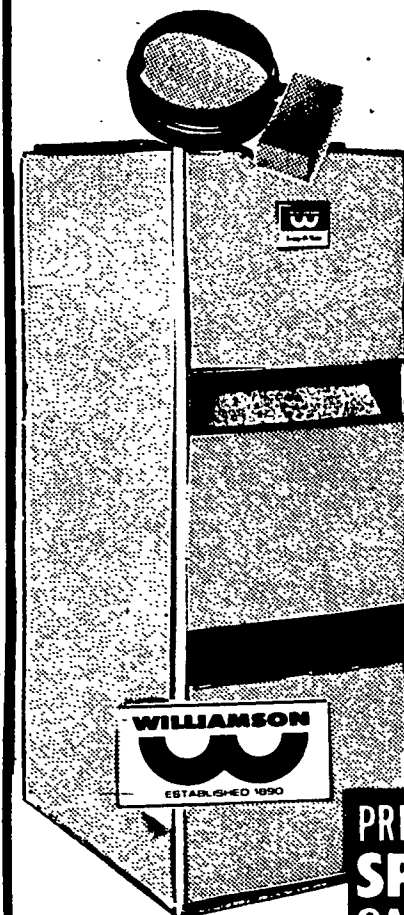

St. John Brebeuf Milk Program

St. John Brebeuf School today announced its policy for free milk for children unable to pay the full price of milk served under the Special Milk Program.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size and income criteria for determining eligibility:

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for Free Milk.

A letter to all parents was sent home. Application forms are available in the school office. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space for signature certifying that all information furnished in the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of Federal funds, that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable State and criminal statutes.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for free milk the family should contact the school. If a family member becomes unemployed or if family size changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application.

All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child nutrition programs, no child will be discriminated against because of his/her race, sex, color, or national origin.

Under the provisions of the policy, Sr. Rita Green will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he/she may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If he/she wishes to make a formal appeal, he/she may make a request to Fr. J. Edward Duggan, 966-8145 for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

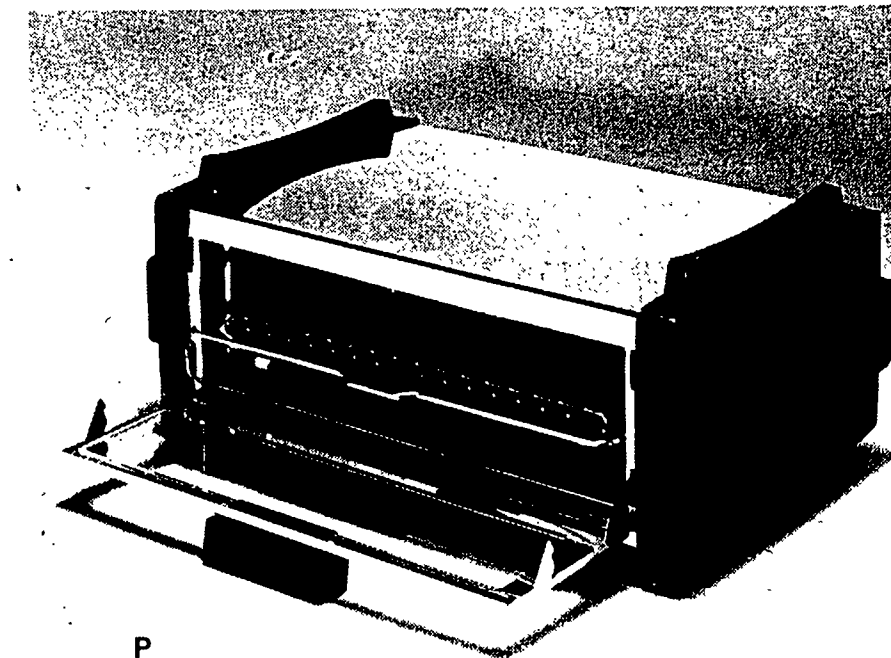

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Fishing license fees going up in Illinois

Governor James R. Thompson has signed a bill increasing the fee for fishing licenses, with the new revenue going toward support of the state's fish hatchery system.

"This measure, even though it involves a fee increase, is supported by major sport fishing groups across the state because it will improve the stocks of fish in our state's water system", Thompson said.

Under House Bill 197, resident sport fishing licenses will increase from \$5 to \$7 while non-resident licenses will be hiked from \$6 to \$12. The combined hunting and fishing license will be increased from \$11 to \$13. All of the fee increases will not take effect until April 1, 1982.

The Governor said the increases will generate about \$1.5 million, with that revenue to be used for operating and maintenance expenses of the new fish hatchery system.

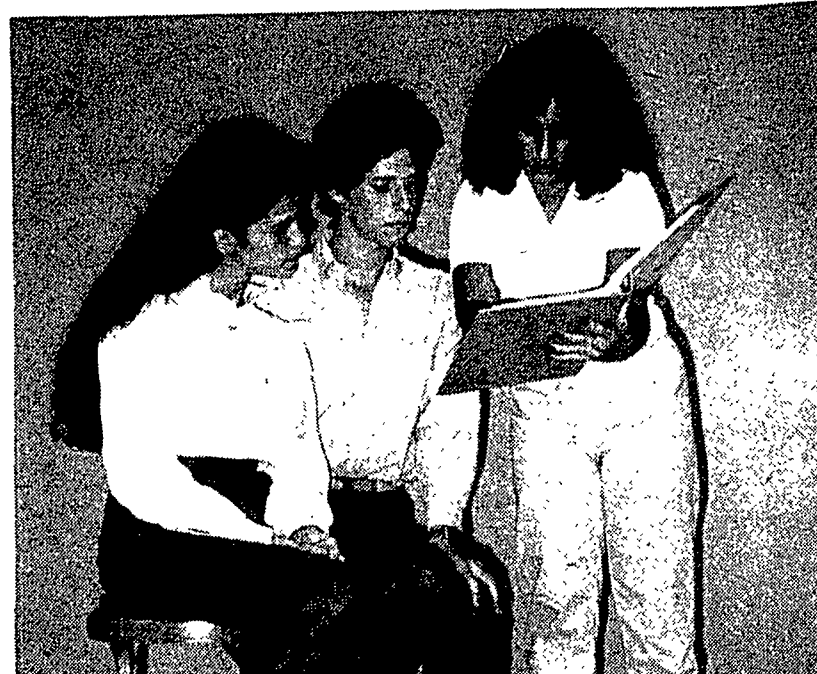

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for Free Milk or Meals.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space for signature certifying that all information furnished in the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of Federal funds, that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable State and criminal statutes.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for free milk or meals for them, the family should contact the school. If a family member becomes unemployed or if family size changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application.

All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child nutrition programs, no child will be discriminated against because of his/her race, sex, color, or national origin.

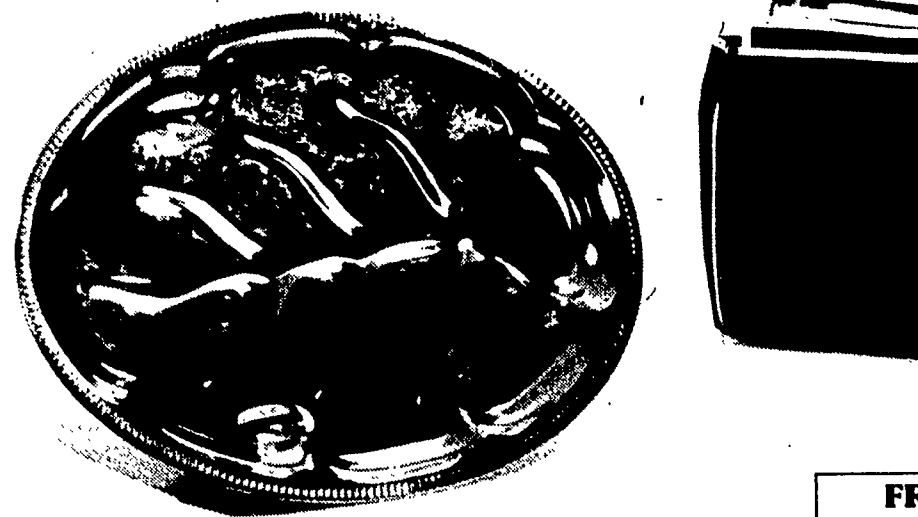

Nearly three-quarters of those students attend OCC/Des Plaines with the remainder attending OCC/Skokie.

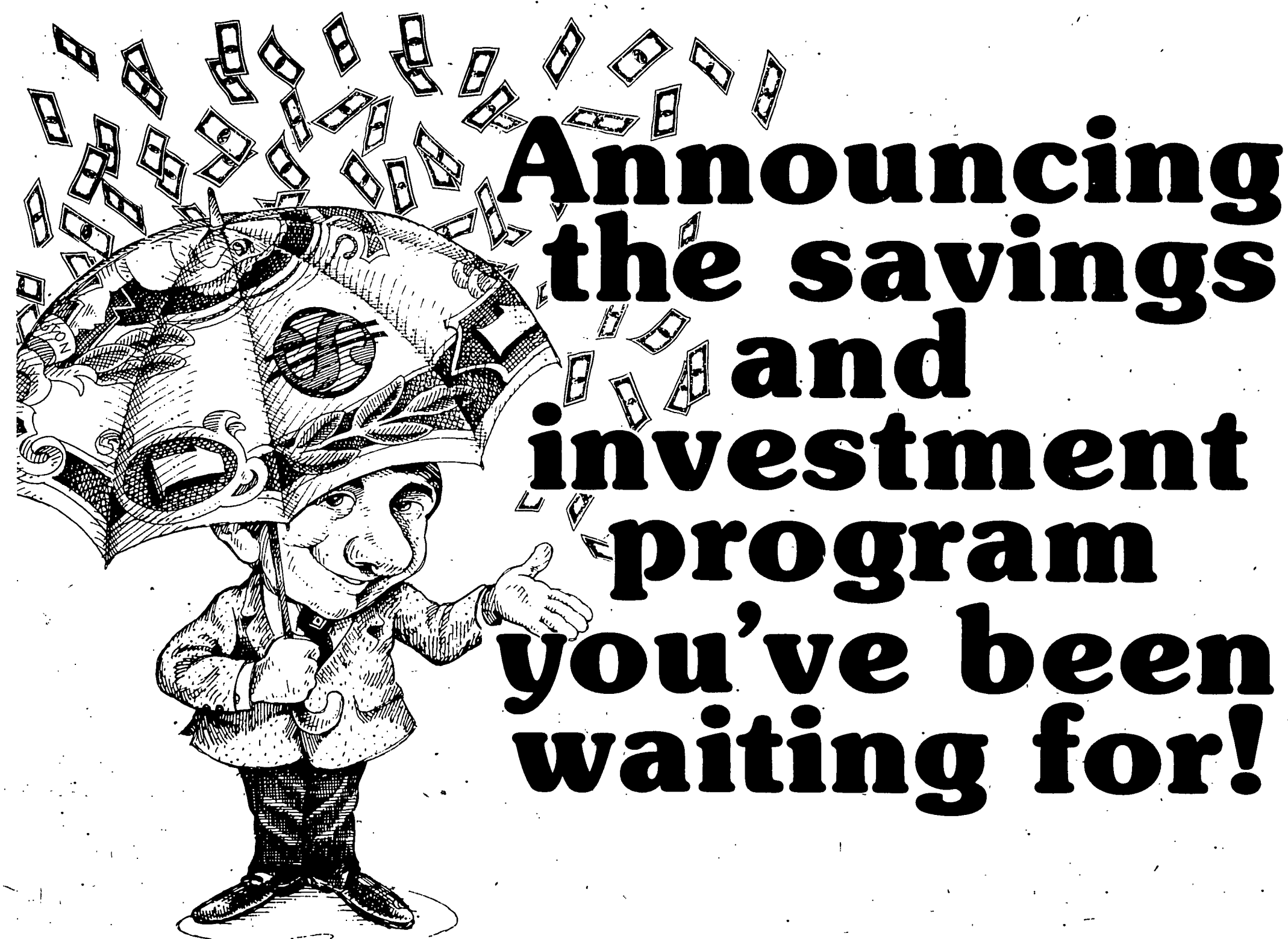

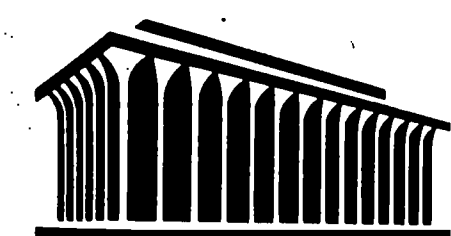

In the case of the village trustees they receive a stipend for meetings they attend. In Niles, village trustees upped their fee to \$2,500 per year after previously receiving a separate per meeting payment. Nick Biase went up \$1,000 to \$4,000 during the past year. On the other hand school board members and park board commissioners get zilch. In exchange for their weekly or bi-weekly efforts they get the glory of being called park commissioners or school board members and at times receiving a great deal of public abuse.

We've always felt park and school people should be entitled to a couple of these conferences a year. They make a tremendous effort over a 12 month period and should be entitled to a week's fluff along the streets in old Manhattan or amidst the sun-drenched palms of Bali. If they sign-in for a 15 minute movie or attend a brief lecture on How To Be a Better Board Member, and then skip the rest of the programs, they've still earned their keep for their week in the sun.

Village board members' \$2,500 a year puts them in a different class. Their lollygagging among the pleasures of life during convention time, while ole Joe Taxpayer foots the bills, seems beyond the realm. The 2,500 big ones means they're being paid for their services. Skimming off a couple thousand more on those hokey junkets means they're hitting the taxpayers for an add-on to their annual salary.

We're sure many public people do attend many of the formal sessions at these conventions. And for them, they may think we're way off-base in discoloring their efforts. But it's our rather skeptical view conventions were created by hotel, restaurant and booze people who wanted to sell their wares and found a way to

our own park district," and chastised Boznos for "making us look like a bunch of fools." He then proposed that his board be advanced expense monies of \$25 per day for state conventions and \$50 per day for national conventions, with members reimbursed for receipts over that amount. Voting in favor of the motion were Commissioners Eileen Coursey, Joan White and Piper, with Boznos opposed. Commissioner Dodee Connelly was absent.

Previous to the vote, Boznos had come under personal attack in letters read at the meeting. Mrs. White had sent a letter to Theodore Flickinger, Executive Director of the Illinois Association of Park Districts, where she described one board member as being discourteous to the others by surprising them with his position. She enclosed newspaper accounts of the on-going battle and asked for written support from Flickinger, which she received.

Mrs. Coursey had written a strong letter to the park board condemning Boznos for "pitting commissioner against commissioner," "speaking only when the press is present," and "probably seeking further office" through the publicity.

Boznos, saying "I feel I have a right to rebuttal since I am accused," read a prepared statement regarding the earlier correspondence.

Boznos said, "I was surprised that in her (Joan White's) letter she failed to mention the issue of the \$125 a day expense money which is my major objection to the convention appropriations."

"She also wrote that I have a 'record' of signing up for 'seminars, etc.' and not attending. The exact number...I have missed since my election is one...due to an unexpected business situation."

"This weekend I spoke personally with Mr. Flickinger and clarified my position in regard to these matters and he assured me there would be a further letter to

form a partnership with Uncle Sam, who allowed write-offs which made conventioning so much more palatable.

salary of about \$1,300 for the 1981-82 school year. Salaries for 21 teacher aides serving one-half time were also approved with an average salary of approximately \$7,000 a year. After board approval, secretaries will receive approximately \$1,300 a month.

there are currently five area scales which can be used by the village to weigh trucks, however, these scales are only available to police during business hours on weekdays.

Additionally, the village may eventually generate revenue from fines as a result of having the scale. Enrickson said Mt. Prospect, which has a similar scale, is generating \$80,000 annually in overweight fines paid by truck drivers and their employers.

In other business, the Niles Village Board approved a zoning change which will allow a hot dog only carry-out restaurant to be constructed at 6747 Touhy Ave. The planned restaurant will be owned by Jake Joseph of Jake's Restaurant, 7740 Milwaukee Ave.

In approving the request, the village will allow Joseph to construct 20 parking spaces rather than the 22 spaces required by zoning codes.

The Niles Plan Commission and Zoning Board previously approved the zoning request by a five-to-one vote.

Trustee Carol Panek voiced concern about debris from restaurant patrons littering the nearby forest preserve. However, restaurant officials assured the board there would be adequate trash receptacles inside the restaurant.

Also restaurant officials said there would be no area inside the restaurant or outside in the parking lot to eat. "Trying to assure concerned residents living near the proposed restaurant, officials said there would be no benches for people to sit outside and eat. Also there will be no trash receptacles in the parking lot which restaurant officials hope will discourage customers from sitting in their cars to eat food purchased in the restaurant."

Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase read letters objecting to the establishment of the restaurant, written by people residing near the restaurant, however, the letter writers did not indicate why they objected.

Trustee Angelo Marcheschi said he would prefer a business in that location than the boarded up gas station which is currently there. In approving the request for the restaurant, Village Board members voted 5 to 0.

The Village Board also approved the erection of a "No Left Turn" sign on Octavia St. east of Milwaukee Ave. across from the former post office. Area residents had complained that when making left turns from the former post office, now a private business, onto the narrow Octavia St., trucks had frequently been forced to drive over neighbors' lawns.
