## Niles wins lawsuit against Chicago's sales tax

The Village of Niles and 23 plaintiffs from the suburban business community won a significant victory last Wednesday afternoon, Sept. 30 when the city of Chicago dropped its effort to try to get suburban retailers to collect a one per cent

sales tax on goods sold to Chicago residents. Before Judge Anthony J. Scillo of the Cook County Circuit Court could rule on the case Wednesday, Corporation Counsel Richard Friedman representing the city of Chicago withdrew his

objections to the Niles' suit. The out-of-court agreement was the result of a suit filed on Sept. 15 by the village of Niles which contended that the collection of the one per cent sales tax in the suburbs was unconstitutional and a burden. Continued on Page 31

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## From the Left Hand

One of the problems of newspapering, particularly on local community newspapers, is the lack of follow-up on past stories. Because of the nature of coming out once a week, often a story published 7 days ago has little or no follow-through when the next weekly paper is published 7 days later. And often, the follow-up to the initial story may not take place for 30 days, after a monthly board meeting, which makes the sequence of the story seem unrelated.

Monday night at Niles Plan Commission meeting the Tam O'Shanter Racquet Club people wanted a re-zoning from B2 (Business) zoning to M1 (Industrial). This was the same racquet club which 2 members of the park board wanted to purchase earlier in the year.

At the time park board members were pushing for the club they reported they had to make a quick decision since the banks holding the mortgages had another party interested in the purchase. The impression was left here a quick decision should be made before the other interested party would take over the building.

We are now many months down the road from that initial plan. At Monday's meeting it was reported the club suffers from a serious water problem. Our reporter told us some of the racquet courts have been mired under water. It would seem correcting and improving the

## Niles Zoners hear petition for tennis club conversion

The Niles Plan Commission and Zoning Board of Appeals continued to Nov. 2 a petition for a zoning change from B-2 to M with 2 variations for the Tam O'Shanter Racquet Club, 7847 Caldwell Ave.

Gabriel Berrafato, attorney for the petitioners, Arlington Heights Federal Savings and Loan and Amalgamated Trust told the board Monday, Oct. 5 they were seeking to have the zoning on the property changed from the

present B-2 to M for conversion to a warehouse with offices. The warehouse space would total 61,500 square feet while the office sections which would be added to the front of the building facing west and south would have 10,900 square feet of space.

Berrafato also told the board, "There is a contract with an outside developer if zoning is approved for this building."

Friedoon Hakimian, architect for the project, told the board Continued on Page 31

## Homeowners exemption tax extended

Niles Village Clerk, Frank C. Wagner, Jr., wishes to inform all Niles residents that the homeowners tax exemption has been extended for all property owners who have failed to request this tax reduction.

"The reduction applies to homeowners and owners of a six flat-or under building and to be eligible you must have lived in your home or six flat since January 1, 1980," stated Wagner. "Requesting this exemption may, in effect, reduce your equalized assessed property evaluation up to \$3,000 which could result in a saving on your property taxes," said Wagner.

If you have not requested this exemption (the postcard form was mailed to all homeowners in March, 1981) you still have a time to apply, but you must request it now. For an application and for information contact the Homeowners Exemption Department at 443-7500.

# District 63 enrollment down 7%

D. Donald Bond, administrator of East Maine School District 63, explained in a report to board members official enrollment declined seven per cent from September 30, 1980 to September 30, 1981.

His report was made at a regular meeting in Apollo School, 10100 Deer Rd., Des Plaines.

Enrollment figures decreased from 3,373 to 3,332 including children enrolled in special education classes. State aid, based on the six months of best attendance, will also decline. However, the district will be receiving more money than expected from property taxes

because of an increase in the assessed valuation. The school district, at its zenith in 1969-69, had an enrollment of 7,345 students.

Dr. Lenore Page, in a second report, briefed the board members on competency tests in four basic subjects. She said testing will allow the school district to pinpoint its weaknesses in the district as well as in each school. Tests will also show parents where their children need help. Bond described the tests as "an excellent diagnostic tool."

Some discussion concerned the final outcome of the tests. Philip Continued on Page 31

## Niles outlines program to attract younger homebuyers

Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase, and Village Trustee Bart Murphy, announced on Oct. 2 the outlines of a dramatic new plan to attract younger homebuyers to Niles.

"We plan to use modern, marketing techniques to acquaint young homebuyers with the tremendous values represented by a home in Niles in terms of the house itself, and the community in which it is located," Blase said.

Blase said Murphy will direct the effort which will include the cooperation of Niles realtors and "hopefully, of financial institutions, particularly if and when new programs ease the mortgage money crunch."

"Ultimately, the program will be coordinated with schools, churches and key business groups, all of whom have a stake in telling what I call the Niles home value story," Murphy said. Because of that home value story, the Village can compete more than favorably with its close suburban neighbors for homebuyers. And because it is so close to the city while preserving its own, unique suburban identity, the Village is a very attractive alternative to the new subdivision which may be located 40 or 50 miles from the City's border.

"Niles' attractions are close to the city, close to jobs and industry, and taxes are low."

For the money, the house itself really can't be beat. Virtually, every home in the Village is of solid masonry construction - not the much lighter frame construction found in new subdivisions. That kind of construction can mean lower heating, cooling, and maintenance costs than other types of construction.

Secondly, we are an established community, not a giant subdivision without trees, sidewalks, and with little dif-

ferentiation from one home to the next. Our schools are built, our sewers and sidewalks are in, and our property taxes are among the lowest - only 52¢ per \$100 - of any suburb in the north or northwest quadrant. That's only \$52 for the average Niles householder. Even with the recent increase in the multiplier and the re-assessment of the northwest quadrant, Niles will hold its enviable reputation for low taxes.

"Just as important is the immediate environment. We have sidewalks, tree-lined streets, established shopping area within walking distance, and the only free municipal bus service of any in the northern portion of the county which runs routes throughout the Village."

"Our library, parks and services to families - like a free

counseling service - are unparalleled in our area."

Murphy said he hopes the mortgage picture would begin easing shortly. "The all-saver certificate and federal buy-back of older, low-interest loans from savings and loan associations should put them in a better position to offer good financing to new homebuyers."

"We, of course, expect that those institutions which do business in Niles to take a good, solid 'hometown' position," he added.

Home prices start as low as \$65,000 with the average in the \$85,000 range, so many of them are still within the reach of the first homebuyer, particularly if there is a parental help or two-income families.

Another market for Niles' homes is those who have built up equity in a condominium and are in a good position to switch to a single family dwelling, Murphy said.

Funding for the program will come from the federal revenue sharing funds. "This is actually a pilot, experimental project to see what, actually, can be done using modern media and marketing techniques to bring younger homebuyers into a 'mature' village," Murphy said.

## Community interest in children is a permanent investment

The arrival of a new family on the block and some very popular bumper sticker slogans have caused me to consider some of the things that made my neighborhood such a great place to raise kids and some of the changes that have occurred.

Although many of the services provided by taxes have increased since I moved here, there are things lacking now that my children enjoyed. Years ago, the neighborhood offered not only 2 neighborhood schools (next year there will be none) and a local park, but an active homeowners group that sponsored picnics, parties and even visits by Santas who walked the streets in the worst possible weather to deliver treats to each child. Now the street has more cars, fewer trees, larger homes with fewer children and no homeowners' group.

One thing I hope the new children will still experience is the feeling of acceptance that enveloped the children growing up on our street. We once watched a couple stop for 3 separate softball games as they drove down the street to look at a house for sale. That seemed to serve as a screening device over the years insuring

that people moving in could enjoy living on a street where children played an important role.

Neighbors not only shagged kids home who got into trouble, but they took the time to notice children, greet them, tease them and even praise them. I may be even more aware of the effect that such acceptance and care has on children because we have raised our children hundreds of miles from our nearest relatives. Over the years there have been literally thousands of instances when people outside our family have taken the time and effort to make our children feel at home in this community. Through their care, they supplemented the love we gave the children.

I think of those neighbors when I see a bumper sticker that asks if you have hugged your child today. I'd rather see ones that urge you to notice and care about someone else's children too. Parents who don't need to be reminded to give their own children attention and affection any more than they should need to be told to feed them. But we often do need to be reminded of the positive effect we can have on the children of a community by noticing them and giving them some positive attention.

We give notice to the negative - the vandals, the problems, etc. and although we can't ignore those things, there's a need to consider the everyday, commonplace accomplishments of youngsters as important too. As someone who supplies local papers with articles about children and their accomplishments, I wish more schools and groups would take advantage of the opportunity local papers provide to give youngsters recognition. When you pick up a paper in a strange community, as we often do on vacation, the accounts of Johnny's home run or the award Suzie won seem too mundane to be news. But to people in a community who take the

### THE "SILENT DISEASE"

High blood pressure or hypertension is a common "silent" health problem. Many people are unaware that they have it because they feel perfectly well. High blood pressure is usually due to two things: 1. Gradual narrowing of arteries due to build up of fatty deposits on walls of arteries, and 2. Decreased pliability or elasticity of the arteries.

A monitored diet is an effective way to control hypertension, but some people also need medications. Some medications may produce side effects (although not always), and people who take them should be aware of the more common side effects: -Diuretic (urine-increasing) drugs may decrease the body's supply of potassium. Symptoms such as weakness, leg cramps or tiredness may result. Foods containing potassium may help prevent significant potassium loss in most patients taking diuretics.

-Prazosin may cause hypertension, or a sudden fall in blood pressure when first used, that could lead to dizziness and fainting.

The Morton Grove Fire Stations give free blood pressure screenings from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m., seven days a week. Trained firefighter/paramedics can take the screenings when an emergency is not in progress.

And, interest earned in excess of the \$2,000/\$1,000 exclusion is fully taxable. Regulations require the loss of the tax exclusion and of three months interest on premature withdrawals.

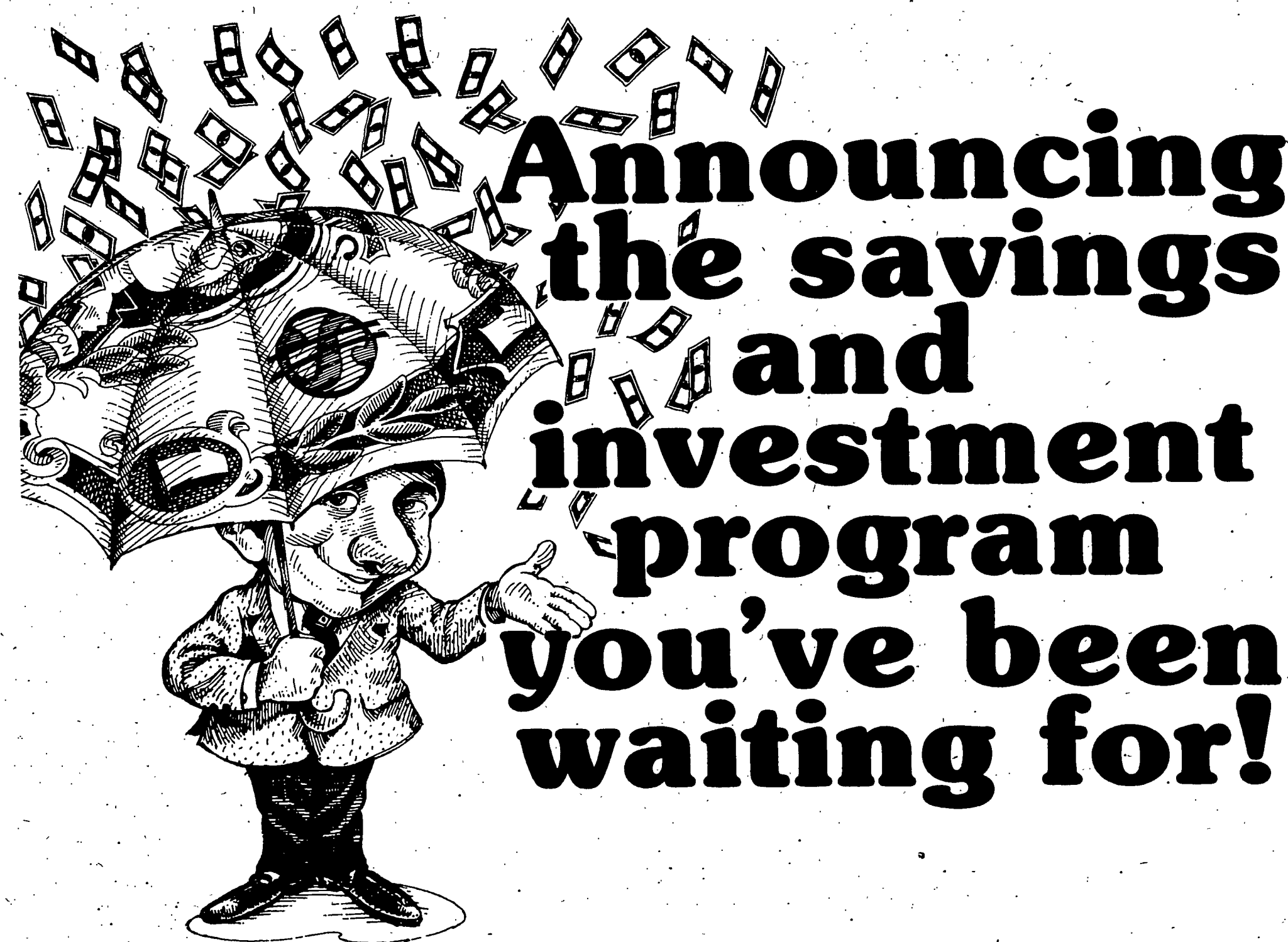

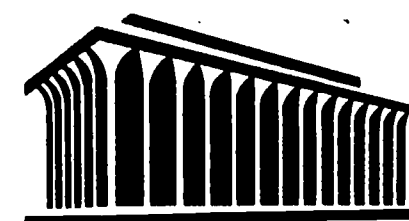

time to foster a feeling of concern for the children, that news is just as significant as the headlines or problems. It may well be an indication of what is right in a community rather than what is wrong.

I recently saw a woman stop a boy by calling out to him, "I saw your name in the paper!" She took the time to give him a little "emotional hug" and her recognition caused him to just light up and flash her an enormous smile. Because he was important to her, the news about him was important even though his accomplishment hadn't really been anything out of the ordinary.

It would be hard to over-estimate the value that type of "hug" has in a child's life. He becomes an integral part of a community that cares for him and hopefully he will grow up caring - not feeling, alienated and alone. It cost that woman nothing - no increase in her taxes, yet it was an investment in her community. Her attention provided him with a feeling our taxes can't buy.

The new children who'll be moving to our block won't have the benefits of some of the neighborhood spirit that I felt was so important to my children as they grew up, but hopefully they will still enjoy the feeling of growing up in the midst of neighbors who care about them; notice them and encourage them.

problem would require a substantial dollar outlay.

When the park board members (Heinen and Chameriski) were pushing for the purchase this water problem was never mentioned. Now, many months later this serious handicap comes to light.

We were sitting around talking to Building Commissioner Joe Salerno Monday afternoon about the possibility of consolidating all of Niles elementary schools into one school district. Several weeks ago Leila Selen had made this suggestion in a Bugle guest column.

The idea of keeping Niles school children inside its village borders and going to school in the same school district seems a credible idea. Unfortunately, it sounds good, but the dollar problems behind the idea make such a plan difficult.

Many years ago we spoke to the Niles PTA and dropped this idea to them. After the meeting one of the listeners told us we were "crazy". "Why would a school district like Niles district 71, with few problems, want to combine with other districts, whose burdens are great?"

In District 63 they've just recently floated a 5 million dollar bond. If Niles residents in that district were to join in a new district they would still be responsible for past tax liabilities. Thus, in addition to the new costs in a new school district, they would still be subject to paying for their former burdens. And how many residents would contenance such a double burden?

In Salerno's District 64 area the closing of Jefferson school in Niles will force these Nilesites to go to school in Park Ridge. How much better it would be if they could go down the street to their local school rather than to go to the next town to school.

They'd be fearful their present program might be diluted.

While the problem is not insurmountable, Niles' two township area causes another problem. Money coming into one consolidated school district would come from two townships. While the mechanics of the problem could be solved the resistance to it would be substantial.

The village of Niles does have a definite problem with the closing of so many schools. The demand for homes here should be less than in neighboring communities where schools are near the residences.

A committee of village and school people should sit down and consider the future. The village of Niles has too much to offer future residents. Yet, the lack of local schools may well offset these advantages. Nick Blase and Niles village board has rightfully focused attention on a problem which could be acute.

The Selen and Salerno ideas should be thoroughly aired. Perhaps from them may come a means for re-opening local schools.

den on all retailers. Niles and suburban retailers agreed to drop their suit against the city of Chicago in exchange for written assurances from Chicago's Acting City Comptroller, Anthony N. Fratto that retailers would not have to register with the city, collect the tax or remit tax receipts to Chicago.

In a letter presented to the Court, Fratto stated, in part: "...It is my determination that out-of-city retailers who sell tangible personal property over-the-counter, in which the buyer obtains the right to and the power over the property outside the City of Chicago, shall not be required to collect or remit to the City of Chicago sales tax on the selling price of the property nor register with the City as a tax collector with respect to such sales."

Deckowitz, board member, said, "I have always considered math this district's strong point. These results are dismaying." Bond said, "We are trying to get baseline data." Page explained a few areas may need more material to be taught well.

Essentially, tests would provide an individual record for each child, she said.

Board members again proposed sale of the Harrison street property, three acres located east of Greenwood ave. in a residential area. The district formerly put the property on bid twice for not less than \$225,000 with no minimum bid. Possible financing and sale by a real estate broker was discussed with possible action at the next meeting.

A representative from the village of Niles has told the school board advertising is being put out to encourage younger couples to move into the village. This would probably bring up the declining school population. Bart Murphy, Niles trustee and chairman of a committee for that purpose, communicated with the district to advise board members he would be speaking to individuals, instead of carrying out committee meetings.

Murphy came to an earlier meeting regarding the tax levy increase to ask why there was a

large increase in the levy when the school population was declining. He also said the village of Niles could not be run the same way.

Philip Deckowitz said he would like to see a restoration of some programs, especially citing art and music. Deckowitz also mentioned this at the hearing for the tax increase levy. Ann Sosrin said she would prefer children not have bad "splits", or teacher-to-pupil ratios. A lengthy discussion concerned previous program changes necessary to prevent a budget deficit now. Dr. Donald Stetina, assistant administrator, will prepare a report on the changes' effect on class ratios.

About \$332,332 will be awarded in contracts for architectural, mechanical and electrical work as approved in other action. Board members also approved work done on Gemini school to prevent further flooding. At this time, water drains into the sanitary sewer instead of the flood sewer and damaged pipe tiles are causing flooding.

Stipends for teachers to conduct lunchroom supervision, bus supervision, cheerleading, basketball, volleyball and instrumental music was narrowly approved by a 4-3 vote. About 20 stipends, at an average of \$100 each, will be spent.

While attorney Berrafato told the board they were seeking a 10% variation for the front yard and side yard, he was basing his request on the premise that the 25 ft. front yard set back was what they needed, but, in fact, was told by the board that zoning requirements for manufacturing which is located across from residential property is a 40 ft. setback for the front yard. Based on these figures, the petitioners were then seeking a 37 1/2% variation on the front yard which is not within the jurisdiction of the Zoning Board to grant.

Berrafato then asked for a continuance of their hearing until the Nov. 2 meeting when they will, in all probability, come before the board seeking the zoning variation under a PUD request. Under this type of petition, the zoning board can waive all requirements making this a unique development and rule on it as an individual case.

Zoning Board chairman John Frick told Berrafato \$1,150 PUD fee would have to be paid by the petitioner if they come before the board in November with the PUD request.

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
