From the Left Hand

A letter-to-the-editor writer in this week's Bugle questions Niles expending money to advertise and bring in young people from outside the community, to sell them about living here. She said there are many young people now here who would love to buy a Niles home but can't afford the prices nor the expense attendant to high interest rates.

The young lady, who speaks for many young people in the community, dropped in our office Monday and said she was angry at Niles spending this money when there were plenty of local young people who would purchase homes if they could receive help from the village. She reminded us next door community Morton Grove twice has received federally-backed funds which enabled MG to offer lower interest rates for prospective home-buyers.

We wondered aloud if the village of Niles might help to solve this problem. It is about to receive a \$500,000 bonanza from cable television which is an unexpected dollar bonus not previously received in past years. If this money was invested at 15% straight interest (not compounded daily), it would net an additional \$75,000 per year. Investing it locally the bank would turn the money over and make a substantial amount of money above the 15% since it turns its money over and re-invests it continuously. Niles officials could sit down with local bankers and tell them Niles will use \$1,000 for each of 75 young people who buy

Parents can help prevent drug abuse

What can I do now to prevent my child from becoming harmfully involved with alcohol or other drugs during high school years?

This question is repeatedly asked by parents who are becoming increasingly concerned about the impact of alcohol and other drugs on their children. While the reality of adolescent experimentation with, and abuse of, chemicals is too threatening for some to admit, most parents are aware that alcohol and other drugs are readily available to young people.

Recognizing the availability of drugs can be frightening thought for any parent, as well as the frequency with which young people must make decisions about their own involvement with drugs. Although parents cannot control the availability of drugs to their children, they can have an impact on how their children respond to this availability and the choice they make regarding

drugs.

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Bugle Digest Local News Briefs

State Representative Bob Kustra (R-Glenview) is either being kicked upstairs or voluntarily kicking himself upstairs, resulting from the new re-districting in the area. Tuesday, Kustra announced he will seek the Senate seat in the new 28th district. The new district is about the same as the former 4th House district, where Kustra previously finished 2nd in a 4-person race with 3 persons being elected. However, the re-districting has resulted in the breaking down of our area into 2 new House districts which will only be able to send one Representative from each district in the next election. Republican Penny Pullen, the top vote-getter in the past 4th district House elections, will be a likely shoo-in in her district. And in Kustra's House district Aaron Jaffe would be odds-on favorite to win in his predominately Democratic area. This leaves Kustra without a seat in his own House. Thus, his upward political mobility. He will vie for the Senate seat in the new 28th district. He could be opposed by State Senator John Nimrod, who presently holds the seat. But Nimrod has been like a ramrod, not yet uttering a word about his political future. Kustra's move upstairs might be a bit crowded if Nimrod runs again. If Nimrod retires, Kustra would score all the points with his kick upstairs.

The Skokie Village Board postponed deliberations on the proposal to award a cable television franchise until Monday, Oct. 19 in order to give their board members more time to evaluate the reports from their consulting firm, Cable Television Information of Washington, D.C. Board members voted 4-3 on Monday, Oct. 5 to re-open the matter in two weeks giving them more time to review the reports on the 7 cable television firms which are seeking the Skokie franchise. The consulting firm completed their report to the board giving Teleprompter Corp. of Chicago and Metrovision Inc., of Atlanta the highest ratings. The 5 other firms seeking the Skokie franchise are: Cablevision of Chicago, Cablenet, Inc., Centel Cable Co., Omnicom Cablevision of Illinois, Inc., and Tele-Matrix of Skokie, Inc.

The public auction of 11 residential lots belonging to School District #64 at Western and Greendale in Park Ridge was approved by the Maine Township Trustees of Schools at its meeting on October 5. The auction will be held on October 30, at 10 a.m., at the location of the lots. Kenneth Carroll, the School District's Director of Business Services, stated that these lots are not part of the land the Park Ridge Recreation and Park District is attempting to purchase from the School District. Carroll said the District has already received requests from approximately forty people to be put on a mailing list to receive a packet of information that gives all the details of the auction.

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

Pat Feichter, Niles representative to the Suburban O'Hare Commission, today announced that a search has begun for citizens willing to testify in Federal Court on noise problems relating to O'Hare Airport.

Mr. Feichter and the Suburban O'Hare Commission members are seeking Niles residents who have lived in our community since 1973 and have suffered continual hardship and annoyance due to O'Hare Airport noise. Once witnesses in Niles and other surrounding communities are located, their names will be turned over to attorneys who are pursuing a lawsuit in Federal Court dealing with the environmental impact of noise pollution created by O'Hare Airport. Witnesses who lived in appropriate flight patterns will be called on to testify sometime in the next few months. Mr. Feichter went on to say, "This court case represents one of the many steps that must be taken to prevent an increase in airport noise and airport expansion in the next decade."

ACHES AND PAINS WORKSHOP

KEEPING WARM IN WINTER

—In extremely cold weather, inhale through your nose and exhale through your mouth. Inhaled air is warmed in the nasal passages before it reaches your lungs.

—Always wear a hat, as the head is the most vulnerable to heat loss. Dress in layers and cover your legs.

—Be sure to use enough bed covering. Body heat production falls off during sleep and you may wake up cold and shivering.

—It is wise to avoid smoking since nicotine decreases the blood supply to far reaches of the body and interferes with warming the arms, hands, legs, and feet.

—Sweaters, vests, extra foot covering are all needed even when indoors to avoid chilling.

—Use a scarf or air-warming mask to protect your lungs.

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
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Marillac sponsors "Gift of Life" drive



"As the patient and this officer entered the home, approximately a dozen patients/residents of the home were observed sitting in chairs and wheelchairs on the front patio with various physical/emotional disabilities. Most were unable to communicate and were totally unsupervised. Both the front door and foyer door were open and the receptionist, though dismayed at where this officer had found the victim, could offer no guarantee said incident would not recur, even in view of the recent death (on Golf Rd.) of one of their patients."

"The receptionist further indicated she had no instructions regarding the coming and going of patients, only that the front door was to be locked after dinner. She was also the only member of the staff assigned to the front door."

In his frustration-filled report the Niles Police officer described a continual problem with nursing homes in Niles over the past few years. As nursing homes have taken in more mentally disturbed patients paid for by the state, and fewer elderly patients requiring extended care, there has been a growing problem with these patients walking away from the homes, causing disturbances inside Niles businesses and creating situations dangerous to themselves and the public. Repeatedly these nursing home patients, often confused, have been found walking aimlessly in the middle of major streets like Milwaukee Avenue and Golf Road.

Indeed, on July 17, a 49 year old patient described as "slightly mentally retarded" from the Mill View Nursing Center, 8333 Golf Rd., was killed when he was struck by a car while crossing Golf Road in the middle of the street.

Niles Police Department records indicate from January 1 through September 22 of this year, police have been notified 28 times that Niles nursing homes patients had wandered away from a nursing home or not returned after freely walking around Niles. Of these 28 known incidents, 16 missing patient reports came from the Mill View Nursing Center, (presently called Spring Meadow Nursing Home).

Next highest is the Forest Villa nursing home (formerly the Pleasant View Nursing Home), 6840 Touhy Ave., with eight reported missing patients. The Regency Nursing Center, 6631 Milwaukee Ave., had two patients they reported missing. With one patient each were the Goldman Home for the Aged, 6601 Touhy Ave. and Golf Mill Plaza I, 9777 Greenwood Ave.

However, these numbers are deceptive as they represent only incidents the nursing homes report to police and, in fact, the number of patients walking away from Niles nursing homes is considerably higher, according to Niles Police officials.

The missing patient incidents individually range from harmless to potentially dangerous.

A 55 year old resident of the Goldman Home was reported missing by the home on April 22 and was found at Touhy and Milwaukee Ave. and returned to the home by police. On May 6 she was again reported missing and this time found on a Chicago Transit Authority (CTA) bus by Chicago Police who returned her to the home.

At the Forest Villa home a 68 year old man was reported

missing on March 5 and later spotted hitch-hiking on Touhy Avenue. The Forest Villa patient was eventually found in Skokie by the Skokie Police.

A 56 year old resident of the Mill View Nursing Home was spotted by police on June 6 wandering in the intersection of Milwaukee Avenue and Golf Road where she was trying to stop cars. Upon returning her to the home, police report being informed that she was in the home because she suffered from mental problems.

Another Mill View patient, a 58 year old man, wandered away from the home on June 27. At 3:15 the following morning Niles Police report the man was in the emergency room at Northwest Hospital at Addison and Central St. in Chicago. The report did not indicate how the man got there.

On July 13 Niles Police picked up a 49 year old Mill View patient who was observed wandering on Golf Road. After returning her to the home police were informed that she was mentally disturbed.

Still another Mill View patient, a 51 year old man, was reported missing from the home on April 8 at 8 a.m. Niles Police were notified the man had been found at 5:50 p.m. and being held at the Chicago Police 15th District Headquarters, 5859 W. Division St. in Chicago. The report did not indicate how the man got there.

An 87 year old Forest Villa nursing home patient was reported missing on January 28. The home reported the woman had been missing from the home on numerous occasions previously. On this January day this woman was found sitting in a grassy area, east of Jarvis and Oak Park St., wearing only a light housecoat. The woman was taken to Lutheran General Hospital for treatment of possible exposure.

The Niles Police have become more involved with area nursing homes since more mentally disturbed patients have been admitted as residents. "We don't have difficulties with persons 65 and 70 years old with medical problems," noted Emerickson. Emerickson added the nursing homes are "obligated to provide safe, secure supervision of their patients in their home. In a little while they ought to be able to tell if a patient is not around."

Barbara Hecht, spokesperson for the Regency home, said if one of their patients has a history of walking away from the home, they are moved onto a floor with outside doors with alarms on them.

However, Hecht said nursing homes are caught in a legal bind as most of the patients legally have the right to be outside the nursing home even though the home is legally responsible for their safety. "These people have their rights and can leave whenever they want," said Hecht. "We're damned if we do and damned if we don't."

An additional problem which results in patients walking away from the homes, said Hecht, is that relatives of nursing homes patients often will conceal crucial information about their relative during the admission procedure. "The relatives don't like to say that the patient has a tendency to walk away from home," said Hecht.

Hecht said if the nursing home is informed a patient has a history of walking away, they can take special steps to prevent the patients from leaving the home. Hecht added the Regency Nur-

sing Center will not admit any mentally disturbed patients as is done in other area nursing homes.

Brian Barrish, who took over as chief administrator on August 10 at the troubled Mill View home agreed with Hecht that nursing homes are caught between conflicting laws. "The nursing home is responsible for them but cannot confine them. Patients have the right to leave if they choose," says Barrish.

However, Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase strongly disagrees with the nursing homes' interpretation of patient rights. Blase says nursing home patients are not permitted to wander unsupervised around the community if they have mental problems.

Niles businesses have repeatedly reported nursing home residents loitering in their establishments as well as harassing customers.

Additionally, Niles Senior Citizen Director Mary Kay Morrissey reported two residents of the Plaza I Nursing Home, both of whom were in a teen rehabilitation program, recently took the Niles Free Bus to the Trident Senior Citizens Center, 8600 Oakton St., and were asked to leave after they began bothering Niles senior citizens by asking for cigarettes and coffee. After contacting Plaza I officials, the teens stopped coming to the home.

On another occasion Morrissey noted she had to contact the Plaza Nursing Home when one of their patients, an elderly man, took the free bus to the Trident Center and was seen wandering in the parking lot. "In my opinion he should not have been out by himself," recalled Morrissey. After she called the Plaza Nursing Home, a car was sent for the man and, after some time, Plaza officials found him and returned him to the nursing home.

Niles recently began combating the walkaway problem when it passed a series of restrictions prohibiting Niles nursing homes from accepting virtually any patient except for the elderly.

This followed the state's successful placement of state hospital patients in private nursing homes. These patients, paid for by Illinois, were often mentally disturbed with little hope of recovery. In effect, Niles nursing homes have been taking in residents who would normally be living in half-way houses.

Niles restrictions on nursing home patients, however, applies only to those patients requesting admission after the ordinances were passed. Those state patients already in the nursing homes will not be moved out of Niles.

Niles Police recently arranged a meeting with representatives of all Niles nursing homes to discuss the walkaway problem. However, no one from the Mill View home attended the meeting. Blase indicated he hoped the village could work out solutions to the nursing home problems with the homes. However, Blase said the village is considering taking steps to control these confused nursing home residents.

Among the actions contemplated by Niles is to issue citations, which could result in fines, to those homes which allow their patients to wander away. Also Blase said the village is considering installing security systems which would prevent these people from getting out. However, Blase said this would be an expensive remedy for the nursing homes.

Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase repeatedly noted he had spoken to representatives of the restaurant in the past informing them that Niles is a "limited pouring license community."

Trustee Angelo Marcheschi added there are 50 liquor licenses that have been granted in Niles and he felt the Village Board would be opening the way to greatly increasing that number by awarding the Sizzler Steak House a license.

Marcheschi said Niles businesses sell their liquor licenses to new businesses at a cost of \$15,000 to \$30,000.

O'Hara said he had not inquired to see if any liquor licenses were currently for sale.

Following little discussion the Village Board voted 4 to 0 against granting the Sizzler Steak House a liquor license. (Trustee Pete Pesole was not present at the Tuesday night meeting.) However, Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase, who is also the village liquor commissioner, told O'Hara he would assist him in determining if a Niles liquor license is presently for sale.

In other business, the Village Board unanimously authorized the purchase of property at the southeast corner of Milwaukee Ave. and Oakton St. The land is currently owned by Mobil Oil Co. The village will pay \$250,000 for the property which they will later lease to a tenant.

Village Manager Ken Scheel noted that Niles must be careful not to allow the corner of Oakton and Milwaukee to become too congested which could result in "driving people away from the corner."

The Niles Village Board also authorized the purchase of a new pumping truck for the Niles Fire Department. The \$74,000 pumper, which will be purchased from the Able Fire Equipment Company of Chicago, will replace an old pumper the fire department said would cost over \$50,000 to repair.

homes in Niles. This would reduce the interest on a \$50,000 loan by 2% annually. If the bank where they place the \$50,000 investment would likewise give 75 young people an additional 2% discount, the new homeowners would save 4% interest on \$50,000, \$2,000 annually or \$166.66 a month.

The village would have to sit down with local bankers and sell the obvious. It's imperative to the village's future, and certainly the bank's future, that young people purchase homes in the community. Then, the village could sit down with real estate people and seek their help. Perhaps, home-sellers can lower their prices in exchange for being eligible for the discounted loans which would enable them to sell their homes. Seventy-five new homeowners annually would flow into Niles residential bloodstream just due to this discounted plan.

Niles has boxed in young people who work for the village. They have told them if you want to work for the village, you must live in town. Many can't afford to buy homes so they're forced to rent apartments here. Quite likely many of them could pur-

chase homes if they received help from the community.

It's easy to sit behind a typewriter and throw out these suggestions week after week. The burden of initiating such a plan is substantial. But it is a bit galling to read about Niles seeking outside residents to come in and buy homes when it has a reservoir of young people already living in the community who manifest a desire to be permanent residents. Many of them have grown up here. And many would like to raise their children here.

There are always scoffers in the community who will say such a joint effort is impractical. Bankers have no desire to get jockeyed in to interest rates which make it unprofitable to operate. And the village will want to guard its new \$500,000 bonanza jealously. But 10 years down the road the banks, the retail businesses and industries might not have a younger group of people to support them or work in their companies. Giving a more liberal mortgage rate today could well result in the re-opening of local schools again and renew the community's future.

to assist capable students in preparing for advanced work at colleges and universities. Students enrolled in AP courses complete a 3-hour examination in May. Primarily seniors participate in Advanced Placement testing, although some subject areas include juniors.

Participating students have their test results sent to the colleges of their choice, which, in turn may award college credit for the examination.

Maine students may take an Advanced Placement test in one or more of ten disciplines: American History, Biology, Calculus, Chemistry, English Composition, English Literature/Language, European History, French, Physics, and Spanish.

In 1981 over 400 Maine scholars participated in AP testing, taking a total of 628 examinations.

Of special pride to the Maine schools is the high number of students receiving scores of "5". A "5" score on the 5-point college-level scale indicated that a student is "extremely well qualified" for college work.

Almost 100 Maine students distinguished themselves with "5"'s in 1981, representing outstanding achievement by Maine instructors as well as students.

The Maine schools have offered several thousand students Advanced Placement instruction since 1957. Dr. Michael J. Myers, Assistant Superintendent for Instruction in District 207, notes, "The Board of Education and administration are proud of the community supports for its students."

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

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

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
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
