Niles to lease Milwaukee-Oakton lot to Jerry's Garden Center

The village of Niles which purchased the lot on the Southeast corner of Milwaukee and Oakton last month for \$250,000 is planning to lease the property to Jerry's Fruit & Garden Center for additional parking.

According to Niles Village Manager Ken Scheel, the village Engineering Department is currently working on a layout of the parking lot which Jerry's will be leasing on a monthly basis for the next five years. "After

that time, Scheel noted, "they will be given first option to purchase the property." He also stated that Jerry's will pay for a razing of the gas station building which is currently on the property.

In the south suburbs there has been a suggestion they consolidate several of the communities into one town making one large city from several small villages.

Here in our area 5 fire departments joined together in a program called Operation RED. Local departments can now cross-over into neighboring communities to respond to fires. Thus, The Bugle offices, which are in Niles but are 2 blocks from a Morton Grove fire station, would have a Morton Grove fire wagon at its doorstep if ever the need arose. Furthermore, rather than have fire departments duplicating equipment they would work together coordinating purchases rather than buying similar equipment.

Consolidating suburbs into one community makes good sense, particularly in the south suburbs where there are "have not" communities alongside the "have" communities. But our way we have little fiefdoms which will not likely be changed in our lifetimes.

We're sure if you asked local folks, most would prefer these small, individual suburbs continue to run their community business. In Niles in particular, local residents would see little reason to change its way of doing civic business. It's a wealthy little community with industry tax dollars and shopping center sales tax dollars contributing mightily to the welfare of its residents.

Zoners ok re-zoning for Racquet Club

Monday night's Niles Zoning Board unanimously approved re-zoning the former Tam O'Shanter Racquet Club, 7847 Caldwell Ave., from B-2 to Manufacturing zoning. 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Bugle Digest Local News Briefs

Niles Village Manager Ken Scheel reports that landscape architects are currently in the process of drawing up plans for the southwest corner of Milwaukee and Harlem Avenues. A Village parking lot had been paved on the property and Scheel reports that the balance of the corner will be landscaped so that it is eye-appealing, but simple to maintain. Dutchman's Point has brought many complimentary comments to the village from motorists who drive Milwaukee Avenue each day and it is hoped the Milwaukee-Harlem corner will further enhance the Milwaukee Avenue Beautification program.

Repaving of Milwaukee from Touhy Avenue to Albion Street is scheduled to begin toward the end of 1982 while Milwaukee Avenue repaving from Golf Road to Main Street is scheduled for 1983. Village Manager Ken Scheel stated Federal and State funds have already been allocated for these improvements, and the village is in the process of getting Federal and State approval on the plans for these improvements.

Director of Public Services Keith Peck reminds residents that during the fall season, while the falling leaves are beautiful, they do cost the village hundreds of dollars. Peck noted the easiest and most efficient way to get rid of the leaves is for residents to bag them and put them out for garbage pickup. Since the village is already paying for this service, there is no added cost. Many residents, Peck noted, sweep the leaves to the curb areas and village manpower and machinery then have to be used to pick up the debris. Peck stated that while the street sweeper and a suction machine are used for this purpose, heavy rains cause the leaves to block the sewers if they are not picked up immediately.

A sign of winter is watching the Public Works employees readying the snow plow fleet for the falling flakes. Director of Public Services Keith Peck noted the village uses approximately 1200 tons of salt during the winter season. He stated that while we have had relatively light snowfall for the past two winters, more salt was used because of the icing at the traffic intersections.

Director of Building and Zoning Joseph Salerno reports that a one-story building housing medical offices is currently on the drawing board for the corner of Ballard and Greenwood directly behind the K-Mart store. Early last year a developer had planned to build a shopping center on that site which would house small boutique shops, but plans never materialized for that center.

Public Work employees have just finished planting 100 trees in village parkways to replace those which had to be cut down or had died in recent years. The new trees consist mainly of Flowering Bartlett Pears, Red Scarlet Maples, Autumn-Plum Ash and Norway Maples. Different varieties of trees are planted so that if a disease does hit the foliage, all the trees are not lost at one time.

Free Carbon Monoxide tests for Niles residents

Now that winter is approaching, the Niles Housing Department is once again offering to all Niles residents, free carbon monoxide testing for all heating units. Carbon monoxide can be dangerous, especially since there is no way to detect it except by monitor.

Todd Bavaro, Director of Housing for the Village, stated, "Some of the signs that indicate

that there is carbon monoxide emission are headaches, dizziness, skin discoloration and nausea. A 10 to 15 minute test of your furnace will determine if you are in danger of carbon monoxide emission.

Niles to seek transfer of mental patients in nursing homes

1980 Circuitbreaker forms available for Senior Citizens

Senior citizens who have not already filed their 1980 Circuitbreaker form have just two more months in which to apply, according to State Rep. Penny Pullen (R-4th).

"The deadline for filing the 1980 Circuitbreaker State Tax Relief Claim for senior citizens and disabled is December 31," said Miss Pullen. "If your household income is under \$12,000 for last year and you have not yet filed, please contact my office for a claim form."

Rep. Pullen's office is at 22 Main st., Park Ridge, telephone 823-2023. Office hours are Monday thru Thursday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Forms are available and help in filling out the form is available by appointment.

The Circuitbreaker provides up to \$700 a year in property tax or rent relief and up to \$90 in additional tax relief to homeowners or renters. It is available to Illinois citizens 65 or older or

Niles officials say they expect Niles nursing homes will end the practice of taking in, and continuing to house, state mental health patients in the near future.

Following the implementation of new regulations in recent years by the State of Illinois, local nursing homes began taking in patients who had previously been in state hospitals. In doing so, these nursing homes became less and less extended care facilities for the elderly and more half-way house type facilities.

Problems from these homes taking in these patients have included a mentally ill nursing home patient being struck and killed by a car while crossing Golf Rd. unattended last July. Also numerous suicides and acts of violence committed by these patients have occurred requiring Niles Police intervention in the homes. And there continues to be a problem of unsupervised nursing home residents wandering around the community for hours at a time often causing disturbances in area businesses which again require police action.

Ken Scheel, Niles Village Manager, said the nursing homes will be transferring these state

mental patients out of Niles. "The zoning was never given for people like that," to live in the Niles nursing homes, explained Scheel. "We have a perfect right to make them change back to what they were zoned for."

Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase agreed with Scheel these patients will be transferred out of Niles. Blase said officials of the Spring Meadows Nursing Home (formerly Mill View) 8333 Golf Rd., have agreed during a past meeting with village officials to transfer the state-sponsored mental patients out of their home some time this fall.

According to Blase, the Plaza I and II nursing homes, 9777 Greenwood Ave., have also agreed to abide by Niles nursing home regulations which exclude the state patients. Blase said Plaza I and II will be converted so one building handles only geriatric patients and the other building will house patients with debilitating disabilities such as cerebral palsy.

"I'm anticipating the (nursing home) owners are not going to fight us..." on eliminating these patients from their homes, said

State Police get radiation detection devices

Governor James R. Thompson announced Wednesday that the Illinois State Police has begun issuing new radiation detection devices to each trooper in the Hazardous Material Section. "These detectors will give troopers assigned to this unit the ability to detect radiation to ensure compliance with state transportation regulations and also will be used in cases of accidents involving possible radioactive spillage," Thompson said. The 46 detectors were purchased at a cost of \$110,000 by the Illinois Department of Transportation. Sixteen of the 46-trooper unit have had detectors on loan from the federal government.

Corporal John Nordin, Director of the State Police Hazardous Material Section, said the monitoring equipment, which will be mounted in squad cars is sensitive enough to discover low level radioactive material carried by other vehicles while the officers are on patrol. All Hazardous Material Officers will be trained in the use of the new monitoring devices prior to receiving the equipment. The

equipment will be maintained and calibrated for accuracy by the Illinois Department of Nuclear Safety specialists headquartered in Springfield.

The Department has the responsibility for the coordination of the radioactive materials enforcement program carried out by the IDOT and State Police.

"The Illinois State Police is the largest single agency in the nation that monitors highway shipments of radioactive materials," Nordin said.

More aluminum available for recycling

With Thanksgiving coming up in late November, area residents will be given the extra opportunity to recycle, J. R. Hoffman, district manager, Reynolds Aluminum Recycling Company notes. All of the extra cooking, including the traditional turkey which oftentimes is baked in aluminum foil, plus more beverages being consumed, can mean extra money for those who save these aluminum household items and turn them in to a Reynolds collection point.

Winter checks needed for vehicles

With our clocks turned back to standard time and the month of November with us, we know that winter is on the way. Prepare your vehicle early for cold weather. A tune-up may be necessary if it isn't running smoothly.

Be sure you have enough antifreeze in your car or truck so it will start when temperatures drop suddenly. You or your service attendant should check your heater hose and radiator connections.

After you check your defroster and heater, inspect the windshield wiper blades. Proper visibility while driving in a snow storm is critical. To reduce the severity of sliding on slippery or icy streets, brakes and tires also should be on your checklist.

Replacing a weak or old battery will give your car every chance of starting when the wind chill factor is well below zero. Remember to keep distilled water in your battery.

Carry an ice scraper and snow brush for obstructed windshields. A can of de-icer for windshields and frozen locks could come in handy. Some motorists keep a bag of sand or gravel and a scoop in the car for getting out of snow or ice if stuck.

Mr. Levander's legal talk, half-truths, and innuendos also did little to appease the audience.

He further admitted that there were no figures available to substantiate the suggested savings involved in such a department. Further, Mr. Levander could not offer proof that the quality and reliability of a private service would be up to present standards.

During the question period, Mr. Sompolski, stated he did not have to answer to the public present. When his arrogance and bullying of the audience did not disperse the audience, Mr. Sompolski left in a huff. After Mr. Sompolski left the audience was able to get courteous and truthful answers from the firefighters.

One of the main issues raised was, how can a public servant (Mr. Sompolski) be so arrogant and rude to the people he represents? The answer is that Mr. Sompolski is answerable only to the Maine Township Board of Trustees, who appoint the fire district trustees. One way to solve this problem would be to make the fire district trustee's position elective rather than appointive, as provided by state statute. Petitions for such an election were seen in abundance after the meeting.

The feeling of the audience present was that Mr. Sompolski should be removed at once from

his position as fire district trustee. If the Maine Township Board refuses to remove Mr. Sompolski then possibly they should be voted out when the trustees for the fire district are elected, should the petition pass.

Nimrod named chairman of National Energy panel

There would seem to be little reason to change.

If you step across Howard street into Chicago west of Milwaukee Avenue, there is really very little difference between the life styles of our neighboring Chicagoans and Nilesites. In Niles we have the free buses which certainly are an enviable service. But interestingly, little old Niles doesn't have many local schools anymore. Northwest Chicagoans can point to their within-walking-distance schools which unfortunately we're losing in our areas.

Actually, the face of our suburbs is beginning to change. The declining population and corresponding birthrate will be changing the make-up for suburbia during the 1980's.

The old line suburbs, those along the Northwest Railway heading northwest, have long had stability since the railroads were created. But our suburbs have been termed bedroom communities which have transient homeowners coming home to sleep at night but working outside the area. But as the 80's move on, our type of suburbs will be moving up in age. Combining older residents, less inclined to be on the work force outside the area, and the lessening of younger people attending schools, the face of our suburbs will be changing. Many more residents on fixed incomes will affect the retail business community. And recreation activities aimed at the young will be shared by the needs of the older community.

We don't have the prescience to foresee the coming years. But the increased inflation and more residents on limited incomes will likely bring more consolidation ideas for services among neighboring areas. The luxury of having an expensive snorkel sitting in a fire station with little usage will give way to border-crossing services, where communities will join together.

It's not likely the 50's, 60's and 70's will ever return to our suburbs. No more building booms, no great influx of children demanding more and more school services. Public personnel may be reduced. And the computer age may radically change our way of doing things, cutting costs to meet the needs of the 80's and 90's.

The ideas of consolidation will be ever-present in our future. The dollars in these communities will demand greater economy. The changes may come slowly. But they are inevitable. We may not leap forward into the future as we have in past years. We think there's going to be a lot of sideways movement, working jointly with the guys on both sides of us.

Blase. However, if the homes do not comply with Niles' demand to transfer these patients, Blase added, "We'll take their (operating) license away."

Blase said the Goldman, Regency and Forest Villa nursing homes are abiding by Niles regulations and have refused to take in more state mental health patients.

Area nursing home officials have repeatedly stated that state law gives these mental patients their right to wander unsupervised outside the nursing homes. Scheel, however, scoffed at that reasoning saying the nursing homes were "hiding behind technicalities." "Most of these homes have areas they could fence-in outside," said Scheel, where these patients could be outside in the fresh air while remaining under the home's supervision.

Additionally, Scheel said he believes the nursing home patients should have access to local businesses and shopping centers, however, he said the nursing homes should take these patients out in groups and under the supervision of nursing home employees.

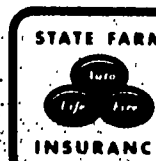

Village Board members voted to purchase the 1/2-acre of land at their October 13 meeting as part of their effort to enhance the current Milwaukee Avenue Beautification Program and to try and alleviate some of the traffic problems currently associated with that intersection.

According to Scheel, "It is a bad situation, traffic-wise, in that area and by leasing the property to Jerry's some of their traffic can spill out onto Oakton Street and off of Milwaukee Avenue."

Scheel also noted that talks are taking place with McDonald's officials since the eatery is located between Jerry's Fruit and Garden Center and the lot at the corner of Milwaukee and Oakton. Patrons for Jerry's who park in the new lot will have to cross McDonald's property to get to Jerry's. Scheel did say McDonald's is "very cooperative" and plans are progressing nicely.

The whole object in purchasing the property, according to Scheel, is to provide a better traffic flow for the area which had been one of the "bottleneck intersections" in the village of Niles.

The Golf Mill State Bank financed the \$250,000 purchase price to the Village of Niles at 9% interest, according to Scheel.

had earlier in the evening been at Sullivan's Bar and Liquors, 9055 Milwaukee Ave., with Robert Burns, 24, of Des Plaines. Burns was later with Wilson at Jake's Restaurant when the alleged incident occurred at 4 a.m.

Niles Police officials say Wilson displayed the gun following a confrontation with Burns, however, Wilson never threatened Burns with the gun, said Emrikson.

Off-duty reserve officer Annette Baran, who was seated next to Wilson in the restaurant, reportedly took the gun from Wilson and later that morning gave it to on-duty Niles Policeman Leon Elsingner.

Following the incident Burns filed a complaint with the Niles Police Department.

Emrikson characterized the incident as "not that big a deal... it is not unusual for people to break a couple of rules."

Wilson has been accused of violating Niles Police Department rules which include displaying a weapon inappropriately, being intoxicated in a public place and engaging in conduct unbecoming of a police officer.

Emrikson said the Police and Fire Commission will review Wilson's appeal of the suspension during their December meeting. Emrikson added that the commission was unable to discuss the incident during their scheduled November 2 meeting because all the commissioners were not present.

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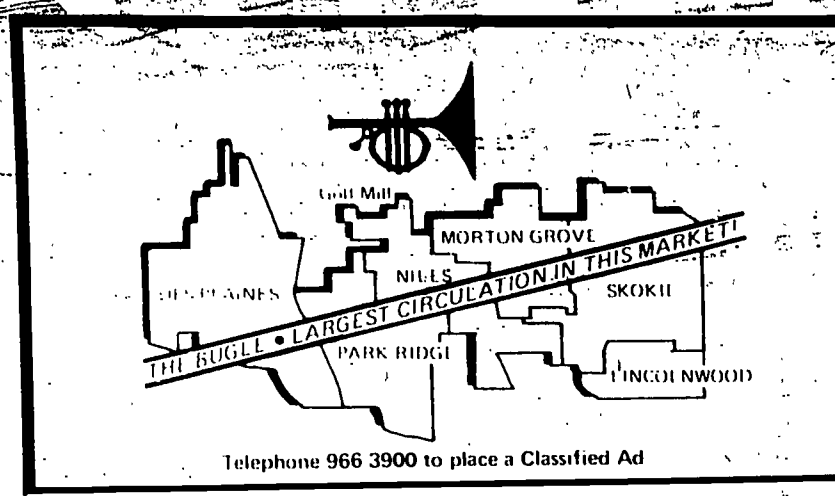
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Hard of hearing people meet November 18

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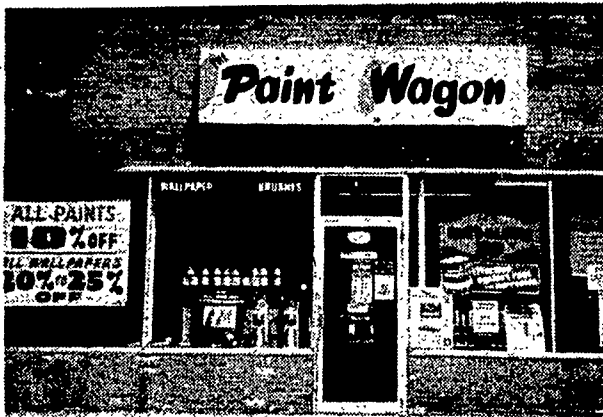
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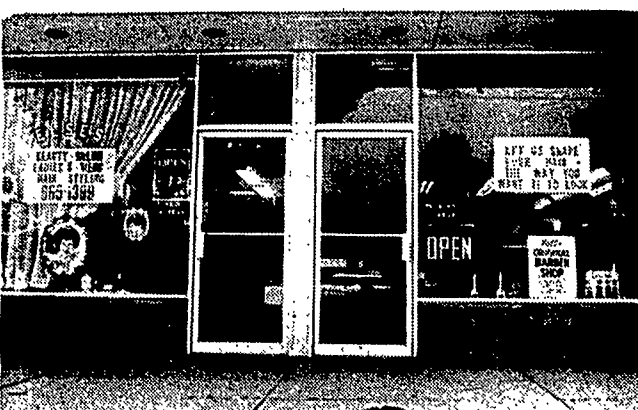

Troiani's suggestion, the petitioner will also remove a foundation and private structure now on the premises prior to any construction. A 10% variation in the front yard set back was granted enabling the parking spaces to conform with the size of the building.

A resident and neighbor on Caldwell reported the ditch in front of the building fronting on Caldwell was continuously filling in. Director of Building and Zoning, Joseph Salerno, said the State would likely improve the area when it begins work on Caldwell in the Spring of 1982.

In other actions the board approved changing 8400 Dempster from R4 to B1 zoning and 8580 Dempster from R1 to B1 zoning. The B1 zoning will also apply to 8450 Dempster. Two of the properties were parcels involved in court action in which McDonalds was turned down in its bid to build a restaurant in the area with special use zoning. At the time the court questioned Niles why the entire area wasn't zoned B1 for commercial use. Monday night Niles petitioned the board for the conforming zoning and received unanimous approval.

Prior to the approval resident Mary Ann Frindi inquired why the village was undertaking this request. Salerno explained the village was upgrading the zoning and conforming to the request of the judge, who suggested the change while the litigation was under appeal.

In a third action Thomas International, 7300 Lehigh, sought a variance and relief so they could create only 162 parking spaces at its location. Representatives said they were attempting to sell the building but the request to reduce the number of parking spaces by 22.5% was necessary to enable the potential purchaser to buy a building without having legal problems.

The Thomas (organ-electronics) building totals 62,612 square feet. Niles code requires one parking space for each 300 square feet of building which has resulted in 209 parking places. According to Niles code there can be an allowance up to 20% which would reduce the parking to about 167 spaces. Thomas contends they must reduce it to 162 spaces which would be about 22.5% reduction.

Niles officials agreed it was a Catch 22 situation since they had to abide by Niles code. Rather than reject the petitioner Board president Frick recommended the case be continued until next month (Dec. 7) while Niles village attorney is contacted for his recommendations.
