Medicare provides new benefit

Medicare will now pay for the treatment of plantar warts, reports Dr. Lawrence M. Rubin, Morton Grove spokesperson for the podiatry section of the non-profit Community Health Information Council.

E.D.S. Federal Corporation, the Medicare carrier for the State of Illinois, notified health providers of this new benefit through its November newsletter.

Podiatrists had tried unsuccessfully for 15 years to rectify the original Medicare ruling that erroneously defined treatment of plantar warts as a non-covered "hygienic measure."

Since its inception in 1967, Medicare has provided benefits for treatment of warts elsewhere on the body, but has denied payment when this common virus-caused problem is located on the feet.

Now, they meet for lunch on Friday afternoon once a month because they do not want to be out after dark.

Several weeks ago, Carol Hampton Sigel drove her RV to pick up Agnes, Eleanor, Alice, Florence and Meta in Morton Grove. En route north, they stopped for Marion and Ruth who live in outlying suburbs. Bernice had passed away several years ago. There were peals of laughter from the suite at the Inn, when the matron looked at snapshots of themselves that were taken over the years at previous get-togethers. While celebrating the occasion, the women went swimming, hiking, boating and browsing the shops of Lake Geneva.

Alice was the first to be married, when she became the bride of Herbert Heppner, a lifetime resident of Morton Grove. Nowadays, still residing in town, she keeps busy with her home, her son, daughter and two grandsons, and works part-time. Florence retired from the chemical industry in 1980 and became the wife of Clem Raft. They now live in Rancho Santa Fe, California, in the winter.

As winner of the Class II category which is for populations under 250,000, M-NASR received a plaque and a \$1,000 cash award at the National Recreation Conference held in Minneapolis on Oct. 27. M-NASR was sponsored for this award by Chicago Sporting Goods of Chicago.

Seek host families for exchange students

Host families for several high school exchange students are being sought in the Chicago metropolitan area. The students will be coming from Austria, Brazil, Chile, Ecuador, France, Germany, Italy, Spain, and Switzerland. They all have studied English in their native countries. They will be arriving in January for entry into our second semester and will return home in June.

The program tries to match the prospective student with a host family having similar interests and children of the same age and sex. This exchange is sponsored by the Educational Resource Development Trust, a non-profit educational foundation authorized by the U.S. State Department to approve and issue student visas. Remarriage after age 60 does not affect benefits

If you are a widow or widower and remarry at age 60 or older, you can continue to receive social security benefits without any reduction in the amount of your check. Also, if your new spouse gets social security benefits, you may elect to take a benefit as a dependent on your new spouse's social security record if the amount would be larger.

The rule regarding remarriage does not apply if you are under 60 or receive benefits as a surviving divorced spouse. If you remarry, you would no longer be eligible for benefits as a widow or widower. However, if your subsequent marriage ends and you are a widow under 60 or a surviving divorced spouse, you may become entitled to benefits again.

This law which is a part of the 1977 Social Security Amendments changed the rule regarding remarriage of widows and widowers age 60 or older. It was in response to the concern of older people who wanted to remarry but feared the loss of their social security benefits.

LUNG PROTECTION

Here are a few ways to bring about better lung health for yourself and everybody else: 1) Quit smoking! 2) Get a flu shot, particularly if you currently have any form of lung disorder. 3) Small objects can cause serious injury to the lungs. Keep any such objects out of a child's reach. 4) Cover your coughs and sneezes and teach your children to do the same. 5) Support activities to clean the air in your community. 6) Do your part: don't burn trash, be sure the fireplace and furnace are in good working order, and have a mechanic check the pollution control device in your car. 7) Give to Christmas Seals. RECENT CHANGES IN MEDICARE

As a result of new laws, important changes have been made in Medicare. Some changes broaden Medicare coverage to include a wider range of health care services than before. Because health care has been getting more expensive - about 15 percent higher each year - some changes require you to pay higher amounts, just as the Federal Government is paying higher amounts for the Medicare program with tax dollars. Other changes are designed to improve the administration of Medicare by helping to control increasing costs, making program operation more efficient, and finding better ways to deliver health care. 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Edison Park Luther Leaguers raise funds for world hunger

Before you go to bed tonight, some 12,000 human beings around the world will have died of starvation or diseases related to malnutrition.

While such staggering figures of misery and suffering give many of us a feeling of hopelessness, the Luther Leaguers of Edison Park Lutheran Church have decided to do something about it.

The Leaguers are going to begin a "Planned Famine" on Friday, December 11 and 12, starting at 8 a.m. and continuing until 2 p.m. Saturday afternoon. Rev. Mark Twietmeyer, Assistant Pastor of the Church, explained that the fast will have a two-fold purpose. "We plan for the youth participating in the program to share the experience of feeling hungry and to also learn why hunger exists in the world and what we can do about it," he said.

Pastor Twietmeyer explained that many factors contribute to hunger - lifestyles, population, the energy crisis, etc.

The "Planned Famine" hunger problem also has a very practical side. The Luther Leaguers will each contribute \$5 of their own money to participate in the program. They'll seek out "famine victims" - friends and neighbors - to contribute \$5 donations. The "famine victims" will also be asked to skip one meal and to read a fact sheet on hunger so they, too, might become involved.

"We hope to be able to raise \$1,000," said Rev. Twietmeyer. "The money we raise may help feed many families, or even an entire village, for a month or longer."

The funds will be channeled through World Vision and the American Lutheran Church World Hunger Program, to help the hungry people.

No single group or organization can help all of the millions of men, women and children who are hungry in the world. But the Luther Leaguers believe that people become hunger statistics one at a time and that they can be helped the same way. They're determined to make a meaningful difference.

NI-Gas warns public against imposters

Northern Illinois Gas (NI-Gas) today warned customers to be alert for persons posing as employees. Most service calls are made only at the customer's request. At times, however, utility employees may need admittance to obtain a meter reading, exchange a meter or turn service on or off during main construction. When this occurs, customers are encouraged to ask for caller's identification card to confirm the

person is a NI-Gas representative. Each employee carries a card with a photo, name and signature. The company said employees never collect money from customers for service work performed. Any charges are included in regular bills. If the caller cannot be confirmed as a gas company employee, contact local authorities or nearest NI-Gas office listed in the telephone directory, the company advises.

State Police explain the costs of drunk driving

Reach into your wallet and take out \$1,800. Give it to the first person who walks by and say, "Have A Nice Day!" Maybe you're not in the habit of giving away large sums of money to strangers, but according to Captain Hugh S. McGinley, Commander of Illinois State Police District 15, this amount, or some similar figure, is what you'd be "giving away to strangers" for fines, lawyers fees, insurance and the like, if you were convicted of drunk driving in Illinois.

If you are convicted for driving under the influence of alcohol, the average fine is \$200 to \$500 plus \$10 to \$50 in court costs. When you were arrested your vehicle was probably impounded. Getting it out will be anywhere from \$35.00 to \$70.00 depending upon how long it remained in storage. So far you're up to \$300 to \$500.

Most judges refuse to hear drunk driving case unless the defendant is represented by a lawyer. In Cook and surrounding counties the "going" fee to represent a drunk driving charge is a low of \$750 to a high of \$2,000 with very few on the low end. Unfortunately for the pocketbook of the drunk driver, that's not the end. The insurance charges can be the worst part. First, after it finds out that you've had a drunk driving conviction, your insurance company will very likely cancel

your policy. Those companies that do not automatically cancel will raise the premiums considerably. In Illinois most drivers convicted of drunk driving enter an assigned risk pool which usually doubles normal insurance rates.

Now, adding an average \$300 for additional insurance to \$350 fine and \$30.00 court costs, plus \$50.00 for towing and storage and an average \$1,370 lawyer's fees, we arrive at a grand total of \$1,800 average costs with the high end being as much as \$3,500 not including wages lost for being in court on work days. Trials are not held on week-ends.

The personal dollar costs of drinking and driving should be enough to convince you to moderate your intake. However, there are other costs that are even more dramatic. At least 50,000 people die nationwide in traffic accidents every year. Half of these, about 25,000, die in accidents involving drunk drivers. Nearly 70 people are killed each day by drunk drivers, or about one every 23 minutes. In 1980, 1.3 million driving under the influence arrests were made in the U.S. The cost to society, associated with drunk driving is over five billion dollars a year.

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District 63 schools participate in conference

A delegation of school board members and administrators from the East Maine Public Schools were among the nearly 5,000 school officials attending the 1981 Joint Annual Conference of the Illinois Association of School Boards (IASB), Illinois Association of School Administrators, and Illinois Association of School Business Officials, November 21-23, in Chicago, according to board president Larry Solomon.

"The annual conference is just about the only chance we have for board members and administrators from throughout Illinois to confer directly about our common problems, gain insight into the issues confronting us and obtain advice from experts in every field of education," Solomon said.

The conference schedule included nearly 50 panel discussions and workshops on an important list of topics, including current issues in school finance, the new collective bargaining law in Illinois, current legislative issues and court decisions, and investment of school funds.

"The vast number of complex issues facing school boards make this conference invaluable," said IASB President Elizabeth M. Cleaver, of Peoria. "The amount of information and advice ex-

changed at the annual conference makes it unique, since the high cost of such an exchange would be prohibitive if attempted through conventional channels."

In addition to learning from the workshops and panel discussions, school board members voted on crucial policy resolutions concerning a corporate personal property tax reduction, driver's education funding increases, exemption of local school districts from utility taxes, and elimination of state and federal mandates accompanying tax revenues.

"The votes on the resolutions by the delegates determine the official policy of IASB, and help district activities in the coming year," Cleaver said.

Featured speakers at the joint conference were Adlai E. Stevenson, former U.S. Senator; Ann H. Barkley, public information officer and consultant for Los Angeles County Schools; Donald G. Gill, State Superintendent of Education; David Allen, President, American Association of School Business Officials; and Zig Ziglar, a leading motivational speaker.

underneath the glass there are problems. While the boarded-up shops are not as obvious as they are in Joliet, they can be seen.

During our 24 years in Niles, we have seen an unbelievable turnover of stores. It is doubtful there are more than 10 of the original business owners still hawking their wares where they were back in 1957. We believe this turnover is a normal process in retailing in these new suburban shopping areas. While older areas seem to have stores which have stayed put through many years, this staying in one location through a businessman's lifetime is rare out here in suburbia.

The bigger chains, the Topps, the Korvette's, the Goldblatt's, the Community Discount's play by different rules than the smaller retail shops. The little guys don't have the same choices as their bigger brothers. We've seen Jewel Foods go in and out of several locations in our area. And Walgreen's has been around in several different locations within a 3-mile square area of our offices.

Just as Niles is concerned about the closing of its schools and the attendant need to attract young people to its community, there is a need to give as much stability to its industrial and commercial areas as possible.

In retrospect, Niles has been too lenient through the years in allowing so many shopping centers to be built. There is a law of diminishing returns which limits the amount of business which can be expected out of any area. We

would guesstimate Niles has had as many as 150 empty stores standing vacant during 1981.

There're really few conclusions we can draw. We think the opening and closing of stores in new suburban areas are a natural part of the free enterprise function in these newer areas. Yet, we can see an almost economic anarchy in allowing so many stores to be built in one area. So many businesses chip away at everyone else's profit statements, often making potentially viable businesses fall by the wayside, because of so many hands wanting to share the economic pie.

Planning by limiting these commercial areas seems to be the answer. Just as we plan for recreation areas and industrial areas and residential areas, there's a need to control the creating of commercial areas. It's a lesson which is coming much too late. We'll continue to see the excessive turn-over of retail establishments, both the size of Goldblatt's and Walgreen's, as well as the one-store family-operated businesses.

Officials of Sportmart, 7233 Dempster st., Niles were also optimistic about business during this Christmas season. Noting that business this year has been "very good," Larry Gray, Customer Relations Manager said, "It is quite possible that the (Washington) predictions are over-rated. When people can't buy the big ticket items, they are still going to celebrate Christmas and buy less expensive merchandise."

"None of us are really hurting though the economy says we should be," remarked Bill Rand of Golf Mill's Rand Jewelers. Noting the early sales going on in many stores, Rand said, "It's really a consumer's market this year. If we market products at the right price, we're going to do business."

Stating he was "cautiously optimistic" about this year's Christmas season, Rand added, "October was a disaster around here and that November picked up. If December continues well, we'll wind up pretty darned well."

However, Steve Sasse, manager of the Oak Mill Mall, was not as hopeful about this Christmas season. According to Sasse, "People are still afraid...they have had a bad year and think it will continue." Sasse noted there are numerous specialty shops in Oak Mill Mall which may be the last type of retail shops to recover from the lagging economy.

Notre Dame's Annual Open House

Notre Dame High School for Boys, 7655 Dempster, Niles will conduct its Annual Open House on Sunday, Dec. 6 from 1 to 5 p.m. All boys in parochial and public grade schools, especially those in seventh and eighth grades, and their parents are invited. Members of the Notre Dame administration, faculty, and students will be presenting guided tours of the school.

Notre Dame High School is under the direction of the Holy Cross order of priests and brothers. In June of 1955, the Holy Cross Fathers from their center at Notre Dame University opened a high school in Niles.

That beginning in 1955 of 500 freshmen and 50 sophomores has borne much fruit. The school has produced over 6000 alumni and almost 91% of them have gone on to college. Notre Dame graduates occupy key positions in all walks of life: medicine, law, business, industry and the church. All have taken their place in society, many in the surrounding local communities, where they have become active citizens. Many also are now sending their sons to Notre Dame.

There have been many changes at Notre Dame since the school opened. However, some things remain the same. Most importantly, a dedicated lay and religious faculty who are determined to provide a well-structured and disciplined atmosphere in which a young man can develop his God-given talents and abilities. The 69 faculty members include 18 religious and 51 lay persons. The average teacher has 14.2 years experience. Over one-half of the faculty hold advanced degrees with two holding Ph.D. and 33 M.A. degrees. While schools are closing, and enrollment lags in some area schools, enrollment at Notre Dame is on the rise. Enrollment is presently 1196, a 23% rise in the last three years. Students come

from approximately 60 parochial and public schools in the Chicago and north-west suburban area.

Notre Dame is primarily college prep with 93% of the class of 1981 going on to college. An all-round athletic program is also offered, which includes 11 varsity sports: football, basketball, track, cross country, wrestling, swimming, hockey, tennis, golf, and soccer. Notre Dame is a member of the East Suburban Catholic Conference which includes Carmel, Holy Cross, St. Viator, St. Patrick, St. Joseph, and Marist. Joliet Catholic enters the conference in 1982-83. Over 600 students participated in the sports program last year. Students also have a large selection of organizations to choose from such as publications, band, and special interest clubs.

The admissions process for all of next year's incoming freshmen starts with a placement test which will be given Saturday, Jan. 9 from 8:15 to 11:30 a.m. at Notre Dame. Each boy is asked to bring two no. 2 pencils and a \$10.00 registration fee.
