
What was the reason for the invitation and who would send it?





They're the ones who are willing to get out and take a stand and do something about things. The motivation (we hope) is that they personally care about what happens and want to make things a little

Jack's article described well the different types of people who run for public office and the motivations they have; from the professional politician, to the ego tripper, to those who wish to improve on the job now being done. There's a very important word involved here and that word is "service". A modern day philosopher has said, "a being is only as valuable as he can serve others." If you think about it you'll see that almost by definition that is a true statement. You are as valuable to society, to your family or to those around you to the degree that you can contribute



to them in some way. A mother who cares for and does a good job of raising her children is a very valuable mother. A friend you can count on (be it for help or just a good time) is to that degree a valuable friend. A newspaper columnist (or editor!) gives you something to read and how valuable he is to you in that capacity is determined by the helpfulness, interest or entertainment he provides. You could have the greatest genius in the world but if he never produces anything or never has any contact with people, he has no real value to those around him. Any job we have is tied up in these key factors of "contribution" and "service" - from the mail sorter to the corporation president whose company depends on his every decision.



After a high speed chase through Niles and Morton Grove Tuesday, Feb. 9, Niles police arrested 2 Chicago men and charged them with theft and traffic violations.
