### From the Left Hand

As 1982 drew to a close, Niles approved many millions of dollars of industrial revenue bonds for companies intending to build or expand in the community. The rash of approvals in December was caused by a likely change in federal regulations about the issuance of such bonds.

The IRB's enabled companies which applied for them to receive loans of from 2%-4% less than what the market was issuing at the time. The bonds have a tax exempt status which enables banks or financial institutions loaning the money to receive tax-free interest from the borrowers.

On first look the bonds seem to enhance the economic health of any community. In Golf Mill a new department store received approval for the bonds which could save them many hundreds of thousands of dollars of interest. The construction would result in more jobs in the area. And the additional store would provide many retail jobs and increased revenue for the community in sales and real estate.

### District 63 considers co-op computer program

At Tuesday evening's District 63 board meeting, members discussed contracting with Glenview School District 34 for entry into a computer consortium of Cook County School Districts administered from the Glenview district. A membership fee is \$3,250 and 50 cents per student enrollment as of October 1. Total cost would be \$4,911.

Membership would supposedly enable District 63 to purchase both computer software and hardware as well as gain a stipulated amount of in-service training.

Although recommended for approval by Dr. Donald Bond, school administrator, board members expressed dissatisfaction.

Residents could not be convinced it was Spring last Monday when a storm dumped 9.4 inches of snow on Bugleland. High winds complicated the inclement weather even more when 2 foot drifts built up in several sections. Many residents had put away their snow blowers and shovels last week when the temperature rose to 67 degrees, but Monday evening and Tuesday morning, the drone of running snowblowers

could be heard all over town. Monday's freak snow storm brought the season total to 58.4 inches making it the fourth snowiest winter in weather bureau records.

Niles' Director of Public Services Keith Peck told The Bugle the village has never used as much salt as it has this winter. 2,300 tons have been spread on Niles streets and according to

## Comptroller to speak at Niles Chamber

The chief fiscal control officer for the State of Illinois will be the featured speaker at the April 13 luncheon meeting of the Niles Chamber of Commerce and Industry at Bunker Hill Country Club, 6635 Milwaukee Ave., Niles. Roland W. Burris, Illinois State Comptroller is only the third person elected to that prestigious state office. He was inaugurated on January 8, 1979 and on October 7, 1981 announced his candidacy for a second term as comptroller.

Burris will speak on the topic: The New Federalism and Illinois Finances. He will also discuss how the new federalism will impact on municipalities like Niles and surrounding communities.

The Niles Chamber has made special arrangements to lower its luncheon reservation prices so a maximum number of business people can attend. Chamber members will pay \$6 per person, non-members \$8 per person. Interested area residents can call 966-1865 for reservations. The luncheon begins at 11:30 a.m.

Burris, a native of Centralia, Illinois earned a B.A. degree in Political Science from Southern Illinois University. He studied international law at the University of Hamburg in Germany. In 1963 he received his law degree (Juris Doctor) from Howard University Law School.

He has served as a National Bank Examiner in the office of the Comptroller of the Currency, U.S. Treasury Department. He spent eight years at Continental Illinois Bank, following a career ladder to a position as Vice President.

In 1973 Burris entered the Cabinet of Governor Dan Walker and served as Director of



General Services. In 1977 he was named National Executive Director and Chief Operating Officer of Operation PUSH.

In his business and public service careers, he has received numerous awards, honors and citations, including biographies in Who's Who in America, Who's Who in Law, and Who's Who in Government.

Ebony Magazine named him along "The 100 Most Influential Black Americans in 1979, 1980 and again in 1981."

He is a past president of the National State Comptrollers Association and serves as secretary of the National Association of State Auditors, Comptrollers and Treasurers.

Recently, Burris was named an at-large member of the Democratic National Committee; and in June, 1981 he received the Israel Peace Medal presented by the State of Israel Bonds.

Niles Savings and Loan, 7077 Dempster St., expects to merge with Uptown Federal Savings and Loan by August, it was announced last Friday.

In making the disclosure, Niles Savings indicated that Irving Deemar, Chairman of Niles Savings, will become Chairman of the Board of Uptown Federal Savings. Additionally, Aaron Deemar, currently the Executive Vice President of Niles Savings, will take on the position of Senior Vice President following the merger of the two financial institutions.

The depressed economy and high interest rates, which have thrown the construction industry into a depression, has resulted in Niles Savings being unable to issue home loans to area customers. As a result of this, Niles Savings lost \$900,000 in 1980, according to Aaron Deemar.

Explaining the necessity of merging with the large Uptown chain, Deemar said, "With the advent of continuing high interest rates and losses...we must acquire (new savings and loans) and get more size..."

In announcing the merger, Niles Savings said it had assets of \$79 million at the end of 1981. Uptown Federal Savings was reported to have \$518 million in assets at the end of 1981. Additionally, the merger of the two savings and loans will increase the number of offices from its current 17 to 21 in Chicago and surrounding suburbs.

Deemar said the name Niles Savings will be dropped following the merger and the name Uptown Federal Savings and Loan Association will be used.

Commenting on the proposed merger, Howard Goldsberry, Secretary of the Uptown Federal Association, said he expected Uptown to "benefit" from the merger. "We think we will be able to provide a wider range of services to our customers since we will have additional resources (by including Niles Savings)."

Goldsberry said he expects it will take between 30 and 45 days for the Federal Home Loan Bank in Washington D.C. to approve the merger proposal. Following Continued on Page 28

### DO YOU KNOW ABOUT THE HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION?

If you are a homeowner in Illinois born in 1916 and thereby you were 65 as of January 2, 1982 you can now apply for the Homestead Exemption Credit which will reduce the 1982 real estate tax bill you will receive in 1983. Since this is the first time you will file, you need to take with you to your local County Assessor the following papers:

1. Copy of deed to the property.
2. Proof of age. A man should bring birth certificate or driver's license and Medicare card. A woman should bring both birth certificate and marriage certificate.
3. Latest real estate tax bill.

A homebound person can get the application by phoning the Assessor's Office at 443-4151. Copies of the above mentioned documents can be sent by mail.

Savings to the homeowner depend upon the local tax rate and usually amounts to about \$120 to \$200 in savings.

### ELDERHOSTEL PROGRAMS

Elderhostels, not to be confused with the youth hostels that appear in many European villages, offer low-cost residential learning for senior citizens on over 500 college and university campuses in the U.S. During a one-week stay, Elderhostels live in a college dorm, attend three classes on campus and participate in special activities. The cost of this one week mini-vacation is \$150 including the lodging, meals, classes and activities.

Northern Illinois University will be conducting two such programs from June 6 to 12, and July 11 to 17. 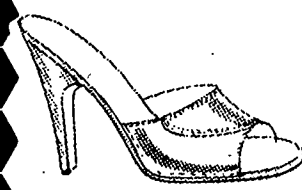

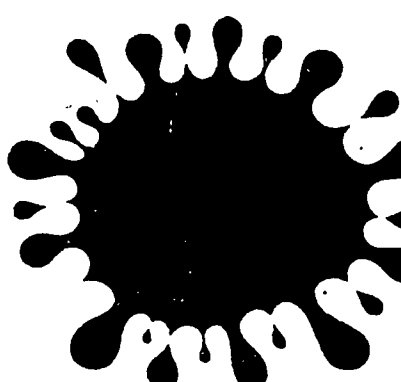

## Driving safety hints

Spring is less than two weeks away, but daylight driving hours don't increase significantly for another month. If you determine that there is not sufficient daylight to see other vehicles ahead or behind you, or if rain, fog or other conditions dictate, turn on your headlights. Vehicles must have two headlights (one on motorcycles) that are visible for at least 500 feet. They must be lighted from sunset to sunrise and at any other time when visibility is so limited as to require the use of lights for safety. Motorcycles - operating on streets and highways must have at least one lighted head lamp at all times. Headlights must be dimmed at least 500 feet before meeting and 300 feet before overtaking another vehicle. If your vehicle is not readily visible to approaching drivers, the potential of danger to yourself and others is dramatically increased. Make sure your headlights are on when visibility is poor. ## Motorcycle driving safety hints

Motorcyclists have the same right-of-way privileges as other drivers and are entitled to the same courtesy and consideration on the road. Please keep these safety rules in mind when near a motorcycle:

1. Don't crowd a motorcycle. Allow more following distance than you do for a car. A motorcycle often can stop faster than your car because it is much lighter in weight. Getting too close may make the cyclist nervous and cause him or her to lose balance and fall in front of your car.
2. Regardless of size, motorcycles are entitled to sue the full width of a traffic lane. Do not try to stop next to a motorcycle in the same lane...either change lanes or stay behind. Do not try to pass a motorcycle in the lane it is using.
3. If you are following a motorcycle, allow plenty of distance when approaching a railroad track. If the crossing is rough or the tracks cross the road at an angle, the rider will need room to maneuver and will have to slow down.
4. Allow even more following distance between your vehicle and any motorcycle when the road is wet and slippery.

## Kustra calls for change in school tax levy date

State Representative Bob Kustra (R-Glenview) introduced legislation (HB2250) last week to give Cook County school districts three more months to file their tax levies which should minimize excessive tax levies based on insufficient information. The levy determines how much money is needed to operate during the next fiscal year. When school boards are forced to levy before they know the needs of schools for the next fiscal year, they tend to levy more than they need just to protect themselves.

School districts have come under increasing criticism lately for levying too high and failing to abate later. According to Kustra, "With three extra months to analyze needs and latest financial data heretofore unavailable in September, schools will be able to plan better and there should be less reason to exaggerate need and levy higher property taxes. Taxpayers should benefit with lower and more realistic tax bills."

### Considering Reroofing Yourself? Be Sure To Heed Safety Rules

One of the ways to save money on the cost of home repairs is to do them yourself. And, as the do it yourselfer becomes more skilled, he takes on more complicated projects. If you are one of them, the time may come when you consider reroofing as a do-it-yourself job.

If reroofing is in order and you're considering whether to hire a contractor or do the roof installation on your own, remember that reroofing can be a difficult and hazardous job. Before going ahead, the Asphalt Roofing Manufacturers Association suggests that you ask yourself these questions:

- Can I do the job as well as a professional?
- Am I willing to devote the time and effort to getting the job done correctly?
- Am I comfortable working at heights?

Unless the answer to these questions is an unqualified yes, you're better off leaving reroofing in the hands of a professional roofing contractor.

Remember also, adds ARMA, that steep-slope and high roofs or those with many angles, dormers or gables are best left to the professional.

To determine the pitch of your roof, measure how many inches it rises for each foot it runs. Roofs with slopes of

four to five inches per horizontal foot are the safest and easiest for the do it yourselfer. When the slope is less than four inches per foot, special application procedures are recommended.

If you chose to reroof yourself, ARMA says to be sure to follow these safety procedures:

- Keep people away from the work area.
- Place shingles and tools where they won't slide off the roof.
- Wear rubber-soled construction-type shoes for secure footing.
- Apply shingles on clear days when it is warm, but not hot.
- Do not reroof in wet weather or when the temperature is below 40 degrees F.
- Reroof only when the roof deck and existing shingles are dry. Moisture makes roofs slippery and dangerous.
- Lift only light loads.
- Secure ladders: top and bottom and keep the roof surface clear of debris.
- Never allow ladders to come in contact with power lines.

The basic reroofing tools include a hammer, roofing nails, tape measure, utility knife, chalk line for proper shingle alignment, and a pointed trowel for applying roofing cement. A carpenter's

apron keeps the tools handy. Ladders, scaffolding and safety harnesses can be rented.

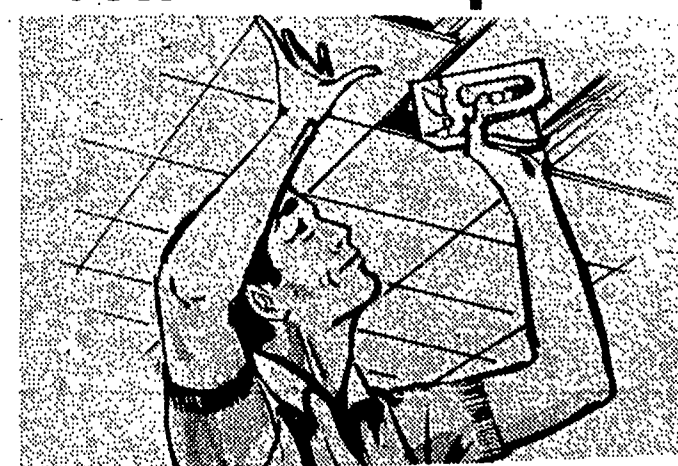

## Consumers Best Buy Is Still Natural Gas

(The following is an interview with American Gas Association President George H. Lawrence on natural gas supply and consumer prices).

**Question:** Consumer Utility Bills are rising. How much will the price of natural gas increase?

**Lawrence:** The cost of all energy is increasing to the consumer. However, gas industry and Department of Energy projections both indicate that the cost of natural gas will remain 40-50 percent less than fuel oil through 1990 and much cheaper than electric heat.

**Question:** How can the consumer reduce the impact of rising energy costs?

**Lawrence:** Conservation. The wise use of energy is one of the most important ways to help control utility bills. Insulation, weather stripping, caulking cracks, turning the thermostat down in winter and up in summer are all important.

**Question:** What about new appliances — do they really save energy and money?

**Lawrence:** Yes, but it is important to make sure an appliance with energy saving features is selected. New gas furnaces, for example, feature pilotless ignition and au-

tomatic vent dampers that eliminate heat-loss when the furnace is off.

**Question:** What is the outlook for natural gas supply?

**Lawrence:** Energy experts in government and in the gas industry are projecting a steady growth in gas supply through the year 2000. During the past several years America has been finding substantial new supplies of natural gas and the gas industry is involved in a number of supplement supply projects. Those include: making gas energy from coal and building a pipeline to bring natural gas from Alaska to the lower 48-states.

## Gas Dryers save cash

A new gas dryer can reduce by as much as 30 percent the amount of gas energy needed to dry clothes, according to the American Gas Association.

Compared to older, less efficient dryers, the new gas-efficient models can save consumers up to \$100 in lifetime

operating costs by energy-saving features such as pilotless ignition and automatic shutoff.

Gas clothes dryers require very little upkeep and can be maintained in a matter of seconds.

For example, it is important to keep the lint screen

clean. The location of the screen varies with different models — some are on top, others on the bottom. A few models place the lint screen inside the door. But remember: keeping the lint screen clean is the single most important step to ensure proper air circulation and efficient, economical dryer operation.

Whenever possible, vent the dryer for exhaust. This will carry moisture-laden air out of the house. Indoor clothes drying with gas is much faster and more convenient than drying laundry outside. But the amount of moisture involved is enormous. "Exhausting" the dryer will prevent moist air from being recirculated through it. Also, it will decrease drying time, using less gas and saving money.

The correct degree of dryness should be chosen. Clothes will come out better, especially permanent pressed clothes.

**PAINT ROLLERS** — Wash latex and oil-based paints off paint rollers as you would off brushes. After washing, dry the roller with a clean rag. Wrapping the roller in aluminum foil will help maintain the soft texture of the nap. Always store rollers on end to avoid flattening the nap.

## Gas Home Heating Saves

Consumers faced with the cost of replacing a home-heating system should select the most efficient, cost-effective system, the American Gas Association says.

Gas heating systems are highly efficient and natural gas is priced below heating oil and electric heat. New gas furnaces have automatic vent dampers which prevent warm air from escaping when the furnace is off. This keeps the house warmer for longer periods of time — saving gas and money because the heating system runs less frequently.

A furnace does not run constantly except in very cold weather. It cycles on and off to maintain the temperature pre-selected on the thermostat. When the furnace is off, some of the heated air in the house moves naturally through the furnace and escapes up the flue. The vent damper, a circular metal plate fitted inside the flue pipe and operated by a motor linked to the controls of the furnace, closes off this escape route.

When the thermostat calls for heat, and the furnace goes on the damper opens. When the furnace shuts off, the damper closes, keeping the warm air from escaping.

Since the house cools off at a slower rate, the thermostat "calls" for heat less often.

New gas furnaces also save money. Continuously burning pilot lights are replaced with intermittent ignition systems. With an I.I.S., a tiny electrical spark jumps across a gap to ignite the pilot and then the furnace.

Only a minute amount of energy is needed with an I.I.S. The amount of gas saved over the lifetime of the furnace can be impressive.

When compared to older gas furnaces, a new energy efficiency gas heating system with vent damper and I.I.S. can save a homeowner up to \$700 in lifetime operating costs. And the same amount of space can be heated with 20 percent less gas as quickly, cleanly and dependably as before.

The spring and summer months are good times to evaluate home heating needs — painting, caulking, upgrading insulation and for replacement of old, inefficient heating systems. Consider an automatic thermostat that can set the heating system to meet particular lifestyles. And storm windows and doors and the insulation around them.

## SELECT CONTRACTOR CAREFULLY

Many homeowners find themselves confused when it comes to choosing a contractor to do that remodeling project they've been dreaming of for so long.

"When you consider the homeowner is talking about tampering with what may well be his most valuable possession, it's understandable that he may have some fear of choosing the wrong contractor," says John Hammond, executive vice president of the National Home Improvement Council (NHIC).

Media stories of home improvement horrors scare some homeowners right out of remodeling projects and leave others with a worried feeling about the work for which they've just signed.

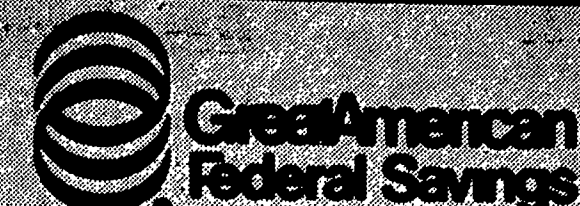
"However, it needn't be that way," says the Council executive. Homeowners who take the time to carefully select their contractor rarely suffer headline making episodes.

In many areas of the country individuals can check with the National Home Improvement Council, which has more than 50 chapters across the nation. NHIC's members are pledged to a strict Code of Ethics and in many areas have a cooperative Consumer Care program with the Better Business Bureau. Many of these chapters are listed in local telephone directories and will send callers a list of contractor members.

If there isn't an NHIC chapter in your area, the trade association suggests following the steps listed below when choosing a contractor.

- 1) Employ a contractor with an established place of business, preferably in your locality.
  - 2) Check for adequate financial references.
  - 3) Get references of satisfied customers and check on them personally by phone. If your city has a Better Business Bureau, check to see if there is an adverse file on the contractor. In lieu of a BBB, check with your local Chamber of Commerce.
  - 4) Observe carefully how precisely he "sizes up" your proposed project, take note of his suggestions and discuss them thoroughly with him. Don't be rushed and avoid snap judgements, either pro or con.
  - 5) Be certain to have a written agreement on plans and specifications (the materials to be used).
  - 6) Have a thorough understanding as to the quality of materials and workmanship required.
  - 7) Get bids from more than one contractor.
- Regardless of whether you use an NHIC member or not, be sure your contractor meets the guidelines and readily answers all your questions.

## Look For Signs Of Worn Roof

Signs that indicate a roof is worn out are cracked, curled or missing shingles. These conditions show that the roof has become brittle and dried out.

The most reliable determinant, says ARMA, is the age of the roof. A roof of standard shingles, 15 years old or older, is a prime candidate for reroofing.

When facing reroofing decisions, you will find that a good roofing contractor can be extremely helpful. A professional contractor can give useful advice on roofing materials and the use of color to provide "curb appeal." Before reroofing, have the roofer conduct a thorough on the roof inspection.

Increasingly popular for reroofing these days are three-dimensional asphalt shingles in rustic earth-tone shades. 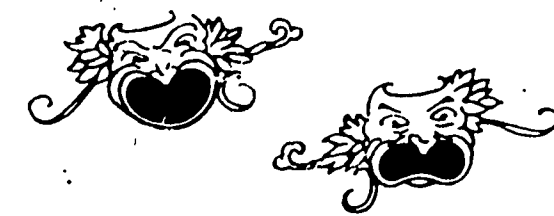

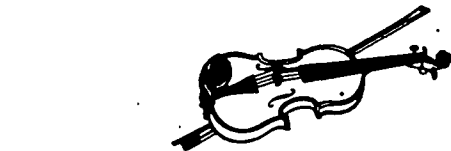

taxes. It would also give additional impetus to increased commercial activity for surrounding businesses in the shopping center.

While all these pluses seem to benefit the economy, the federal government gets hurt by the tax exempt status of the loans. It is left out of the groups which benefit from these activities.

Municipal governments also get hurt by the tax exempts. The tremendous increase of IRB's on the market pushes up the prices of municipal bonds which costs local governments more money when they want to improve public works projects.

To receive village approval to seek tax exempt bonds, a local company first inquires about its chances for qualifying for them. Niles bond counselors, Benjamin and Lang, study the request and make sure the company has the financial requisites for meeting the standards necessary for acquiring the bonds. Niles village attorney and village financial committee then review the application. If approved, the village board passes a resolution which enables the seeking company to go to their financial in-

stitution with the tax exempts approval.

Niles, being a home rule community, is able to provide a 60%-65% approval of the pending prime rate. Thus, if today's rate is about 16½%, companies receiving approval for tax exempts hope to get loans for around 10%. Non-home rule communities can approve for about 70% of the maximum of prime which would mean a 16½% prime would result in an 11½% interest rate.

In Niles, Sound Video Unlimited closed out their tax exempt loan at the end of the year for about 1 million dollars. Middle/Market Oven Company closed out December 17 for \$500,000. General Business Forms closed out last Thursday for \$950,000. "Closing out" means the tax exempt loan has been approved.

P. A. Bernger, the Golf Mill store, was approved by the village for \$10,000,000 and F.S.A. Niles Association for 6.2 million dollars. The latter corporation owns the Golf Glen Shopping Center. Both of these loans are still outstanding, not having been completed, according to Niles officials.

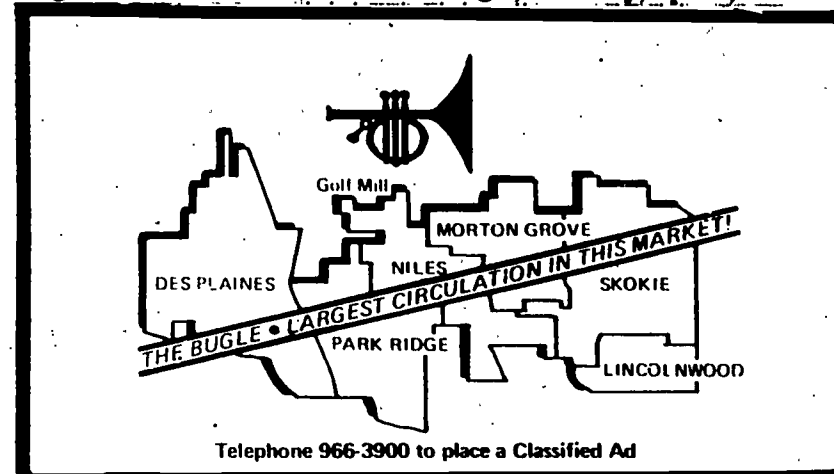
