DO YOU KNOW ABOUT THE HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION? If you are a homeowner in Illinois born in 1916 and thereby you were 65 as of January 2, 1982 you can now apply for the Homestead Exemption Credit which will reduce the 1982 real estate tax bill you will receive in 1983. Since this is the first time you will file, you need to take with you to your local County Assessor the following papers: 1. Copy of deed to the property. 2: Proof of age. A man should bring birth certificate or driver's license and Medicare card. A woman should bring both birth certificate and marriage certificate. 3. Latest real estate tax bill.

A homebound person can get the application by phoning the Assessor's Office at 443-6151. Copies of the above mentioned documents can be sent by mail. Savings to the homeowner depend upon the local tax rate and usually amounts to about \$120 to \$200 in savings.

Motorcyclists have the same right-of-way privileges as other drivers and are entitled to the same courtesy and consideration on the road. Please keep these safety rules in mind when near a motorcycle:





Many homeowners find themselves confused when it comes to choosing a contractor to do that remodeling project they've been dreaming of for so long.

"When you consider the homeowner is talking about tampering with what may well be his most valuable possession, it's understandable that he may have some fear of choosing the wrong contractor." says John Hammon, executive vice president of the National Home Improvement Council (NHIC).

2) Check for adequate financial references.

3) Get references of satisfied customers and check on them personally by phone. If your city has a Better Business Bureau, check to see if there is an adverse file on the contractor. In lieu of a BBB, check with your local Chamber of Commerce.

4) Observe carefully how precisely he "sizes up" your proposed project, take note of his suggestions and discuss them thoroughly with him. Don't be rushed and avoid snap judgements, either pro or con.

5) Be certain to have a written agreement on plans and specifications (the materials to be used).


6) Have a thorough understanding as to the quality of materials and workmanship required.

7) Get bids from more than one contractor. Regardless of whether you

use an NHIC member or not, be sure your contractor meets the guidelines and readily answers all your questions.

Look For Signs Of Worn Roof

Homeowners can save money by spotting the early signs of a worn out roof. A roof that's slightly damaged, but ignored, can lead to serious problems in the roof deck and in the attic and could result in costly repairs, advises the Asphalt. Roofing Manufacturers Association.

If a few shingles have been blown away by high winds, or damaged by tree branches, chances are the damage can easily be repaired. Missing or damaged shingles can be replaced. Leaks around flashing can be waterproofed.

Sooner or later, however, all roofs have to be replaced. If the roof shows signs of old age, repairs will only help temporarily because roofs tend to wear uniformly

Signs that indicate a roof is worn out are cracked, curled or missing shingles. These conditions show that the roof has become brittle and dried out.

The most reliable determinant, says ARMA, is the age of the roof. A roof of standard shingles, 15 years old or older, is a prime candidate for reroofing.

When facing reroofing decisions, you will find that a good roofing contractor can be extremely helpful. A professional contractor can give useful advice on roofing materials and the use of color to provide "curb appeal." Before reroofing have the roofer conduct a thorough on the roof inspection.
