## U.S. Mayoral Conference backs handgun control ordinance

The influential U.S. Conference of Mayors announced its support of Morton Grove's controversial handgun control ordinance on Friday.

The handgun ban is currently being considered in the U.S. Court of Appeals and the Illinois Appellate Court. The U.S. Conference of Mayors filed a "friend of the court" brief in federal

court Friday supporting the right of a municipality to ban handgun ownership.

Morton Grove Administrative Assistant Jim Sloan said village officials "welcomed" the action but said it came as "no surprise, as we believed local communities would be active in supporting..." the Morton Grove ordinance. Sloan said officials expect oral

arguments to be completed before the federal court prior to the upcoming summer recess. A decision should be issued by the fall.

The U.S. Conference of Mayors is made up of municipalities with populations over 30,000 residents. Their membership is made up of 480 cities throughout the United States.

In an effort to fight rising utility bills, East Maine Public Schools, District 63 has joined Project COST, a coalition of northern Illinois school districts. This resolution was introduced by Dr. Donald E. Bond at the April 27 meeting of the Board of Education and was passed unanimously.

The Conserve Our School Taxes

group successfully fought proposed Commonwealth Edison rate increases in 1981-82, and is now preparing for the 1982-83 hearings before the Illinois Commerce Commission.

COST helped reduce Edison's 1981-82 proposal of 19.6% to the ICC-sanctioned increase of about 15%, approved six months ago. If

Kaufman to notify Blase whether theatre will remain open

## Decision on Mill Run this week

Niles officials were waiting Wednesday to receive word on whether Mill Run Theatre will close "within weeks" because of financial problems.

Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase said Jerry Kaufman, of Tiffany Productions, which leases Mill Run, would contact Niles officials on Wednesday (May 5) with a decision on whether they will continue running the theatre.

This follows a week in which Tiffany Productions repeatedly told Niles officials the future of Mill Run is uncertain. However, Golf Mill officials said they had received no word that Mill Run may go out of business.

In the event Mill Run continues operating, Blase said Niles will close down the theatre if they have not constructed an outdoor fire escape within 30 days.

After delaying Niles' order for over one year to construct the fire escape, Blase said, "we won't let them operate..." unless the fire escape is constructed. He said Mill Run operator Jerry Kaufman "has to give us a contract" outlining when construction on the fire escape will begin and who will do the work.

The cost of the fire escape is expected to run between \$10,000 and \$15,000.

## Return Homeowner's Exemption form for savings

People who both own and live in their own home can save up to \$300 in property taxes with the Homeowner's Exemption, announced Cook County Assessor Thomas C. Hynes.

Hynes recently mailed to all Cook County homeowners an application for the exemption. Qualified homeowners are asked to return it by May 14 so they can receive the savings on tax bills due out this summer.

Eligible residential properties include single-family homes, condos, co-ops and apartment buildings up to six units occupied by the current or previous owner as of January 1, 1981.

The Homeowner's Exemption, also known as the Hynes Exemption, works by eliminating from taxation any increase up to \$300 in the taxable value of a home since 1977.

If you are a homeowner, but did not receive the application card, promptly contact the Assessor's Homeowner's Exemption Department at 443-7500.

Senior citizens already qualified to receive the 1981 Senior Homestead Exemption will automatically receive the 1981 Homeowner's Exemption. Therefore, they will not receive the application and will not have to apply for it.

## Bugle Digest Local News Briefs

Three Niles Police Detectives were honored Monday night for their actions in apprehending a 33-year-old Deerfield man charged with the March 31 murder of a Niles woman. The Niles Police and Fire Commission presented the Distinguished Duty Award Monday night to Detectives Jack Thompson, Charles Affrunti and Gerald Sheehan for their work in helping to identify the remains of 53-year-old Mrs. Veronica Kordek. After bringing James Lauer of Northbrook in for questioning, the detectives were instrumental in obtaining a confession from him.

Long time East Maine Dist. 63 physical education teacher Harry Klocker is retiring at the end of this school year. Klocker, who taught at Oak School before being transferred to Nelson following the closing of Oak, will surely be remembered by the generations of students he taught.

Park Ridge has issued its first liquor license. Park Ridge Mayor Martin Butler was at the Pickwick Restaurant on Friday in downtown Park Ridge to present the owner with his license. Park Ridge recently enacted its first ordinance allowing liquor to be served with meals in restaurants.

Two Des Plaines residents were killed on Sunday when they were apparently overcome by smoke and fire in their home. Ned Kipkowski, 70, and his sister Eugenia Sanford, 68, of 2075 Halsey rd. apparently died of smoke inhalation and burns, according to officials at Holy Family Hospital. Firemen arriving at the house at 2:45 a.m. were unable to rescue the residents because of the intense heat and smoke.

# MG feels gun vote on ballot doubtful

Morton Grove resident William Blameuser filed a petition Tuesday to allow voters to voice their opinion on the controversial handgun control ordinance in a non-binding referendum during the upcoming November election. However, the referendum drive was immediately shrouded in a series of charges as to whether it had been correctly obtained, and in accusations that Blameuser has links to American Nazi movements.

Morton Grove Village Attorney Martin Ashman doubted Blameuser had collected the correct number of signatures to assure the referendum would be on the November ballot.

Blameuser, according to Morton Grove officials, had collected some 1,500 signatures on his petition and claimed all he needed was 10 per cent of the number of Morton Grove residents who voted in the March primary. However, Ashman said that, in fact, state law says 25 per cent of the total registered voters would be necessary to assure a place on the November ballot for the referendum.

Ashman added in preliminary conversations with the Illinois Department of Elections, state officials seemed to agree with him though they said they would have to carefully check the law.

Since it became known that Blameuser was circulating a petition, rumors have persisted

that he has ties with American Nazi organizations.

In a Wednesday interview with The Bugle, Blameuser admitted having been a Nazi. "I was a member...a few years back I was affiliated with the NSPA (National Socialist Party of America)," said Blameuser. The National Socialist Party of America is one of two Nazi political parties in America. However, he added that he was "not really active" and is currently not a member of any Nazi organization.

Blameuser said, regarding his Nazi past, that he "still has sympathies in that direction." Blameuser added that "Nazism has nothing to do with this issue (the referendum)...it is not the point."

"In getting signatures I did not deny (being a Nazi) but I did not march down the street as a storm trooper," said Blameuser.

Additionally, Blameuser said, "lots of Jewish people signed" his petition. The 24-year-old Morton Grove resident said he has lived in Morton Grove all his life.

## MG residents seek support for nuclear weapons freeze

Dear Editor:

The Freeze moving through our country now is not one which will kill our plants and hurt our people; it is a beneficial Freeze which might, instead, save our lives. The Freeze stands for Nuclear Weapons Freeze, which means an end to the arms race by stopping all development, manufacture, and deployment of nuclear weapons by the Soviet Union and the United States, this to be followed by step-by-step mutual reduction of nuclear weapons. We feel that the Freeze must be broadened also to cover weapons for chemical and biological warfare, those dread products of unreasoning fear.

President Eisenhower once said that peace is too important to be left to the generals, and this is what great numbers of Americans have decided. For too long we have tried to ignore the danger of nuclear weapons, though the underlying anxiety has been very damaging, especially to children. We must confront the danger honestly, and reduce it...and eventually eliminate it. If the politicians won't act, the people must. The madness of stacking up mountains of deadly weapons beyond any rational need for deterrence must be stopped.

This is a very favorable moment for a freeze since the United States and the Soviet

Union have reached approximate parity. In the last several years the Soviet government has made several proposals for a partial or full moratorium on nuclear weapons. So far, however, the United States government has rejected these, on the ground that the U.S. must have superiority. We must show our government that we find this unrealistic and wrongheaded. Negotiations for weapons freeze and reduction must take place under conditions of equality. We now have means of verification of existing weapons levels. The only path to survival is to adopt the Freeze, and to proceed through hard negotiations to a safer healthier world for everyone.

We hope that many residents of Morton Grove agree that it is time for our village to join the Freeze movement, as twenty-seven other communities in our immediate region are doing. If you do, please come to our meeting on Monday, May 10, at 8 p.m., in the Memorial Room of St. Martha's Church, 8523 Georgian St. We will lay plans for our campaign and hear about the resolution calling for a nuclear weapons freeze which has recently been introduced in the Illinois Legislature.

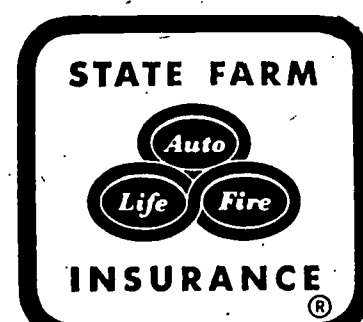

## Litter cleanup costs taxpayers \$\$\$

It's the season when the winter-wracked motorist sets out to enjoy the springtime scenery along the open road.

But, all too often, he doesn't find only flowers and firs and fauna along the roadside.

He finds litter. All kinds of litter. Cans. Car hoods. Food sacks. Auto jacks. The list is limitless.

Lots of the litter, it seems, is discarded by the motorists who regard the roadside as a free dumping ground.

"It's not free, however," Secretary of Transportation John D. Kramer pointed out today.

"It costs the state an estimated \$2.5 million a year in labor and equipment to clean it up," said Kramer, who heads the Illinois Department of Transportation, the agency with state highways in its jurisdiction.

That cost, he said, is in addition to what it costs cities, villages and other governmental units to clear out the litter in their areas.

"That's money out of the pockets of the taxpayers," Kramer said, "and it's money that could be used for filling potholes, or repairing bridges, or taking care of other road-related needs."

"Most people wouldn't throw money out of their window," he said. "Yet every time they toss a bottle, or sack, or other litter along the roadside, they are in effect throwing away tax dollars."

The solution, he said, is obvious: Don't throw anything out the roadside.

Although there are no statistics available on how much trash is tossed on the state's roadides, he said, an indication of the volume of the problem can be seen from the amount of debris that inmates of Illinois prisons—under a new program—pick up.

Inmates, carefully guarded, worked from April through November last year along more than 5,100 miles of interstate highways of the state and picked up enough trash to fill more than 66,000 garbage bags.

In many communities across Illinois, Kramer pointed out, groups of volunteer citizens make an effort to save tax money and beautify their areas by picking up litter from roadides and other public property.

Such groups should get permission first from the appropriate governmental unit.

Anyone interested in conducting such a "litter walk," Kramer said, can contact their local community or the state Department of Transportation.

### 'Right turn on red' most abused traffic law

The law allowing a right turn at a red light after stopping makes it easier to drive when traffic is light.

Unfortunately, this has become one of our most abused traffic laws. Many motorists think the law allows them to slow down at a red light, take a quick look and dart into traffic.

The law was enacted to help move traffic safely, particularly in slow periods, with the responsibility on the driver making a right turn from a red light.

The law states that a right turn is permitted at a red light under certain conditions. You must come to a full stop, look for traffic on the street you are entering and yield the right of way to any traffic on that street and pedestrians in the adjacent crosswalk. You then may proceed to make your right turn with caution.

You should also watch for and obey signs at traffic signals which say "No turn on red."

Making a left turn after stopping at a red light is permitted from a one-way street to a one-way street heading left. Again, make sure you stop, look, yield and proceed cautiously.

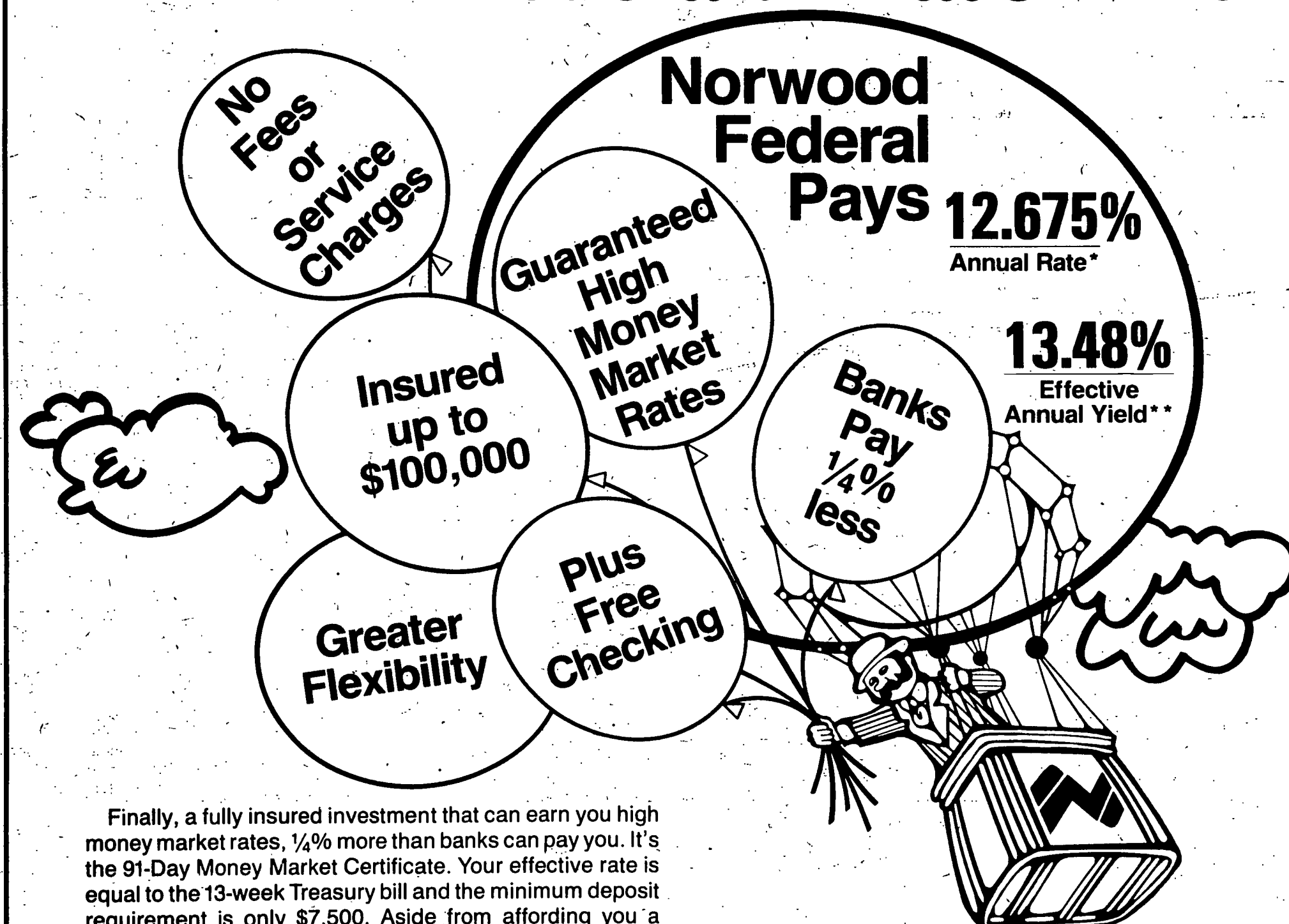

### Black praises seminar for Democratic Senate Candidates

The April 18-20 seminar in Springfield run by the Committee to Elect a Democratic Senate in Illinois was praised this week by Louis Black of Skokie, Democratic candidate for State Senator for the 28th District.

Black, who is Niles Township Clerk, said that the seminar exceeded his expectations. "It not only offered candidates broad discussions on the major issues confronting the Illinois Senate but emphasized that only we can decide how we should vote on issues because only we can represent our individual districts."

"This is the point I have been making in my campaign," said Black. "I will not vote a conservative line or a liberal line or a party line, but a people's line."

"Our government is set up on a system of checks and balances. Members of the state legislature must not hesitate to challenge the Governor, if we have any doubts about his policies, not follow him blindly," he commented.

Black and his chief advisor Richard Smith of Skokie described the seminar as a "no-nonsense operation" and "extremely informative."

Some of the persons addressing the seminar included State Party Chairman Philip Rock, Democratic National Committee Chairman Charles Manatt and former

Illinois Senator Adlai Stevenson, who is the Democratic candidate for governor in the November election.

There were lectures concerned with the key issues facing Illinois legislators and discussions on the nuts and bolts of running a campaign.

Prior to the seminar, Black noted, each candidate received a 200-page booklet containing discussion papers on the major issues of the 1981 session of the 82nd General Assembly.

The document included 17 discussion papers on such subjects as: economic revitalization; property tax issues; revenue issues; education; transportation issues; workers' compensation and unemployment insurance.

Black said that the Committee plans additional seminars for candidates as the campaign progresses and that candidates also will be sent materials updating their information about Senate activities.

"We were encouraged," he said, "to contact Committee staff for any additional information we might want on bills before the Senate so that we could make an informed decision on how we could vote on these bills."

Black commented that he expects to make good use of the information he obtained at the seminar in his campaign.

### Jaffe opposes lie detector test as condition of employment

State Representative Aaron Jaffe (D-Skokie) has introduced legislation to make it unlawful for an employer to require a lie detector test as a condition of employment.

"No one should be denied a job

because they refuse to take a lie detector test," Jaffe said.

"There are many ways to check out a person's character. Jaffe's bill, House Bill 2537, would permit anyone who is denied a job because of his refusal to take a lie detector test to bring civil action against the employer and recover damages plus attorney's fees and court costs.

A violation of the act would be punishable by a fine not to exceed \$1,000. Jaffe said the bill is supported by groups concerned with protecting workers' civil liberties.

"Besides, it has been proven that these tests are really not reliable indicators of a person's trustworthiness."

Jaffe's bill, House Bill 2537, would permit anyone who is denied a job because of his refusal to take a lie detector test to bring civil action against the employer and recover damages plus attorney's fees and court costs.

A violation of the act would be punishable by a fine not to exceed \$1,000. Jaffe said the bill is supported by groups concerned with protecting workers' civil liberties.

Freeze again refers to the National Weapons Freeze which they contend is aimed at ending the arms race by a step by step mutual reduction of nuclear weapons.

While political conditions sometimes prevent politicians in Washington and Springfield from taking stands representative of their constituents' opinions, the grass roots activity at the community level is turning around the political process in America. When Morton Grove trustees passed anti-gun legislation the whole country felt its effect. The anti-nuclear actions taken at the village hall level are likely to prove even more pronounced since so many communities are becoming involved. In suburban Chicagoland more than 20 communities are considering taking local action.

Since we're writing this column Tuesday morning, we can't foresee the reaction to the British torpedoing of the Argentine cruiser, the General Belgrano, with its loss of 600 men's lives. But despite the rights and wrongs of the conflict between the two countries, we have a revolution over the loss of these men's lives over a matter which should have been resolved long ago and will certainly be resolved over a conference table in the near future. 800 lives; 600 families are caused so much pain so needlessly. Had there been some prescience from leaders of responsibility in years past, this absurd conflict need never have happened.

We decry the blood being spilled in Argentine waters because national leaders neglected to look to the future, years ago. We would hope the Nuclear Freeze people get a groundswell of support from all of us today so that those living tomorrow won't have to say, "Why didn't we do something yesterday?"

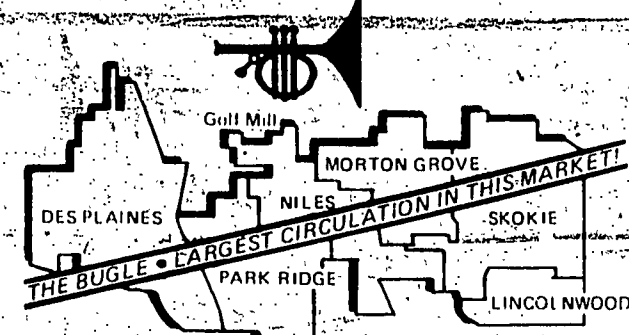

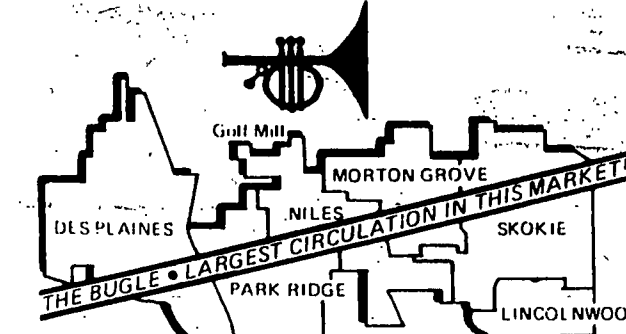

There has been continuous speculation within recent weeks that Mill Run Theatre would soon close its doors because of financial problems. Blase said Kaufman told him on Thursday, April 29, that his organization was weighing their options and would let Niles officials know on Wednesday, May 5, whether they would remain open.

The Mill Run financial problems came to village officials' attention recently as they were again attempting to get Kaufman to install the fire escape.

An incident was reported by The Bugle in early 1981 where a stage light burst during a performance causing smoke to rise to the top of the circular theatre. Patrons seated in the upper level seats momentarily panicked and, in trying to flee, realized there was no upper level fire escape. Many patrons were seen climbing over seats to reach the lower level of the theatre.

However, as the smoke was insignificant, patrons quickly returned to their seats and the stage show continued with only a momentary pause.

Following this incident, letter writers to The Bugle questioned

why there was no outdoor fire escape. In talking with Niles officials it was learned that at the time the theatre was built, such emergency exits were not required and only within recent years would the theatre be required to install the upper level fire escape.

As the controversy grew, Niles officials ordered the theatre to install the outdoor fire escape. Kaufman agreed one year ago to install the fire escape, however, Tiffany Productions have repeatedly delayed the installation of the fire escape telling village officials they were involved in other construction programs and did not have the workers to do it. They then told village officials they were having trouble obtaining the materials they needed and, during this past winter, the weather was preventing them from constructing the outdoor fire escape.

Recently, Kaufman told Blase the theatre may go out of business which would prevent the fire escape from being built.

The Bugle was unable to contact Kaufman following numerous phone calls to his office during this past week.

## State rep honored by U of I College of Law

A five-term representative in the Illinois House is the April alumnus of the month of the University of Illinois College of Law.

Alan J. Greiman, Skokie, a 1955 law graduate, represents the 15th District and chairs the House Democratic Conference.

Greiman was the author of House Bill 65, which he called the first bill introduced in any state legislature to end age-based mandatory retirement. He was a principal sponsor of the Equal Rights Amendment in the 80th General Assembly.

He has sponsored legislation to provide legislative oversight and

protect newsmen from unreasonable searches. Greiman wrote the Illinois Democratic Violence Act, which provides new remedies and approaches to the protection of "battered" household members, Gene Wurth, assistant dean of the U. of I. law college, said.

Greiman has been named "Environmental Legislator of the Year" by the Illinois Environmental Council and "Best Legislator" by the Independent Voters of Illinois, and has been honored by the Illinois Education Association and the Chicago Teachers Union.

## North math and science students in meets

ROTC but later was denied admission into the program because of his alleged link to the American Nazi Party.

Claiming his First Amendment rights were being violated, Blameuser sued for entry into the ROTC. In a September 22, 1980 ruling handed down by the 7th U.S. Court of Appeals in Chicago, the federal court agreed the Army did not have to accept racists into the ROTC.

In the judicial opinion written by Appellate Judge Wilbur F. Pell, the court said Blameuser's racial views were "incompatible" with "important public office" such as membership in the ROTC. Writing about Blameuser, Pell said, "His views on race relations further draw in to question his ability to obey commands, especially in situations in which he (considers) his no upper superiors as socially inferior."

Additionally, according to the Associated Press, Blameuser told his student newspaper he was a member of the Nazi political party, the National Socialist Party of America. Also, the student newspaper reported Blameuser's claim he would deport blacks and Jews if he controlled the government, according to the Associated Press.

Also, the Associated Press reported on his ROTC application, Blameuser wrote that he would refuse, if ordered, to fight on the side of Israel or on the side of "Negro-Communists" in Africa.

In an interview on Tuesday with Dr. Richard Rankin, St. Norbert College's Dean of Students, the school official recalled that, in fact, Blameuser was unable to gain membership into the National Socialist Party of America. "Their Nazi youth group in Chicago is what he was involved in," said Rankin. "I don't think he got accepted by them (the National Socialist Party of America)."

Morton Grove opponents of the controversial handgun ordinance said they were aware of Blameuser's past and, subsequently, worked to remove themselves from his petition drive. One handgun control opponent doubted whether Morton Grove residents would have signed Blameuser's petition "if they knew about" his Nazi affiliations.

Edison's original proposal had been approved, District 63 would now be spending \$40 more for every \$1,000 of electrical use.

In this round of testimony and proposals at the ICC, COST will move to reduce Edison's proposed 19.4% general rate increase, and to stop Edison's proposal that would force many schools into higher rate brackets. East Maine officials say many of the COST efforts center on the fact that public schools do not have the "pass-along" powers of private business. With slim or no hopes of passing referendums, schools have to cut back internally when faced with unreasonable electrical increases.

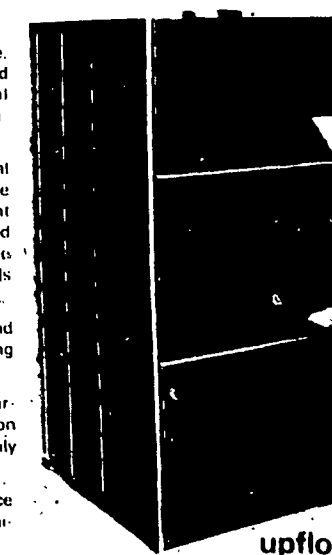
