Emma Melzer, 83, dies in Scottsdale, Az.

Emma S. Melzer, the first principal and superintendent of School District 63 died in her home in Scottsdale, Az. on July 9 at age 83.

Graveside services were held on July 12 in Carlisle, Ark. A memorial service was held on July 14 in the Congregational United Christian Church in Scottsdale.

Surviving her are a daughter, Margaret, 5 grandchildren, and 5 great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Melzer started teaching in Dist. 63 in a small, 2 room school which was located in the 9100 block on Milwaukee Ave. She soon became the Principal-Superintendent.

The Ballard School was built in the early 40's and became the first 8-room, 8-grade school in the district.

After World War II the district grew rapidly. Enrollment in 1946 was 180 students; in 1958, when Mrs. Melzer retired, enrollment

was over 1800 and the district comprised 3 schools, the Oak School, Melzer School in addition to the Ballard School. All were 12 room facilities.

Mrs. Melzer and her husband, Robert, moved to their rice plantation in Carlisle, Ark. when she retired in 1958. Her husband died in 1970.

She moved to Scottsdale, Az. in 1978 to be closer to her 2 children, Robert who died in March of this year. Continued on Page 26

taxed a nominal \$100 a year. This year they could be assessed 25% of the assessed value of the lots which could have contributed many additional hundreds of dollars to their tax bills.

I'm a big city boy. Or at least I'm a "I love a big city" boy. Putting it bluntly, I've never met a big city I didn't like.

During the 1943-'46 era, I discovered many of the big cities of the world. While stateside I ran into Los Angeles and San Francisco and wrote home reams of praise for the cities along the Pacific. Soon afterwards Boston became a port of call and I waxed warmly about Bostonians and their fine city. Overseas, I spent a great deal of time in London and Paris and Berlin and wrote enthusiastically about these 3 capitals, two of which were heavily wounded.

Today and yesterday Chicago has my affection. It's more than puppy love. It's been going on too long. It's more a romance of the mature, a passion which is enduring and permanent.

I walk the city and I'm proud. I sit at the el fresco cafe at the First National Bank Plaza and sip ice tea while I people-watch. Chicago has few outdoor sittings which are as pleasing as this one. On a warm 80 degree day the blooming flowers in front of the Chagall Wall makes this setting most pleasing and a bit fantastic. The bright colors from Chagall, the soft beauty of the flowers and the pretty girls and the warmth of the day makes this stop something special.

Bugle Digest Local News Briefs

The Cook County Treasurer's Office has announced expanded office hours to accommodate property owners who wish to pay their second installment real estate taxes in person.

Cook County Treasurer Edward J. Rosewell said that effective July 8, daily office hours will be from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. both at 118 N. Clark st. and at the Maywood office, 1500 Maybrook Square, Maywood.

Both offices will be open Saturday, July 24, and Saturday July 31, from 9 a.m. to noon to accept tax payments. Rosewell urged property owners to make their payments by mail to avoid long lines. The second installment payment is due August 6th. Taxes paid after this date will be subject to a 1.5 percent per month penalty.

Any Cook County property owner who has not received his or her tax bill should contact the Treasurer's office at 443-5100.

The third successive meeting of the Niles Zoning Board was cancelled last week because of the virtual halt in home construction in the area. Niles Director of Building and Zoning, Joe Salerno said the lack of zoning petitions is "directly attributable to the economy." In particular, Salerno noted area residents are unable to build additions on their homes due to the economy.

The Maine Township Board of Trustees announced during their July 6 meeting that they are looking for a new office site. Their current offices, located at 2510 Dempster St. in Des Plaines, have become too small, according to Maine Township Supervisor Paul Halverson. Using \$450,000 in federal revenue sharing funds the township government said it will look for, perhaps, an empty school to rent space in or build a new office center. Halverson has indicated he would prefer building new offices.

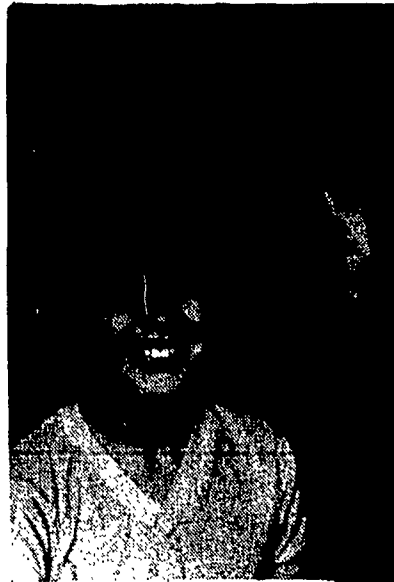
Two additional security officers have been hired by the Niles Park District to help combat vandalism in Niles Parks. The security officers, employees of the Security Group, Ltd. of Niles, will assist the two officers now patrolling the parks. The cost of the two new officers will be \$7,000 raising the total cost for the May through October patrolling to \$18,500. Niles Park District officials said the additional officers are necessary because of problems at Grennan Heights Park which include vandalism, drinking and fighting.

The Lincolnwood Chamber of Commerce has been polling its members on whether they favor the building of a shopping center at Howard st. and McCormick blvd. in Lincolnwood. Of the over 100 ballots received, 85 Chamber members were in favor of the center and 11 against, with the remaining undecided. The proposed shopping center will be on the site of the Bell and Howell complex.

Jeffrey Slowik, 11, formerly of Niles, is depending on a bone marrow transplant from his 4-year-old brother Steven to cure him of a rare form of leukemia. He is scheduled to undergo the transplant operation in August at a hospital in Seattle, Washington. Jeffrey's parents, Charles and Joan, and 15-year-old brother Mark are overwhelmed by the support they have received since they publicized the plight of Jeffrey.

Jeffrey, a sixth grade student at River Trails Junior High School, Mt. Prospect, is afflicted with chronic granulocytic leukemia, a rare blood condition usually found in adults. Family members and medical authorities are optimistic Jeffrey's brother Steven holds the key to recovery. To help the family, several relatives, neighbors and friends have created a benefit fund at the First National Bank of Mt. Prospect, 967-7826.

The quick actions of a Niles resident during a home fire possibly saved the life of his neighbor and prevented a major fire from spreading throughout his neighbor's house.

Niles Fire Department officials said Steve Frountzis, 36, 7300 Nora, was in his backyard on Monday, July 5, talking with Walter Petrowske, 62, 7312 Nora when both men saw smoke coming from a window in the house.

Grabbing a garden hose Frountzis ran into his house where he saw a pan on his stove on fire. When the hose was turned onto the flaming pan, the hot grease flashed and splattered Frountzis. Additionally, the flames shot up from the pan engulfing the wall and cabinet above the stove.

Petrowske, who had followed his neighbor into the house, immediately pushed Frountzis away from the flames and, picking up the garden hose, extinguished the flames.

Arriving on the scene, the Niles Fire Department found Frountzis with second degree burns on his arms, hands and lips. Frountzis was taken to Lutheran General Hospital by Niles Paramedics where he remained hospitalized on Tuesday.

Commenting on the incident, Niles Fire Department Chief Harry Kinowski said Petrowske's "excellent reactions" may have "saved Mr. Frountzis' life." According to Kinowski, had Frountzis not been pushed out of the flaming kitchen, he may have quickly been overcome by the super-heated air.

Kinowski said the Niles Fire Department will propose that Petrowske receive a Citizen's Commendation from the Village of Niles.

PREVENT BLINDNESS

National Eye Institute funded researchers have successfully field tested a new laser treatment for senile macular dementia (SMD), the leading cause of blindness among people over 65. It has reduced the risk of vision loss by 60% among SMD sufferers.

The treatment, known as argon laser photocoagulation, seals off blood vessels that sometimes grow into the retina as a person ages. If untreated, the new blood vessels leak fluid that destroys the macula, the part of the retina responsible for all but peripheral vision.

Persons over age 65 are now encouraged to test their eyes daily for signs of SMD by covering one eye and looking at a straight object such as a sign-post or door, repeating the test for each eye. If the object appears bent or if there is a blank spot in the field of vision, people are advised to see an Ophthalmologist immediately.

The county has a Formal Protest Form which must be sent in duplicate with the tax bill and the payment. If the people who are protesting have a mortgage with an escrow account at the bank, the protest form must be submitted to the bank to triplicate so that the bank can keep a copy. I found this out through many phone calls.

The protest form can only be obtained at the County Assessor's Office downtown or by sending a self addressed envelope stamped to Order From Holders, 121 W.

Washington, Chicago, Ill. Our assessor's office for Maine Township doesn't have them nor does the Mayor's Office.

I went to see Mayor Blase and he told me to write a letter of protest. This is wrong information. It must be the Formal Protest. My taxes went up \$626.00 this year. Many of my neighbors are very upset.

Please let the Senior Citizens and all Niles residents know what has to be done if they want to protest this terrible increase. Also please don't use my name but we must let the taxpayers

know what to do. These protests might not help at all but we must let Springfield know we are not happy. Please, Bud, we need your help and expertise in letting the people know what they can do. Name withheld by request

In the past, whenever there was a problem, one phone call was enough to get results from any department in Niles. This past year a water main broke in front of our house. The men came out and repaired the main. In the process of digging up our front yard, several squares of concrete in front of our house were damaged. The Village assured us that whatever was damaged would be repaired.

In April or May when we were signing up for the 50-50 sidewalk plan, we put in a work order to have the front sidewalk repaired by the Village. We also signed up for the 50-50 plan to have several squares of sidewalk replaced on the side of our house. The squares on the side of our house are finished, but nothing has been done about the front, not even the sod has been replaced. No one has even been out to look at the tree in our front yard as promised.

I have been to the Village Administration Building at least three times since then and talked to many people there and at Public Works, but nothing gets done. They don't even return my phone calls.

I don't know what the problem is. Maybe the people that are in charge of these departments are not the right ones for the job. I can remember when Mr. Ed Baehner was at the Department of Public Works - Things got done! Mayor Blase, there is still much about Niles that is excellent - our park district, senior citizen programs, free bus, and garbage removal - just to name a few. I hope that you can get these departments back on the right track and get Niles working again. If you can't, maybe more than just the leadership of these departments needs to be changed!

Liability Insurance discount for seniors

A new law effective July 1 provides senior drivers with an automobile liability insurance rate discount upon completion of an approved defensive driving course.

My office is implementing the law, which requires insurance companies to offer premium discounts to persons 56 years of age and older who complete defensive driving courses approved by the Secretary of State's office.

The new law has several substantial benefits, both to seniors and others concerned about traffic safety.

More than 1.7 million senior citizens are eligible for the discount, and it provides an incentive for them to take defensive driving courses, which

should mean improved safety on our roads and highways.

The amount of the discount varies, depending on the amount of the driver's coverage, geographic location, miles driven per year and other insurance rating factors. In other states it has been as high as 15 percent.

My office is responsible for approving and monitoring instructors and agencies administering the courses, issuing certification to persons who have successfully completed a course, and making senior citizens aware of the discount and available courses.

Signal your intentions when driving

As a courtesy to other drivers, comply with Illinois law and give the appropriate turn signals whenever you intend to make a turn.

In a business or residential district, a continuous turn signal must be given for at least 100 feet before turning, and in other areas the signal must be given at least 200 feet in advance.

All motor vehicles, except motorcycles, and all trailers and semi-trailers must have electric turn signals visible at least 300 feet away in normal sunlight. Front signals must be white or amber and rear signals must be red or amber.

Signal your intentions with either electrical turn signals or your left hand and arm. Always check the traffic behind and on your left or right, slow down, signal for the turn, and merge in to the correct turning lane. Yield the right-of-way to pedestrians and vehicles in the intersection before completing the turn.

Signaling your intentions enables other drivers to pass you rather than possibly being stalled in your lane waiting for you to turn. Following the law and displaying courtesy not only helps the traffic flow, but also reduces accidents.

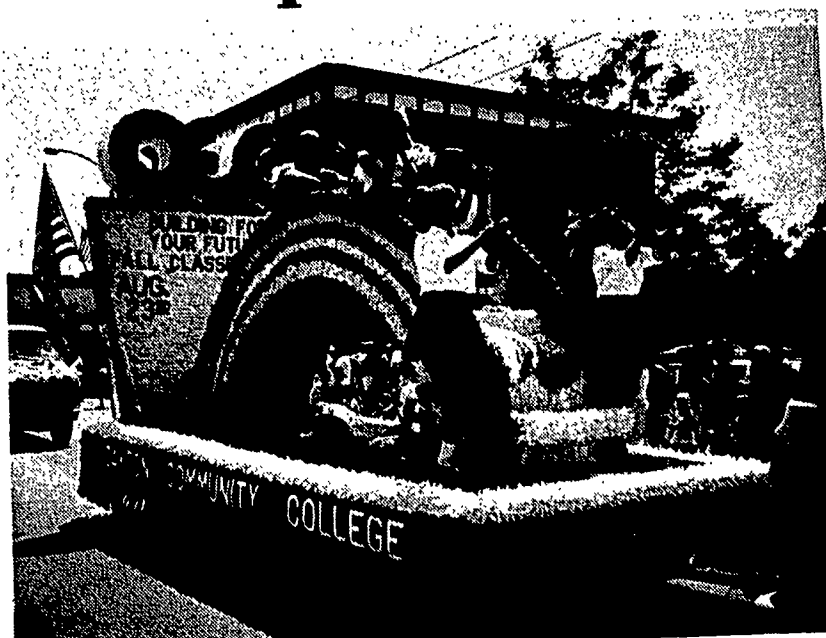

Oakton to study job needs of handicapped

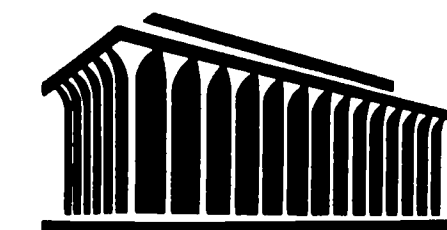

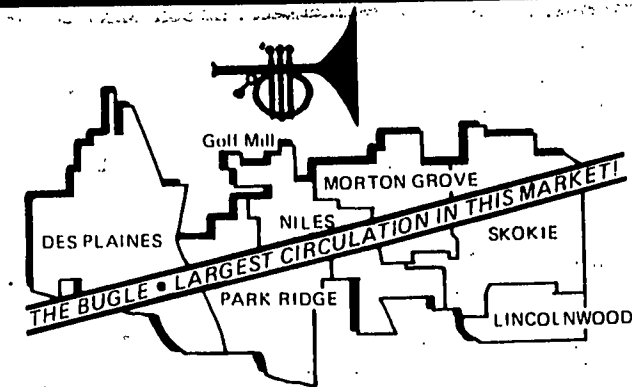


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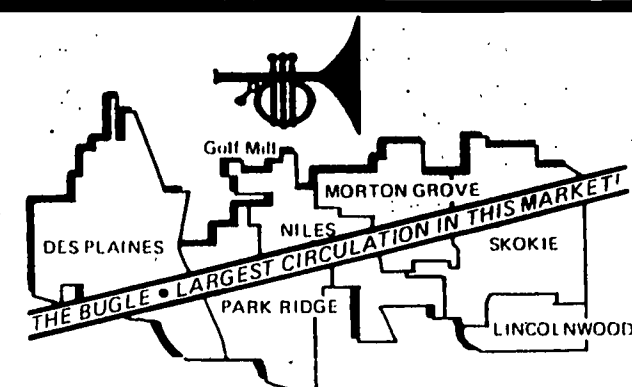

I walk east toward Michigan ave., up the steps of the library's culture center and walk with awe through the renovated Center. Upstairs, at Wednesday noon, the Myra Hess concerts are a joy and a respite from the day's activities. Located in the Preston Bradley Room the inlaid tile ceilings and walls are a restful backdrop to the peaceful music.

Downstairs, there is a hydro-sculpture made of soap and detergent bubbles which has a hypnotic effect on the many watchers who sit around and while away the minutes.

I walk north on Michigan ave., crossing over to the east side of the street. At the river I watch the boat traffic. Down below of the workers are boarding boats which take them west to the Northwestern train station. It's a lovely way to end their business day boating their way home after a day at work.

The Plaza in front of the Tribune building is another great spot for people-watching. As the shadows of the Gothic towers of the McCormick's 1924 building languish in the background, you can replenish your energy supply with popcorn from an old-fashioned popcorn cart which is in the square.

I walk across the street to the Wrigley building and head west to the restaurant whose entrance is on the river-side of the building. It is a Chicago restaurant, a little bit of elegance with a bit too much noise. You can turn the clock back 40 years sitting in this restaurant whose heyday was back in the early-radio days. It is still advertising row's favorite. And old chauvinists still point to the male

waiters who signify the better restaurants in Chicago.

If I hadn't headed east after sitting at the First National Plaza, I would have moved down the street to Adams and west to Berghoff's Restaurant.

Berghoff's is Chicago-eating at its best. Again, male waiters move officiously, somewhat coldly to and from your table, as they bring you cold steins of dark beer, great barley soup, fresh rye bread and German dishes which gave off gemutlich. All cities brag about their fine restaurants. Berghoff's could go to the Olympics for restaurants as our representative for the best in our world.

I walk the city. Alongside Berghoff's is a store which sells Cohasset Punch, a drink of younger days. It brings back memories of New Year's Eve, a peach in the center of a punch bowl. I walk east, west, south and north and there's a book store nestled down an alleyway, on the second floor of a multi-story building. Bookstores are a joy to a walker, a dropoff where you can browse and refresh amidst buckram and old paste.

I walk the city and move into a lobby, the old Rookery building, with its white wrought-iron railings and staircases. It has become a landmark and it is essentially Chicago.

I walk the streets and move east to Wabash, south to a record shop filled with old jazz recordings. Or I head north to Rush st. where a better jazz record shop is nestled away around the corner from the neon jungle. Book junkies can loiter away hours in the stacks of old musty stores. Record fans no longer have the joy of toiling around an old turntable and playing for hours new-found treasures. Near that south Wabash shop, we used to frequent a store which sold twelve 78 RPM discs for a \$1. And the joy of discovery of an old classic was every bit as exciting as discovering a favorite book.

A walk east at the south end of the loop and past the Auditorium Theatre, another out-of-another-era building which has been renovated and restored. It's my Chicago. It's my theatre.

I walk south on California ave. to Kelly Park where softball games go on well into the night. There's a Scala beef sign which gives dreams of peppers and giardiniera which adds seasoning to the sandwich which is strictly Chicago. It is to Italian beef-eaters what a Fluky hot dog is to hot dog-eaters.

were registered by some protestors. One Nilesite at the west end of the village said his taxes soared from \$800 last year to \$2,000 this year, when the quadrennial assessment was released.

Niles village president, Nick Blase, said his taxes increased \$520 over the previous year. Blase lives south of Dempster and west of Cumberland in Niles. Protest forms, which should be included with payments of the tax bill, were made available at local village halls. Both Niles and Morton Grove halls had the forms for its residents.

A petition was being passed around local areas, as well as the Niles village hall, which sought to freeze or eliminate the tax multiplier, which is the culprit in the increase in taxes. Blase explained the governor is responsible for increasing the multiplier. Governor candidate Adlai Stevenson said the multiplier increased by 31% in Cook County.

According to Blase, the multiplier is used to equalize taxes throughout the state. Because farm areas and other non-industrial areas have different taxing bases from areas heavily laden with high-taxed industries, to equalize the difference taxing areas in the state, the multiplier is used. Blase said the multiplier increased 6% this year.

Stevenson contends "the effect has been to increase property taxes assessments faster than actual increases in market value".

The tax multiplier is a figure computed by the state to equalize property assessments statewide. It affects the amount per student each school district receives under the state school aid formula. If an increase in the multiplier leads to increased property taxes, the local school district receives less school aid from the state.

Governor Thompson has denied responsibility for the property tax multiplier increases. He contends the increases have been required because local assessing by officials has failed to assess property at the level prescribed by state law.

Stevenson wants a two year freeze on the multiplier during which assessing practices and local government financing could be studied. Following the two year period the multiplier would be eliminated and replaced by a new state revenue code.

Meanwhile, local residents can pick up their protest forms at the local village halls or the township collector's office. They must be submitted when taxes are paid.

The petitions to advise the legislature to repeal or freeze the tax multiplier are being passed around in the villages. They were picked up Tuesday morning in Niles and taken downtown. Blase said Niles was aiming for 2,500 signatures with a total of 600,000 necessary for the November advisory to be placed on the ballot. Candidly, Blase thought there were acts of demagoguery from politicians emphasizing the protest forms would be effective. He seemed more confident the November referendum to freeze or abolish the multiplier would be more effective.

Mayors back rideshare project

The villages of Skokie, Morton Grove, Northbrook, and Glenview have invited more than 100 large-scale employers to take part in a ride-sharing program starting this month under the auspices of the North Shore Council of Mayors and the Chicago Area Transportation Study (CATS).

The introductory meeting will be held Thursday (July 22) at the Glenview Village Hall. Mayors of the four communities have asked firms with 100 or more workers to send representatives to the meeting.

Lea Ames, ridesharing marketing manager for CATS, said the emphasis is on benefits to both employers and employees.

"Some employers have already recognized these benefits and encouraged employee carpools," Ames said. "That means there's potential for more. We've found in three years of ridesharing promotion, that working through employers is the best and most productive way to get a program underway."

Graduates from District 219 Action Learning Center

The Action Learning Center, an experienced based learning program available to Niles Township High School students, recently held a graduation program of its own at Niles North High School, Skokie. Eight seniors from both North and West High Schools received Certificates of commendation for successful participation in and completion of Center's program.

The students are Lesley Berger, Robyn Grobman, and Marielle Hagman from Niles West; and Naema Abraham, Sue Careb, Anne Hajkalek, Diane King, and Fern Katz from Niles North. Mid-year graduates John Colander and Sue DeFratus were also recognized. The students had previously earned and received their regular high school diplomas on June 8.

Student Marielle Hagman served as master of ceremonies for the program, and teachers Pat McGuinness, Jean Barstow, and Jim Olson presented awards to the students they advise. Bill Robinson, a former Alternative Learning Center teacher now on leave of absence, spoke, recalling the history and past successes of the program. Approximately 70 students, parents, and guests, attended.

According to Action Learning Center coordinator, Jim Olsen, the Center annually enrolls about 40 sophomores, juniors and seniors who choose to finish high school requirements in an experienced based program. The program features "learning by doing," independent study, and small seminar-like classes in the Center located on the Niles West campus.

While Action Learning Center students must complete the usual high school requirements, the program also requires each to earn a minimum of one credit each semester through community volunteer work. This year, Center students worked for the Council for Jewish Elderly; the Chicago Botanical Gardens in Northbrook; the Lincoln Park Childrens Zoo, various day care centers, and the Evanston Environmental Center.

Ames said studies have shown that an active ridesharing program broadens the area from which employers can draw workers. It also can reduce parking costs and, because CATS uses a computer matching system, contingency plans can be made for emergencies such as severe storm or gasoline shortages. There are indications that productivity and employee relations benefit as well. Those joining a carvan, or buspool can cut their commuting costs in half, lower their insurance costs, gain some extra time, and in some cases avoid the need for a second car.

CATS' information, coordination, and matching services—all provided at no cost—also will be discussed. CATS' Commuter Computer currently has about 11,000 names on file. The North Shore Council of Mayors decided to develop the program to assist local businesses and because of the potential for reduced congestion, air pollution, and energy use.

Morton Grove blood donors needed during summer

Morton Grove residents are asked to donate blood this summer when blood supplies are low. With busy summer schedules, many people do not donate and blood collections decrease during the summer months.

This year we at the North Suburban Blood Center are especially concerned because blood usage has increased up to 15% over comparable months last year. At the same time, cut backs and layoffs in the workforce have adversely affected blood collections. While blood collections decrease, blood usage continues to increase, causing summer shortages.

According to our current projections for scheduled blood drives, we will be collecting an average of 900 pints of blood each week. But 1,100 pints of blood will be needed to meet the estimated transfusion demand. If the 200 additional donors needed each week are not found, blood shortages will result. Chronic blood shortages can then lead to a summer blood emergency.

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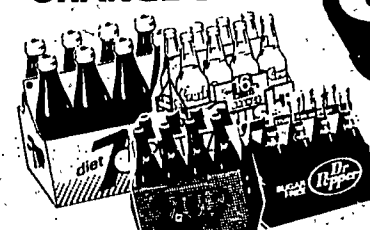
