Probe on cop charges against MG chief continued to Aug. 12

The continuing controversy involving alleged improprieties by Morton Grove Police Chief Larry Schey will drag on into August following the cancelling of the July 8 meeting of the Morton Grove Board of Fire and Police Commissioners.

The Commission will meet August 12 to hear charges by Morton Grove Police Officer James Schroeder, that Schey violated department regulations on three occasions.

However, the burden of proof appears to have fallen onto Schroeder who will have to produce witnesses or evidence to substantiate his claims about Schey. A July 8 meeting of the Fire and Police Commissioners was cancelled presumably because Schroeder was not ready to prove his charges against Schey.

Among the allegations include Schroeder's accusation that Schey provided a \$200 bond last

December for Tom Amarantos an hour after he was arrested on a drunk driving charge in Morton Grove. Amarantos is the former owner of the Buffalo Ice Cream Parlor, 6000 Dempster st.

Other charges by Schroeder, an eight year police veteran, include Schey's filing a stolen vehicle report for his son's truck which had been repossessed and for using police funds to pay for the repairs done on the private car of

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Drunk driver charged in girl's death

A 16-year-old Chicago girl was killed and four people were hospitalized when the drunk driver of a car went out of control slamming the auto into a light pole in Niles on Thursday, July 15.

According to Niles Police, a car carrying five people was driving south in the 6600 block of Milwaukee ave. when the driver, who was speeding, lost control of the vehicle. The car crossed both northbound lanes, left the road

and slammed into a light pole and an electrical control box.

A number of the passengers in the car were thrown from the vehicle.

Pronounced dead at Lutheran General Hospital was Patti Wildner, 16, of 3625 N. Campbell in Chicago.

Hospitalized with numerous injuries including lacerations were a 20-year-old and a 22-year-old Niles men as well as a 17-year-old

We know big boys and girls aren't supposed to cry but the tears flowing in Maine Township caused by tax increases may cause flood tides which could wash us all out.

It's no consolation but taxes are great equalizers. They are indiscriminate when they go up. Everyone gets hit for more money. We got a home raise of more than \$500. Nick Blase got raised over \$500. Everyone who resides in Maine Township went up.

School District 63's Jim Bowen told us Tuesday taxes for the elementary district increased by 21.2%. In the Park Ridge District 64 area they went up by a comparable amount. In the Maine high school district they increased 23.8%.

Bowen gave this explanation. State aid, which was \$1.3 million dollars in 1981, will be only \$751,000 or less in 1982. While the assessed valuation in District 63 increased 25.3%, the tax rate went down 9 cents per \$100 assessed valuation. But putting the state aid decrease together with the lower rate and the increased valuation, you come up with a 21.2% tax increase for School District 63.

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Niles Parks expect staggering pool repair bill

The Niles Park District may be faced with an "overwhelming" bill of between \$25,000 to \$150,000 to repair or replace the piping and filter system in the Recreation Center swimming pool, 7877 Milwaukee ave. according to Niles Park Board President Walt Beusse.

The swimming pool problem, which was announced during Tuesday night's park board

meeting, is the result of the almost 20 years the pool filter and pipes have been in operation. Rust and corrosion have caused a "potential problem for next season," according to Niles Park Director Bill Hughes.

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Deny school realignment in 63 & 207

De-annexation plans for school districts 63 and 207 residents north of Golf Road were derailed Monday when the Cook County Board of Regional School Trustees ruled an insufficient number of signatures on petitions prevented consideration for the group joining Glenview and Glenbrook school districts.

Attorney Robert Pelton, representing the de-annexation parents, said the decision is just "Round one" and the group will either appeal or start a new petition drive.

East Maine school District 63 would lose \$933,500 in property taxes and 525 elementary students if they transfer to school District 34 in Glenview. Maine High School District 207 would lose \$864,500 in property taxes and 400 high school students to Glenbrook high school District 225.

While the majority of Maine Township homeowners received sizeable real estate tax hikes, Park Lane residents were hard hit with increases ranging from \$300 to \$1,200 over last year's tax bills.

Irate homeowners gathered at the Park Lane Community

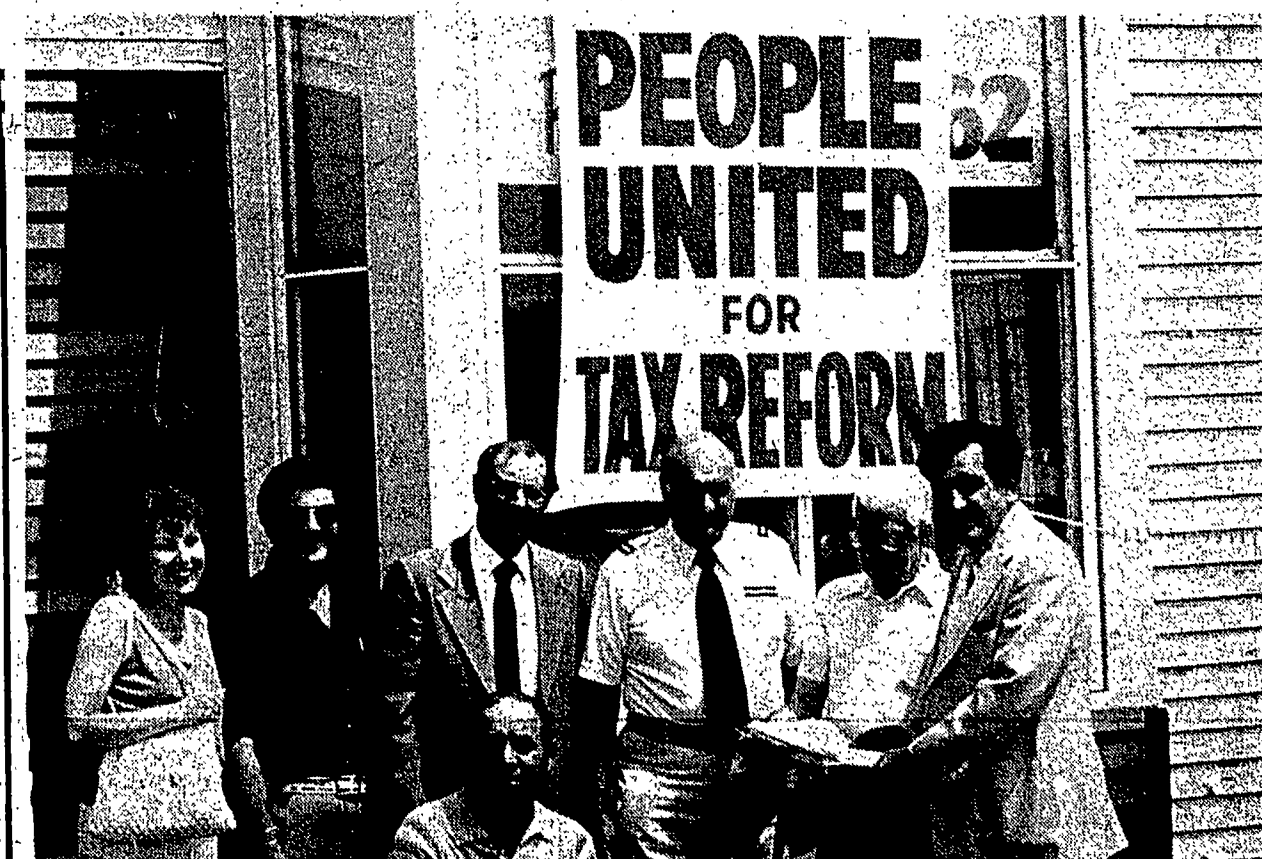
House, Sunset and Greenwood, Niles to see what they could do as a group to protest what they termed "unfair increases in taxes."

Learn to take blood pressure

The Morton Grove Health Department in cooperation with the American Heart Association will be offering a 9-hour course for laymen to be trained in blood pressure screening techniques and facts about high blood pressure.

Blood pressure is a vital part of a person's overall health and it is necessary that people understand what their blood pressure is and what it means. For this reason the Health Department is offering a free, American Heart Association certified course to anyone in the community.

The classes will meet from 6 to 9 p.m. on Thursday, July 29; Monday, August 2; and Thursday, August 5 in the Senior Citizen Center of the Morton Grove Village Hall, 6101 Capulina. If you are interested please call the Health Department at 965-4100 to sign up for the course.

Knowing how to take blood pressure will aid individuals who have high blood pressure or family members of hypertensive people, and also enable interested people to participate in Health Department screening programs. High blood pressure is called the "Silent Disease" because of its absence of symptoms, but people need not be absent of the knowledge of this disease.

Heart attack victims sought in medical study

Volunteers are urgently needed to help combat America's number one killer, atherosclerosis. This disease is primarily responsible for heart attacks, strokes, and related fatal diseases that account annually for almost one million deaths of 51% of all deaths in the United States. The National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute is conducting a program at four participating medical institutions, including the University of Minnesota, to determine whether lowering blood cholesterol levels will reduce the risk of heart attacks. The University is seeking persons 29 through 64 years of age, who have had only one heart attack in the past 5 years with no history of heart surgery, diabetes or stroke. 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Bugle Digest Local News Briefs

As if the beleaguered Assessor of Cook County Thomas Hynes didn't have enough problems these days, it now appears he's having serious staffing troubles. Niles Park District Commissioner, Elaine Heinen reports that, in trying to find out why the Niles Park District has not received \$104,000 due it in taxes, she called Hynes recently. Hynes referred Mrs. Heinen to one of his employees, a Mr. Cunningham, in a different office. Hanging up on Hynes and dialing Mr. Cunningham, the receptionist informed Mrs. Heinen that Mr. Cunningham had been dead for one year. The bottom line here seems to be that these days there is no rest for employees of the Assessor's office, dead or alive.

Lutheran General Hospital is now considering whether it will open a sports medicine facility in the closed Maine North High School. Maine Township High School District 207 cleared the way on July 12 for renting the school when it gave Lutheran General a 90 day exclusive option to rent the 380,000 square foot school. If the high school is converted into a sports health facility, it would become available to area professional sports teams. In June, former National Football League coach George Allen toured Maine North in an attempt to find a training center for the Chicago franchise of the United States Football League.

Maine Township District 207 School Board recently announced the completion of a list of extracurricular activities to be eliminated if funding runs out. The list was compiled as a contingency plan and no plans have been set to eliminate any of the activities. Those programs which would be cut include: gymnastics show, literary magazine, pep council, chess club, contest drama, group interpretation, varsity field hockey, junior varsity gymnastics, junior varsity field hockey, fencing, bowling, varsity and sophomore fencing, freshman gymnastics, freshman "B" football, freshman "B" basketball, freshman "B" baseball and junior varsity II wrestling.

Niles Township Supervisor Thomas McElligott announced that Niles Township is reducing its tax levy by 55%, which will result in lower township tax payments by residents. Unfortunately property owners will not see a noticeable decrease in their tax bills since the township's portion of the tax bill is a small one. The reduction in the tax levy was due to an accumulation of monies in the township's corporate fund.

Police nab drunk driver in 100 MPH chase

Niles police arrested one of two drivers speeding at 100 miles per hour on Golf Rd. on Saturday, July 17. The arrested driver was drunk when he was apprehended.

Police report patrolling in the 9100 block of Golf Rd. when they heard two cars racing east towards Milwaukee Ave. Measuring the cars speed on radar, police said the cars were clocked at 100 miles per hour.

With the Niles Police in pursuit, one of the cars stopped for a red light at Golf Rd. and Milwaukee Ave. The other car continued through the red light.

While talking with the driver, a 19-year-old Glenview resident, police noticed he had to use the auto for support to stand and detected a strong odor of alcohol on his breath. Police also found an open beer can in his car.

At the Niles Police Department the Glenview resident was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol, speeding, and transporting open liquor in an automobile.

After being processed he was assigned an August court date and released on \$100 bond.

Political theoreticians were hard at work this week trying to explain State Senator John Nimrod's (R-Glenview) move to have his name placed on the November ballot as an independent candidate for state senator. Nimrod, who was defeated in the April primary by State Rep. Robert Kustra (R-Glenview), recently began circulating petitions to have his name placed on the ballot under the auspices of the "Taxpayers Independent Party."

According to election officials, Nimrod will need 3,000 valid signatures to be placed on the ballot.

Speculation throughout the 28th Legislative District this week focused on Nimrod's motivation for running. Popular theories being bantered around include that Nimrod, who is reported to be highly incensed over his primary defeat, will act as a "spoiler" in the November election and split the Republican vote with the possible victor being Democrat Lou Black, Clerk of Niles Township.

Another theory which is being discussed holds that Nimrod will use his candidacy to pressure Illinois Republicans to guarantee him a prestigious state job in exchange for his dropping out of the race.

Commenting on Nimrod's possible candidacy, Kustra said, "I don't think John Nimrod can gather much support." Kustra said if Nimrod runs as an independent, he will "incur the wrath of the Republicans in the district."

"John Nimrod has been around long enough to know there is no way he could win the race," said Kustra. "I was willing to step aside if I lost the primary," said Kustra, "but he doesn't look at it this way."

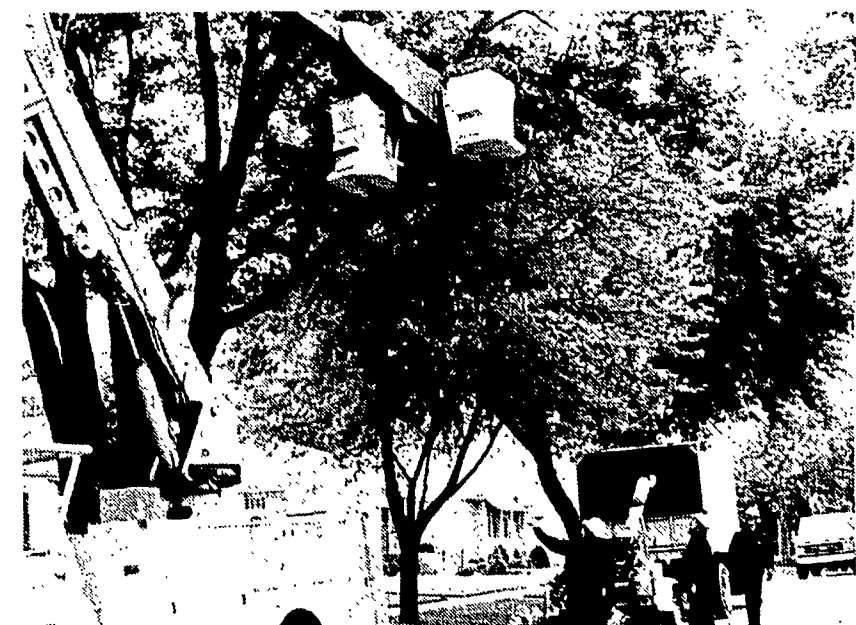
Maine Township Democratic Committeeman Nicholas Blase said Nimrod's name on the November ballot would be "very good for us." "Our candidate's position would be considerably stronger if Nimrod ran," said Blase.

"Nimrod will be fighting for the same voters as Kustra," said Blase.

Candidate Black has reported that a number of his volunteer workers who had previously worked for Nimrod, but joined Black to defeat Kustra, have since returned to the Nimrod petition drive campaign.

Niles tree care program



Summer is a time of great activity, especially for the Village of Niles Public Services Forestry Division. It is their responsibility to maintain the health and appearance of all trees in the public parkways. A tree care program involves many activities including the removal of unsafe diseased or dead branches, trees and stumps.

Emergency situations are first priority, all storm damaged tree and branches which are a safety hazard for passing pedestrian and motorists are removed. Each activity requires careful planning and programming. Unforeseen weather conditions an seasonal changes are considered when scheduling all tree care activities.

Requests to remove low hanging branches are accepted until June 1 of each year. Those requests taken after June 1 are placed on a waiting list until the following spring. Branch requests, prior to June 1, are scheduled for removal by zoned area between spring and fall. Requests are done by zoned area in order to be more productive and save time and fuel.

There are eight zone areas. Each zoned area is scheduled for certain spring and/or fall months. Zone 1 & 2 - east of Harlem; April and May. Zone 3 & 4 - west of Harlem, Dempster south to Oakton, Oketo east to Harlem, south of Oakton to Howard, Harlem to Orioles; June. Zone 5 - west of Oketo to

Milwaukee, Oakton to Dempster; July and August. Zone 6 - Oakton to Main, Washington to Milwaukee; September. Zone 7 - Oakton to Dempster, Washington to Western; October. Zone 8 - Dempster north to the northern village limits; November.

An "anatomical gift card" is printed on the back of all Illinois drivers licenses. This card signed by the driver and two witnesses authorizes the donation of specific body parts upon the death of the cardholder.

Additionally, the anatomical gift card will be printed on the back of the photo identification cards issued from my office as soon as possible.

Under this new law my office will also provide organ donor information pamphlets to all Illinois residents along with their regular drivers license renewal

Kustra cites attempts to repeal equalizer as hypocritical

State Representative Bob Kustra (R-Glenview) has called attempts by Cook County Democrats to repeal the tax equalizer or multiplier "hypocritical." Kustra charged that Minority Leader Michael Madigan published a "hit list" of property tax relief bills in the recent session of the General Assembly and circulated it among legislators and lobbyists to assure defeat of the proposals. Now that the legislative session is over and Cook County Democrats are safe from meaningful property tax relief, it is easy for them to propose abolishing the multiplier. According to Kustra, "As sponsor of a property tax reform measure which had the effective of freezing the multiplier for one year (HB 2492), I am appalled that the very same Democrats who were responsible for killing my bill are now so interested in wiping out the multiplier alto-

gether. Their change of heart can only be due to the recent tax bills which reflected the assessment increases of Assessor Hynes and Hynes' attempt to stick Governor Thompson with the blame for rising property taxes in an election year."

Kustra's bill was supported by the Taxpayers Federation of Illinois and was recommended by Democrats and Republicans who served on a Local Government Finance Commission. Commenting on Democratic attempts to kill property tax reform, Kustra said, "My bill was killed because it attempted in some small way to curb Chicago's voracious tax appetite. I was told quite simply that the city of Chicago and Cook County Government couldn't afford to lose the revenue." Kustra continued, "Taxpayers will see through such duplicity."

Rep. Capparelli votes "No" on tax increase

State Rep. Ralph C. Capparelli (D-18th), who voted against a tax increase to fund Chicago public schools, charged that Gov. James Thompson sold out the people by supporting a tax increase rather than tax relief for homeowners in Cook County.

Capparelli said he was "dismayed that the governor did nothing while members of his party in the Republican-controlled House refused to support legislation that would have increased the Homestead Exemption from \$3,000 to \$3,500. Republican legislators by their action failed to recognize the plight of homeowners in providing tax relief. The contrast was apparent when the Democratic-controlled Senate passed the measure earlier. It's very clear. The Democrats wanted tax relief, and the Republicans didn't."

Yates to assist in new ERA campaign

"Illinois will lead the nation in the fight for ERA," Congressman Sidney R. Yates (D-9-IL) predicted today.

Congressman Yates will be one of the cosponsors of the Equal Rights Amendment when it is reintroduced on July 14. Yates promised "a major effort" in support of ERA and urged his Illinois colleagues to join him.

"Illinois played such a regrettably pivotal role in the defeat of ERA that we should give reintroduction early and enthusiastic endorsement," Yates said in a letter to his Illinois colleagues. "Let's make Illinois the most supportive state in the nation on this round of the ERA fight. Let's send a clear message that ERA will be enacted and sexual discrimination defeated."

The language of the Amendment will be identical to the ERA that passed Congress originally. The Amendment failed to gain the necessary number of ratifying states on June 30.

Black campaign brings out unemployment problem

Democratic candidate for State Senator (28th District) Louis Black doesn't have to read statistics to know that Illinois has a severe unemployment problem. Since he opened his Skokie headquarters at 3750 Dempster in May people have been walking into the headquarters from off the street seeking work.

"They think because I'm running for office," Black said, "that I'll be hiring people. They don't realize that I'm running a volunteer."

People are desperate for jobs. They are looking for work anywhere they think that someone is hiring. This certainly helps keep me aware of the depth of the unemployment problem in the 28th District," Black commented.

Black, who is Niles Township Clerk, added: "Governor Thompson may be crowing that his administration has retained the AAA bond rating for Illinois; that doesn't mean very much to the man or woman without a job.

Even less, if the rating really doesn't represent a fiscally healthy state economy, as the media maintains, and is actually the result of the Governor's mortgaging the state's financial future for short-term political gain.

"That would mean that the unemployed in this state do not

have much of a chance for a weekly pay check in the near future," Black charged.

He said that it is high time that the leadership in state government really concentrates on the economic revitalization of Illinois instead of only giving lip service to that goal.

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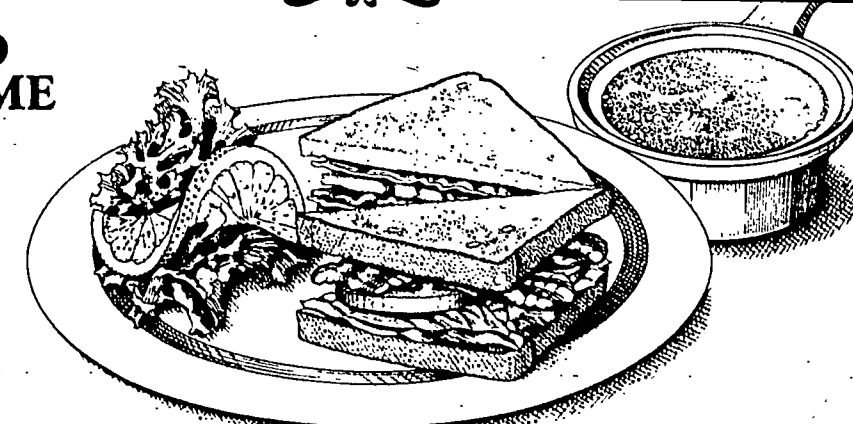

the crowd "we're not your enemy, we're here to help you." Kustra said the 3 main reasons for the tax increases were the assessed valuation (which is worked out on computers), the tax rate and the state multiplier. Kustra said he had a bill in the House to freeze the multiplier, but it was killed by opposition forces. He also noted that attempts to get rid of the multiplier now by submitting petitions is a ploy since the legislature is not even in session. He urged residents to attend their Village and School Board meetings in the future to see how their monies are being spent.

Cathy Parker, Northfield Township Assessor and a candidate for the Cook County Board of Appeals told the crowd the assessments on their properties may be incorrect and they definitely should file complaints with the Assessor's office. If enough complaints are registered, the County Assessor should come out and reassess the area, according to Parker.

Charles Kohlerman, Finance Director for the Village of Niles appeared before the group and told them he had checked their neighborhood before the meeting and the only thing he could see different from other Niles neighborhoods was the land size. Many lots in the Park Lane area are one half acre or more.

Kohlerman said the property taxes were based on 15% of the total value for vacant land and 22% of the total value for land with a dwelling on it. He noted, "This is the first time this has been done." He also explained to the group that perhaps they had been unfairly assessed for improvements in their area. The community had received new streets, curbs and storm sewers nearly 5 years ago.

Kohlerman's final suggestions to the groups were to: 1) Pay your taxes on time under protest using duplicate protest forms. 2) Go to the Assessor's office and file Certificate of Error forms, and 3) The final process would be to file a class action law suit as a group.

Mike Bell, a group spokesman said another meeting was being scheduled for possibly Wednesday, July 28. He added they were attempting to get representatives of School District 63, Maine Township High School District 207 and Oakton Community College District 535 to appear before the group. In addition, they hoped to get Roy Bergquist of the Maine Township Assessor's Office to be at that meeting. Bell said attempts to contact Bergquist for Monday night's meeting were fruitless.

Also, Marusek said there will again be after-school park programs held at Nelson and Gemini schools in District 63 next fall. Park programs offered to children in the schools will include arts and crafts, computers, dance, open gym and a newspaper club.

Commissioner Jim Pierski told the board that 75 senior citizens participated in a recent mystery bus trip. Also Pierski said a senior citizens' luncheon is planned for July 23.

Lastly, Park Director Hughes told the board that Mike Traver, the Ballard Ice Rink Manager has resigned. Traver has accepted a new position in New York. Hughes said the park district will begin looking for a new ice rink manager.

Hughes said a number of swimming pool maintenance firms have been contacted and representatives will tour the Milwaukee Ave. pool to assess the work that needs to be done.

Hughes said it was not yet known whether part or the entire system would have to be replaced. The cost of putting in a new swimming pool filter system would be \$150,000, said Hughes.

In other business, Commissioner Mary Marusek announced that a bill which would allow alcohol to be served in park district facilities has been passed in Springfield and is on the Governor's desk awaiting approval. Beusse asked Park Director Hughes to have his staff begin to check into rates which could be charged for using park facilities serving alcohol.

However, Marusek cautioned the board that guidelines must be established as to what type of groups will be allowed to use park facilities if liquor is served.

Beusse reviewed a tour of the parks by numerous board and staff members taken on Monday. Washington Park, said Beusse, is "improving" with broken slats having been replaced and park equipment painted. Courtland Park equipment is going to be temporarily removed while water piping from Evanston and Arlington Heights is installed on the land underneath the park. The equipment will be replaced when the water pipe work is completed.

Beusse also reported that the Niles Park District will have to pay \$51,000 as its share of the Maine-Niles Association of Special Recreation budget this year. Saying, "We do need the program," Beusse said 180 Niles Park District residents participate in the special recreation program for the handicapped. Beusse said the total enrollment in the multi-park district program is 965 residents.

Commissioner Marusek told the board that School District 71 has agreed to allow its athletic fields to be used by the Niles Park District for children's soccer this fall and baseball next spring.

Also, Marusek said there will again be after-school park programs held at Nelson and Gemini schools in District 63 next fall. Park programs offered to children in the schools will include arts and crafts, computers, dance, open gym and a newspaper club.

Bertini is a member of the board of directors of ERA Illinois and is a Commissioner of the Illinois State Scholarship Commission.

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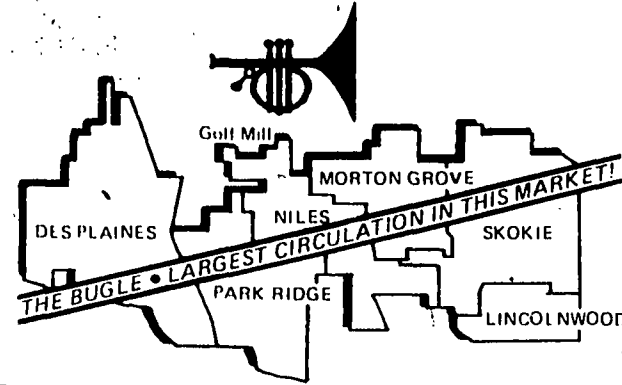
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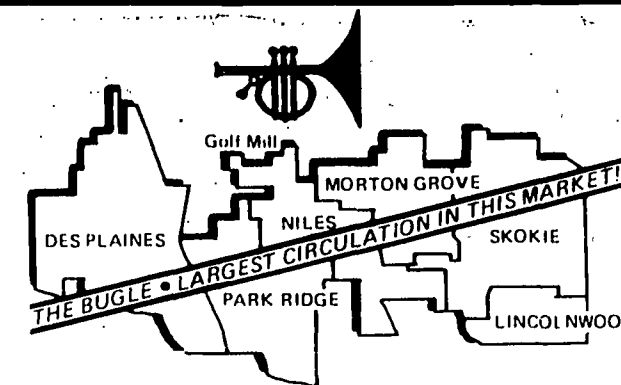

there are less than 6 units to their property. Multiple dwellings pay 33% of the true value while industry and commercial property pay about 40%.

Bowen contends if there are errors in the process, it is based on the evaluating of property. He believes if all property was evaluated properly, the state multiplier would be 1.0.

From the view From The Left Hand, if Bowen's explanation is on target then it is true the state government is decreasing its role in supporting local schools, shifting the burden to landowners in their home communities. What seems to be happening is Springfield is telling us to take care of our own business at the local level and not to look to the state capitol for solving our local problems.

Since school taxes account for about 70% of our total tax bills, this is the area which should be scrutinized by taxpayers. Are we getting our dollars worth for what we are spending?

Monday we spent time with a very thoughtful businessman who got socked for a \$400 increase at his home property and a several thousand dollar increase on his business real estate tax. He didn't speak too kindly about school people. He sees low school enrollments, closing of schools, increased teachers' salaries and he's asked to pay thousands more for their upkeep. He sees teachers working until 3 or 4 p.m., never on Saturdays or Sundays. He sees teachers take off for months during the summer-time, weeks during wintertime and spring break, plus many days during the year, while he works. And then the schools are asking him for more money. He works 6 days a week, couple of nights a week. And he takes off 2 weeks per year. No days off for conferences. No time off to honor past president's birthdays. And yet they are coming to him and asking for more money. He feels

he's being taken advantage of. And he has little sympathy for the teachers and administrators who likely work half as much as he does, and pay far less for the schools than he does. He is frustrated...and understandably so.

No one is speaking well of the politicians representing us. We've been told the Maine Township collector could never be reached in an attempt to get him out at meetings. Nick Blase sent out an emissary, Charley Kohlerman, to represent the village at a meeting Monday night by outraged taxpayers. In Springfield the many clowns down there were passing such important legislation as banning lights at Wrigley Field so night baseball won't take place there while our tax bills were skyrocketing.

The bottom line question is, "What can we do now?" Charley Kohlerman reported Monday you can go down to the Maine Township assessor's office and apply for a certificate of error. Your assessed valuation will then be reviewed. This is a step everyone should consider. You should also include protest forms when you pay your taxes. All Niles residents received the Objection to Real Estate Tax Payment protest forms with a letter which went out last week. Morton Grove residents and Maine Township unincorporated residents can pick them up at their village hall or at the township collector's office.

Lastly, a class action suit might be another step to be considered. This would take leadership action from the people representing us. It sure would be great if people now in office would come forth and lead the charge. They were elected to serve. And they were elected to lead. It's time they show their mettle, despite their efforts being done belatedly.

A police radio dispatcher. A Cook County Grand Jury subpoenaed police records earlier this year after following Schroeder's allegations. However, the grand jury failed to hand down a verdict though an official of the Cook County State's Attorney's office urged the village to take "any administrative actions you deem appropriate" against Schey.

Schroeder and Schey have apparently been in conflict since Schey became Chief last September. Schey suspended Schroeder for five days last December for selling his \$170 police jacket to another officer. The suspension occurred within one hour of Schroeder's returning after leveling charges at Schey at the State's Attorney's office. The Morton Grove Board of Fire and Police Commissioners later overturned the suspension and awarded Schroeder back pay.

Morton Grove officials have defended Schey saying the charges by Schroeder are untrue. In the event Schroeder cannot produce witnesses or other evidence during the August meeting, it is suspected the charges will be dropped.

utilized in branch and tree removals. The snorkel lifts a man to the high areas of a tree. At the ground level pole pruners are used. The second and third pieces of equipment are the chipper trunk and the chipper which grinds up the branches. The mulchings are funneled through the chipper into the chipper truck.

Thick branches (logs) and tree trunks are cut up and loaded into the fourth piece of equipment, a pick-up truck.

Requests to remove dead or diseased trees are accepted until June 30 of each year. Tree requests prior to June 30, are scheduled for removal during the months of June and July. Those requests taken after June 30 are placed on a waiting list to be removed by early fall of the same year. Removals are done by area concentration to save time and fuel.

Once a name is placed on the tree removal list it also is automatically placed on the stump removal list. There is no need to call a second time to be added to the stump removal list.

Stump removals are scheduled in March and November and progress northward by area concentration.

Two pieces of equipment are used: a stump cutter and a pick-up truck which holds the cut-up stumps.

Unfortunately these carefully scheduled tree care activities can be delayed due to weather conditions, such as a severe wind storm or tornado. It is understandable in these situations that emergency removals of branches and trees will be handled first. Thus, scheduled requests for branch removal in a zone area could possibly be delayed by a few weeks.

We hope this information about the Village's tree care program has created a better understanding of how and when these services are delivered.

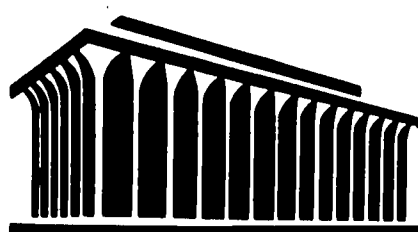
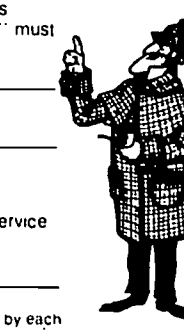
