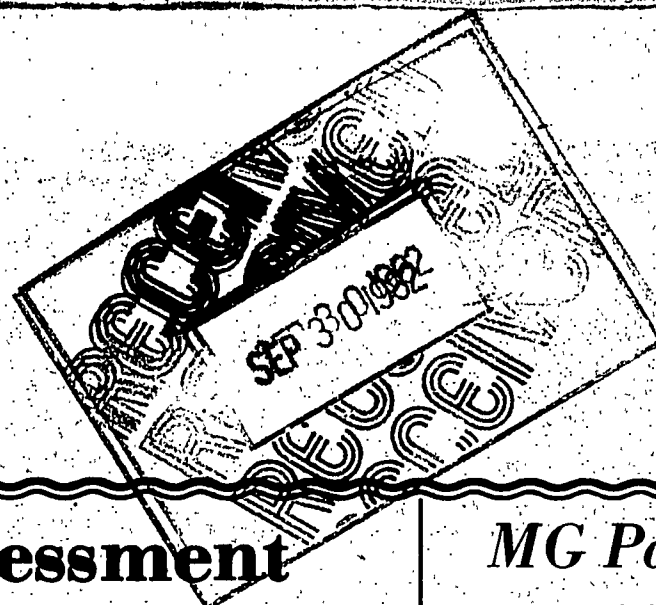

District 63 faces assessment for false alarms

False alarms in Niles public schools may be assessed to East Maine School District 63 at a cost of \$100 each after the first few alarms, according to Dr. Donald Bond, District superintendent, reporting to school board members on Tuesday, Sept. 28 in Apollo school, 10100 Dee rd., Des Plaines.

Bond said the Niles police chief sent a letter stating village expenses for those false burglar alarms would justify the move. Bond suggested board members approve charges for false alarms to parents of responsible youngsters or leasees in schools who carelessly trip the alarms. James Bowen, business


manager, said some problems are caused by "inadequacies" of the systems and suggested a more sophisticated method for checking in and out of buildings be placed into effect. Board members agreed tenants should be notified.

Niles passes teen anti-drinking law

Hold parents responsible for teen drinking

Parents or even minors living at a residence will be held responsible for the alcoholic drinking of minors in their abode as the result of a teen anti-drinking law passed Tuesday night by Niles Village Board.

Niles Police Chief Clarence Emrikson told the board there is a 6-year-old law in Niles which enforces parental responsibility. He said during this period it has never been used to bring anyone

to court. He added the purpose of the new drinking law was to let parents know their responsibility regarding drinking in the home. He said if there continues to be teen drinking at the abode where parents have previously been notified (of teen drinking) then penalties could be taken. Village Attorney Dick Troy said the charge would be a misdemeanor with the possible fine of \$500 or a

Niles fire chief Al Hoelbl and village president Nick Blase should get special huzzahs for their efforts in leading the way for the Doppler Tornado Warning System in our area, a 22-minute radar advanced warning system.

Back in September of 1979 Niles hosted a combined meeting of over 100 fire chiefs from surrounding areas who pledged their support for the innovative system. Last week Niles hosted another luncheon where it was announced the radar system would be implemented. After the fire chiefs pledged each one of their communities would come up with \$800, in the event the County Board failed to expend \$88,500 for the balance of the money needed for the program, Blase and the Village of Niles signed for the \$88,500 balance to expedite the installation of the system in time for the spring tornado season.

Letters and presentations were made to radio, TV, and other media, as well as much correspondence with Congressmen, O'Hare Field officials and City of Chicago representatives.

Even when support was waning Hoelbl and Blase pushed harder for the system culminating in the September 16 luncheon when the \$88,500 fund was pledged by other suburbs. It was a worthy accomplishment which will benefit all Chicago-area residents in the coming years.

Bugle Digest Local News Briefs

Niles Fire Chief Al Hoelbl said a meeting was held last week between Cook County Sheriff Dick Elrod, Niles Mayor Nick Blase and several representative fire chiefs to petition for the funding of \$38,500 for the Doppler Tornado Alert System. Hoelbl said Elrod will now present this information to the Cook County Board next week in the hope that funds will be forthcoming from that group towards the installation of the tornado alert system.

A 19-year-old Palatine woman was found hanged last Wednesday, Sept. 22 in St. Paul Woods in Morton Grove. Police said she apparently killed herself. Cynthia L. Schefris, 1342 Reynolds Drive was identified by a driver's license found in her pocket. Morton Grove Police Inspector Robert Davis said there was no other note or identification found on the body. The woman's relatives lived in Skokie, however, she was staying in Palatine.

Parkside Foundation, Inc., the non-profit corporation affiliated with Lutheran General Hospital has signed a two year lease with Maine Township High School District 207 to lease approximately 27,000 square feet of the now-shuttered Maine North High School building. The lease runs from Sept. 15, 1982 to Aug. 14, 1984, with an option to lease for an additional two years. The annual rental is \$2.58 per square foot. The Chicago Blitz football team has already signed an agreement with the Parkside Foundation to sub-lease 5,500 square feet of space. The foundation's plans are for a Preventive Medicine-Sports Medicine Center. The Chicago Sting soccer team had not signed a formal lease as yet, but is expected to sublease 1,500 square feet of space. The Chicago Bulls basketball team which had expressed an interest in the building previously now plans to stay in their present quarters at Angel Guardian school in Chicago.

The Metropolitan Sanitary District last Thursday voted to deny building permits to 10 suburbs that have not developed flood control plans governing new construction. The 10 communities included Golf, Rosemont, Bellwood, Melrose Park, Lyons, Stickney, Indian Head Park, Westhaven, Markham and South Chicago Heights. The board also voted to give 26 other communities until Oct. 1, 1983 to complete ordinances designed to prevent construction in flood areas. Commissioner Richard Troy said those towns and villages have submitted proposed plans but need time to change them to make them comply with district requirements. The Village of Morton Grove was one of these suburbs which was granted a one-year extension to bring their sewers up to district standards.

The Illinois Department of Children and Family Services has begun legal proceedings to take away the adopted daughter of the Park Ridge woman who beat to death her other adopted child last month. The Illinois agency filed a neglect petition to remove the one-year-old girl still living with Ralph Kompare. Mrs. Kompare, charged with voluntary manslaughter in the September 11 killing, remains hospitalized for psychological treatment.

ITT Harper to close Morton Grove plant

Niles Lions Candy Day chairman

A.G. "Ang" Marcheschi has been named general chairman of the candy day campaign for the Niles Lions Club. "We're planning on one of the best candy days since the start of candy day in 1952," he said. Candy day is held statewide by 33,000 Lions from more than 670 clubs throughout Illinois. It is scheduled this year for Friday, October 8, when Lions and volunteers will give away candy and accept donations to help the blind, visually impaired, deaf and hearing impaired.

Locally, the club goal is \$10,000. The statewide goal this year is \$1.2 million to fund a variety of humanitarian projects. The announcements of candy day chairmanship was made by William Cornelius, club president.

Funds from candy day are restricted to use to aid the blind, deaf and those with either vision or hearing impairments. Funds are used for a variety of projects both locally and statewide.

The statewide projects, administered through the Lions of

ITT Harper announced today that it will close its manufacturing plant here.

The plant, which produced fasteners and extruded mill products, will be phased out over the next several months and plans are to close the facility entirely by the end of 1982. This announcement follows an earlier indication from the company that it was given serious consideration to closing the local facilities.

The closing will mean the loss of about 325 production and salaried positions. A company spokesman confirmed the decision to close the plant after discussing the closure with salaried employees and with officials of the United Steel Workers of America who represent the non-salaried employees.

Management of ITT Harper reached its decision because it had incurred substantial losses for several years as a result of ruinous foreign competition and severe recession in the fastener and steel industries. Although the company has made the decision to close, discussions regarding the possible sale of the operations are continuing.

The company's fastener operation manufactured special and standard fasteners primarily from stainless steel, copper-

based and nickel alloys. Its specially mill operation produced custom-designed extruded products primarily from stainless steel, titanium, and other corrosion-resistant alloys.

An ITT Harper spokesman indicated that a placement office will be set up to assist employees in seeking positions with local companies or other units.

ITT Harper representatives will also help prepare and distribute resumes for all employees. A workshop will be conducted to develop employees' skills for job interviewing. Representatives from the Illinois Bureau of Employment Security will meet on-site with employees to discuss unemployment benefits and job availability in the area, set interview schedules, and provide other information pertaining to the employment process.

ITT Harper is a division of International Telephone and Telegraph Corporation.
