## Dist. 63 ok's \$7.75 million tax levy

Board members of East Maine School District 63 approved a \$7,750,000 tax levy for 1982 which business manager James Bowen said is a five per cent increase and "will not increase the tax rate." Action took place at a regular board meeting on Tuesday, Nov. 16 in Apollo school, 10100 Dee rd., Des Plaines. Funds from the levy will be applied to six funds: Education - \$5,811,290; Operation, Building and Maintenance - \$1,203,990; Transportation - \$385,290; Illinois

Municipal Retirement - \$200,000; Tort Immunity - \$75,000; and Working Cash - \$100,000. A previous committee-of-the-whole meeting had been held to discuss the levy and receive comments from the public. Board members also approved the 1981-82 audit report. Bowen said the report was not accurate in a listing of assets and liabilities. He said a refunding bond sold by the District in September was placed in escrow to pay all other bond issues. ## From the Left Hand

We dropped over to Commonwealth Edison's nuclear power plant in Zion Monday afternoon. It was a rather awesome experience.

The plant is located along the lakefront in a very desolate area perhaps a mile east of a populated area. Before entering the parking lot, you are checked at the entrance gate. Previously, Commonwealth had secured our social security number which was checked for clearance. At the entrance gate the guard checked our name off his list, then telephoned ahead after receiving identification from us.

Inside a security building a metal check-out machine, similar to the ones used at the airport, made sure we were clean of any metal. We then registered at another security check-point, received a body-check, identified who we were, and received a visitor's pass. We also were given a hard-hat, escorted into a briefing room, and received a radiation detector, which we clasped onto a breast pocket. After being briefed, and told not to touch railings, we were escorted past huge turbines into the spent fuel storage area. On runways above the water pools, we saw spent fuel racks below in the water which were being stored.

Nuclear fuel is uranium dioxide enriched to approximately 3 percent U-235 and clad in zircalloy-4 fuel rods. Fuel is in the form of Continued on Page 27

A planter box was damaged at Golf Mill and Jonquil Terrace and the tennis court coin/light box was damaged. An attempt at a break-in took place at Courland Park.

Ms. Marusek attributed the public Halloween parties held over the weekend were responsible for quelling any major acts of vandalism. In other actions Comm. Heinen reported park moneys deposited at the First National Bank of Niles at an 8 1/2 per cent interest Continued on Page 26

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## Bugle Digest Local News Briefs

Reports from Lutheran General Hospital are encouraging on the condition of Morton Grove Mayor Richard Flickinger who suffered two heart attacks 11 days ago. According to Jim Sloan, assistant village administrator, word from the mayor's family indicates that his condition has been upgraded from critical to serious and that a respirator and heart pump have been discontinued. The 66-year-old mayor is still in the coronary care unit of the hospital.

The North Suburban Mass Transit District (NOR-TRAN) will hold a public hearing on Tuesday, Nov. 30 regarding a proposed change in the bus route 208 (Golf Mill-Old Orchard-Evanston). The hearing will begin at 8 p.m. in the Skokie Village Hall, 5127 Oakton, Skokie. Route 208 is being revised to serve the new Cook County Courthouse located near Harms and Old Orchard Road in Skokie. The proposed route 208 will leave Golf Mill, travel east on Golf, North on Harms to Old Orchard Road, then east on Old Orchard Road to the Old Orchard shopping center, back to Golf Road and return to Evanston along its usual route. The public hearing provides an opportunity for the public to express their views.

Representatives from the Park Ridge Taxpayers Task Force will meet with finance committee members of Maine Township High School District 207 on the subjects of taxes and school funding. The meeting will be held on Monday, Nov. 29 at 7:30 p.m. in the Administration Center, 1131 Dee Road, Park Ridge.

## Village warns residents on kerosene heater use

In recent years, the use of portable kerosene heaters by homeowners has increased dramatically - primarily as a result of their availability, fuel efficiency and advantage in reducing central heating costs by supplemental heating of individual rooms. "Those persons considering the purchase of a portable kerosene heater should look for the (UL) Listing Mark since these contain safety features to reduce the chance of fire, burns and potential asphyxiation problems," stated Niles Fire Chief Albert Hoelbl.

Portable kerosene heaters are not required to be connected to a chimney, nor are they designed to draw their required oxygen for combustion from outside of the building. These heaters draw their required oxygen from the interiors of the building in which they are located and return their products of combustion back to the living space. "If a heater is used in an area where normal infiltration rates are low, the oxygen in the air will be gradually reduced resulting in incomplete combustion of the fuel and the liberation of increasing amounts of carbon monoxide - which is odorless, colorless and

deadly to occupants if exposure is continuous and at a high enough level," continued Chief Hoelbl.

Many safety experts believe portable kerosene heaters should not be used in bedrooms or other

# Library audit report delayed by fund placement question

## Mill Run fate up in the air

The fate of the vacant Mill Run Theatre remains a mystery to Niles residents and officials though speculation includes the possibility of the theatre being torn down and replaced with commercial stores.

The 1,800 seat theatre, which had been leased by the Golf Mill Association to the Chicago-based Tiffany Productions for the past ten years, failed to open in September.

And at least three theatrical firms from around the country are reportedly negotiating with Golf Mill to operate Mill Run.

However, before any company could open the theatre, an outside fire escape would have to be constructed, according to Niles officials.

Tiffany Productions had been ordered to construct the fire escape following an incident during a performance in which a smoldering stage light momentarily created a panic in the audience. Following inquiries by members of the audience, Niles officials insisted Mill Run install an outdoor fire escape for patrons sitting in the upper tiers of the theatre in the room.

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Niles Library board members adjourned a meeting Wednesday, Nov. 10, before completing business on a scheduled agenda which should have included an annual audit report. The meeting may be reconvened December 8, again in the main library.

Adjournment was preceded by an unusual meeting in which an ordinarily routine matter, the treasurer's report, was interrupted by board member Martin Hodes declaring an irregularity.

In another matter, four board members voted to discontinue the meeting which would have culminated in an auditor's report about 10:30 p.m.

Cutting off a report by accountant Marge MacNamara, Hodes said \$315,880 had been "erroneously drained out" of the Corporate Reserve fund and "buried" in another fund for capital improvements named Niles Public Library Acquisition fund.

Hodes stressed his argument was with the amount of money placed in the Library fund and not whether it should be there. According to him, the amount of money siphoned into another fund is a five-year accumulation from the Corporate fund and should be only \$40,000 to \$60,000.

Hodes explained a 15 mill tax levy is used to raise Corporate Funds. Money unsent by the library for items paid for by this fund are placed in the Corporate

Reserve fund. Reserve funds, therefore, stem from the Corporate fund while the Library Construction fund is paid for directly by a two mill tax levy.

Four board members supported Hodes in approving placement of the \$315,000 back into the Corporate fund until an audit determines the amount of money which should be transferred.

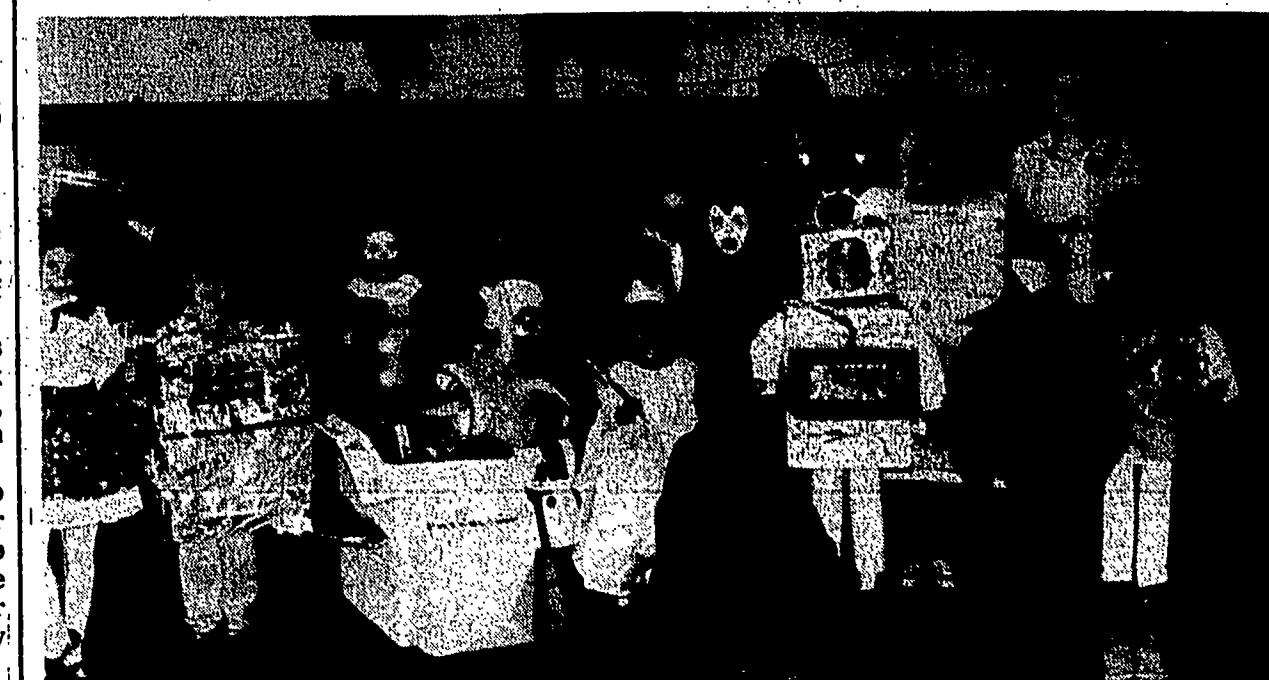
Margaret Rajski, board member, asked board approval to immediately hear the audit report which she said is a "very important document" that persons should not begin work on when tired. Although this motion did not pass earlier, four board members voted to adjourn the meeting and reconvene at a later date when the entire agenda exclusive of the audit report was not finished by 11 p.m.

Some discussion concerned discretion in inviting the auditor for a 10 p.m. report. Two board members said the auditor, unable to attend a finance committee meeting the evening before, had been asked to speak at a regular board meeting when other business supposedly would be completed.

In discussion, Harry Pestine, board president, said two computer terminals are standing "unused" at the main library because a unit for connecting a possible four terminals has not

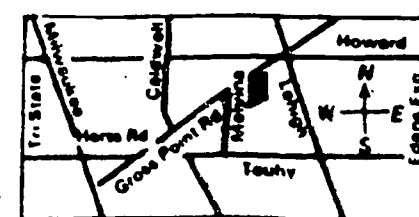
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## Carbon monoxide hazard in cold weather

The warning signals of carbon monoxide poisoning are weariness, yawning, dizziness, nausea, headache and ringing in the ears.

Here are four simple precautions to take to avoid carbon monoxide poisoning:

1. Have the exhaust system checked regularly for any leakage.
2. Do not start the engine, drive your vehicle or run the engine while parked with all of the windows closed tightly.
3. Do not start your vehicle or warm up the engine in a closed garage.
4. Do not allow children access to your car keys. They enjoy imitating adults, but pretending to drive the car could be a game with deadly results.

Our comments that declining enrollment was unforeseen related to the year 1970. At that time every grade level was showing increases each year. Figures showing a decline were not reported until after that year.

Dear Editor:

In recent columns, you wrote that no one could have foreseen the sudden declining enrollment in our schools. This is not correct. If the school districts and the school boards had done their homework, they would have been able to predict declining enrollment.

There is a booklet entitled, Directory of Suburban Public Schools, issued by Richard Martwick, Cook County Superintendent of Schools. This Directory lists each elementary and high school in each district in the entire suburban Cook County area. Under each school district is listed the name of each school, how many students and teachers are in each school, and whether the school is K-6, 7-8 or high school.

By making yearly comparisons, anyone can project that enrollment will continue to decline for some time. For example:

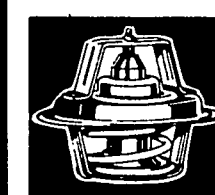

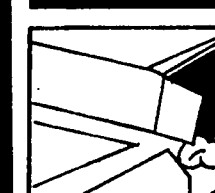

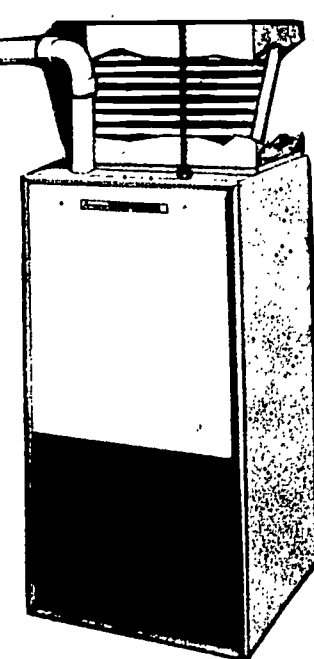

### ED HANSON

#### A Left-Handed Gunslinger



Last Tuesday, Nov. 9, the celebrated Mike Royko, of the Chicago Sun-Times wrote a funny and interesting column entitled, "Double Gun Fun - 2 Barrel Award". He related how gun lovers have accidentally blasted themselves in various ways, killing, wounding or blowing-off various parts of their anatomy.

Mike is offering two awards - Handgun Owner of the Year and Long Gun Owner of the Year. This column is my official entry. I shall mail it to Royko and I will win the top award for Handgun Owner of the Year - "hands-up".

Since I was a little boy of three I always loved handguns.

This is my true story. My third Christmas Eve, Dec. 24, 1914, little lead soldiers of many nations stood at attention on the white sheet under the large balsam, candle-light Christmas tree, with rifle upon shoulders and handgun on hips. They were resplendent in brilliant colors of red, white, green, blue, yellow, black and grey (including even drab brown - the color of the uniforms with the putes of the "Dough Boys or the 'Yanks' of World War I.)

They were a gift from my grandmother (on my father's side) who, at that time, was the personal maid to Jane Adams, founder of Hull House, near Halstead and DeKoven, Chicago. My father was born there.

My third Christmas a bonus was added. It came in the form of a cowboy doll whose sky-blue moveable eyes amazed me. But even more astounding was the cowboy doll itself. It wore a removable sombrero, a red bandana tied around its neck, and yellow wool chaps. On its left side was a tiny leather holster, slung low, and tied to its left thigh. In the tiny holster was a little lead handgun cast to resemble a .45 Colt. But, lo and behold, my baby blue eyes widened with wonder when I discovered the little handgun was removable from the leather holster. All my other expensive gifts from the wealthy side of my mother's family were spurned by me, a mechanical train set, a drum, an erector set, a "Frank Merriwell At Yale" hard cover book, a football and baseball game, puzzle sets and a big Christmas stocking jammed with goodies.

All I played with was the blue-eyed cowboy doll for weeks thereafter. Being born left handed, it was easy for my tiny hand to quickly draw, pretend to shoot the small lead replica of the Colt .45. I became faster and faster and faster on the draw. Everyone who came to our upstairs room, \$15 a month, cold-water flat on Grace street near Carl Schurz High School, (the mailman, phone collector, insurance man, milkman, produce peddler, ice man) who visited our flat, I promptly shot.

My father who often came home "half shot" - I shot, again and again until it finally got on his nerves. Always crabby at home he was always cheerful and the life of the party when he went visiting with ma and me. One day after he came home late the night before and I "shot" him, he

yelled, "Knock it off, brat, before I belt you one!" He was a big, athletic muscular guy and I was afraid of him so I began bawling. My mother and her mother (who lived with us) flew into the living room with the wrath of the avenging angels crying, "Don't you ever dare to strike him!"

Taken back by the sheer fury of my mother's spleen, he grunted something, slammed his black derby on his thick shock of wavy blonde hair and left, slamming the door with such force he was unhinged it.

My mother gathered me to her ample bosom, hugged and kissed and wiped away my tears. When she finished I gave her my baby blue-eyed innocent stare and she said to her mother, "Isn't he cute?"

Now, that I'm much, much older I often wonder if my mother, who did possess a rare insight, felt a strange, unexplainable sense of foreboding of what the future might hold for me. She tried time and again to wean my affections away from the cowboy doll and the little handgun and at times she stared at the cowboy doll with such a malicious expression as though it were as evil as an ancient voodoo doll.

Finally, she hid it telling me to play with my many other new Christmas toys. Probably being unaware of it, I must have possessed an inborn animalistic cunning, so I refused to eat until I got back the cowboy doll. I waited... (what she didn't know was I wasn't hungry anyway having sneaked a few cookies from the jar and had others stashed in various hiding places throughout the flat).

Ma gave me back my cowboy doll. I surmised she just couldn't beat the greatest feat of her only son who she secretly hoped would someday grow up to be president, not eating his porridge.

Yes, my third Christmas I never forgot; it was a milestone. And to this day I still remember the little lead soldiers of many nations whose black shadows reflected upon the white sheet spread under the Christmas tree. Years later I finally fathomed the significance of those shadows. It was this: "Coming events cast their shadow before." The armies of many nations cast their shadows on my third Christmas. The year of my third Christmas was 1914. The "sign" was there just as the 3 Wise Men saw the sign in the sky that signaled the birth of Jesus Christ.

It was while playing poker in Vegas that I finally understood. It was when I mastered what the best there is and knew what they knew. And that was how to read faces, decipher gestures and recognize "signs". This is often erroneously referred to as a gambler's 6th sense.

The "shadows of the lead soldiers of many nations and ours was the "sign" foretelling the return of the "Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse" and the outbreak of the greatest WAR in the history of the world up to that time... World War I.

And three years later, on my 6th birthday April 6, 1917 it happened - and shortly after the Yanks went "Over There".

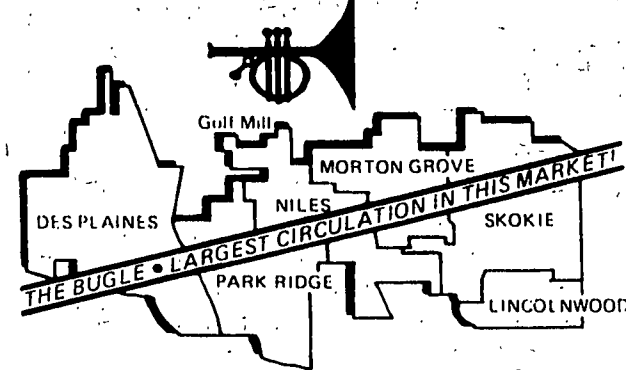

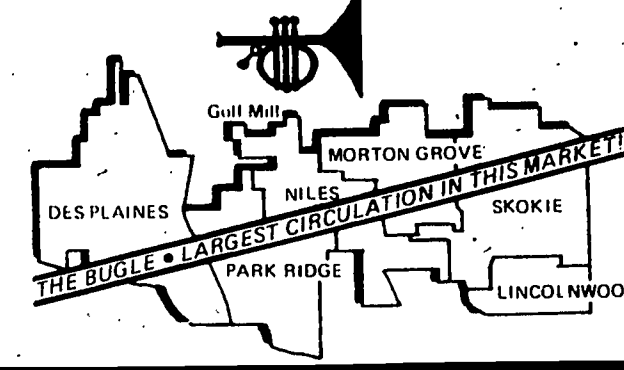

rate. She also reported the district is seeking new auditors who she hopes will be cheaper and more effective. The failure to receive more than \$100,000 from the County for almost a year contributed to the auditor search.

Heinen also reported the park district may seek a consultant to determine if the park district could use a computer. Since other park districts' needs are different, she said a park committee did not deem it necessary to check out other districts' use of computers.

Commissioner Dan Kosiba thought the subject should proceed as fast as possible. He is

concerned about park employees spending so much time making the payroll. He also thought the need for an end of the year print-out should be considered.

In other actions the park board, in preparing for disbursing liquor on park property after the first of the year, had many questions pursuant to dram shop insurance and the license requirements for groups using the park facilities. Village liquor commissioner Blaise is reviewing the many questions.

Kosiba's recreation committee included reporting the successes of the 400 children Halloween Party, the successful

junior high school student party which had more than 100 participants and the successful Turkey Trot held at the golf course. Upcoming parties include the December 18 pre-teen Santa Party to be held at Grennan Heights and the boys and girls basketball leagues and the District 63 gym program to take place later in the year. Kosiba also reported basketball tournaments for 5th and 6th graders and 7th and 8th graders takes place Dec. 4 for boys and Dec. 18 for girls. He expects double the participation this year.

Commissioner Jim Pierski reported the park ranger police program ended Oct. 31 and Tom Lippert is evaluating the overall results of it. Also the park board will review the services of the Niles Neighborhood Watch Patrol, a concerned citizens group which works in conjunction with the police department.

Park Board President Walt Buesse reported 2,628 more rounds of golf were played this year with an increase of \$33,843 in revenue. However, because expenses were up, the increased revenue did not reflect that amount of extra profit from the golf operation.

Park Director Bill Hughes reported Iowa Travellers Insurance Company will be the new health insurance company for the district effective Dec. 1. Monthly premiums will be \$2,366.00, dental premiums \$528 plus a small life insurance policy premium.

Hughes also reported the golf course will be open on a day to day basis, hopefully to Thanksgiving with daylight hours being from 7 a.m. until 4 p.m.

Hughes also reported a mid-December cross country ski program is scheduled. He also said at a Louisville convention he attended, an inside soccer field was exhibited at a converted rink. He indicated this was an interesting idea which implied the ice rink facility might have another use in the future.

A Hughes recommendation for the purchase of an IBM electric typewriter was approved.

Lastly, it was reported 2 park commissioner's seats will be filled in April for 2 four year terms. Nominating petitions will be available at the park district offices Dec. 15 and must be filed between Jan. 4 and 31. A minimum of 157 signatures must be submitted on petitions, 2 percent of the 7,831 votes cast in the last park election.

the form of pellets about a half-inch long and slightly less than a half-inch diameter.

Each reactor has 193 fuel assemblies. Each fuel assembly has 204 fuel rods and measures 12 feet long and about 8 inches square. There are 53 control rods in each reactor core.

While we were standing above the storage pools, a simulated fuel assembly was hanging from a crane hook. This is spent energy which was to be stored into the pool. They have been able to condense more rods into the same 12 foot long by 8 inch square cores which were to be placed into the water.

Because our government has stopped the re-processing of this fuel, it is presently being stored underwater. While storage has been previously sent to Washington and South Carolina, there seems to be a hold on further storage in the ground. This necessitates Commonwealth storing rods into this water pool at their plant.

It is Commonwealth's contention this matter has become a political problem rather than a scientific one. They contend it is perfectly safe to store the active uranium in the ground buried deeply in encasements. But the political decision of placing the active uranium into the ground rests with the individual states, and politicians are not giving their okay for storage. It is seemingly impossible politicians will permit storage in their areas since the public has become increasingly apprehensive about active energy being stored underground. According to Commonwealth only the federal government will be able to make the decision for underground storage of waste which they believe is inevitable.

After standing on the runway overlooking the spent fuel water pits we retraced our steps. Twice we had to step into detectors to make sure we did not contact radiation. Our shoes and hands were checked and a hand detector was run over our clothes. At another security checkpoint the radiation detector we had installed on our shirt pocket was read.

We went into the briefing room for a question and answer period and then returned to the initial security room for a final checkout and a return of our hardhat.

It was a good session and we might suggest Commonwealth should open its plant to many more people. They are out to enlighten the public on what they are doing and what their problems are.

As a reporter we have no firm conclusions on a very complex matter. We mentioned we are aware the much more economical nuclear plants are preferred by utility companies because of the higher profits involved. Commonwealth people said these lower costs are returned partially to their customers. Since they are regulated by the government, only certain amounts of these savings can be given to stockholders and much of the savings are returned to users of their electricity.

We are keenly aware the utilities desire to sell us their point of view. A few years ago Illinois Bell had us down to hear their story regarding the unfair competition they contended they were fighting. The argument was the MCIC company was able to give long distance service only between large cities while they were compelled by government agencies to give long-distance service to America's smallest communities, which they said was very costly. Only recently Illinois Bell lost the suit.

As a conveyor of information we have to be very careful. The utilities are the professionals with a great deal of money to spend to get their message across to the public. The opposition, as in the case of the Illinois Bell's court action, had much less ability to get their message to the public.

For the most part, we've given you the utility company's message today. It will take a great deal more effort to get their opposition's view into print. We intend giving you their side because this issue is very important to all of us.

The storage of nuclear waste must be determined. And the sooner it is decided, the better. Every day more nuclear waste is being created. Finding a place to permanently store it should be determined now.

The slow actions of a politically-oriented society is not in the public interest. Tomorrow's burden will be greater than today's.

It is a public decision which has to be made. Neither the professional scientists nor the politicians can make this decision for us. None of us can make a sound decision without full knowledge. It is our responsibility to seek out this information and distill from it a firm conclusion.

rooms used for sleeping purposes. These units may be hazardous in bedrooms because sleeping occupants will not be able to observe any abnormal operation of the heater. In addition, since doors of bedrooms should be kept closed for fire safety reasons, the room ventilation requirements for sleeping occupants and for proper operation of the heater may be inadequate. Also, it is unlikely that the practice of partially opening a window in a bedroom, allowing cold air to enter, will be followed, since the objective of providing the heater is to keep the room warm. Finally, it is not expected that people will purchase smaller units for use in their bedrooms; they will probably purchase a unit for the living or family room and move it

to the bedroom the result being a unit too large for the space intended to be heated.

It is extremely important that only kerosene be used for fuel in a portable kerosene heater.

Kerosene should be "water clear"; it should not be yellow or colored. Yellow or colored kerosene indicates inferior or contaminated fuel and is not considered suitable for use in unvented heaters. Kerosene should be stored in approved, metal or plastic containers clearly marked "KEROSENE".

Remember, refueling a portable kerosene heater can be a dangerous procedure. A heater should never be refueled while it is still operating or while it is still hot, and the user should never smoke during the refueling procedure!!

systems and focus on job training skills." Davis was chosen from among over 150 applicants. "It's nice the new Vice President of the College is within it," said Chairman Harstein.

In other matters, the Board ratified \$1,494,351 for payment of bills for the month of October. The financial position of the college released in the Treasurer's report showed a deficit and the need to transfer \$1,000 from investments to meet operating expenditures. A quarterly report on investments showed that Oakton has accrued an interest of \$323,430 or 13.07 per cent average yield.

To meet ordinary expenditures and payment of loans, the Board approved the transfer of \$2,500 from Working Cash funds to the Educational Purposes Fund.

Oakton's students will be comfortable this winter as seven BTU unit heaters will be used for 4 months for a total expenditure of \$20,971. The rental is estimated to save the College approximately \$25,000 until a permanent HVAC heating system will be installed.

A gift of 16 works of art consisting of paintings, prints, a silkscreen and photograph was accepted by the Board from Mr. and Mrs. Neil King. The items have been valued at \$1,400.

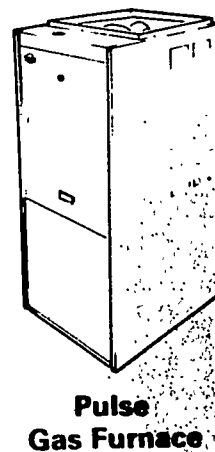

"With the vast resources of Mid-Citco Incorporated, we anticipate an expansion of all services and substantial growth in the commercial segment of our market area," Skopec said.

The acquisition of the bank in-

volves cash payment to shareholders of \$41.50 per share for 150,000 shares outstanding, a total of \$6,225,000. The acquisition has been approved by regulatory agencies.

Skopec pointed out that the cash purchase illustrates the basic strength of Mid-Citco Incorporated in these times when some financial institutions are short of equity due to reduced earnings or losses.

He reported that for the first nine months of 1982, Mid-Citco had earnings after security gains or losses of \$2,377,071, an increase of 32 per cent over the same period in 1981.

Mid-Citco's assets, including those of the First National Bank of Morton Grove, now exceed \$342 million.

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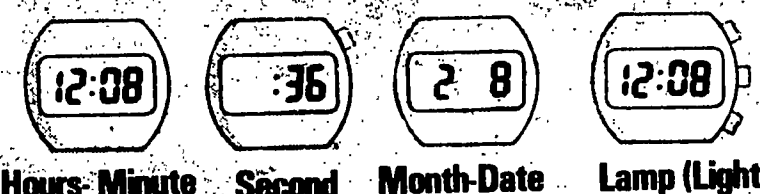
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
