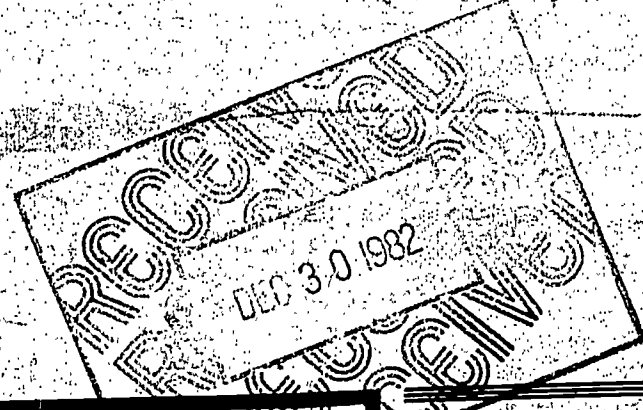

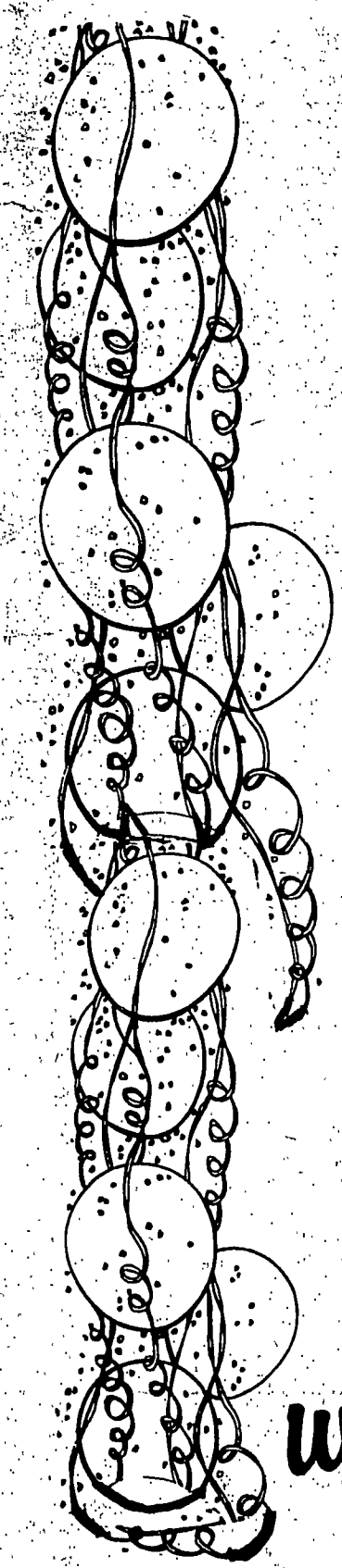

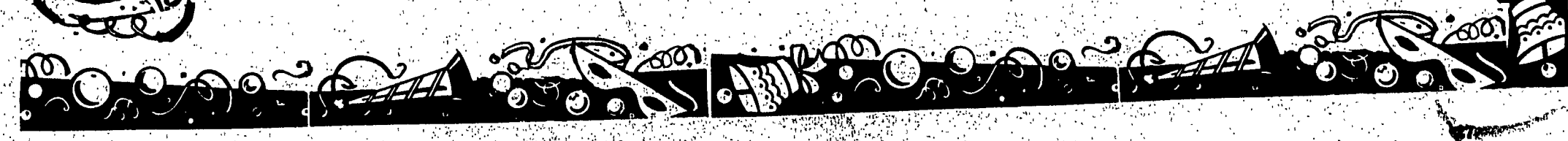

MG Board votes to cut village engineer post

In an abbreviated meeting Monday night Morton Grove village trustees okayed the elimination of the village engineer post at the end of this year, which will cut \$32,650 from the village payroll.

Because the re-appointment of the village engineer would normally take place at the beginning of the calendar year, it was decided to take action at this time.

When the post was created there were more state and federal funds available for the village post. With the government money drying up, village officials felt using a consultant would be more economical.

In other actions Bill Tsagalis, owner of the Seven Brothers Restaurant (Manda's), received a certificate of appreciation from the village presented by president pro tem Don Snieder. Sixty to seventy free Christmas dinners were served by Tsagalis' restaurant to needy persons.

...\$150,847 Motor Fuel Tax money was approved for the Austin Avenue repaving project which was completed last summer.

The reinstatement of the law which forbids trustees from serving on the village payroll for 2 years after leaving office was delayed until the next meeting. Trustee Greg Youstra's suggestion to include the village clerk in the law was accepted by the board and will be included in the reinstated law.

Health Chairman Bill Simpkins' recommendation that the opening of jars in supermarkets be forbidden will be drafted as an ordinance. It is believed Morton Grove is the first community to create such an ordinance. Sealed jars become unsterilized when they are open.

Approved an ordinance to enable the village treasurer to shop around for the best loan available and to increase the maximum loan by \$600,000. Because of tax moneys being received late from the County, public bodies obtain tax anticipation warrants which are loans borrowed against anticipated tax moneys.

District 207 optional attendance areas

For the 1983-84 school year, two optional attendance areas exist in Maine Township High School District 207. Students who reside in either of those areas will be permitted the option to select the school which they wish to attend.

Those students residing in that portion of Elementary School District 64 that is north of Oakton st.

will have the option of attending either Maine East or Maine South. Eighth grade students presently attending Emerson Junior High School have already been contacted. All other students wishing to exercise the option to attend Maine South should contact Mr. Sherman Roth, Director of Student Personnel Services at Maine East, at 825-4484.

Those students who reside in that portion of Elementary District School 62 which is east of the Tri State Tollway and West of the Potter Lyman boundary, between Dempster st. and Central rd., will have the option of attending either Maine East or Maine West. All students wishing to exercise the option to attend Maine East should contact Mr. Wayne Rosenquist, Director of Student Personnel Services at Maine West, at 827-6176.

Petitions for Library Board openings

The Board of Trustees of the Niles Public Library District has announced that an election of Board Members will be held on April 12. At this election seats will be open for one two-year term, and three six-year terms.

The Library Board invites all interested citizens of the District to present nomination petitions to run for election to this office. Any citizen of the United States over eighteen years of age who has resided in Illinois for one year, in Cook County for ninety days, and in the Library District for thirty days is eligible for trusteeship. Trustees are expected to attend regular Board meetings which are held at 8 p.m. on the second Wednesday of each month and any special meetings which may be called for special extraordinary needs. They should have an interest in serving the community by sharing in the responsibility for the governing of library policies and helping in planning the future development of the library.

In order to become a candidate for this office petitions must be presented signed by at least fifty but not more than two hundred voters who have resided within the district for thirty days, the county for ninety days, and the State for one year. Petitions must be presented at the library no sooner than January 24 and no later than the 31st day of January, 1983. A packet of the necessary forms is now available at the library office.

Students who are experiencing alcohol and drug-related problems are finding new avenues of hope in Maine Township's new program, PROJECT RESCUE.

The outgrowth of a year's planning, PROJECT RESCUE offers first-time violators of the district's drug/alcohol policy an alternative to the required ten-day suspension, vital information about drugs, and skill-building in values clarification and decision-making.

A basic prevention and early intervention program, PROJECT RESCUE grew out of a proposal submitted last spring by a group chaired by Mr. Sherman Roth, Director of Student Personnel Services at Maine East. The committee included district personnel and Ms. Shannon Burns, coordinator of the Community Education Program at the Lutheran Center for Substance Abuse.

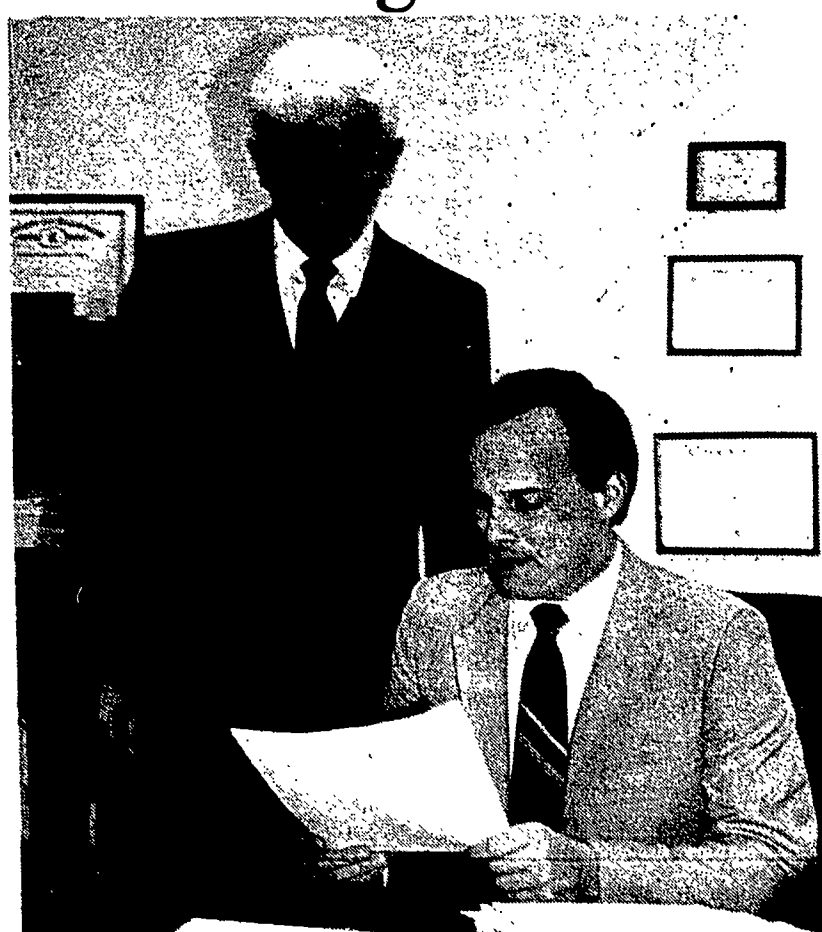
"Maine's program is a pilot program in Illinois," explains Mrs. Linda Ganser Selway, M.S.W., coordinator of PROJECT RESCUE. "Our program is designed to educate students and their parents on the effects of various drugs, addiction dynamics, and the progression of use, misuse, and abuse."

"We want to help students begin to answer such questions as, 'What do I want out of my life?' 'Where am I headed?' 'What kinds of decisions must I make in order to achieve my goals?' We also want to foster good communication between students and their parents."

Located at Maine East High School in Park Ridge, PROJECT RESCUE is offered three evenings a week in the school's Guidance Department center. Mrs. Selway, social worker at Maine North High School from

Warnings on holiday drinking and driving

Although drunk driving is a year-round problem, it becomes a serious problem during the Christmas holidays. Each year, the National Safety Council projects traffic fatalities that will occur during the holidays, and, statistically, we know that the majority of these fatalities will be linked in some way with a driver who has had too much to drink.

Alcohol is a drug that depresses your central nervous system and slows the activity of your brain and spinal cord. Even if you've had only a few drinks, your reflexes are slowed down. Your body does not digest alcohol the way it does food. The alcohol you drink is absorbed directly from your stomach and intestines into your bloodstream. This absorption takes place rapidly, especially if your stomach is empty. So, before you drive, give yourself time to burn up the alcohol in your bloodstream.

How much alcohol does it take to make the average person drunk? That varies from person to person. Some people have a higher tolerance than others do, and even individual tolerance can vary depending on your physical condition and your emotional state. But, if you weigh 150 pounds and drink three martinis, or five ounces of hard liquor, in an hour, you would be considered legally drunk. If you drink this much and want to get the alcohol content of your blood back to a normal level, you should stop

drinking for about three hours. Black coffee or cold showers will not help sober you up. Time is the only remedy. The old saying, "If you give a drunk a lot of black coffee, all you will have is a wide-awake drunk," is essentially true.

The best advice for those who are drinking is simply, "Don't drink and drive." But being realistic, we must recognize that many people are going to do both. If you know you are going to drink and then drive, eat before your start drinking. Having something in your stomach will help slow down the rate of absorption. You should also space your drinks. Drink slowly to give your body time to handle the alcohol. If you consume no more than a third of an ounce of alcohol each hour, you will probably stay sober, for the average healthy liver will burn up alcohol at the rate of about one-third ounce an hour.

Be sure you know what you are drinking. Don't accept a drink if you don't know what is in it. And, before you have your first drink, set yourself a limit on the number of drinks you will have, and stick to it!

Finally, give your body a chance to "burn up" the alcohol you have consumed before you get behind the wheel.

The Illinois Department of Public Health urges you help avoid tragedies during the coming holiday season by staying sober if you are going to drive.

State police list drunk driving as No. 1 priority

The Illinois State Police have been advising motorists since the beginning of the year that arresting drunk drivers is one Number One priority. And yet, 7,389 persons have been arrested for Driving Under the Influence during the first 11 months of 1982. The Holiday Season finds more people traveling on Illinois roads visiting friends and relatives. More individuals are drinking and celebrating. Troopers are watching for motorists who mix the two. Many citizen-victim groups are also watching and notifying the police when they

spot a potential drunk driving hazard. The odds are against you if you drink and drive! Remember the only cure for intoxication is time. A cup of coffee won't help. A cold shower won't help. Breathing fresh air won't help. Time is the only factor that will help sober you up. An hour for each drink.

Don't end the current year like 7,389 sorry motorists already have. If you had to do it over, they sure would do it different. Learn from their mistake.

Winter driving safety hints

Winter driving calls for patience, knowledge and skill on the part of every motorist. The following safe driving practices will help reduce the dangers of driving in winter:

-As conditions deteriorate, reduce your speed accordingly. There is no safe driving speed on snow or ice. Be especially careful when you come upon a bridge, overpass or underpass. -If you have a rear-wheel drive vehicle, use snow tires and/or chains on your rear wheels. Snow treads improve traction, both starting and stopping. Tire chains are effective in ice and snow. Many hardware stores sell portable chains for emergencies. Snow tires and chains will not, however, allow you to drive on slick roads at normal speeds. -Keep your windows clear. Don't start driving until the windshield is defrosted and clean, and snow and ice is completely removed from all other windows.

-Get the feel of the road. Start very slowly and test your brakes to determine how much traction you can expect from your tires. Start slowing down well before coming to an intersection, turn or stop.

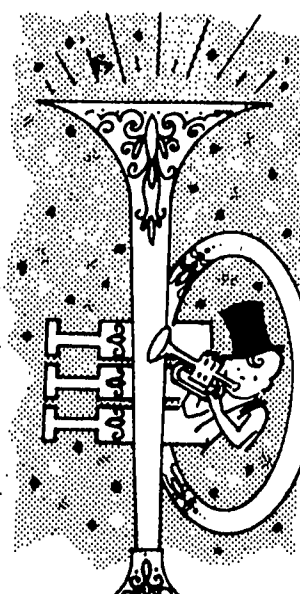

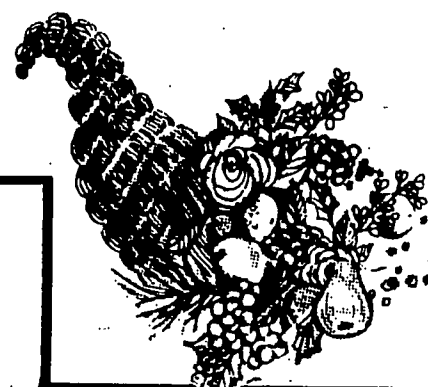

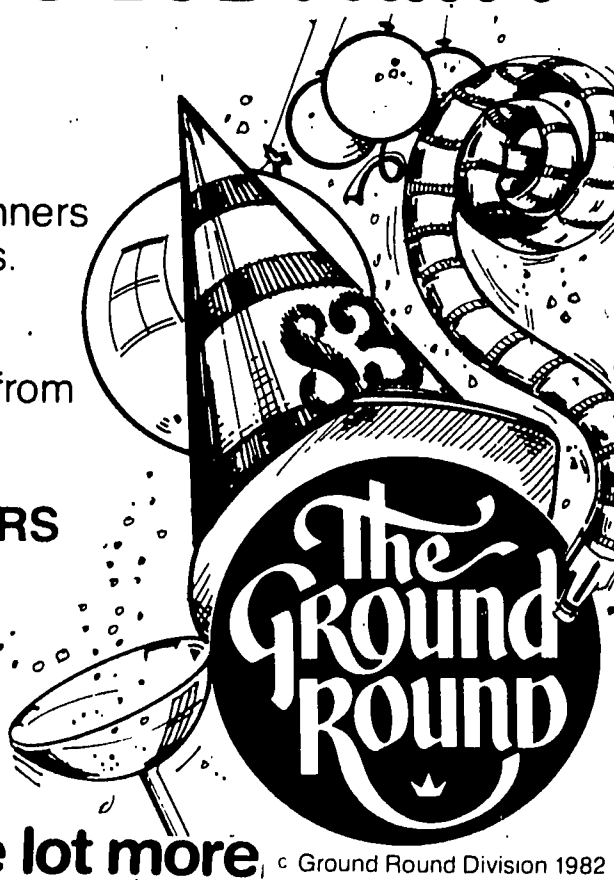

Capparelli votes to eliminate property tax multiplier

State Rep. Ralph C. Capparelli (D-13th) kept his pledge to residents in the 13th District by voting to eliminate the state multiplier, a long-standing irritant that has forced Cook County Taxpayers to pay higher real estate taxes than they believe are necessary.

The measure passed the Illinois House by an 82-78 vote.

The controversial property tax multiplier raises the assessed valuation of property against which local governments levy taxes.

"I was pleased to reflect the wishes of my constituents who voted two to one in a referendum to eliminate the multiplier, and then further demonstrated their concern by presenting 30,000 signatures from Chicago's 41st Ward alone demanding action," said Capparelli. "This was a mandate from the people which I followed, and my action on this legislation is indicative of my ongoing effort to keep taxes down."

Capparelli said that elimination of the multiplier could present a more accurate tax picture of what the country needs in revenue rather than the state trying to equalize property taxes for all 102 counties.

1971-1980 and a private therapist for nine years, received additional specialized training in substance abuse from the Lutheran Center. The program includes an initial interview with the student and parent(s), five sessions, and an exit interview where additional recommendations are made.

Students may refer themselves to PROJECT RESCUE or parents may refer their children. No student is eligible for the program unless at least one parent or guardian attends the required sessions for parents. In addition, students must remain drug/alcohol-free during the program and complete all sessions and assignments.

Director of Special Projects for Maine Township, Mr. Robert Jacobsen notes, "We are discovering that the problem of substance abuse transcends the junior and senior high school settings. Initial contact with drugs and alcohol often begins in the elementary school - and sometimes as early as fifth grade. We encourage parents to be sensitive to their own use of drugs and alcohol in the home, to closely observe the friendships formed by their children, and to monitor their children's behavior when necessary."

"We hope that PROJECT RESCUE will help to reduce substance abuse in the township, educate our entire faculty through in-service experiences, and increase the community's awareness and involvement regarding substance abuse."

Another service offered by PROJECT RESCUE is a parent support group which is available to all district parents. In the support group, parents can discuss, under professional guidance, such issues as setting limits, how to tell if a child is drug-involved, and how to help a child resist peer pressures.
