Niles Police continue search for Burger King killer

Witnesses to Saturday night's murder of the manager of Burger King, 733 Dempster St., continued this week to review pictures provided by the Chicago Police of possible suspects, according to Niles Police Lt. Ray Giovannelli.

Following the Saturday night murder of John Anthony Terry, 34, of Park Forest, manager of the Burger King restaurant, police are pursuing the possibility the suspects may be members of any one of numerous Chicago Hispanic gangs.

Descriptions by witnesses to the murder have pinpointed the suspects as Hispanic looking men in their early 20's. Additionally, one of the suspects was heard speaking Spanish.


Golf Road hi-rise and Terrace Square residents to be served

Be glad we didn't mention your name the past couple of weeks.

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Library board unrest leads to walkout

A second Niles Library board meeting this January adjourned for lack of quorum following a heated disagreement on appointing a trustee to fill a vacancy created by a trustee resignation. An election will take place April 12.

Lack of quorum followed action on almost all agenda items carried from a formerly scheduled meeting, January 12. A lack of quorum, or four board members, resulted when trustees Martin Hodes, Margaret Rajski and Josephine Buck left the library making it unlawful for the

board to conduct official business.

A vacancy was created when former trustee Lois Grant resigned in December "with regret." According to her, many board and committee meetings did not result in any "constructive programs." She said her input was either "over-ridden or ignored" and she "accomplished next to nothing."

Three trustees, board president Harry Pestine, treasurer Rita Breithart, and secretary Irene Costello supported appointment

District 63 parents discuss redistricting

About 150 parents attended a board meeting of East Maine School District 63 for input to or information on possible redistricting of five district schools by the 1983-84 school year. Discussion took place Jan. 25 in Apollo school, 10100 Dee rd., Des Plaines.

Only about 25 parents remained as board discussion continued after midnight and no definite action was taken. In concluding the debate, board members agreed to resume discussion at a committee-of-the-whole meeting scheduled for Tuesday, Feb. 2 at 7:30 p.m. in Apollo. Votes cannot be made at such a meeting and public participation must be approved by board members.

Dr. Donald Bond, school superintendent, said it was im-


portant to finalize plans by the Feb. 8 meeting for the district to make adequate plans for the coming year. Bond also said any decision would be difficult and board members did not come to the meeting with set plans.

Board members attempted to consider moves of student population in regard to safety factors, busing, socialization, academic quality and special education students.

About 21 persons spoke and many more were said to have sent letters to the board. District schools now open to student attendance number five. Melzer school is populated by about 250 students and Washington school may reach that number in about 3 years. Stevenson school is overcrowded.

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Filing dates for Maine assessment protests

Patrick Quinn and Harry H. Semrow, Commissioners of the Cook County Board of (Tax) Appeals have announced the dates for filing assessment appeals complaints by property owners in Maine township.

The filing dates for property assessment appeals opened on Friday, Jan. 21 and will close on Wednesday, Feb. 9.

The Board of Appeals is a two member agency which oversees the entire \$18 billion property tax system in Cook County and hears taxpayer complaints about unfair assessments.

Owners of homes, condominiums, townhouses, apartment buildings and businesses, may appeal their assessments to the Board if they feel that their assessment is too high. A lawyer is not required to file an appeal on behalf of a residential property owner.

Evidence which can be particularly helpful to the property owner seeking an assessment reduction includes any of the following items:

- proof of lower assessments for homes that are comparable to the home of the taxpayer who is appealing;

- a photo of the taxpayers property;

- proof of recent sale prices of homes similar to the home of the taxpayer who is appealing; and

- a real estate appraisal, if available.

Anyone interested in receiving an assessment appeal complaint form should write the Cook County Board of Appeals, Room 601, 118 N. Clark st., Chicago, 60602 or call 443-5542. Appeal complaint forms can also be picked up in person at the Board.

Property owners in the townships mentioned above have until 5 p.m. on February 9 to file assessment appeal complaints.

The Board will then notify the taxpayer of a hearing date when he will be able to argue on behalf of his request for a lower property tax assessment.

Consumer Guide to Hospitals available

Publication of a new Consumer Guide to Hospital Services in Suburban Cook and DuPage Counties was announced by the Suburban Cook County-DuPage County Health Systems Agency (Suburban HSA). The 110-page publication offers a wealth of information on all 33 area hospitals, designed to help the public understand that all hospitals are not alike. The Guide enables the reader to compare hospitals by size, teaching or medical school affiliation, occupancy rates, and the range of specialties on their medical staffs.

A unique feature is cost information: not only room rates, but charts comparing what mid-size vs. larger hospitals charge for typical hospital stays for the ten most common diagnoses. The cost data, supplied by Chicago Blue Cross, can help consumers

discuss with their doctors which hospital is appropriate for their medical needs. Armed with information from the Guide, a prospective hernia patient might say to the admitting doctor, "Why are you putting me in a large teaching hospital for a routine hernia?" The average hospital bill for a hernia operation is \$2,800 in larger suburban hospitals, and only \$2,000 in the mid-size ones.

Detailed profiles of area hospitals allow the reader to check at a glance what each hospital offers in emergency care, maternity services, special clinics, community services such as home care and home delivered meals; out-patient surgery, preadmission testing, mental health, drug or alcoholism.

Five drunk drivers arrested in Niles this week

A 38-year-old Niles man was arrested on Tuesday, January 18 for drunk driving after sideswiping another car on Milwaukee ave. and then attempted to flee. According to police, the Niles man was driving north on Milwaukee ave. when he sideswiped a car driven by a 55-year-old Des Plaines man. The offender immediately drove down a nearby side street, however, was soon stopped when he entered a dead-end street. The man who he struck pursued him and held him until the police arrived.

At the Police Department the Niles man was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol, leaving the scene of an accident, driving with a revoked drivers license and improper lane usage. He was added a February court date and released after posting \$300 bond.

Bugle reader comments on changing times and Ed Hanson

Dear Editor,

Diane Miller is to be commended for her enlightening and entertaining article about her recent experience with the phone company. Usually only Mike Royno can make me laugh before I've finished my first cup of coffee. Anyone who has had any contact with a public utility, or a governmental bureaucracy can identify with how she felt. How sad it is that friendly, efficient service is rapidly becoming a thing of the past.

Last week, CBS News reported that the United States is in the midst of a transformation from an industrial economy to one that is service-oriented, and cited this as one reason why so many blue collar workers are out of work. Since your recent article about your attempts to get a pair of pants altered, I have become acutely aware of how rare it is to get good service these days anywhere you go. Of course, I'm assuming that you actually get served at all.

The marketing powers have made us a nation of large, impersonal department and discount stores. We are expected to select our purchases, humbly wait in line, and be grateful for the privilege when it comes time to pay. Meanwhile, sales clerks usually can't answer your

questions about the merchandise, and can be as difficult to find as snow in July.

When was the last time your waitress was friendly and attentive and brought your bill without being asked? When was the last time you got someone to look at your car without having to make an appointment or leave it for the day? When was the last time someone said, "May I help you?" and really meant it?

Businesses abound with "clock-watchers", employees who treat their jobs like prison sentences. They are merely serving time and wouldn't dream of putting in an extra minute of work if they didn't absolutely have to. And why should they? They are paid for their time, rather than for the results they produce. I contend that if more workers were compensated on the basis of their productivity or contribution to profits, the entire economy would benefit. Absenteeism and waste would decrease, and the quality and quantity of output would increase.

On another matter, Ed Hanson has reached a new low in devoting his entire column to his practice of betting on football games. I've always wondered why he gets so much space in your paper, yet rarely says anything that is profound, or

newsworthy, or even of general interest. Quite often, his purpose is merely to provide free advertising for a handful of Niles businesses. Pretending to be a qualified food critic, he repeatedly cajoles us to patronize a few well-known restaurant and taverns, as if they deserved an international five-star rating.

I hope for Mr. Hanson's sake that the local authorities don't hear about his self-professed "fairly sizeable cash wagers", since gambling is illegal in Illinois. Of course, I'm sure he won't forget to report his winnings on his federal income tax return. And I'm not the least bit surprised that the team he picked to win the Super Bowl has already been eliminated from the playoffs.

Doesn't Mr. Hanson realize that a record number of people in this country are out of work? Or that an even larger number are working as hard as they can and just getting by? Businesses are failing, individuals are declaring personal bankruptcy, and little children are starving. And he has the nerve to take up valuable space in a local newspaper to tell us he is betting at least two hundred dollars on a relatively insignificant football game. A majority of the people who read his column probably couldn't care less about his predictions or his "system". Furthermore, he showed great insensitivity to the

cares and needs of the community in these troubled times. Instead of using his financial success to publicly pat himself on the back, I urge Mr. Hanson to make a donation to the library, or the park district, or the school system, or any worthwhile charity, all of which need every dollar they can get. Thank you, Mr. Besser, for the opportunity you have always given your readers to express their thoughts in your paper, in an open, dynamic forum, and for being such a staunch supporter of the First Amendment.

Kustra proposes In-Person Absentee Balloting

State Senator Bob Kustra (R-Glenview) introduced legislation this week to permit voters to cast absentee ballots in person at their local township offices or village halls in primary and general elections. Current law permits in-person absentee voting only for nonpartisan and consolidated elections.

Voters in suburban Cook County, who want to cast absentee ballots in person for presidential and statewide elections, must now travel to the County Clerk's office in downtown Chicago. Under Kustra's bill, suburban voters could cast their votes closer to home at their township or village halls.

Commenting on the need to make the law uniform for all elections, Kustra said, "More and more voters are unwilling to send their absentee ballots through the mail. As long as the election apparatus is in place for in-person absentee balloting in the nonpartisan elections, there is no reason why it cannot be extended to the partisan and general elections."

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
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

State police release figures on DUI arrests

Illinois State Police Superintendent R.J. Miller has released figures on State Police arrests for Driving Under the Influence (DUI) for the month of December

and total arrests for the year 1982.

State Police officers arrested 902 drivers for drunk driving in December 1982. Total DUI arrests for the year 1982 numbered 8291. This figure represents a 70% increase when compared to 1981's arrest figure of 4864.

Superintendent Miller stated that the new drunk driving law has helped considerably in the processing of drivers arrested for DUI. Under the old law, it took a Trooper up to 4 hours to process the arrest. Under the current law, a driver can be processed in 1 to 1½ hours.

The utilization of Troopers in numerous federally funded programs administered by the Illinois Department of Transportation, has not only increased the number of DUI arrests, but has also drastically reduced the number of fatal traffic accidents.

Miller emphasized that in single vehicle crashes, between 65% and 75% of the driver fatalities tested had a blood alcohol concentration of .10% or more. Highway deaths, over the past 5 years, involving alcohol, have averaged between 500-600 per year. This represents an economic cost of 1.9 billion dollars a year in Illinois.

The Illinois State Police are pledged to make Illinois highways safe. When you drink it's your business, when you drink and drive it's ours!

Learn how to spot a drunk driver

Here are a few visual cues from the Illinois State Police.

The most obvious and well-known cue is weaving. The driver zig-zags along the road. Swerving and drifting are also good clues the driver may be intoxicated.

Driving too slow is also a fair indicator. If the observed vehicle is driven at a speed which is 10 mph or more below the posted speed limit chances are 50-50 the driver is drunk.

Turning abruptly, illegally, or with a wide radius, are signals to keep away-the driver may have had too much to drink.

Driving at night without headlights, slow response to traffic signals, braking erratically and stopping inappropriately, are all good indicators of drunk driving.

Sometimes the driver just appears to be drunk. For example: Slouching in the seat, gesturing erratically or obscenely, Eye fixation, tightly gripping the steering wheel, face close to the windshield, drinking in the vehicle, driver's head protruding from vehicle.

Remember, these are all just clues - none are absolute! The police can't be everywhere - we need your help. As a motorist, you can help us get the drunk driver off the road before (s)he causes an accident. If you spot one, stop at the nearest phone and call, or notify us on CB Emergency Channel 9.

If you drink it's your business - if you drink and drive it's the Illinois State Police's business!

Egan opposes rise in state income tax

State Senator Robert J. Egan (D-7) announced today that he would "fight to the death" any measure to increase the state income tax without a significant deduction of real estate taxes and passage of a raise in the Homeowner's Exemption. The amount of that exemption to \$3,500 in the last session of the 82nd General Assembly were blocked when the House Speaker refused to call the measure for a vote. Egan is the original sponsor of the legislation which was passed in 1979 at a level of \$1,500. He successfully doubled the exemption to \$3,000 in a four-year period.

Egan plans to reintroduce the Homeowner's Exemption this session with a call for a raise in the exemption. In addition he will also be involved in work on a reform package of the Illinois tax structure.

of a trustee before the spring election. The board's lack of quorum, possibility of a tie vote and library law. The law, read by Pestine, indicated a trusteeship should be filled if 85 days or more remain before election.

Hodes, Rajski and Buck said two months in office would not enable a trustee to become familiar with board matters before possibly being voted out of office and cited unfairness to voters and "controversy highlighting the board."

Three candidates for the vacancy had been interviewed by Pestine, Breitbart and Costello during a committee-of-the-whole meeting one hour before the regular board meeting. Hodes, Rajski and Buck did not come. Hoping for an appointment in executive session that night, interviews began at 7 p.m. with Heidi Majewski, Chris Stout and Terri Carman in attendance. All three formerly picked up petitions and information packets necessary to file as candidates for library trustee this Spring. Another potential candidate, John Sulla, could not come, according to Pestine. Two incumbents, Costello and Breitbart, will probably run for re-election. A tentative agreement, or consensus of board members seemed to be: keep Melzer school open; increase population in both Washington and Melzer schools; not move students in Gregory Circle and consider moving students from Courtland Park to another school.

A spokesman from Nelson school presented an alternate option and said, "It seems to us that you are doing this redistricting solely to balance numbers...so that you can keep one school open." He said a dangerous situation could be created by too many bus routes at Washington school and urged the district to consider a more permanent solution to the problem.

Other factors included by parents regarded safety, walking to school, contiguous borders, busing, gerrymandering of school districts, total redistricting as opposed to two or more schools, and quality education.

Bond said he was pleased with parental concern as well as attendance for discussion of redistricting and asked more input be given by public.

In other board action, approval was given for an engineer's evaluation of former work done by an architectural firm on the Gemini school sanitary system. The evaluation will cost about \$2400.

Also, in regard to Gemini, a contract for more grading, topsoil, sod, replacement of a sidewalk and repair to three manholes was approved at a cost of about \$6,700.

Also, battery packs for the school's emergency lighting were replaced at a cost of about \$6,500. One battery had blown up during testing during the summer.

All schools will have improved fire alarm systems at a cost of about \$3,775.

attending Nelson School would find themselves transferred to nearby Melzer School to help offset the dwindling student population at Melzer School.

Goldstein said there is a distinct possibility that students living only blocks from Nelson School would then have to be bused to Melzer School.

Goldstein said such a plan would decrease the value of Morton Grove homes near Nelson School. "This is a serious problem and Morton Grove can't allow property values to be further depressed," said Goldstein.

Goldstein added, "It makes little sense to disturb an area within walking distance of Nelson School."

The proposal Goldstein asked the Morton Grove Village Board to adopt included bringing in students to Melzer School who are already being bused. In particular, Goldstein said students living in an area north of Golf Rd., who are now being bused, should be transferred to Melzer School before proposing to bus additional students.

Goldstein said his group had collected a petition with 500 names to present to District 63 officials supporting his proposal.

Acting Village President Greg Youstra said the "proposal sounds reasonable," adding, "The Morton Grove community should not be disrupted when there are other alternatives." Trustee Don Snieder also voiced support for the proposal.

The Morton Grove Trustees voted unanimously to support the endorsement and Youstra said he would attend Tuesday night's District 63 meeting and read a letter of support from the Village Board.

In other business, Youstra reported that Morton Grove Mayor Richard Flickinger, who is recovering from a heart attack, is continuing to show improvement. Youstra noted, "He's growing a lot so you know he's feeling better. He has good color. We're looking forward to his return in the near future."

Sneider told the board they should consider a change in the Consumer Protection Ordinance. This follows a request by Dominicks Finer Foods, 6931 Dempster St., to use foam trays, rather than the plastic ones they're using now, to place meat on which is then wrapped in plastic.

Morton Grove's current code prohibits the use of the foam trays. However, during a test period recently completed to determine how consumers felt about the foam trays there were no complaints when foam trays were used, said Sneider.

He said no action would be taken on the matter until it was determined which cuts of meat could be placed on the foam trays.

Village Clerk Jerry Schuhrke announced two nights have been set aside for voter registration before the upcoming election. The Village Hall will be kept open late and residents will be able to register to vote from 7 to 9 p.m. on Feb. 17 and March 3.

Regarding the upcoming election, Sneider said the village cable committee is considering televising the candidates' debate being planned by the League of Women Voters.

Lastly, Trustee Joan Dechert announced that she and Sneider have been working on "tightening up" some language and definitions in the village zoning ordinances.

will have to transfer in the Golf Mill Center along with other Golf Road residents if they desire to be bused into areas south of Golf Mill.

A new route will cost about \$23,900 plus maintenance for the buses. It will raise the total cost of the free bus service to \$322,000.

Following the shooting of Terry, the robbers were told by employees of the restaurant that only Terry had the combination to the safe containing the night's receipts. At that point they took Terry's car and fled into Morton Grove where the car was abandoned two blocks west of Edens Expressway.

Police speculate they were picked up by an accomplice.

Terry, an eight year employee of Burger King, had worked at the Dempster St. Burger King for only two months.

Terry, who served four years in the Navy, is survived by two brothers and a sister.


