

It really didn't help the complaintants since we referred most problems to the local Consumer Fraud Department. We were merely duplicating efforts which were already set-up in the community by an agency which was created to help with these same problems.

Many of us are aware something has happened in the land which is disturbing. Putting it in its simplest terms, "We're getting ripped off."

Our utility bills have been zooming through the ceiling. And the quality of work at all levels has, at best, become indifferent. The making of the fast easy buck has become a way of life.





"Family Fun" carnivals a thing of the past

The days of considering neighborhood carnivals a source of family fun and entertainment are over. They have become too expensive for a family to enjoy with rides costing 50¢, 75¢ and even a dollar for the biggies. A family with three children could spend a pretty ducat in a few hours.

In addition, what one of our letter writers referred to in last week's Bugle as the "sleazy element" not only comes with the carnival personnel, but many of the attendees at these neighborhood carnivals also fall into this same element.

This has become a tremendous source of irritation to residents whose homes border the Lawrencewood Shopping Center where the Niles Events carnival was held last month. TIPS FOR SPEAKING TO THE HARD-OF-HEARING 1. The face and mouth of the speaker should be clearly visible stand on the same level as the listener, avoid glaring light, don't talk from another room, keep hands away from face, and avoid eating, chewing or smoking while speaking. 2. Speak slowly and with clarity, pause between phrases, and do

3. If a person has difficulty understanding some particular phrase or word, try to re-phrase your statement rather than repeating the original words over. 4. If you are giving specific information, such as a time or place,

be sure it is repeated back to you by the hard-of-hearing person. Many numbers and words sould alike. 5. Avoid sudden changes of topic in the conversation and do not drop the tone of voice at the end of a sentence.

Walking may just be the most beneficial exercise for senior citizens. Walking as an exercise, stimulates blood circulation which in turn can strengthen the heart muscle, lower the heart rate and blood pressure, and increase energy for other tasks. Walking at different places can be enjoyed by those with limited agility or can become a strenuous workout for those with more

year in that office. The men and their counterparts from the Auxiliary Unit will be installed in formal ceremonies as is traditional, in the fall.


