## Disagree on Park District annexation

At a post-board committee meeting Tuesday night, Niles Park Board okayed sending a letter to 325 residents west of Washington St., between Oakton and Bruce Streets, seeking information on whether or not they would be interested in annexing into Niles Park District. Presently, they are Niles village residents but Park Ridge Park District members.

While Niles park board members approved creating the letter three months ago, park commissioner Dan Kosiba objected to the tenure of the letter at Tuesday night's committee meeting. Kosiba wanted a letter sent to the residents explaining non-resident rates would apply to them since they are not tax-paying park district residents. Kosiba said if they want to disannex from the Park Ridge district and annex into Niles park district, "they should take the ball". He thought a letter intimating Niles Park District was

initiating any annexation would anger Park Ridge's Park District as well as the residents.

After a lengthy discussion the board voted to have park attorney Berrafato tone down the letter. Berrafato said he thought the letter should neither encourage nor discourage residents to annex into the district but merely present the facts concerning their choices. He said the ensuing court case would note the board urged the residents to annex. He said it was obvious the Park Ridge Park District would be losing property valuation within its district if the 325 homes under consideration left their park district.

Committee chairman Jim Pierski and commissioner Mary Marusek both fought to keep the substance of the letter intact.

In the letter it states: "It is our hope that you petition for de-annexation from the Park Ridge Park District and petition for annexation into Niles Park District."

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## Oakton approves \$19 million budget

A \$19 million dollar operating budget was approved Tuesday night by the Oakton Community College Board of Trustees for fiscal year 1983-84.

The approved expenditures represent a 7.2% increase over last year's budget, according to David Hilquist, Vice President of Business and Finance, who added, "This increase probably represents our lowest ever."

In a related move, the board also approved a \$ million dollar

property tax levy for Community College District 535.

Almost half, 49.3% of Oakton's total revenue comes from local property taxes, which Hilquist referred to as, "One of the highest ratios in the state." Tuition and fees account for 17.9%, while the state contributes 14%.

Oakton President W.A. Koehnline told the board that as of September 10, 9,710 students had enrolled at the college, with

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## MG to debate handgun ordinance

"Is Morton Grove the answer?"

The controversial Morton Grove ordinance outlawing handguns will be debated in the Elgin Public Library, Thursday, September 29, at 7:30 p.m.

The participants are: Martin Ashman, Village Attorney of Morton Grove, who drafted the ordinance and has successfully defended it in state and federal courts; and Victor Quilici, attorney and resident of Morton Grove, who brought suit to over-

throw the ordinance and; with others, is seeking a hearing by the United States Supreme Court.

Their confrontation will take on the aspects of a courtroom drama with each attorney subject to cross-examination by the other.

Hailed nation-wide by advocates of handgun control and damned by anti-control forces, the ordinance bans possession of handguns within the village limits except by police, military, etc. A similar ordinance has been enacted in Evanston and is under consideration in Skokie and other communities.

# Oakton seeks input on Family Education Center

## Early delivery of Social Security checks

Monthly Supplemental Security Income (SSI) checks which are normally delivered on the first day of the month, will be delivered on September 30 instead, according to Marilyn Robertson, manager of the Des Plaines Social Security office.

"Benefit checks are mailed early when the usual delivery date falls on a Saturday, Sunday or legal holiday," Robertson said. "In these instances, the checks are dated and delivered on the first day before the first of the month that is not a weekend or holiday."

Robertson stated that this procedure helps reduce the problems that people have when they receive their checks and their banks are closed. These situations occur several times during the year, and Robertson added that SSA would provide similar information about early check deliveries as they occur.

A Midwest first - a Center for Family Education, geared to meet the growing Educational needs of families - is being developed at Oakton Community College.

Helene Block, OCC professor of child care services, is in charge of the Center's development and is urging interested community agencies to share ideas and suggestions for the new project.

The Center for Family Education is the culmination of a sabbatical taken last year by Ms. Block, during which she traveled to various areas of the country investigating infant/toddler centers on college campuses, parenting programs and intergenerational programs.

When the Center materializes, credit course offerings in areas such as parenting, the working woman, aging and divorce will be added to existing OCC courses such as "Child Growth and Development" and "The Psychology of Personal Growth." New courses will be created for the Center for Family Education as the need arises.

In addition, a referral network is planned to make information

available about community family-related programs.

"Many times people who live in Glencoe, for example, have no idea about a program offered somewhere in Niles or Park Ridge," Ms. Block said. "We have 30 organizations that want to be on a task force exploring this idea, including mental health, education, hospital and health care and gerontology agencies."

Now, Ms. Block is looking for more input from the Oakton community. "We want as many ideas and suggestions as we can get," she said. "I want to know the kinds of things that people are interested in."

Ms. Block said a small number of pilot classes will be planned for Spring, 1984, with full implementation scheduled for next fall.

"We want to try a few credit courses and see how it goes," she said, "before we get into it full swing. We're still very much open to ideas and suggestions and hope anyone who's interested does contact us."

### Watch for school speed zones

School signs are shaped like an old schoolhouse. School area signs warn of school grounds next to the roadway or established school crossings ahead. School crossing signs are erected at the crosswalk and are used where there are school crossing signals.

Adult crossing guards, auxiliary police and police officers frequently supervise crossings for students going to and from

school. Students safety patrol members may assist the crossing guards. Watch particularly for small children, who are difficult to see and unpredictable in their actions. They may dart unexpectedly into the street in front of you.

You should slow down whenever nearing a school zone. Classes may be held at different hours and many activities are held at night.

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

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

## Surgery Instead of Glasses?

Eye Surgeons are now performing an outpatient corrective procedure which can eliminate dependency on eyeglasses in the vast majority of people who are only able to see sharply up close.

The procedure, which takes under an hour, is performed while the patient's eye is numbed and with the patient sedated to the point of not caring. Using an operating microscope, a micrometer-adjusted diamond scalpel and an ultrasonic computer, the eye surgeon places incisions into the clear front wall of the eye to change its curve to provide for proper focusing of light within the eye. One eye is done at a time; people return to work in a week; the second eye is usually done eight weeks later. Reoperations are possible and are occasionally needed to gain best correction. Success in gaining legal driving vision without glasses is about 90% for most who depend on glasses before the procedure.

First developed in the Soviet Union where the first human operation was performed in 1973, the procedure was first done in the United States in 1978 and since then, some 25,000 operations have been performed here. In the entire U.S. experience there have been four cases of serious complication requiring surgical intervention and none has resulted in blindness. F.A.A. examiners accept good vision from radial keratotomy and so do local and federal law enforcement agencies, though the armed services have knowingly accepted only a few test candidates as yet.

The procedure, called radial keratotomy, is most helpful to adults 18 to 55 years old, who wish to free themselves of glasses for careers in the airlines, in law enforcement, and in fire protection, and for those motivated for personal reasons but for whom contact lenses have not worked. Try this leg-stretcher: Stand comfortably and extend your right leg behind you as far back as possible in a straight line. Hold position for a count of five. Repeat with left leg.

### LWV clarifies questions on Cable TV meeting

Dear Editor:

The League of Women Voters of Morton Grove-Niles would like to thank you for attending our Public Access cable television program on September 13th. We are aware of the time and effort you made in preparing your Sept. 15th article about our program, in trying to get the several sides of the issue that cropped up over that meeting. After reading your article, I feel the need to clarify a few discrepancies that your various interviews revealed, and to present the League's position in this matter.

Your statements from Tony Naughton, of Cablevision, were the same as I, as President of LWV of Morton Grove-Niles, had received Tuesday morning from him when he suddenly withdrew Cablevision from our program scheduled for that same evening. He also stated in our conversation that he had the technicians and equipment ready to go for the evening's program if he would just get the O.K. from Mayor Blase. It is curious to note, however, that subsequent callers to Cablevision have gotten such varied excuses from them as "everyone had to attend a Cablevision meeting scheduled two months prior for that September 13th evening" or "they didn't have the time or equipment or personnel to attend" and suddenly Tony Naughton is not available for these complaint calls. Question: If Cablevision's first obligation is the village which regulates the franchise, what numbered obligation is the subscriber?

The interview with Councilman Marcheschi where he states: "The League should have cleared the program with the village." League is under no normal obligation to have to clear its

program with any local government, as it has the same rights as any chartered group to hold meetings. But in this particular case, League did mention this meeting three times prior to Sept. 8th to Niles officials: 1. Heidi Majewski, Chairman of this program, phoned Mr. Marcheschi July 15th and told him what we were planning. He offered no help but suggested she call Cablevision. 2. Past-President, Joan Goldberg, spoke with Mayor Blase and Mr. Marcheschi about the upcoming program on July 26th after adjournment of the Village Board meeting. 3. A full-page colored flyer describing the meeting was included in the August issue of our League Bulletin of which each Niles official gets a complimentary copy. This was received by them about Sept. 1st. At none of these times was there ever mention that in order for Cablevision to be able to participate in our meeting, Mayor Blase and Mr. Marcheschi had to be included in the program. They were welcome to attend the meeting, as the public was welcome also, and I had phoned the Mayor's office September 12th to remind them of this and urge them to attend as part of the general audience. They would have been welcomed and introduced and would have been as free as our audience was to ask questions and/or answer them. I had explained to Mr. Naughton that if any too-specific question was asked about public access Cablevision in Niles, that he could just explain that detail hasn't been worked out yet. We were not trying to get Cablevision to speak for the Village of Niles franchise that has to be determined, in part, by the Niles officials. This, however, does raise

the blessing of the new year to everyone on the village board. It went on ad nauseum.

The Jewish themes were on thruout the evening. People who have never thought about the holocaust were suddenly brought up the subject to gain a point. The pro-gun people suggested if the Jewish people in Europe had guns, they would have had a better chance. They pointed to the Warsaw ghetto fighters as proof people with weapons can defend themselves.

The anti-gun people contended this is a phony argument. They said if the Polish army, with highly sophisticated weapons, couldn't hold off the German army, how could individuals with handguns confront the German onslaught.

The pro-gun people were pushing to have a referendum on the issue. Several speakers said they were neutral concerning the matter but would like the Skokie residents to vote in a referendum. The Skokie board will reach its decision at their October 3rd meeting.

Despite the emotion and tension in the hall, the meeting was conducted with great aplomb. When the last speaker was heard, Mayor Al Smith commended the audience for its decorum. Exiters from the hall left on a very low key.

Since no decision was reached Monday night, the high charge was taken out of the meeting. Village board members will vote October 3rd. It's quite likely Skokie will follow Morton Grove and Evanston in banning handguns.

American Library Association, the Indiana Library Association, and a past officer of the Michigan Library Association. He has been cited for his innovative approaches to librarianship by *Library Journal*.

Interim administrator, Robert Young, has been named first "administrator emeritus" of the Niles Library District.

In other matters, board members approved a two mill levy for maintenance and support of library facilities as well as a Budget and Appropriation Ordinance which is to be filed with the County Clerk.

In other action, almost routine approval of a new staff member became bogged down in a debate over appropriate salaries for all library personnel. Several board members took the opportunity to protest salary rates. Board member Myles Dimand said, "There are some of us who are trying to send out a signal we are in favor of higher salaries."

Board member Margaret Rajski asked that salaries be evaluated within two months and placed on average with those of surrounding suburbs. Otherwise a re-adjustment of salaries will not take place until January. Her motion was tabled.

Police security costs for the library will be reduced from \$15 an hour to \$6.25 an hour according to board president Harry Pestine citing a communication from the administration of Niles. Pestine said costs are being reduced because of the library's

tax-supported base. According to one library trustee, members of the board's finance committee considered discharging all police security because of a projected \$7,000 expense next year.

When questioned, Pestine did not explain how the security issue came to the attention of village personnel.

Pestine also reported the State Librarian has not sent notice concerning the success or failure of grants toward a library construction fund. Reportedly, Illinois is not able to release funds for the grant at this time.

In former board action, board trustees approved purchases and installation of five air conditioners for the branch library. Heat at the branch soared at least 100 degrees or over causing the smoke detectors to go off.

for the Village consisted of a provision in the Agreement that could have delayed an increase for a few months, but may not have prevented an increase after the delay. Continental took a position that the provision was inapplicable and strongly indicated that the Village would have to enter into litigation to give effect to that particular provision. The Village was then in the position of having to weigh the cost of litigation against any gain assuming the Village were successful in the lawsuit. Continental Cable indicated they were not inclined to engage in a lawsuit and were willing to make the following concessions to the Village in order to avoid litigation which they felt was not desirable for their public image. They agreed to "freeze" their modified increase in rates to August, 1985, although, under the terms of the current agreement, they could again raise rates in August of 1984, based on the Consumer Price Index. They further agreed to modify their increase by reducing the charge for additional TV sets and giving a \$1 reduction in basic cable charges to Senior Citizens. They also agreed to modify the agreement by giving a broader definition to the term "gross revenues" which would result in a small increase in the revenues the Village derives from the cable franchise.

Out of the above background came the decision of the Village not to litigate at this time as the cost of litigation would outweigh any slight or temporary gain to the residents of the Village. The Mayor, the trustees and members of the Cable Committee were all absolutely against the increase; however, based on the above, it would not have been prudent to incur the expensive cost of litigation at the present time.

28%, or 4,890 being full-time. Koehnline stated this represents a 1% increase over last year, and advised the board that yearly enrollment increases of 5% are a thing of the past, although 1% or 2% increases can be expected throughout the decade.

According to U.S. Census Bureau data, the projected number of college-age students, those 17 to 19, will drop 23% by 1989 within Oakton's district.

Lastly, it was announced that Oakton will receive a \$49,480 abstract stainless steel sculpture through the Illinois Capital Development Board. The sculptor, Barry Tinsley, will erect the 17 ft. x 25 ft. x 42 ft. work, entitled "Silver Oak" in October on Oakton's Golf Road campus.

nextion into the Niles Park District. By your doing this you would be keeping all of your real estate taxes in Niles and also, "realigning" park boundaries to coincide with village boundaries. If you elect to stay in the Park Ridge Park District, we will adopt the policy of "non-residents" rates at Niles Park District facilities.

The second page of the letter is a fact sheet citing Niles district's facilities and includes comparable tax rates for the two districts. Niles tax rate is .3090 per \$100 assessed valuation while Park Ridge is .480. Including the Park Ridge bond indebtedness which must be paid until 1991, Niles rate would be .4522 which the sheet notes is a savings of .0278 over the Park Ridge rate.

The third page of the letter is a response questionnaire in which residents reply if they would be interested in annexing into the Niles Park District, would be interested in circulating petitions for such an annexation, would only be interested in signing a petition, or are undecided or would prefer to remain in the

Park Ridge District. At the bottom of the questionnaire is space for additional comments from the respondents.

"We're eager to see the world as Lincolnwood young people see it through a camera lens," said Linda Wieber, Children's Services Coordinator. Winners will be announced November 19.


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
