Surgery **Instead of Glasses?**

Eye Surgeons are now performing an outpatient corrective procedure which can eliminate dependency on eyegiasses in the vast majority of people who are only able to see sharply up close.

The procedure, which takes under an hour, is performed while the patient's eye is numbed and with the patient sedated to the point of not caring. Using an operating microscope, a micrometer-adjusted diamond scalpel and an ultrasonic computer, the eye surgeon places incisions into the clear front wall of the eye to change its curve to provide for proper focusing of light within the eye. One eye is done at a time; people return to work in a week; the second eye is usually done eight weeks later. Reoperations are possible and are occasionally needed to gain best correction. Success in gaining legal driving vision without glasses is about 90% for most who depend on glasses before the procedure.

First developed in the Soviet Union where the first human operation was performed in 1973, the procedure was first done in the United States in 1978 and since then, some 25,000 operations have been performed here. In the entire U.S. experience there have been four cases of serious complication requiring surgical intervention and none has resulted in blindness. F.A.A. examiners accept good vision from radial karatotomy and so do local and federal law enforcement agencies, though the armed services have knowingly accepted only a few test candidates as yet.

The procedure, called radial karatotomy, is most helpful to adults 18 to 55 years old, who wish to free themselves of glasses for careers in the airlines, in law enforcement, and in fire protection, and for those motivated for personal reasons but for whom contact lenses have not worked. Pull Shades On Winter Heat Loss

When it comes to rating the worst squanderers of home energy. windows rank second only to an uninsulated attic. according to the U.S. Department of Energy.

In winter. windows are expecially energy-wasteful. They are responsible for as much as 35 percent of heat loss in a typical house. That's because window glass is a conductor of heat. In fact, 3 to 4 times more costly furnace-generated heat is lost through the window than through the sash around it. In a study conducted at the Illinois Institute of Technology. researchers tested out standard window shades that retail for less than \$6 each. Their findings: shades keep in 24 to 31 percent of the heat that normally escapes through windows.

Here's how. When shades are drawn, heat "bounces" back like a basketball off a backboard. That is why the Window Shade Manufacturers Association suggests that when it is most cold outside - in the evening, at night. and during the early morning - pull your shades down to the sill. Be sure there is very little space between the vertical edges of the shade and the window frame. This will block the escape of interior heat. During the sunny hours, raise the shades and let the sun warm up the inside.

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LIGHTING TIPS TO CONTROL ELECTRIC BILL

Edison Electric Institute suggests you try these ideas to control your electric bill. Urge people to turn off lights on leaving a room. This habit can be encouraged more easily when every area

has its own wall switch (threeway switches for spaces having two entryways). Provide "task" lighting (over desks. tool benches,

sewing tables. etc.) so that work and leisure activities can be carried on without illumininating entire rooms. Select the type of lighting

fixtures on the basis of their efficiency. Fluorescent lamps produce about four times as much light per watt as do incandescent bulbs.

The reflectance of interior surfaces has an important bearing on lighting efficiency. In home decoration. therefore. choose lighter colors for walls. ceilings. floor and furniture. Dark colors absorb light and would require higher lamp wattage for a given level of illumination. Lightcolored surfaces should be kept clean to keep reflectance near like-new value.

Consider replacing incandescent lights in outdoor lighting fixtures with the new sodium vapor lights now available for residential applications. They consume less energy for a given light output and have a longer life.

In lamps and fixtures having two or more sockets for incandescent bulbs, consider using a single large bulb in one socket rather than filling all sockets with bulbs of smaller wattage. A 100-watt bulb, for instance, produces 50 percent more light than four 25-watt bulbs for the same amount of energy.

check the ratings of all incandescent light bulbs in the house. In many cases a lower wattage bulb can be substituted for the one now being

So-called "long-life" bulbs emit less light than a standard incandescent bulb of the smae wattage. They should be used only where the longlife feature is advantageous. as in hard-to-reach places.

If possible. locate floor, table and hanging lamps in the corner of a room rather than against a flat wall. Lamps in corners refect light from two wall surfaces instead of one and, therefore, give more usable light.

Clean lighting fixtures regularly. Dust on lamps and reflectors impairs lighting efficiency.

For large areas such as family recreation rooms where high levels of lighting are required periodically but not 100 percent of the time. install fixtures on two or three separate circuits so illumination can be controlled by switching circuits on and

and furniture in the basement were engulfed by the fire. Fire officials said the intense heat of the flames caused windows to begin shattering.

By 3:11 a.m. most of the fire had been put out. However, fire and smoke damage left the house ininhabitable.

Commenting on the intensity of the fire and smoke, Sosnowski said, "I'm amazed that all three people got out....if the son in the asement hadn't awakened, we

would have had three fatalities." Sosnowski said damage to the house itself was placed at \$20,000 and an additional \$10,000 in contents were destroyed.

which published the story. This week Bob Besser worked overtime trying to develop a local story concerning the Lebanon tragedy. He first contacted local clergymen thinking grieving parents might be in touch with them. He called the Marine headquarters in Washington D.C. and got no information. He got busy signals over a 24 hour period. He next telephoned the Marine recruiting offices in Glenview, Des Plaines and in Chicago. He was unable to get any help from Senator Percy's press secretary. At the home news office of the U.S. Marines in Texas, they were most cordial

but could not lend help. The only local boys he found out about were police officer Bob Hanna's son and a young man named Jordan, from Nordica Avenue, who are both on the U.S.S. New Jersey, which is anchored just off Beirut. Hanna said his son could only give limited intelligence since he's a baker below deck and often doesn't see the light of day.

Interestingly, Mrs. Hanna sent a newsclip from The Bugle to her son letting him know Jordan, another Niles young man, is also serving on the same ship.

Since local news is what it's all about we should let you know there's three special Nilesites, Isabell Curtin, Bill Hlavacek and John Zaba, who have been manning (and womaning) the Niles Village free blood pressure service for the past 10 years. Bill, who has been retired the past few years, after serving as Niles Health inspector, said the blood pressure program has administered to almost 23,000 people during the past decade. The free service is available to anyone including residents

John was a village trustee in Niles for 12 years during the booming fifties and early sixties. He grew up in the Lincoln and Belmont Lakeview area. He went to St. Michael's school on Hudson and Cleveland but never graduated. He was the son of a millhand and had two brothers. During the dark depression days John worked on a WPA project in the Skokie lagoon. His early jobs in cluded hammering out gold leaf which was used for lettering on windows. This was in the era before we went off the gold standard. He also worked as an upholsterer for Valentine and Sievers on Diversey and Crawford.

We believe it was in 1941 when he came to Niles. Mike said his brother borrowed \$500 from his fatherin-law and bought a \$6,000 common brick house on Osceola Avenue in Niles' Grennan Heights area. He subsequently became a painter-decorator and became very successful during the era when Niles population went from about 3,000 to more than 20,000 during the '50-'60 era.

John became very successful. It is always interesting hearing stories of men with humble backgrounds who succeed. In the years we knew John, he was a major mover in the Niles Lions Club. He was also most proud of reminding us about his efforts in helping bring the Golf Mill Shopping Center into Niles.

In the late fifties the Golf Mill area at Golf Road was a mile north of Niles' northern border at Dempster street. When Golf Mill sought Niles city water, trustee John Stanley insisted Golf Mill sign an agreement to annex into Niles if the village borders were alongside the center. Poeschl nightly went with Stanley to landowners between Dempster Street and Golf Road. If a landowner on the west side of Milwaukee Avenue would balk at annexing into Niles, they would cross the street and seek east side landowners to annex into the village. Like playing checkers Stanley, aided by Poeschl, would go to the landowners and cross back and forth over Milwaukee Avenue. To annex into a community, the land had to abut alongside each lot or be directly across the street from annexed or village property. It was a laborious task. But their good efforts has resulted in Niles now receiving \$1 million to \$2 million annually from the center in sales tax revenue alone. It's the reason Niles is the only village in the area to have 8 free buses and to have social services superior to any other town in the area. There's a ring of Horatio

Alger in John Poeschl's life. His efforts in Grennan Heights and in the Golf Mill annexation will be a legacy which Nilesites will profit from for years ad infinitum.

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
